behavior, compensating for idiosyncratic differences in neuromuscular morphology and anisotropies in the mechanisms triggering and executing fixational saccades."



IF fixation is the maintenance of gaze within a spatio-temporal window THEN how do we foveate a moving target ?









































Working hypothesis

Gaze direction is driven by a *flow of expected target positions*

This flow is an internal model that has been learned and embodied.

 \rightarrow There is no need for encoding the location of the target in the future.

→ The brain needs to build up an estimate of *expected here-and-now* target position.

 \rightarrow Obviously, this estimate is not stationary, the oculomotor system reads out a signal out of a memory (register) that *temporally unfolds*.

This dynamic signal feeds the same local feedback loop involved in the generation of saccades toward a stationary target.
