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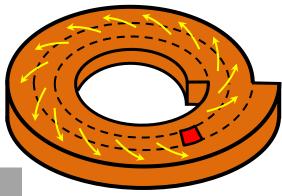

- The No-Insulation (NI) winding technique is one option for magnet protection.
- The turn-to-turn contact resistance is a key component to specify the magnet stability.

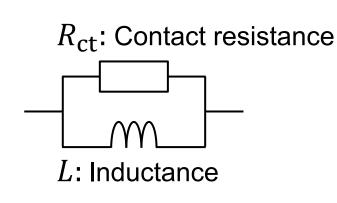
: Current

: Normal state (resistive)

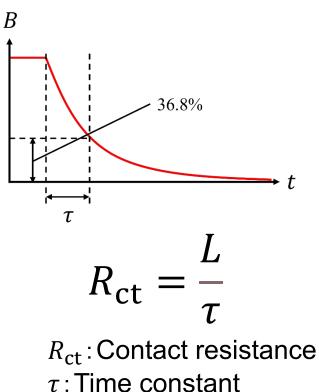
- Two methods have been proposed to measure the turn-to-turn contact resistance.
 - Sudden-discharge method
 - Low-frequency-AC current method



The coil inductance is derived from the time constant of field decay.

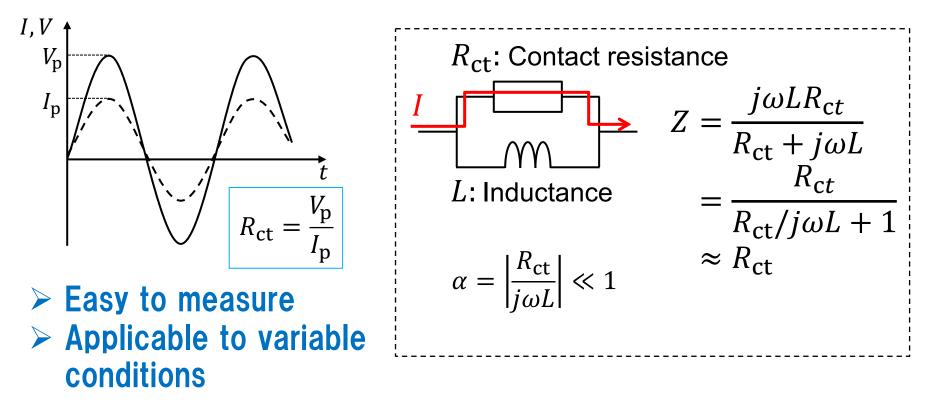


Widely usedMany examples



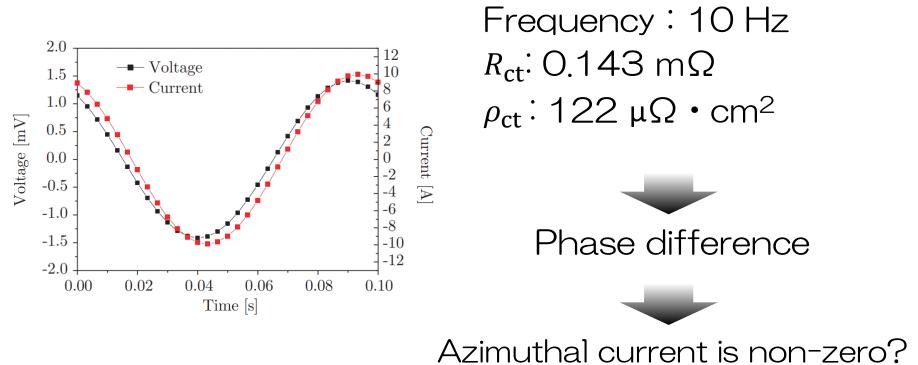
L: Coil inductance

The contact resistance is derived from the ratio of voltage and current by carrying ac current with adequate frequency.

Measurement example of LFAC



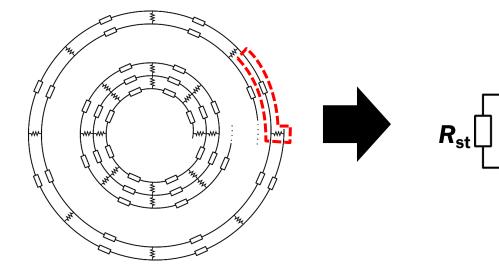

2D Partial Element Equivalent Circuit (PEEC) Model



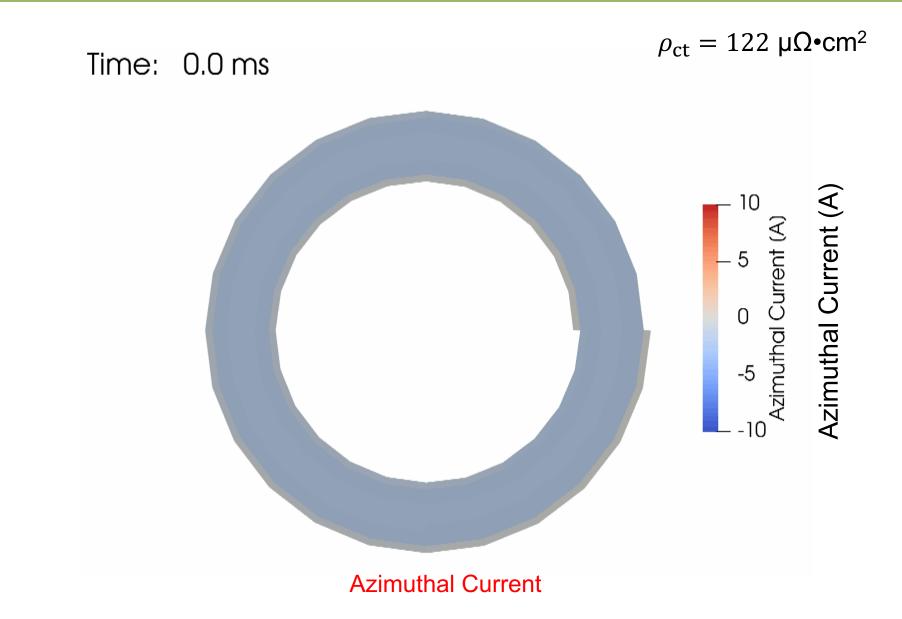
- R_{ct} : Contact resistance R_{sc} : REBCO resistance R_{st} : Cu resistance L : Inductance
- $R_{\rm ct} = \sum_{i=1}^{N-1} \rho_{\rm ct} \frac{1}{S_i}$
- N : # of turns ρ_{ct} : Contact resistivity S : Contact area

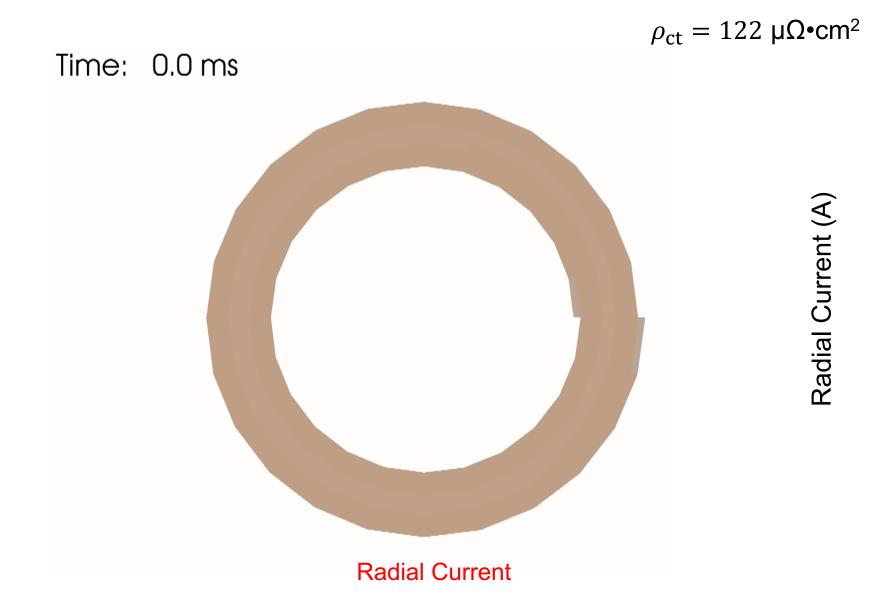

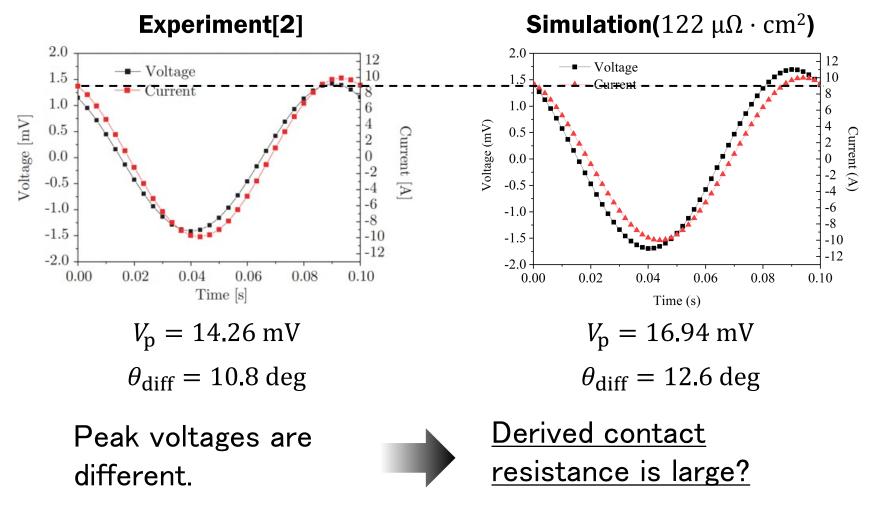




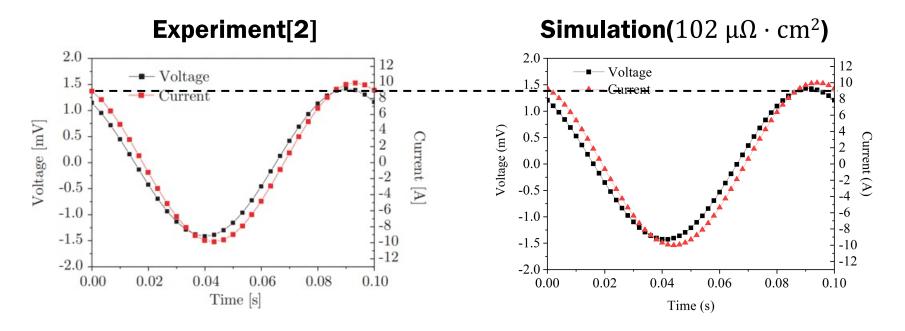


- •Azimuthal current remains in innermost and outermost turns.
- Inductance should be considered

Phase difference



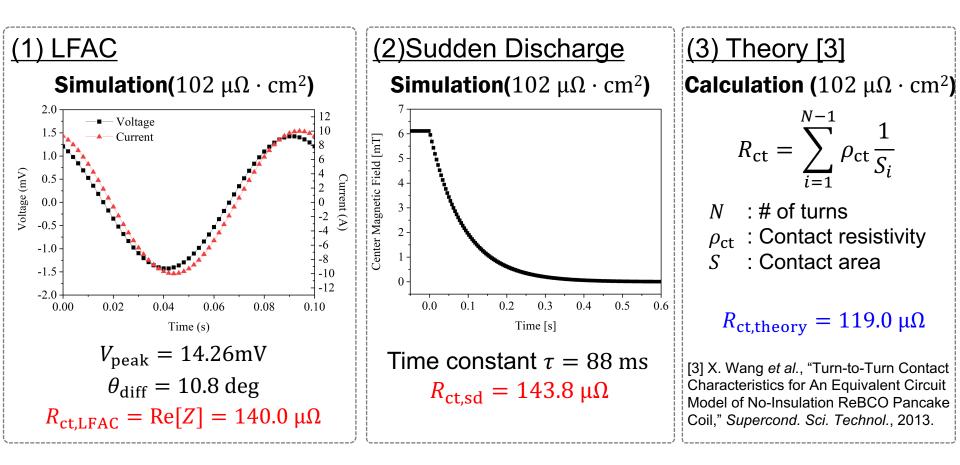

The resistivity of 102.0 $\mu\Omega$ cm² agrees well with measurement.

The simulated values is 80% of original LFAC method.

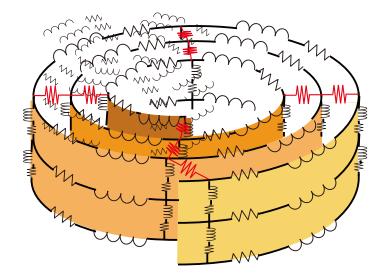
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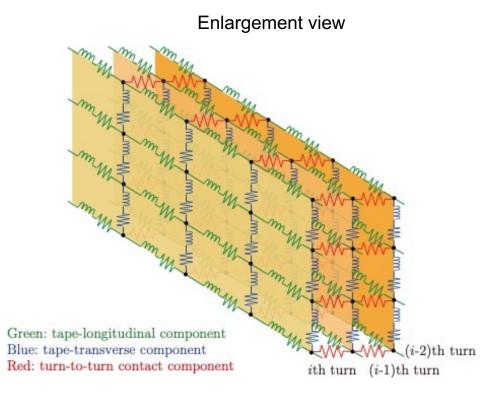

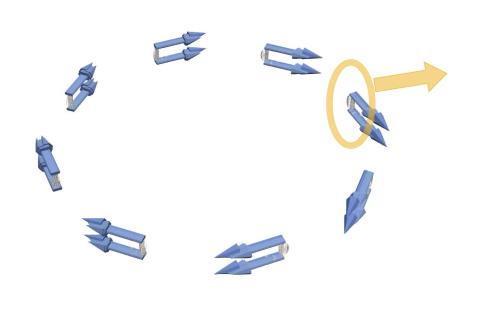
3D Partial Element Equivalent Circuit (PEEC) Model

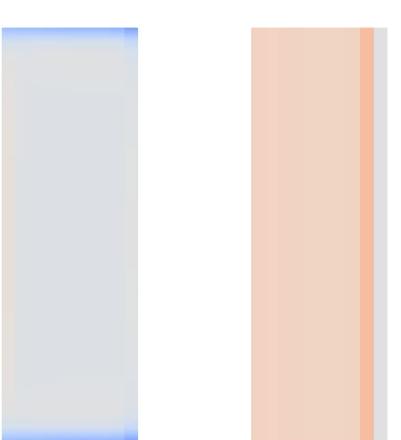




3D Partial Element Equivalent Circuit (PEEC) Model

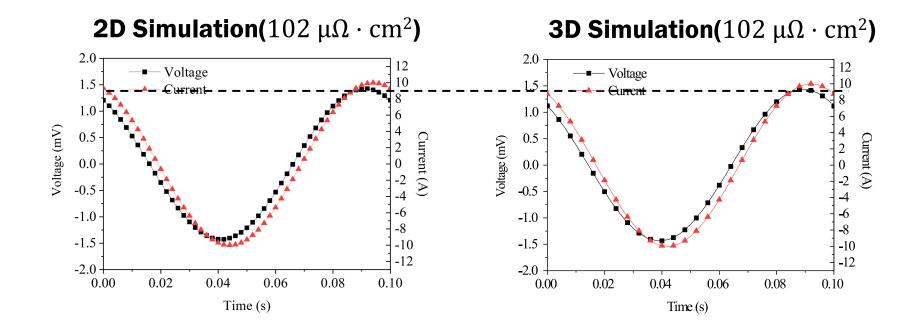

The 3D simulation also agrees well with 2D one and measurement.

- Turn-to-turn contact resistance can be measured:
 - ✓ by sudden-discharging method
 - ✓ by low-frequency-ac current (LFAC) method
- Due to complicated current paths, theoretical relation between contact resistance and resistivity is not hold.

$$R_{\rm ct} = \sum_{i=1}^{N-1} \rho_{\rm ct} \frac{1}{S_i}$$

 Detailed simulation is preferred for estimation of accurate contact resistance.
