

Magnonic crystal in Heusler Based Co2MnSi thin films S Mantion, Nicolas Biziere

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<u>Abstract</u>: Magnonic crystals are micro/nano-structured magnetic systems that can be used for passive microwave devices such as filters, waveguides, sensors etc.. The Heusler-based Co₂MnSi (CMS) alloy is considered as a promising material for magnonic applications due to its relatively high saturation magnetization and low Gilbert damping. Here, we demonstrated with micromagnetic simulations that its cubic crystal anisotropy allows microwave reconfigurable operations and filtering properties at zero bias field in a simple model consisting of a squared antidot magnonic crystal. We showed that a low amplitude (few mT) and ultra-short (≈ 1 ns) initialization field can be used to recover different quasi-uniform remanent states that can couple or not to a microwave field. A first experimental demonstration of the reconfigurable operation at zero magnetic field has been observed by ferromagnetic resonance on a squared antidot lattice with square size 200 nm and spacing 600nm.

Spin waves and Magnonic crystals



Spin waves (SW): collective propagating precession of magnetic moments

- Magnonic crystal (MC): magnetic material with periodically modulated properties
- Creation of frequency band gaps in SW dispersion (analog to Bragg diffusion)







High Curie temprature ($T_c \approx 860K$)

Spin polarization above 90%

Reconfigurable dynamic states in a CMS based magnonic crystal: A numerical study

Objective: Find quasi-uniform magnetic states at remanence

- **Micromagnetic simulations performed with Mumax3**
- Model system: a squared antidot lattice in a Co₂MnSi thin film of thickness 20nm
- Magnetic parameters: $M_s = 1.26 mT$, $\gamma = 28.7 GHz$. T^{-1} , $K_c =$ 17. $10^3 J. m^{-3}$, $A = 18. 10^{-12} J. m^{-1}$ [2]

Case 1 : CMS with cubic anisotropy



Result: Optimized reconfigurable states obtained for $s/d \le 1/3$

Strong cubic anisotropy such as with Co₂MnSi thin film is required for simple reconfiguration operation ([3] S. Mantion et al., Phys. Rev. Applied 17, 044054 (2022))

First experimental measurement of the reconfigurable operation (to be submitted)



Reconfigurable dynamic states at remanence





Extinction of most of the SW modes but attenuations lower than expected \Rightarrow lower K_c induces domain wall at remanence



m_x (a.u.) -1 0 1

Frequency shifts and/or attenuations of particular SW modes

Nonlinear effects

Filtering properties at remanence in a CMS based magnonic crystal [3]

Application of a localized microwave excitation $\overrightarrow{h_{RF}}$ to excite propagating SW towards the MC



Frequency band gaps generation at remanence for Magneto Surface Spin Waves (MSSW) in cubic crystal Co₂MnSi



Perspectives:

- Fabrication of a similar device with different s and d in order to compensate the lower K_c obtained
- Measurements of the filtering applications at remanence with Magneto Surface Spin Waves (MSSW)
- Measurements of FMR and propagating SW modes with varying electrical currents through the MC
