# $\boldsymbol{\beta}$-Chlorovinylaldehydes as intermediates in the synthesis of new functionalized $\boldsymbol{\beta}$-fluoroalkoxyvinyl aldehydes and corresponding alcohols

## Abstract

A convenient synthesis of a series of new $\beta$-fluoroalkoxyvinyl aldehydes (9-30) and their corresponding alcohols (31-37) from $\beta$-chloro- $\alpha, \beta$-unsaturated aldehydes (1-8) was developed. The etherification reaction and the carbonyl reduction were successfully achieved, affording the desired products in good yields. The mechanism of the nucleophilic vinylic substitution reaction of the $\beta$-chlorovinylaldehyde 3 has been studied using DFT methods. IRC analysis shows the presence of a hidden intermediate, in agreement with one kinetic step two-stage process. The isomerization of intermediate $3-\mathrm{Z}$ into intermediate $3-E$ was explained in terms of the small energy gap difference between the two intermediates Int $z_{Z}$ and Int $_{E}$ and the thermodynamic stability of compound 3-E compared to 3-Z.

## Introduction

It is generally known that the vinyl ether compounds are of considerable interest due to their potential applications in a wide array of chemical transformations ${ }^{1-4}$. They are also important raw materials used as easily degradable vinyl polymer materials ${ }^{5}$, precursors of active pharmaceutical compounds ${ }^{6}$ and efficient intermediates in several reactions ${ }^{7-8}$. More interestingly, in the last decades, vinyl ethers bearing fluorine atoms have attracted much attention owing to their beneficial effects on the metabolic stability and lipophilicity of biologically active alkyl ethers ${ }^{9,10}$. Therefore, a variety of methods have been reported for the synthesis of vinyl ethers, including modified transetherification ${ }^{11}$, addition-elimination
reactions ${ }^{12}$, carbonyl olefinations ${ }^{13}$, additions of alcohol to triple bonds ${ }^{14}$ and metal-catalyzed coupling or transfer reactions ${ }^{15}$. However, classical synthesis of vinyl ethers has shown serious limitations, such as the use of strong acids or bases ${ }^{16,17}$, expensive catalyse metals ${ }^{18}$ and high temperatures ${ }^{19}$. Therefore, the need to implement new inexpensive and easy methodologies to produce functional vinyl ethers remains challenging. For instance, the nucleophilic substitution of the vinylic chlorine atom was largely described in the literature ${ }^{12}$. It was successfully carried out with several nucleophiles such as $\Phi \mathrm{S}^{-}, \mathrm{MeS}^{22}, \mathrm{R}_{2} \mathrm{NH}^{20}, \Phi \mathrm{O}^{-}$ ${ }^{20,12}$ and $\mathrm{MeO}^{-20}$. Highly functionalized alkenes and interesting cyclic and heterocyclic compounds were obtained in this way ${ }^{22}$. Meanwhile, the fluorinated alkyl vinyl ethers were rarely reported. Furthermore, $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{f}} \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{OH}$ or $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{f}} \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{O}^{-}$have not been always considered as nucleophiles; they are rather described as high ionizing power, acidic agents, strong high bond donors and very weak nucleophiles ${ }^{23}$. Nevertheless, aromatic nucleophilic substitution was reported by Novack et al. ${ }^{24}$ for the synthesis of the trifluroethoxylated pharmaceuticals, but rarely used without metal catalysts or high temperatures ${ }^{24}$. It was shown that only activated aryl chlorides underwent trifluoroethoxylation with strong electron withdrawing groups ${ }^{25,26}$.
In our previous works, we have explored the reactivity of the $\beta$-chlorovinyl aldehydes as precursors for highly substituted benzenes ${ }^{27}$, phosphonates ${ }^{28}$, phosphoramidates ${ }^{29}$ and phosphates ${ }^{30}$. We have also investigated their coordinating chemistry towards tin tetrachloride and showed that the $\mathrm{C}-\mathrm{Cl}$ carbon was a strong electrophilic site, due to the conjugated carbonyl group effect upon coordination to the tin metal center ${ }^{31}$. As an extension of our work, we report herein a further experimental and theoretical reactivity investigation of $\beta$ chlorovinyl aldehydes for the synthesis of new variously substituted $\beta$-fluoroalkoxyvinyl aldehydes and corresponding alcohols. All these new compounds were obtained in mild conditions with good to excellent yields and were fully characterized by multinuclear ( ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H},{ }^{13} \mathrm{C}$ and ${ }^{19} \mathrm{~F}$ ) NMR, IR spectroscopies and HRMS.

## Results and discussion

## Synthesis

The starting substrates $1-8$ were synthesized from corresponding $\alpha$-methylene ketones using the Vilsmeier-Haack reaction according to literature procedures ${ }^{32}$. The synthesis of the new $\beta$-fluoroalkoxy- $\alpha, \beta$-unsaturated aldehydes (9-30) was performed by fluoroalkoxyetherification of the $\beta$-chloro- $\alpha, \beta$-unsaturated aldehydes (1-8) in a mild basic medium.

Several tests were attempted to optimize the reaction of the cyclic and acyclic substrates namely, the $\beta$-chlorovinylaldehydes $\mathbf{1}$ and $\mathbf{4}$, with trifluoroethanol in the presence of several basic agents. (Table 1).

When $\mathrm{Et}_{3} \mathrm{~N}$ or KF were used, no reaction was observed and the starting $\beta$-chloro- $\alpha, \beta$ unsaturated aldehydes 1 and 4 were recovered as deduced by thin layer chromatography (entries 1, 8 and 9). Although $\mathrm{K}_{2} \mathrm{CO}_{3}$ in dry THF, reacted to give low or moderate yields of the
expected products and the reactions were not completed, even for several hours at refluxing temperature of THF (entries 2 and 10). The action of NaOH or KOH in neat conditions led to the expected products with good to excellent yields (entries 3-6, 11, 12). The reaction with $\mathrm{Cs}_{2} \mathrm{CO}_{3}$ in neat conditions at $40^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ for 8 h gave the expected product in an excellent yield for the cyclic compound 7 (entry 7). When generalizing the reaction to other fluoroalcohols, the bases KOH and NaOH gave good to excellent results with acyclic starting aldehydes 3-8, however it did not yield the satisfactory results when applied on the cyclic aldehydes $\mathbf{1}$ and $\mathbf{2}$. In these cases, the better results were achieved with $\mathrm{Cs}_{2} \mathrm{CO}_{3}$ as basic reagent in neat conditions as shown in Table 2.

It is worth to note that the aliphatic chlorovinylaldehydes 5-8 reacted with the fluoroalcohols and gave the expected products $\mathbf{2 6 - 3 0}$ in moderate yields. However, it was difficult to isolate them due to their volatility. On the other hand, the non-fluorinated homologous alcohols such as methanol, ethanol, isopropanol and allylic alcohol reacted with the chlorovinyl aldehydes 1,2 and 4 and gave several products with lack of the aldehydic signal in ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}$ NMR spectra. Only the expected product 25 , starting from $\mathrm{CH}_{2}=\mathrm{CH}-\mathrm{CH}_{2}-\mathrm{OH}$ and aldehyde 4, was obtained in a good yield. All the results are gathered in Table 2.

[^0]To explore the reactivity of the $\beta$-fluoroalkoxy- $\alpha, \beta$-unsaturated aldehydes $\mathbf{9 - 3 0}$, further treatment of these compounds with $\mathrm{NaBH}_{4}$ as a reducing agent in absolute ethanol at $\left(-10^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right)$, afforded successfully the corresponding new $\beta$-fluoroalkoxyallyl alcohols 31-37 in 76-99\% yields (Table 2).

All the reactions were monitored by TLC and NMR. The products $9-30$ were obtained as orange or yellow viscous oils that are soluble in both $\mathrm{CHCl}_{3}$ and DMSO. Alcohols 31-37 were stable at room temperature and obtained as yellow liquids soluble in $\mathrm{CHCl}_{3}$. All the new compounds were identified by NMR ( ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H},{ }^{13} \mathrm{C}$ and $\left.{ }^{19} \mathrm{~F}\right)$, IR spectroscopies and HRMS. All the spectra are in agreement with proposed molecular structures and the percentages were calculated using ${ }^{1} \mathrm{H}-\mathrm{NMR}$ spectra of the crude reaction mixtures.

In the course of our investigation and as shown in Table 1, the $Z$ and $E$ isomer ratios are in the same order as those of starting substrates, except for the $\alpha$-unsubstituted aldehydes 17-20, 26 and 27. Remarkably, in these cases, a partial or complete stereoconversion has occurred; the percentage of the $Z$-isomer decreases in favor of the $E$-isomer. Additional experiments were carried out and the stereoconversion was found to be not affected if the reaction of the chlorovinylaldehyde $\mathbf{3}$ with $\mathrm{TFE} / \mathrm{KOH}$ is realized in solvents with different polarities such as THF, $\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{Cl}_{2}, \mathrm{CHCl}_{3}$, toluene or DMF. The same proportions of $\mathrm{Z} / E(7 / 93)$ isomers of the product $\mathbf{1 7}$ are observed implying that the solvent polarity is not involved in the observed stereoconversion. However, this latter is dramatically affected with bulkier substituents belonging to either the substrate (compounds 26 and 27) or to the alcohol fluorinated alkyl group of the nucleophiles (compounds 18-20). By reducing the aldehyde group of the compound 3 to alcohol, the resulting product $\mathrm{Cl}(\mathrm{Ph}) \mathrm{C}=\mathrm{CH}-\mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{OH}$ ( $3^{\prime}$ ) does not react with trifluoroethanol in basic mild even at high temperatures and long reaction times. This suggests that the resonative electron-withdrawing aldehydic group is necessary to the nucleophilic vinylic substitution reaction in these $\beta$-chloro- $\alpha, \beta$-unsaturated aldehydes.

There are literature reports, in which the products stereochemistry issued from nucleophilic vinylic substitution reaction is directly related to the nature of the reaction mechanism. The stereochemical outcome would be retention of configuration, partial or total stereoconversion depending on whether the reaction takes place into a concerted process or stepwise ${ }^{12,33,34}$. The most common reaction route for similar highly activated systems is an addition-elimination
mechanism that is initiated by nucleophilic attack perpendicular to the $\pi$-bond ${ }^{12,35,36}$ as proposed in Scheme 2.

## Theoretical calculations

To get more insight into the experimentally observed stereoconvergence, theoretical B3LYP/6-31+G(d,p) calculations have been carried out using the implicit SMD model to simulate 2,2,2-trifluoroethanol solvent mainly on compound 3, which showed a high stereoselectivity. . Therefore, it was necessary to study the nucleophilic vinylic substitution mechanism and extract the structure of the reaction intermediate corresponding to the Z stereoisomer (IntZ) from the IRC calculation in order to evaluate the rotational energy barrier allowing the passage of $\operatorname{Int} Z \rightarrow \mathrm{IntE}$ and consequently the $\mathrm{Z} \rightarrow \mathrm{E}$ isomerization of the reaction products. The geometry configurations and frequencies of all reactants $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{Z}}$ and $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{E}}$, transition states $\mathrm{TS}_{\mathrm{Z},}, \mathrm{TS}^{\prime}{ }_{\mathrm{Z}}, \mathrm{TS}_{\mathrm{E}}$ and $\mathrm{TS}{ }_{\mathrm{E}}$ and products $3-\mathrm{Z}$ and $3-\mathrm{E}$ involved in the mechanism of the reaction were optimized, as well as Natural Bond Orbital (NBO) charge analysis and bond length changes along the intrinsic coordinate of the reaction were calculated. (Fig.2). $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{z}}, \mathrm{TS}_{\mathrm{z}}$ and $\mathrm{P}_{\mathrm{Z}}$ optimized geometries are given in Figure 2a. All the relative data of the stereoisomer $E$ are given in the supplementary materials.

The kinetic study through the reaction coordinate from $\mathrm{R}_{z}$ by IRC computations shows an interesting behavior, whereby the product formation showed a shoulder revealing the presence of a so-called hidden intermediate (Figure 2 b$)^{41}$ and the reaction is pseudo-first order. However, the calculations performed on the compound 3' show only a single step without any intermediate (Fig. 2b'), supporting the role of the aldehydic group in the carbanion intermediate formation. On the other hand, the applied RMS gradient norm on the

IRC plot of compound 3 showed five different zones (Fig. 2c). The zone I describes the nucleophile $\left(\mathrm{CF}_{3} \mathrm{CH}_{2} \mathrm{O}^{-}\right)$orientation and approach from the electrophilic site $\mathrm{C}_{4}$ of the aldehyde $\mathbf{3}$ forming the activated complex $\mathrm{TS}_{\mathrm{z}}$. The NBO charge and the bond length along the IRC plots (Fig. 2e, 2d and 2d') and Table 3 show that there is a charge transfer from $\mathrm{O}_{2}$ to $\mathrm{C}_{3}$ and $\mathrm{O}_{1}$ atoms, while the $\mathrm{C}_{3}-\mathrm{C}_{4}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{2}-\mathrm{O}_{1}$ bond lengths increase and $\mathrm{C}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{3}$ bond decreases. The zone II corresponds to the enolate intermediate ( $\mathrm{Int}_{z}$ ) formation. There is addition of the nucleophile on the $\mathrm{C}_{4}$ atom, which goes from pseudo $\mathrm{sp}^{2}$ to $\mathrm{sp}^{3}$ hybridization while the $\mathrm{O}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{4}$ bond is formed. At this stage, an electronic charge transfer is observed from $\mathrm{O}_{2}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{4}$ atoms to $\mathrm{C}_{2}, \mathrm{C}_{3}$ and $\mathrm{O}_{1}$ atoms. The $\mathrm{O}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{4}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{3}$ bonds decrease in length ; $\mathrm{C}_{3}-\mathrm{C}_{4}, \mathrm{C}_{2}-\mathrm{O}_{1}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{4}-\mathrm{Cl}$ bond lengths increase and the maximum charge transfer to $\mathrm{O}_{1}$ in IRC plot is $\mathrm{q}_{\text {max }}\left(\mathrm{O}_{1}\right)=-0.887$. The zones IV and V reflect the elimination step: there are both electronic and geometrical reorganizations. The maximum of the zone IV represents the second transition state $\mathrm{TS}_{z}^{\prime}$ of the reaction with an increase in bond lengths of $\mathrm{C}_{4}-\mathrm{Cl}$ and $\mathrm{C}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{3}$ and a decrease in those of $\mathrm{O}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{4}, \mathrm{C}_{3}-\mathrm{C}_{4}$ and $\mathrm{O}_{1}-\mathrm{C}_{2}$. Then there is molecular reorganization and $\mathrm{sp}^{2}$ hybridization recovery of $\mathrm{C}_{4}$ with $\mathrm{Cl}^{-}$elimination accompanied by $\mathrm{C}_{2}-\mathrm{C}_{3}$ bond length increasing and $\mathrm{C}_{3}-\mathrm{C}_{4}$ and $\mathrm{O}_{1}-\mathrm{C}_{2}$ bond lengths decreasing. At the end of the reaction, the transfer charge occurs from $\mathrm{O}_{1}$ to $\mathrm{C}_{2}$ to $\mathrm{C}_{3}$ to $\mathrm{C}_{4}$ to Cl atoms. These observations are in good agreement with the assumption of the addition-elimination mechanism.

Further more, the activation energy value in the reaction pathway from Rz to Pz is less than in the reaction from $\mathrm{R}_{\mathrm{E}}$ to $\mathrm{P}_{\mathrm{E}}$ and $\mathrm{P}_{E}$ isomer is more stable then $\mathrm{P}_{Z}$ by $1.36 \mathrm{kcal}^{2} \mathrm{~mol}^{-1}$ as shown in Fig. 3 and Table 4. The calculations performed on the activation energy of the nonreactive compound $3^{\prime}$ ' toward trifluoroethanol, rise to a value of $\Delta G^{i}=29.65 \mathrm{kcal} . \mathrm{mol}^{-1}$ supporting the effective contribution of the aldehydic group in the nucleophilic vinylic substitution reaction by reducing the energy barrier. The reaction of both compounds $\mathbf{3}$ and 3’ are thermodynamically favored and exothermic with insignificant change in enthropy. All parameters of the reaction calculated with 6 31+G (d,p) basis sets are gathered in table 4.

In order to relate the stereoconversion ratios to the structure of the molecules involved in the reaction, some internal rotation barrier key values have been calculated. It was found that the internal barrier rotation from the conformer $\mathrm{Int}_{z}$ to the conformer $\mathrm{Int}_{E}$ is only $3.7 \mathrm{kcal} . \mathrm{mol}^{-1}$,
similar to those of the simple molecules as ethane ( $2.9 \mathrm{kcal}^{-\mathrm{mol}^{-1}}$ ) and propane ( $3.4 \mathrm{kcal} . \mathrm{mol}^{-1}$ ) and much lower than the value of the activation energy of compound 3’ (Fig. 4).

The compound 27 have the lowest barrier rotation leading to a total conversion. However, in the compound 29, due to the bulky substituents, the relative high rotational barrier (6 kcal. $\mathrm{mol}^{-1}$ ) leads to configuration retention. It is worthnoting that the bulkiness of the alcohol alkyl group in compound $\mathbf{1 9}$ affect the barrier rotation inhibiting the stereoconversion ratio.

Thus, the carbanion intermediate stability, in consequent relationship with the steric hindrance of the substituents including those of the nucleophiles, is the driving force of the vinylic substitution reaction feasibility on the various $\beta$-chloro- $\alpha, \beta$-unsaturated aldehydes, as well as the stereoconversion rates. Particularly, The $\alpha$-position substituents of the substrate do affect dramatically the barrier rotation due to hyperconjugation between C-H bond in $\alpha$-position of the carbonyle and the carbanion intermediate. This latter is destabilized and, due to its reduced lifetime, the internal rotation is prevented leading to retention of configuration. On
the other hand, the unsubstituted $\alpha$-position favors the fast rotation leading to inversion of configuration.

## Conclusion

A series of new functionalized $\beta$-fluoroalkoxyvinyl aldehydes and corresponding alcohols have been synthesized from $\alpha$-methylene ketones using a facile and efficient method in neat conditions in most cases. The major advantage of this green transformation is the non-use of metal catalysts or high temperatures. We have shown that the driving force of this reaction is the resonative electron-withdrawing aldehydic group effect. The theoretical DFT investigations of the nucleophilic vinylic substitution mechanism showed the charge transfers in the stabilized hidden intermediate enolate. Isomerization of the intermediate $3-Z$ into the most stable intermediate $3-E$, was justified by the very low energy accompanying the internal rotation of the carbanion intermediate. The new functionalized $\beta$-fluoroalkoxyvinyl aldehydes can be used as building blocks of new fluorinated compounds that are synthetically attractive in biological active molecules and advanced materials. Further works to explore the synthetic applications of these new intermediates are in progress in our laboratory as well as their biological activity and coordination chemistry.

## EXPERIMENTAL SECTION

## General Information

The usual solvents and reagents were purchased from commercial sources and use without further purification. TLC was performed on silica gel, 60F-250 ( 0.26 mm thickness) plates. The plates were visualized with UV light (254 nm). NMR spectra were performed on an Ultrafield AVANCE $300 \mathrm{MHz}\left({ }^{1} \mathrm{H}, 300 \mathrm{MHz} ;{ }^{13} \mathrm{C}, 75 \mathrm{MHz}\right)$ or Bruker ARX $200\left({ }^{19} \mathrm{~F}, 188 \mathrm{MHz}\right)$ spectrometers. Chemical shifts ${ }^{\mathrm{TM}}$ are in parts per million ( ppm ) and the following abbreviations are used: singlet (s), doublet (d), doublet of doublets (dd), triplet ( t ), quadruplet (q), quintet (quint) and multiplet (m). High resolution mass spectra were obtained using a Bruker Esquire electrospray ionization apparatus at the SAMM (Faculty of Pharmacy at Chatenay-Malabry). All solvents were dried, distilled and stored over molecular sieves ( $4 \AA$ ) using standard techniques. The starting aldehydes were prepared using Vilsmeir-Haack reaction ${ }^{70-73}$.

Alcohols (2mmol) was added to an oven-dried flask under argon with base ( 2 mmol ), The mixture was stirred for 2 h at reflux. The aldehyde ( 1 mmol ) was added at $0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$, and the reaction was stirred at reflux. The progress of the reaction was monitored by TLC. Until the conversion of $\beta$-chloro- $\alpha, \beta$ - unsaturated aldehydes was completed. Then, water ( 50 mL ) was added to the mixture, the products were extracted with diethyl ether. ( $3 * 30 \mathrm{~mL}$ ) and washed by 10 mL of NaCl . The solvent (diethyl ether) was evaporated, and the crude product was purified by short-column chromatography using cyclohexane-diethylether as eluent (8/2).

General procedure for the preparation of $\boldsymbol{\beta}-\mathrm{O}-\mathrm{F}$-alkyl allylalchols (31-37).
The $\beta$-O-F-alkyl vinyl ethers ( 1 mmol ) was stirred at $-10^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ in absolute ethanol with $(0.25$ mmol) of $\mathrm{NaBH}_{4}$. The progress of the reaction was monitored by TLC (by dissolving the sample in ether) using cyclohexane: diethylether (8:2).until the conversion of $\beta$-O-F-alkyl vinyl aldehydes was completed. Then, water $(100 \mathrm{~mL})$ was added to the mixture, the products were extracted with diethyl ether. $(3 * 30 \mathrm{~mL})$ and washed 2 times by 10 ml of NaCl . The solvent (diethyl ether) was evaporated, and the crude product was purified by short-column chromatography using cyclohexane-diethylether as eluent (8/2).

## Theoretical calculations

Full geometry optimizations were performed with GAUSSIAN 09W ${ }^{37}$ program package, in 2,2,2-trifluoroethanol as solvent, modeled by universal salvation model (SMD) ${ }^{38}$ using B3LYP method ${ }^{39}$ with $6-31+G(d, p)$ basis set ${ }^{40}$. From transition states (TSs), reaction paths were traced by the intrinsic reaction coordinate (IRC) method $[22,23]$ to obtain the energyminimum geometries. The relaxed Potential Energy Surface (PES) scan was performed with geometry optimization at each point. The energies of the optimized structures were evaluated by freezing the distances $\mathrm{C}_{4}-\mathrm{Cl}=1.890 \AA$ and $\mathrm{C}_{4}-\mathrm{O}_{2}=1.501 \AA$ for each value of the dihedral angle ( $\mathrm{Cl}-\mathrm{C}_{4}-\mathrm{C}_{3}-\mathrm{C}_{2}$ ).
