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Flux density waveform control based on Newton-Raphson method

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1. CONTEXT

- ✓ Well-known need for flux density waveform control in magnetic measurements
 - Sinusoidal B for comparable and repeatable test conditions
 - Application specific conditions (PWM voltages, etc.)
- ✓ Diversity of flux control methods
 - Analog/Numeric, Iterative/Real-Time, etc.
 - Various control theory : proportional compensation, neural network, etc.

2. PROPOSED WORK

- ✓ Application of both Newton's method and Broyden's method to flux control
- ✓ Comparison between
 - Both proposed controllers
 - Several objective functions
 - The proposed methods and a classical form of control
- ✓ Benefit : High adaptability
 - Only the starting voltage has to be set between setup

4. CONTROLLERS

- ✓ Root-finding algorithm : nullify an objective function F
- ✓ Newton or quasi-Newton method : input update by inverting the Jacobian J_F of F

$$V_g^{(i+1)} = V_g^{(i)} + (J_F^{(i)})^{-1} \times F(V_g^{(i)})$$
- ✓ Instabilities damping

$$V_g^{(i+1)} = V_g^{(i)} + 0.5 \cdot (J_F^{(i)})^{-1} \times F(V_g^{(i)})$$

Newton-Raphson's method (NR)

Exact computation of the Jacobian

Application to flux control.

Hypothesis : Due to the periodicity of the system, we assume the following circular behaviour.

$$\begin{aligned} \Delta B_1 &= j_1 \Delta V_1 + j_2 \Delta V_2 + \dots + j_n \Delta V_n \\ \Delta B_2 &= j_1 \Delta V_2 + j_2 \Delta V_3 + \dots + j_n \Delta V_1 \\ &\dots \\ \Delta B_n &= j_1 \Delta V_n + j_2 \Delta V_1 + \dots + j_n \Delta V_{n-1} \end{aligned}$$

→ Reduce the system dimension

« Bad » Broyden's method (BB)

Make an initial guess for the Jacobian inverse and improve it iteratively (alongside the excitation V_g)

$$(J_F^{(i+1)})^{-1} = (J_F^{(i)})^{-1} + \left(s_i - (J_F^{(i)})^{-1} y_i \right) \frac{s_i^T (J_F^{(i)})^{-1}}{s_i^T (J_F^{(i)})^{-1} s_i} y_i$$

Application to flux control.

Choice of the initial Jacobian inverse :

$$(J_0)^{-1} = \frac{1}{|V_0|} I_n$$

Proposed objective functions

$$F_B(V_g) = \frac{(B - B_{ref})}{|B_{ref}|}$$

$$F_{dB}(V_g) = \frac{\left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)_{ref} - \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)}{\left| \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)_{ref} \right|}$$

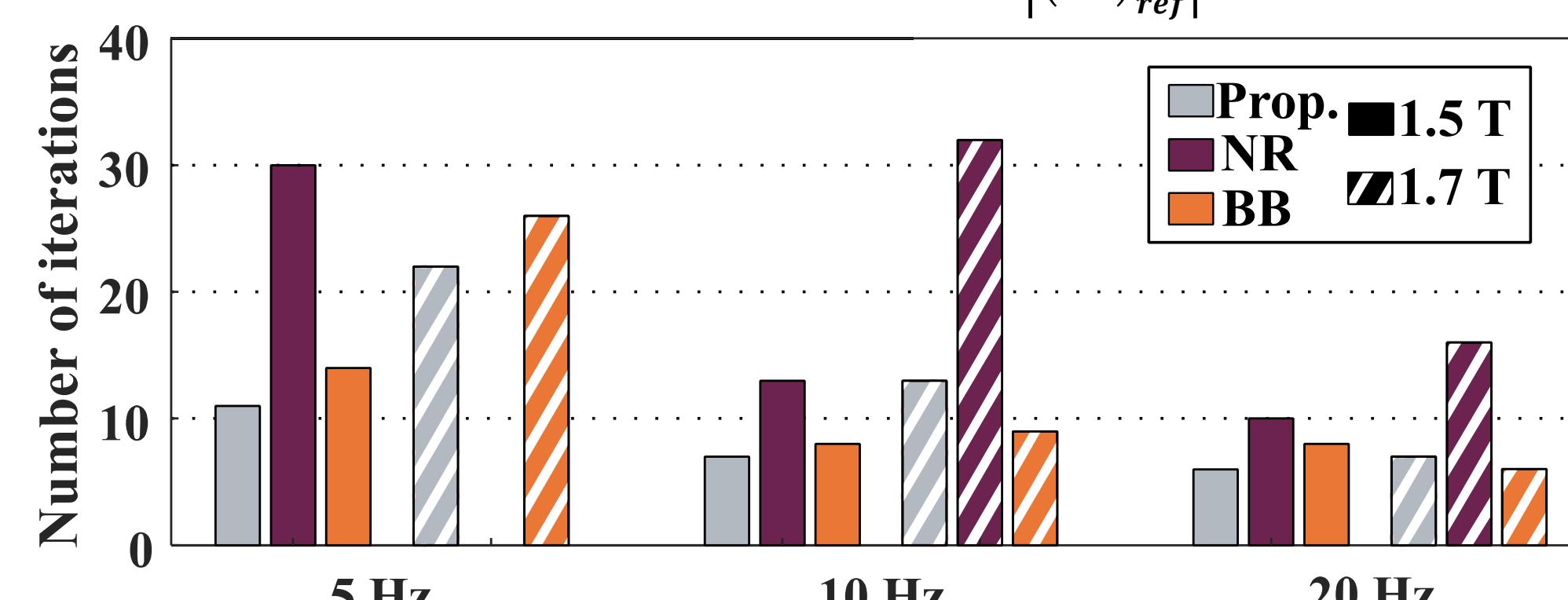
$$F_{Dual}(V_g) = \left[\begin{array}{c} \frac{(B - B_{ref})}{|B_{ref}|} \\ \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)_{ref} - \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right) \\ \left| \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)_{ref} \right| \end{array} \right]$$

5. OPERATION VALIDATION

- ✓ Control achieved with both controllers in a variety of test conditions
 - BB : Reach moderate saturation level on the [5 – 100] Hz band
 - Below : Control unstable ; Above : System limited
 - NR : Slightly lower induction level and narrower band ([10 – 100] Hz)
 - Erratic for 5 Hz

Comparison to a simple digital controller for speed reference

$$V^{(i+1)} = V^{(i)} + \alpha \frac{(B - B_{ref})}{|B_{ref}|} + \beta \frac{\left| \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right) - \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)_{ref} \right|}{\left| \left(\frac{dB}{dt} \right)_{ref} \right|}$$



- BB shows a similar speed to the simple proportional controller with a lower setting time, NR is slower

6. OBJECTIVE FUNCTION

- ✓ Using BB controller, comparison between all three objective functions : F_B , F_{dB} and F_{Dual}

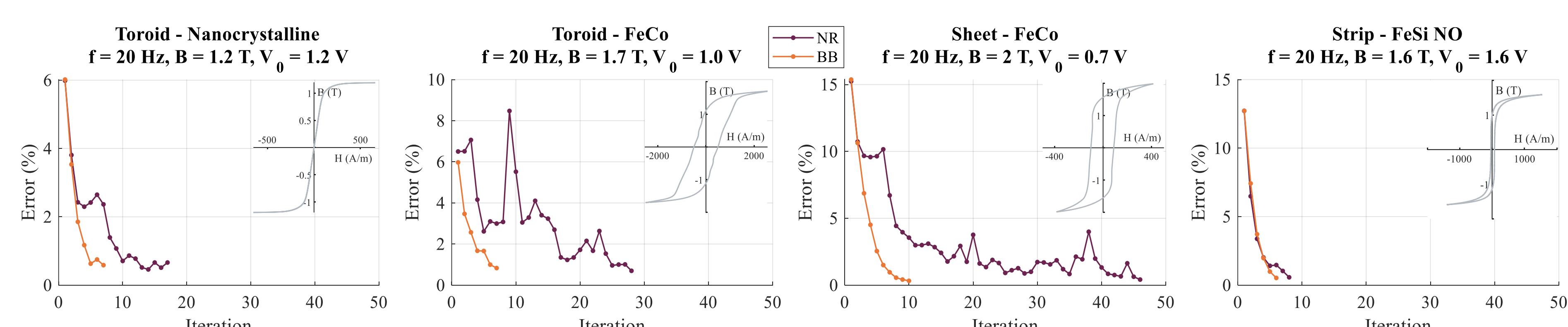
f (Hz)	V_0 (V)	Number of iterations		
		F_B	F_{dB}	F_{Dual}
5	0.6	31	∞	28
10	0.8	24	∞	12
20	0.5	∞	20	10
	1	24	∞	7
50	1	∞	9	9
	1.4	20	∞	8
100	2.6	14	8	7
200	4	∞	6	7

Results are coherent with physical interpretations :

- F_{Dual} is steadier against frequency and initial excitation V_0
- Balancing between inductive and resistive terms
- F_B works better for low frequency and high V_0
- F_{dB} performs well with high frequency (inductive cases), and needs lower starting voltage

7. COMPARISON OF CONTROLLERS

- ✓ Application of both methods to several identical cases



8. CONCLUSIONS

- ✓ Successful adaptation of Newton's and quasi-Newton methods
 - For $f \in [10; 100]$ Hz and \hat{B} up to mild saturation
 - Link between convergence performances and Jacobian conditioning to be investigated
- ✓ Appropriate for laboratory measurement :
 - Sample/setup change is fast and simple
 - No parameters : only the magnitude of the initial voltage V_0 has to be set
 - And, eventually, the starting waveform (sine in most cases)

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
