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# Modeling of the morphic effect using a 1st-order transitional magneto-elastic energy

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The study takes place in the context of magneto-elastic coupling. A new magnetoelastic energy formulation is proposed at the magnetic domain scale in order to account for the non-linear and non-monotonous effect of stress on magnetization and magnetostriction. The model uses 1st order cubic/isotropic invariants and a transition function taking an equivalent stress as argument.

Keywords: magnetostriction, second-order effect, invariants

#### 1 Introduction

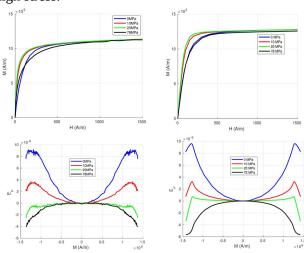


Figure 1 : Comparison between experimental magnetostriction (left) and transition model (right) for magnetization (up) and magnetostriction (down) as function of stress.

Magnetostriction and Villari effect are two consequences of the magneto-elastic coupling [1]. In some materials such as Fe-3%Si, the mechanical loading has a non-monotonous influence on the magnetic behaviour (fig1). This second-order phenomenon is denoted as the morphic effect [2,3,4].

### 2 Former simulations and drawbacks

This phenomenon can be modeled by adding a quadratic term to the usual Gibbs magneto-elastic energy density  $\Psi^{\mu\sigma}$ . This term can be formulated via a constitutive  $6^{\text{th}}$  order tensor [3] or via an equivalent polynomial formulation using polynomial invariants [4]. The main drawback of this formulation is that both magnetostriction strain and magnetic behaviour are not bounded with respect to the stress leading to strong divergences at high stress.

#### 3 New first order transitional model

One way to avoid this problem is to use a transition function f (eq. 1) in the magnetoelastic free energy density allowing to switch from one linear energy formulation  $\psi_1$  to another  $\psi'_1$  (both functions of local stress  $\sigma$  and magnetization m) This reflects a modification of the material constants  $c_{210}$  involved in eq. 2 (where 'indicates the deviatoric part of tensors). f takes as argument a magneto-elastic equivalent stress  $\sigma_{\rm eq}$  (eq.  $3-M_{\rm s}$ : saturation magnetization) [5].

The new formulation is introduced in a multiscale model. Figure 1 illustrates the way the new model respects the non-monotony of the magnetization, the change of sign of the magnetostriction and its saturation at high stress.
