Supplementary information for "Variable-Depth Simulation of Most Permissive Boolean Networks" – Simulation results

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Results of the simulation of models from literature with the following parameters:

- full asynchronous, with depth=1 and $W = 10_{n-1}$
- (general) asynchronous with depth=1 and $W = \mathbf{1}_n$
- random walk in full MP dynamics with depth=n and $W = \mathbf{1}_n$
- full MP dynamics with random depth following negative exponential distribution: for each $d \in \{1, \ldots, n\}$, depth=d with probability $1/(2^d.M)$ where $M = \sum_{j=1}^n 1/2^j$ and $W = \mathbf{1}_n$.

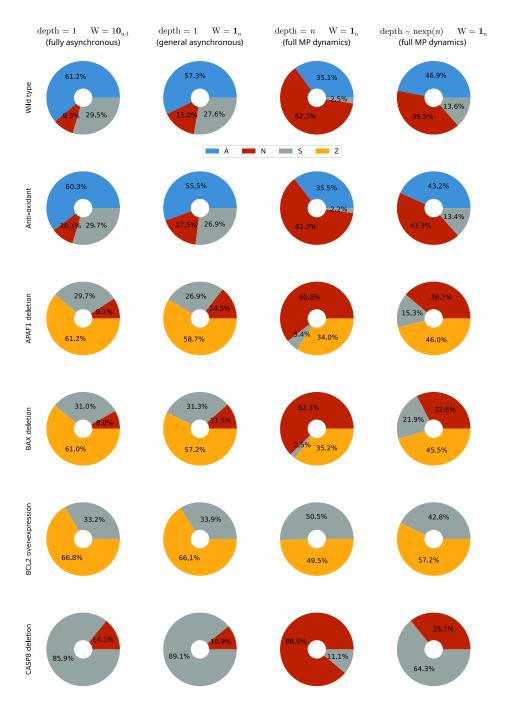


Fig. 1. Simulation results for the cell death receptor model (part 1/3)

Cell death model [1] with the same set of mutations as in the original article from the configuration where components cIAP, ATP, and TNF are active. Results are listed in Fig. 1-3.

Bladder model [3] without mutation (wild type) and with PI3K constitutive activation from the configuration where components EGFR_stimulus, FGFR3_stimulus, GrowthInhibitors are active. Results are listed in Fig. 4.

Tumor invasion [2] without mutation (wild type), with p53 deletion, and with NICD constitutive activation, and from four different initial conditions where components miR200, miR203, and miR34 are always active and for all combination of DNAdamage and ECMicroenv activities. Results are listed in Fig. 5-9.

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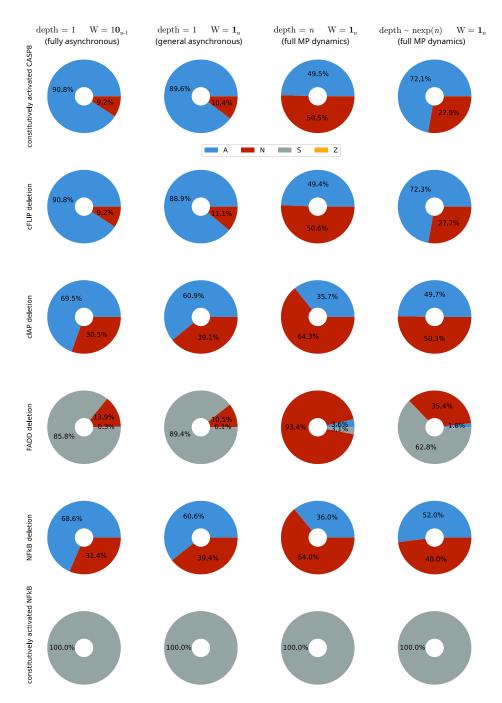


Fig. 2. Simulation results for the cell death receptor model (part 2/3)

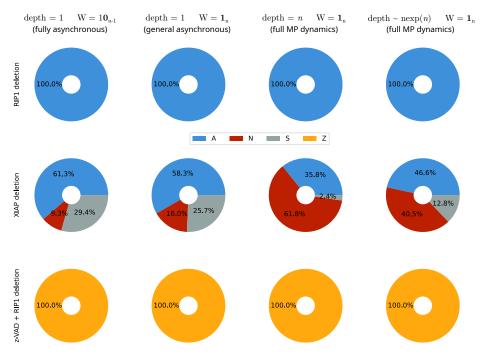


Fig. 3. Simulation results for the cell death receptor model (part 3/3)

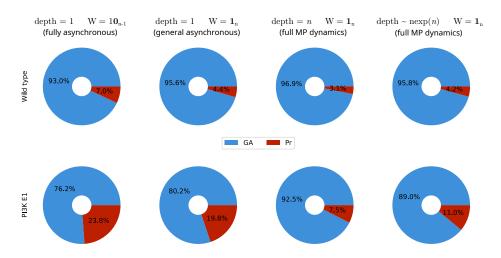


Fig. 4. Simulation results for the bladder model

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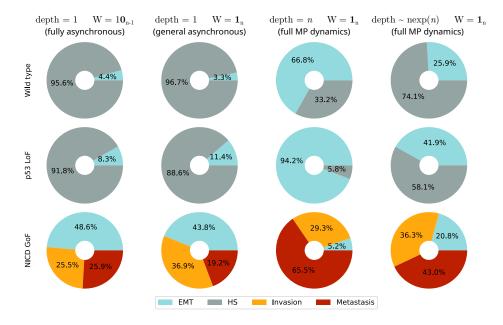


Fig. 5. Simulation results for the tumor invasion model from the configuration where DNadamage and ECMicroenv are inactive

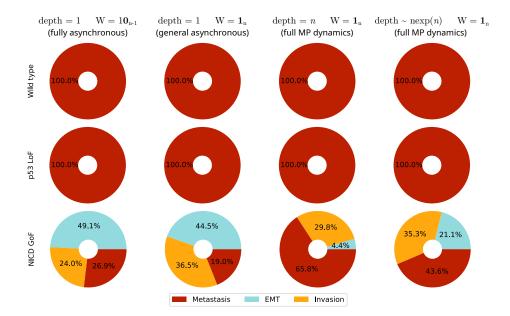


Fig. 6. Simulation results for the tumor invasion model from the configuration where DNadamage is inactive and ECMicroenv active

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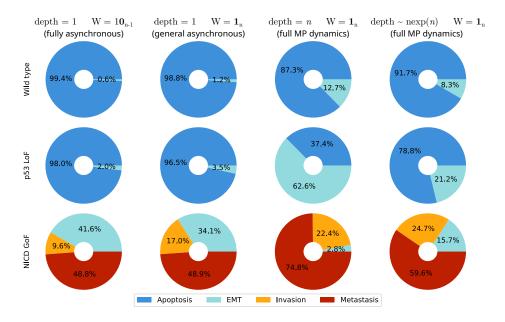


Fig. 7. Simulation results for the tumor invasion model from the configuration where DNadamage is active and ECMicroenv inactive

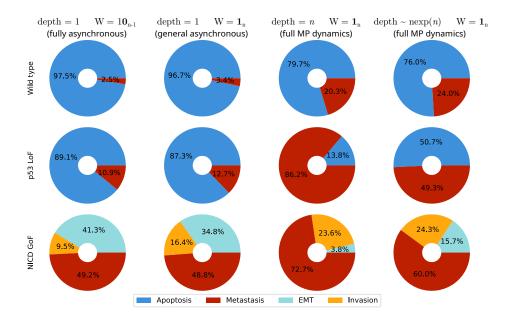


Fig. 8. Simulation results for the tumor invasion model from the configuration where DNadamage and ECMicroenv are active

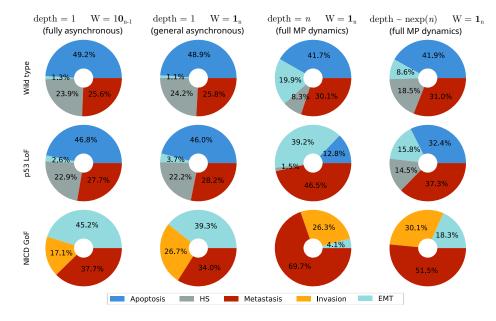


Fig. 9. Mean of the simulation results for the tumor invasion model from the four initial configurations
