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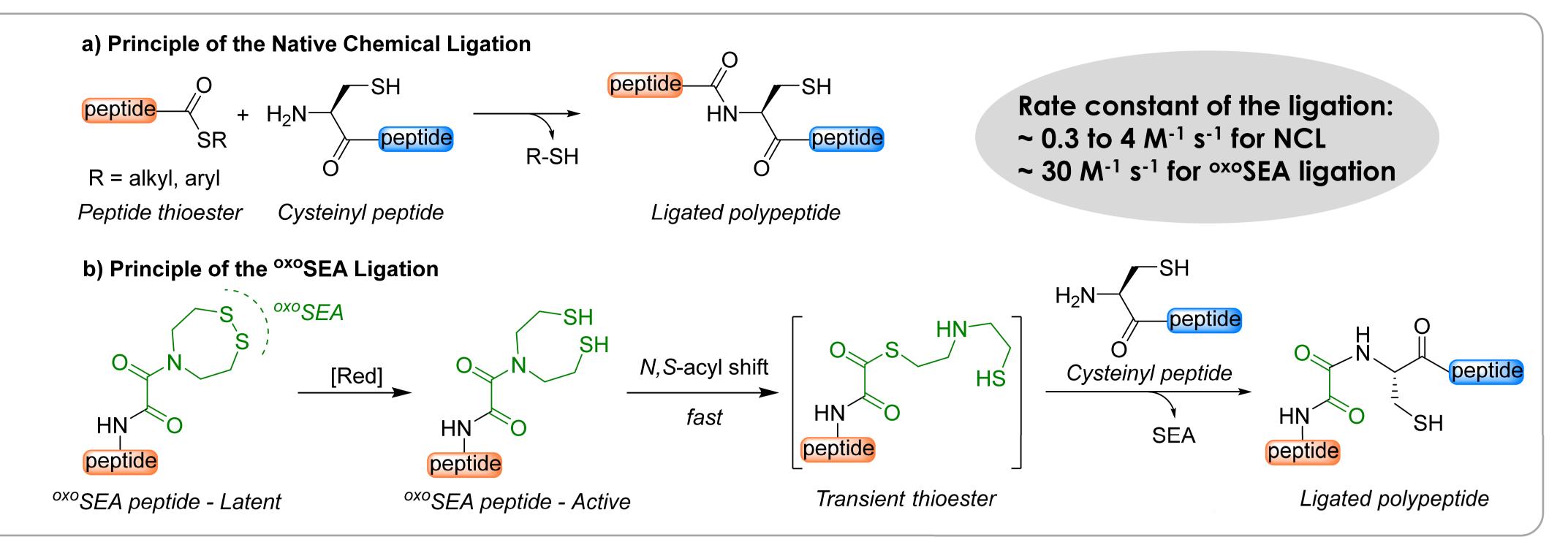
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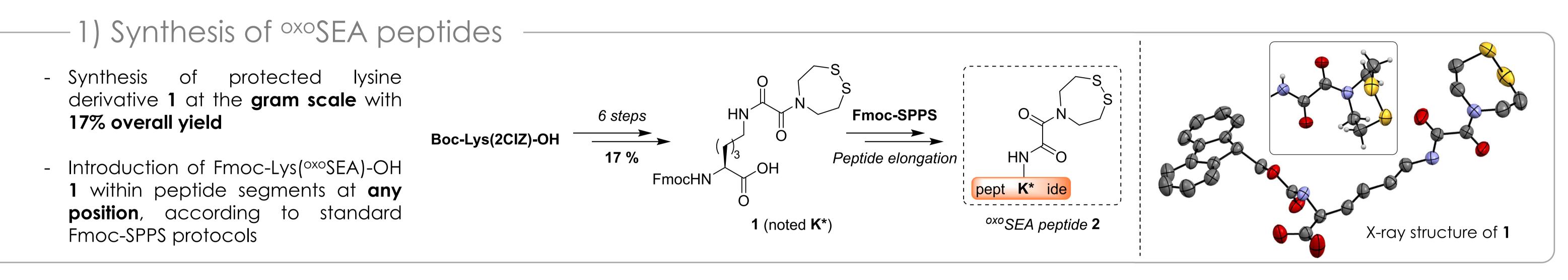

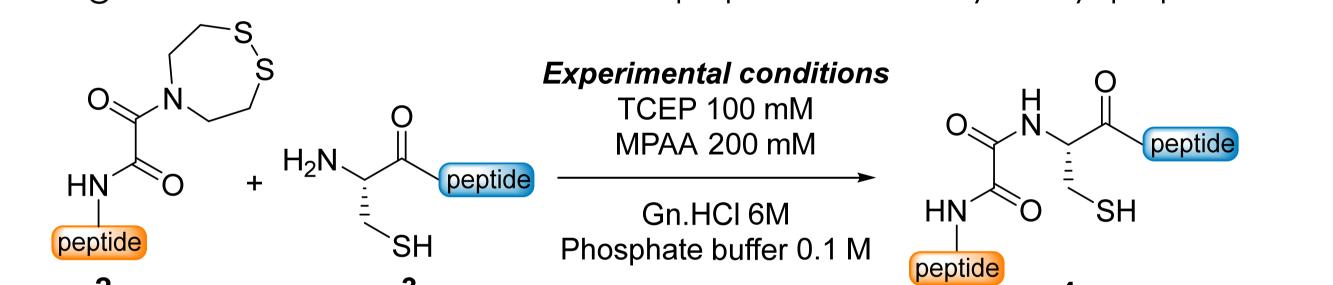
Introduction -

The **Chemical Protein Synthesis** has highly benefitted from the properties of the thioester particular in with the functional group, development of the Native Chemical Ligation reaction.<sup>1,2</sup> However, NCL-based (NCL) modification of proteins suffers from the moderate reactivity of classical alkyl and aryl thioesters<sup>3</sup>, especially in highly dilute media. Seeking for fast reactive thioesters surrogates, we have discovered that oxalyl amide SEA (oxoSEA), in the form of a latent thioester precursor,<sup>4</sup> could, upon activation, act as a powerful acylating agent in chemoselective ligation reactions with  $\beta$ -aminothiols such as the cysteine residue.

#### Investigation on the reaction of $^{oxo}$ SEA peptide **2** with cysteinyl peptide **3**.

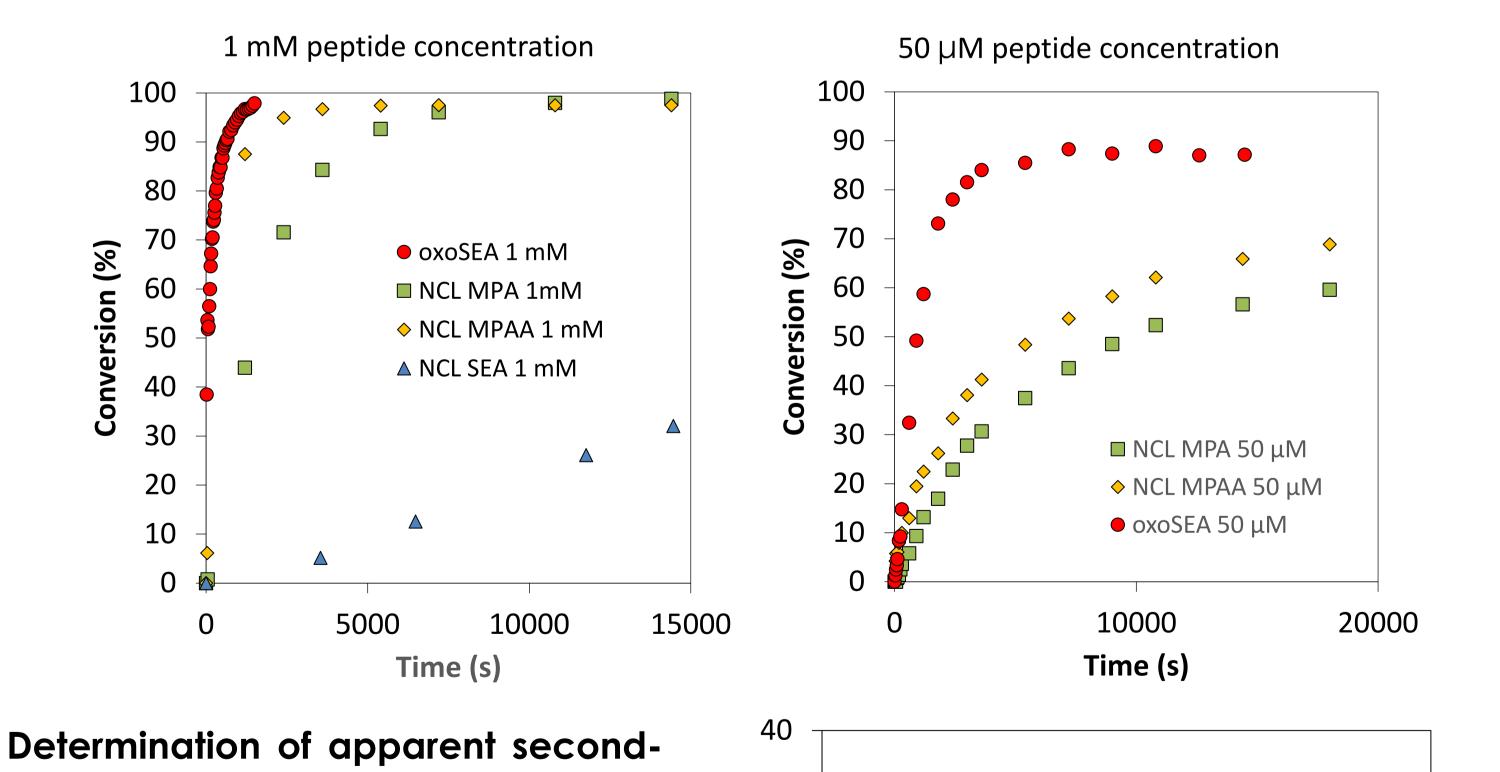
### -3) Nanomolar concentration range

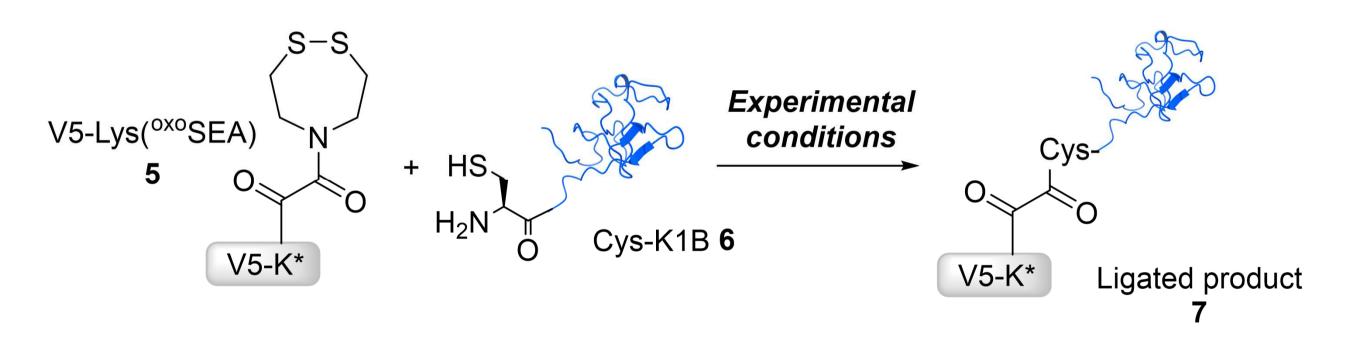
To further explore the performance of the  $^{oxo}$ SEA-mediated ligation in the **nanomolar concentration range**, we opted for SDS-PAGE separation followed by Western Blot as the analysis tool. This allowed us to work at the protein level by monitoring the reaction between the  $^{oxo}$ SEA peptide derived from V5 peptidic tag **5** and the C-terminally biotinylated kringle 1 domain of the hepatocyte growth factor (K1/HGF) equipped with a N-terminal cysteine **6**.

### <sup>oxo</sup>SEA ligation with a peptide concentration of 1 mM is:

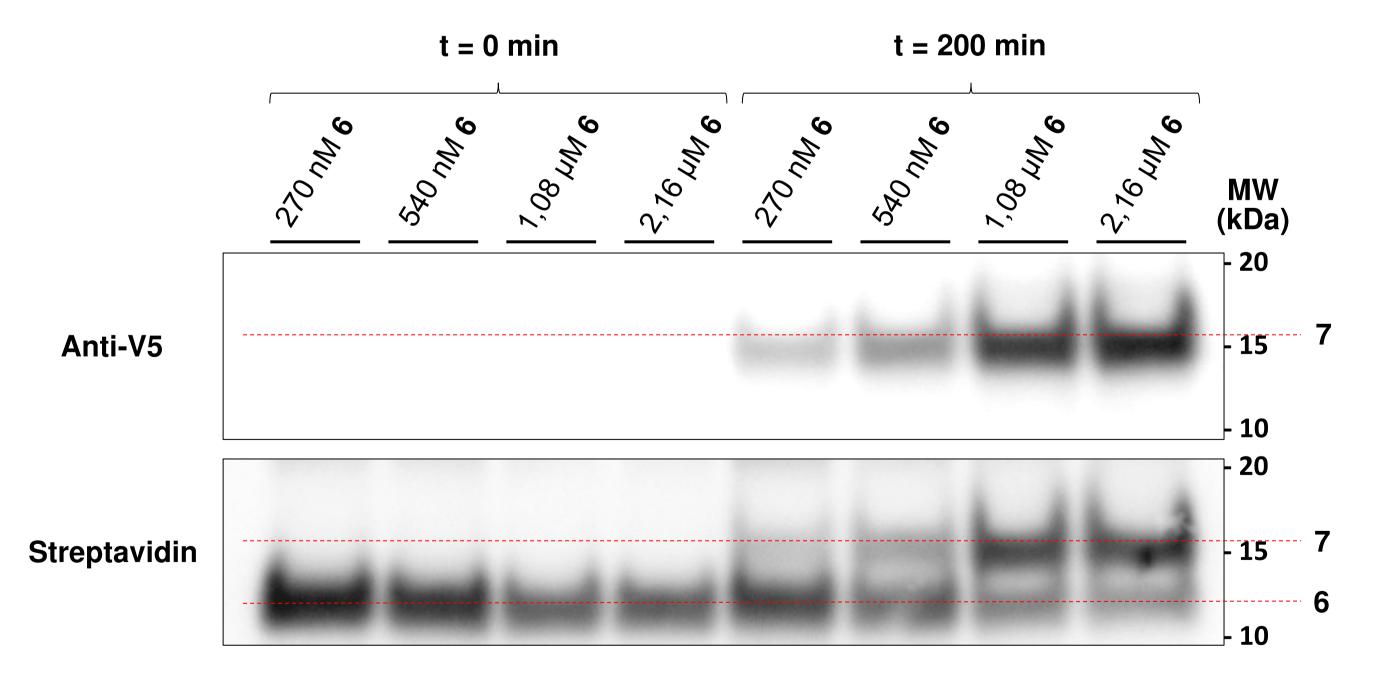
- **Efficient** (HPLC conversions to polypeptide **4** beyond 95%)
- **Fast** (Half-reaction time of 200 s)
- Optimal at a working pH = 5,5
- Triggered by reductants (TCEP)

Comparison with classical NCL rates highlighted the tremendous reactivity of the  $^{0x0}$ SEA group, even more when decreasing peptide concentration to 50  $\mu$ M.





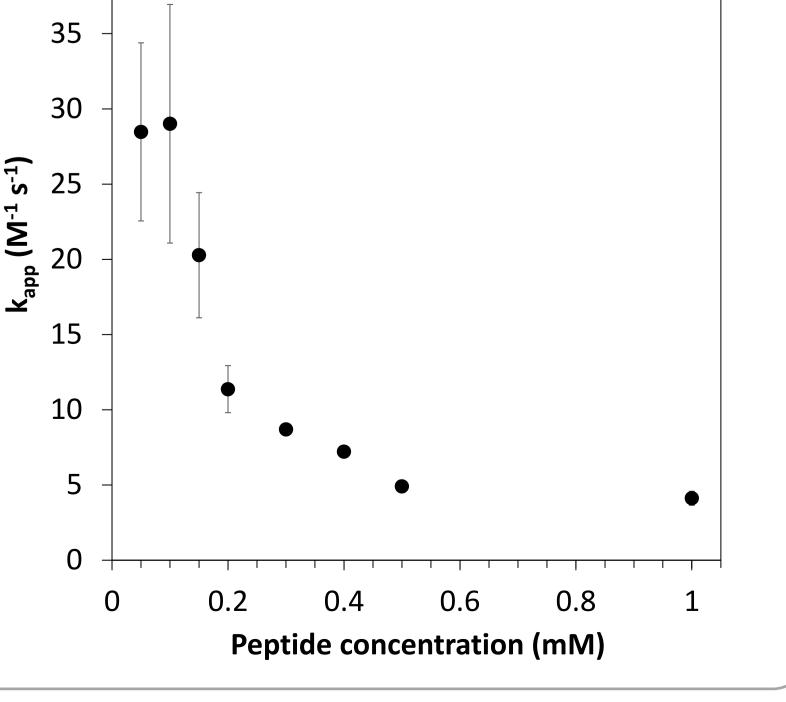
- Detection of ligated product **7** after 200 minutes of reaction
- <sup>oxo</sup>SEA ligation effective in highly dilute solution, with peptide concentration of **270 nM**



Moreover, this ligation reaction is also efficient and chemoselective in a **complex protein medium**, as it has been successfully performed in a crude protein extract of a THP-1 whole cell lysate supplemented **with 100 nM of 6** in the presence of a 15-fold excess of **5 (see article)**.

order rate constant for the oxoSEA ligation in the micromolar concentration range:

- Diminution of the peptide concentration led to the increase of the rate constant
- Rate break at 150 µM, and below this concentration value, apparent second- order rate constant thrives around **30 M<sup>-1</sup> s<sup>-1</sup>**



# - Conclusion -

The groundbreaking reactivity of this **activatable oxalyl thioester surrogate** allows us to perform peptide and protein modification through a **chemoselective ligation reaction**. The latter proceeds extremely fast in aqueous media, under mild conditions and in **highly dilute medium** which can be as complex as a cell lysate. By being easy to introduce within peptide segments in the form of a lysine derivative, oxalyl thioesters might be of significant importance for the development of novel **crosslinking strategies** or the **polycondensation of water-soluble (bio)molecules**.
