## Behavioral and neuro-anatomical differences

In the monkey, a spatial deficit similar to the cat is observed when one tests fixational saccades (miniature saccades generated when a visual target is being fixated) (*Guerrasio et al. JNP 2010*).

The different gaze disorders could result from differences in the extent of fastigio-tectal projections.
