Conclusions

The Fastigial Oculomotor Region (FOR) ensures the spatial congruence between : - the location of a stationary visual target (peripheral or foveal locus of activity) and - the endpoint of a saccade toward this location (oculomotor commands).

The FOR is mostly involved in the control of the amplitude of the horizontal component (more information during the symposium #10 "Vertical eye movements" at the Barany meeting).

The control is exerted during fixation and during saccades by the balance of activity between the left and right FOR.

During saccadic gaze shifts, the control is restricted to the oculomotor system (or « small » gaze shifts). Additional mechanisms must be recruited for coupling the eye saccades with head movements and/or body movements during locomotion.

The two FOR influence the accuracy of saccades by their projections toward the EBN/IBN region. They participate to encoding the location of foveal targets by their projections toward the rostral SC.

Perturbation of the rostral SC does not affect the accuracy of saccades to peripheral targets but leads to a fixation offset which is similar to that observed after cFN inactivation.
