

## FORMATION MECHANISMS OF LiNbO<sub>3</sub> NANOCRYSTALS UNDER SOLVOTHERMAL CONDITIONS FROM ALKOXIDE PRECURSORS

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## ABSTRACT:

Recent detailed investigations of the formation mechanisms of centrosymmetric metal oxide nanoparticles such as TiO<sub>2</sub> and Zr<sub>x</sub>Ti<sub>1-x</sub>O<sub>2</sub> have evidenced the appearance of oxo-alkoxy clusters that further aggregate into amorphous nuclei at low hydrolysis rates of alkoxide precursors [1-3]. In this work, a mixture of LiOEt and Nb<sub>2</sub>( $OC_2H_5$ )<sub>10</sub> diluted in alcohols and glycols of different chain lengths has been used to produce non-centrosymmetric LiNbO<sub>3</sub> nanocrystals. Upon hydrolysis of the initial precursor solutions kept under magnetic stirring, DLS measurements demonstrate the rapid formation of ~2.7nm oxo-clusters for each solvent after ligand exchange with the initial ethoxide groups. After 24h at room temperature and formation of a viscous, non-transparent light-scattering gel, SAXS measurements confirm the presence of amorphous nuclei of average diameter ~4nm. The subsequent solvothermal treatment at 235°C for 24h then results in the formation of LiNbO3 nanocrystals whose average crystallite size can be varied between 15 and 70 nm according to the co-solvent chain length. Extensive time- and temperature-dependent experiments first demonstrate the presence of surfacepassivated crystalline intermediates of 4-6 nm whose aggregation leads, after rearrangement of the surface ligands [4], to easily re-dispersible LiNbO<sub>3</sub> nanocrystals. Finally, colloidal suspensions of Erdoped and Er-Yb co-doped nanocrystals also evidence scattering of several nonlinear optical (SHG, THG and SFG) and up-conversion (UC) signals.
