Unilateral contact¹

displacement level

• Coulomb's friction [with $\dot{u}_{T}(t) = -v + \dot{x}(t)$]

Equivalent nonsmooth equality contact conditions



- Unilateral contact
 - Displacement level²

$$r_{N} \ge 0, \quad y \ge 0, \quad r_{N} \cdot y = 0 \quad \Leftrightarrow \quad \forall \rho_{N} > 0, \quad \Psi_{N}(r_{N}, y) = r_{N} - \max(r_{N} - \rho_{N}y, 0) = 0$$

Velocity level

with convention: $\operatorname{sign} y = 1$ if $y \ge 0$ and $\operatorname{sign} y = -1$ otherwise

Frictional contact^{3,4,1}

$$\begin{cases} \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}} = 0 \implies |r_{\mathsf{T}}| \le \mu r_{\mathsf{N}} \\ \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}} \ne 0 \implies |r_{\mathsf{T}}| = \mu |r_{\mathsf{N}}| \text{ and } \exists \alpha \ge 0 | r_{\mathsf{T}} = -\alpha \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}} \\ \Leftrightarrow \forall \rho_{\mathsf{T}} > 0, \ \Psi_{\mathsf{T}}(r_{\mathsf{T}}, \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}}) = r_{\mathsf{T}} \max(\mu r_{\mathsf{N}}, |r_{\mathsf{T}} - \rho_{\mathsf{T}} \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}}|) - \mu r_{\mathsf{N}}(r_{\mathsf{T}} - \rho_{\mathsf{T}} \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}}) = 0 \\ \Leftrightarrow \forall \rho_{\mathsf{T}} > 0, \ \Psi_{\mathsf{T}}(r_{\mathsf{T}}, \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}}) = \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}} + \min(0, \rho_{\mathsf{T}}(r_{\mathsf{T}} + \mu r_{\mathsf{N}}) - \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}}) + \max(0, \rho_{\mathsf{T}}(r_{\mathsf{T}} - \mu r_{\mathsf{N}}) - \dot{u}_{\mathsf{T}}) = 0 \end{cases}$$

Admissible sets







Weak formulation (\equiv weighted residual formulation)

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• Discretization of the unknowns

$$x(t) \approx x_h(t) = \sum_k x_k \phi_k(t), \quad y(t) \approx y_h(t) = \sum_k y_k \phi_k(t)$$

$$r_N(t) \approx r_{Nh}(t) = \sum_k N_k \phi_k(t), \quad r_T(t) \approx r_{Th}(t) = \sum_k T_k \phi_k(t)$$

- \$\phi_k(t)\$: family of pre-selected shape functions (for instance, Fourier functions)
 \$x_k, y_k, N_k, T_k\$: to be found participations of the shape functions in the solution
- Differentiation in time

$$\ddot{x}(t) \approx \ddot{x}_h(t) = \sum_k x_k \ddot{\phi}_k(t), \quad \ddot{y}(t) \approx \ddot{y}_h(t) = \sum_k y_k \ddot{\phi}_k(t)$$

Ritz-Galerkin projection

$$\forall k, \quad \int_{t} \phi_{k}(t) \Psi_{x}(r_{\mathsf{T}h}, x_{h}, y_{h}, \ddot{x}_{h}) dt = 0, \qquad \int_{t} \phi_{k}(t) \Psi_{y}(r_{\mathsf{T}h}, x_{h}, y_{h}, \ddot{y}_{h}) dt = 0 \quad (\text{dynamics})$$

$$\forall k, \quad \int_{t} \phi_{k}(t) \Psi_{\mathsf{N}}(r_{\mathsf{N}h}, y_{h}) dt = 0, \qquad \int_{t} \phi_{k}(t) \Psi_{\mathsf{T}}(r_{\mathsf{T}h}, x_{h}) dt = 0 \quad (\text{contact})$$

Comments



- Solution method
 - ▶ With a range $k \in [1, ..., N_h]$, $4N_h$ nonlinear/nonsmooth equations for $4N_h$ unknowns
 - ► Integral computation → classical quadrature schemes
 - Nonlinear solver → Hybrid Powell with line search (Matlab solver)
 - Solution accuracy solely dictated by the selected {φ_k} family
 - Parameters $\rho_{\rm N}$ and $\rho_{\rm T}$ can play a role in the convergence rate
- Comparison with the DLFT method^{6,7} → similar, however:
 - Not limited to Fourier functions for the $\{\phi_k\}$ family
 - No need of the Alternating Frequency Time procedure⁸ to express the Signorini and Coulomb conditions in the time domain using FFT
 - ▶ DLFT algorithm → energy dissipation in the normal direction (plastic impact)
- No penalization needed
- No regularization/smoothing procedure involved
- Possibility to express a piecewise Jacobian
- Other equivalent techniques: shooting⁹

2-dof oscillator with friction





Dynamics

$$m_1 \ddot{x}_1 + (k_1 + k_2) x_2 - k_1 x_1 = 0 \tag{12}$$

$$m_2 \ddot{x}_2 + k_2 x_2 - k_2 x_1 = f \cos \omega t + r \tag{13}$$

$$\dot{x}_2 + \min(0, \rho(r + \mu N) - \dot{x}_2) + \max(0, \rho(r - \mu N) - \dot{x}_2) = 0$$

Approximated solution: Fourier functions (odd harmonics only)

$$x_{1h}(t) = \frac{a_1}{2} + \sum_{k=1}^{N_h} [a_{2k}\cos(2k-1)\omega t + a_{2k+1}\sin(2k-1)\omega t]$$

$$x_{2h}(t) = \frac{b_1}{2} + \sum_{k=1}^{N_h} [b_{2k}\cos(2k-1)\omega t + b_{2k+1}\sin(2k-1)\omega t]$$

$$r_h(t) = \frac{c_1}{2} + \sum_{k=1}^{N_h} [c_{2k}\cos(2k-1)\omega t + c_{2k+1}\sin(2k-1)\omega t]$$

Concluding remarks



- Summary
 - Very simple and general formulation in terms of nonsmooth equalities with Ritz-Galerkin projection
 - Successful implementation using basic Matlab commands: fsolve, integral
- Future work
 - Systematic convergence analysis on ρ_T, ρ_N
 - Systematic comparison to time-domain solution techniques
 - Investigation with other shape functions $\{\phi_k(t)\}$: wavekets, finite elements in time...
 - Investigation with other domains of integration: quasi-periodic solutions (square), damped solutions (on [0, ∞[)
 - Investigation of forced response: energy-frequency curves
 - Extension to 2D frictional framework
 - Extension to nonlinear/nonsmooth modal analysis within the invariant manifold framework
- Pending question: stability analysis?
