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# DEVELOPMENT OF NATURAL SALIVARY SUBSTITUTES AND EVALUATION OF THEIR RHEOLOGICAL PROPERTIES USING AN IN VITRO MODEL

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# CONTEXT

- Xerostomia is usually described as a decrease in salivary flow caused by specific diseases, drugs, or therapies associated.<sup>1,2</sup>
- The prevalence of xerostomia varies from 13 to 28% in the older population and increases up to 60% in patients living in long-term care facilities.<sup>2</sup>
- It can seriously impact the quality of life, altering speech, oral environment, and swallowing. <sup>1,2</sup>

## **OBJECTIVE**

To develop artificial saliva to be used in swallowing in vitro models in order to design tailored food textures for xerostomic patients.

# **MATERIALS & METHODS**

# **Artificial Saliva**

Flaxseed extracts at 0.25% and 0.7% dry matter were mixed with deionized water.

**Bolus** injection

# **Apple Puree**

Commercial apple puree was used as a model food (Andros, France).

# Soft-robotic in vitro setup

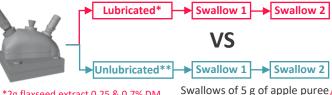

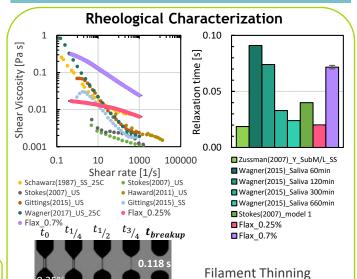

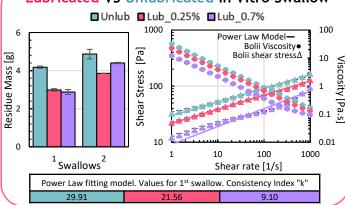


# Lubricated VS Unlubricated In Vitro Swallow

#### **CONCLUSIONS**

- The flaxseed extracts at 0.25% and 0.70% DM show shearthinning behavior, with the 0.25% closer to human saliva.
- The relaxation time of both concentrations (0.25% and 0.70%) are in agreement with those obtained from human saliva.
- Residues decreased when flaxseed extracts are used suggesting a lubrication effect.
- The shear viscosity of in vitro bolus decreased using flaxseed extracts simulating human saliva behavior.
- Flaxseed extracts showed bolus' cohesiveness during the swallowing sequence.
