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Salem, (1944) : S closed. Open problem (since 1945) : is T closed? and $T^{(1)}$ ?

Conjecture (Boyd)
(1) $S \cup T$ closed
(2) $T^{(1)}=S$.

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$\beta>1$ Pisot number if alg. int. (real) and $\left|\beta^{(i)}\right|<1$; Salem number if $\left|\beta^{(i)}\right| \leq 1$ with at least one conjugate on $|z|=1$. $S:=\{$ Pisot $\}, \mathrm{T}:=\{$ Salem $\}$

## Conjectures : Lehmer : there exists a constant $c>0$ such that

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\mathrm{M}(\alpha) \geq 1+c
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for any algebraic number $\alpha \neq 0$ which is not a root of unity.

Minoration of M or heights (Weil, Néron-Tate,...) : Boyd, Mignotte, Smyth, Rhin, Amoroso David, Amoroso Dvornicich, Amoroso Zannier, Laurent, Ratazzi, Galateau, Borwein, Mossinghoff, Chinburg, (points on ell. curves, abelian varieties, ..., dilogarithms, Coxeter graphs, smallest geodesics, minimal complexity, smallest topological entropy, ...).

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\mathrm{M}(P) \geq \Theta=1.3247 \ldots
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smallest Pisot number (dom. root of $X^{3}-X-1$ ).

Dobrowolski (1979) : for any nonzero reciprocal algebraic integer $\alpha$ of degree $d$, not being a root of unity

\mathrm{M}(\alpha)>1+(1-\epsilon)\left(\frac{\log \log d}{\log d}\right)^{3}, \quad d>d_{1}(\epsilon)
$$

effective : the constant is $1 / 1200$.

Voutier (1993) :

\mathrm{M}(\alpha)>1+\frac{1}{4}\left(\frac{\log \log d}{\log d}\right)^{3}, \quad d \geq 2
$$

C. : Schinzel-Zassenhaus, 1965 : For $\alpha \neq 0$ algebraic integer, of degree $d$, not being a root of 1 , there exists a constant $D>0$ s.t. :

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Given

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X^{n}+X-1, \quad n \geq 2
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let
$\theta_{n}$ be the unique root in $(0,1)$ of $-1+X+X^{n}$. $\left(\theta_{n}^{-1}\right)_{n \geq 2}$ is a convergent sequence of Perron numbers tending to 1 .

## Aim : a direct minoration of

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\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}^{-1}\right)=\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}\right)
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First, is this method (divergent sums of functions of $n$ ) applicable in the case of these trinomials, and more generally to integer polynomials having small Mahler measure?

where $\Theta=\theta_{5}^{-1}$ is the smallest Pisot, dominant root of

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Second, since $G_{n}(X):=-1+X+X^{n}$ is not reciprocal, Smyth's Theorem ('71) implies :

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\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}\right)=\mathrm{M}\left(G_{n}\right) \geq \Theta=1.3247 \ldots, \quad n \geq 2,
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Consequently : Lehmer's conjecture is true for $\left\{\theta_{n}^{-1}\right\}$, with a minoration with $\Theta$.
yes, gives a direct proof of Lehmer's conjecture, Schinzel-Zassenhaus's conjecture and an improvment of Dobrowolski/Voutier's minoration.
without invoking Smyth's Theorem.

## Theorem :

Let $\chi_{3}$ be the unique character of conductor $3\left(\chi_{3}(m)=0,1\right.$ or -1 according to if $m \equiv 0,1$ or $2(\bmod 3)$, equivalently $\chi_{3}(m)=\left(\frac{m}{3}\right)$ the Jacobi symbol), and let $L\left(s, \chi_{3}\right)=\sum_{m \geq 1} \frac{\chi_{3}(m)}{m^{s}}$ the Dirichlet series $L$ twisted by the character $\chi_{3}$. Then
$\lim _{n \rightarrow+\infty} \mathrm{M}\left(G_{n}\right)=\exp \left(\frac{3 \sqrt{3}}{4 \pi} \mathrm{~L}\left(2, \chi_{3}\right)\right)=\exp \left(\frac{-1}{\pi} \int_{0}^{\pi / 3} \log \left(2 \sin \left(\frac{x}{2}\right)\right) d x\right)$

=1.38135 \ldots=: \wedge
$$

2 proofs: (1) by the method of asymptotic expansions, (2) by the method of 2-variables Mahler measures (D. Boyd, C. Smyth).

Clausen's integral, Log-sine, obtained by the Bloch-Wigner dilogarithm.

Asymptotics of the Mahler measure :

Theorem :
Let $n \geq n_{0}$ such that $\pi / 3>2 \pi\left(\log n_{0}\right) / n_{0}$. Then,

\mathrm{M}\left(G_{n}\right)=\left(\lim _{m \rightarrow+\infty} \mathrm{M}\left(G_{m}\right)\right)\left(1+r(n)\left(\frac{1}{\log n}\right)+O\left(\left(\frac{\log \log n}{\log n}\right)^{2}\right)\right)
$$

with $|r(n)| \leq \frac{1}{6}$.

Improvment of the lower bound of Dobrowolski ('79), Voutier ('93) :
Theorem :

\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}^{-1}\right)=\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}\right)>\Lambda-\frac{\Lambda}{6}\left(\frac{1}{\log n}\right), \quad n \geq 2
$$

The conjecture of Schinzel-Zassenhaus is proved : for $n \geq 2$,

with $c=2\left(\theta_{2}^{-1}-1\right)=1.23 \ldots$ reached only for $n=2$ and

(asymptotic excess off extremality)

## Theorem :

Let $u=0$ except if $n \equiv 5 \bmod 6$ in which case $u=-2$. Then,

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\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}^{-1}-1\right) \geq \frac{\left(\frac{1+\sqrt{5}}{2}\right)^{(n+u) / 2}}{\Lambda}\left(1-\frac{1}{6 \log n}\right), \quad n \geq 2
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Comparison : for $\mathbb{L}$ totally real algebraic number field, or CM field (a totally complex quadratic extension of a totally real number field) ; then for any nonzero algebraic integer $\alpha \in \mathbb{L}$, of degree $d$, not being a root of unity, Schinzel (1973) showed


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\mathrm{M}(\alpha) \geq\left(\frac{1+\sqrt{5}}{2}\right)^{d / 2}
$$

Proof : from the following theorem of Zagier which claims

$$
\mathrm{M}(\alpha) \mathrm{M}(\alpha-1) \geq\left(\frac{1+\sqrt{5}}{2}\right)^{d / 2}
$$

for algebraic numbers $\alpha$, of degree $d, \alpha \neq 0, \alpha \neq 1, \alpha \neq \frac{1+\sqrt{-3}}{2}$.


FIGURE: The roots (in black) of $G_{n}^{*}(X)$ (here $n=51$ ) are uniformly distributed about $|z|=1$ according to the theory of Erdős-Turán-Amoroso-Mignotte. A "bump" appears in the neighbourhood of 1 , which is at the origin of the different regimes of asymptotic expansions of the roots. $\theta_{n}^{-1}>1$ is the dominant root of $G_{n}^{*}(X)$ (Perron numbers).

Factorization of the trinomials $G_{n}$ (Selmer, 1956) :

## Factorization of the trinomials $G_{n}$ (Selmer, 1956) :

where $j=1,2, \ldots$ s.t. $z_{j, n}$ is a complex zero of $G_{n}(X)$, (except $n$ is even, $j=n / 2$ ), s.t. $\arg \left(z_{j, n}\right) \approx 2 \pi j / n$ in a increasing sequence :

Lemma (Selmer ; Flatto, Lagarias, Poonen 1994)
For all $n \geq 2$,
(i) $\left|z_{j, n}\right|$ and $\theta_{n}$ lie in the interval

\left[1-\frac{2 \log n}{n}, 1+\frac{2 \log 2}{n}\right]
$$

with

\lim _{n \rightarrow+\infty} \theta_{n}=1
$$

(ii) the root $\theta_{n} \in[0,1]$ is the unique root of smallest modulus among all the roots of $G_{n}(X)$,
(iii) if $n \not \equiv 5(\bmod 6)$, then $G_{n}(X)$ is irreducible. If $n \equiv 5(\bmod 6)$, then $G_{n}(X)$ admits $X^{2}-X+1$ as irreducible factor and $G_{n}(X) /\left(X^{2}-X+1\right)$ is irreducible.

## Proposition

Let $n \geq 2$.
(i) The number $p_{n}$ of roots of $G_{n}(X)$ which are located inside the open angular sector $\mathcal{S}=\{z| | \arg (z) \mid<\pi / 3\}$ is equal to

1+2\left\lfloor\frac{n}{6}\right\rfloor .
$$

(ii) The correlation between the geometry of the roots of $G_{n}(X)$ which lie in the unit disc (and $I m z>0$ ) and their indexation is given by

j \in\left\{1,2, \ldots,\left\lfloor\frac{n}{6}\right\rfloor\right\} \Longleftrightarrow \Re\left(z_{j, n}\right)>\frac{1}{2} \Longleftrightarrow\left|z_{j, n}\right|<1,

and the Mahler measure $\mathrm{M}\left(G_{n}\right)=\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}^{-1}\right)=\mathrm{M}\left(\theta_{n}\right)$ of $G_{n}(X)$ is

instead of $\mathrm{M}\left(G_{n}\right)$, as an approximate value of $\mathrm{M}\left(G_{n}\right)$.

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## Conjecture of Smyth - Theorem of Flammang (2014) :

## Conjecture (Smyth)

For all integers $n \geq 4, k \geq 1$ such that $\operatorname{gcd}(n, k)=1, k<n / 2$, $\mathrm{M}\left(z^{n}+z^{k}+1\right)<\Lambda$ if and only if 3 divides $n+k$, $\mathrm{M}\left(z^{n}-z^{k}+1\right)<\Lambda$ with nodd if and only if 3 does not divide $n+k$, $\mathrm{M}\left(z^{n}-z^{k}-1\right)<\Lambda$ with $n$ even if and only if 3 does not divide $n+k$.
(2014) Flammang : True for $n$ large enough.

By the method of C. Smyth/D. Boyd allowing the computation from 2-variables Mahler measures, or Duke/Flammang's extension of this method:

Theorem :
Let $n \geq 2$. Then,

with, for $n$ odd :

## Conjecture :

There exist two constants $1<C_{1} \leq \Lambda$ and $C_{2}>0$ such that

\mathrm{M}\left(1 \pm X^{k} \pm X^{n}\right) \geq C_{1}-\frac{C_{2}}{\log n},
$$

for all $n \geq 4,1 \leq k<n$.
