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Variability of fungi detection in the respiratory tract of racehorses according to the sampling site

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INTRODUCTION

- The clinical relevance of colonization of equine airways by fungi is unclear.
- Diagnosis of fungi in the respiratory tract is fastidious and there is no method of reference.

OBJECTIVES

- To characterize fungi from upper and lower airways of racehorses
- To determine the most reliable methodology for fungal detection

HYPOTHESIS

• Fungal cytology of a pooled BAL (BAL_R) is representative of corresponding left (BAL_L) and right (BAL_R) samples.

METHODS

- 30 Standardbred racehorses in active training, aged 4.6 \pm 1.6 years, from 3 different training stables
- TW, followed by BAL from each lung separately, collected through a guarded catheter and gastroscope
- Fungi detection, identification and characterization by cytology and culture
 - Positive culture: ≥ 1 mold identified
 - Positive cytology: ≥ 1 fungal element (hyphae, spore) observed

RESULTS

- Fungal culture (Table 1)
 - <u>TW</u>: 28/30 (93%) positive
 - BAL_E: 4/30 (13%) positive → All positive in TW, 3/4 with same fungi
 - 9 genus (alone or concomitant): Aspergillus (5 genus)
 13/28 (46%), Penicillium 12/28 (43%)

Comparison of sample sites (Table 3)

- Poor agreement between BAL_I and BAL_R
- Poor agreement between culture and cytology
- BAL_P vs separate lungs:
 - Not equivalent (p = 0.025 by McNemar Test)
 - Sensitivity = 0,58; Specificity = 1,00

Fungal cytology (Table 2)

- <u>TW</u>: 22/30 (73%) positive; 12/22 (55%) with both spores and hyphae, frequently phagocyted
- BAL: Large disparity between lungs

DISCUSSION

- Despite a similar prevalence of fungi detection in left and right BAL, a large disparity was found between lungs on cytology.
- Detecting fungi by cytology on either BAL_P or BAL_L + BAL_R was not equivalent

CONCLUSION

Pooled BAL is a highly specific while fairly sensitive alternative to combined cytology of individual left/right samples for mold/fungi detection.
