Introduction

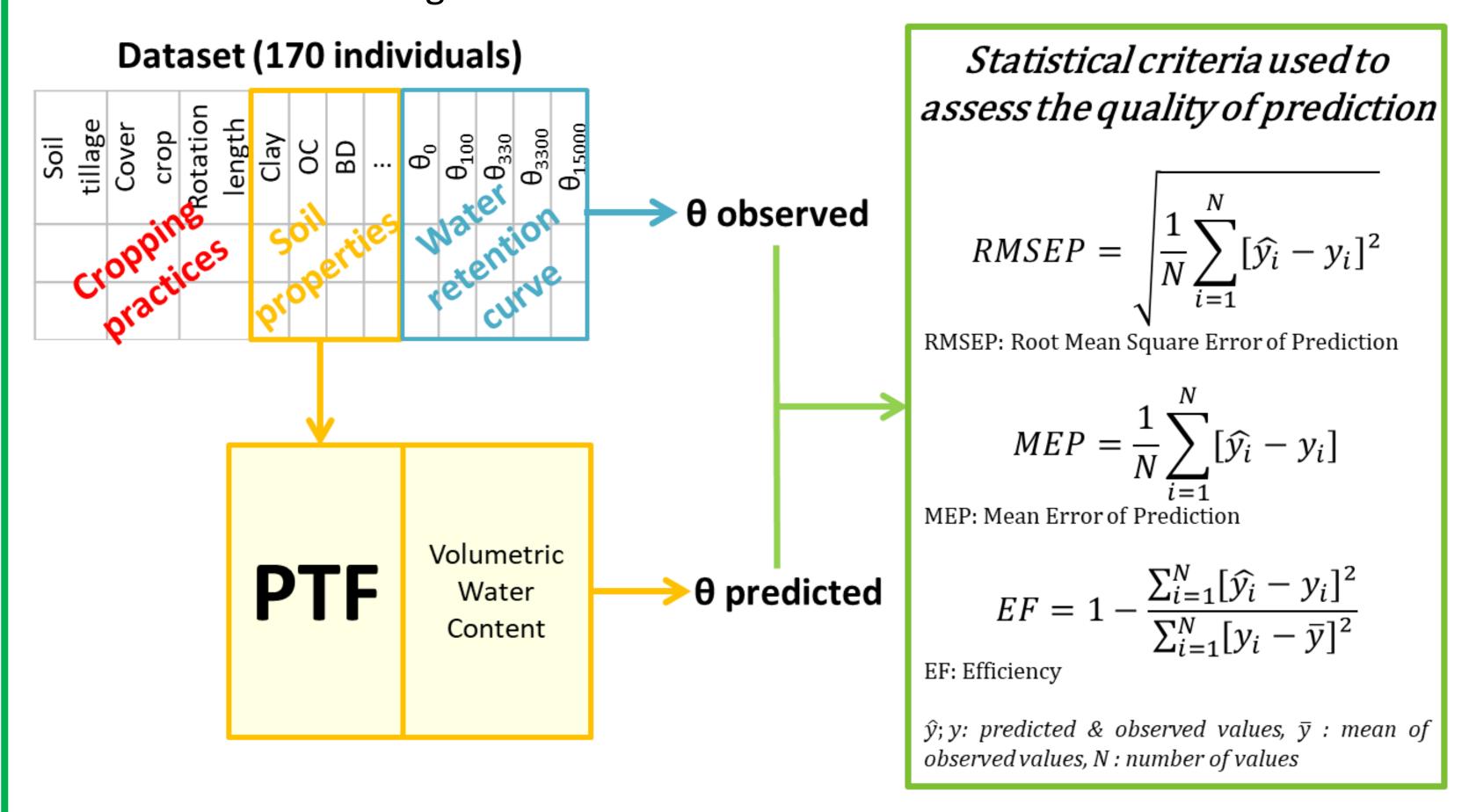
- The lack of accurate data on soil hydraulic properties is an obstacle to the use of water and solute transport models
- Pedotransfer functions (PTFs) represent a solution to cope with data scarcity
- PTFs relate easily measurable soil properties to properties more difficult to access such as water retention curve
- They were mostly developed for soils under conventional tillage systems
- The ability of PTFs to predict water retention in conservation agriculture is unknown

Objectives

- (i) Assess the quality of prediction of soil water retention of different published PTFs for soils managed with conservation agriculture practices
- (ii) Develop specific PTFs for soils under conservation agriculture

Materials and Methods

 Evaluation of 29 existing class-PTFs, continuous-PTFs and tree-PTFs using a dataset describing cropping practices, soil properties and water retention curves under conservation agriculture



- Development of new PTFs predicting soil water content (θ) at field capacity (θ_FC) at -100 or -330 cm) and at wilting point (θ_WP) at -15000 cm), as a function of soil properties and cropping practices, using a regression tree method (recursive binary partitioning with rpart package in R)
- Quality of prediction of the new PTF was estimated by crossvalidation considering spatio-temporal correlations ■ BAG'AGEC

Results

1. Quality of prediction for θ_{LOO} (2 out of 26 functions are shown)

BEST CLASS AND CONTINUOUS FUNCTION	RMSEP	MEP	EF
Class: texture FAO (stratification) [1]	0,049	-0,03	-0,23
Continuous: $a + b \times clay + c \times sand + d \times BD$ (stratification) [2]	0,057	-0,046	-0,67

- Among all PTFs, RMSEP ranged from 0,034 cm³/cm³ to 0,192 cm³/cm³
- \square Almost every PTF tends to underestimate θ_FC_{100} (MEP<0)
 - One function led to a correct EF but it requires both θ_WP and θ_FC_{330}

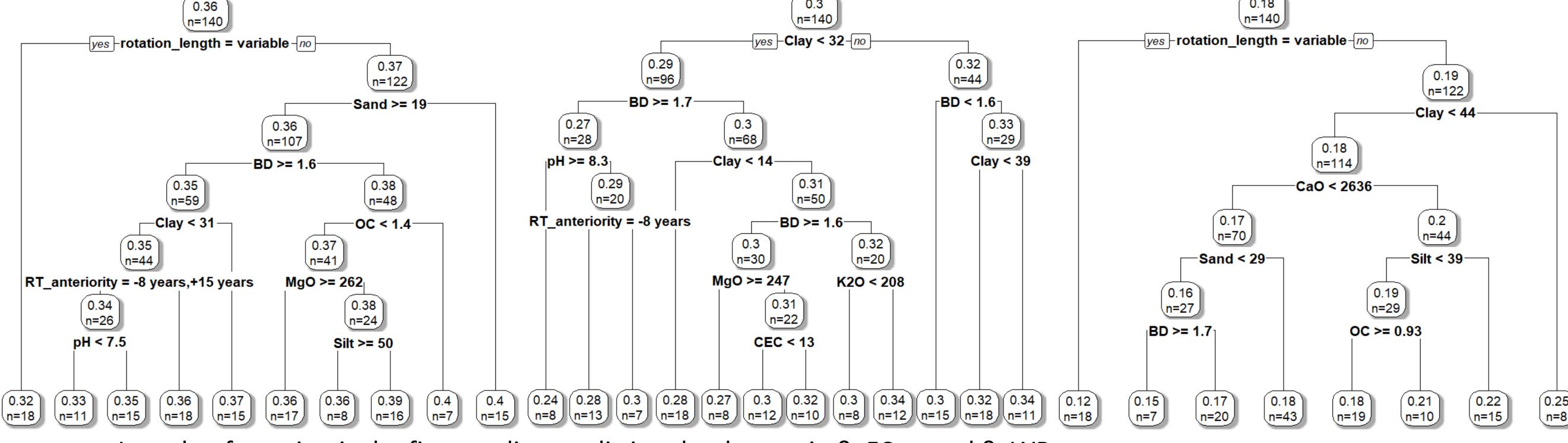
Field under conservation agriculture practices

2. Quality of prediction for θ _WP (2 out of 29 functions are shown)

BEST CLASS AND CONTINUOUS FUNCTION	RMSEP	MEP	EF	
Class: texture FAO and BD [3]	0,042	0,002	0,18	
Continous: a + b × clay + c × sand [2]	0,034	0,003	0,45	

- RMSEP ranged from 0,034 cm³/cm³ to 0,051 cm³/cm³
- Error represents a higher proportion of water content than for $\theta_{-}FC_{100}$ prediction
- 2/3 of the PTFs underestimated θ WP
- EF were globally better than for θ_FC_{100} prediction

3. Regression trees to predict volumetric water content at field capacity (θ_FC_{100} and θ_FC_{330}) and wilting point (θ_WP)



- Length of rotation is the first predictor splitting the dataset in θ_{100} and θ_{100} are trees • Anteriority of reduced/no tillage appears in θ_FC_{100} and θ_FC_{330} trees
- 4. Quality of prediction of the developed regression trees

Cross-validation	θ _FC ₁₀₀	θ _FC ₃₃₀	θ_WP
RMSEP	0,036	0,041	0,041
MEP	0,002	0,003	0,001
EF	-0,08	-0,24	0,03

- The θ_FC₁₀₀ tree has a better predictive quality than published PTFs : smaller RMSEP and MEP. However, EF remains low
- The θ WP tree performed equally or even worse, as compared to published PTFs

Conclusions & Perspectives

- Existing PTFs did not have a good quality of prediction of our water retention dataset
- New tree-PTF has a better ability to predict soil volumetric water content at field capacity ($\theta_{-}FC_{100}$)
- Variables describing cropping practices were found to be important in order to predict soil water retention in conservation agriculture
- Their role in the development of PTFs needs further investigation
