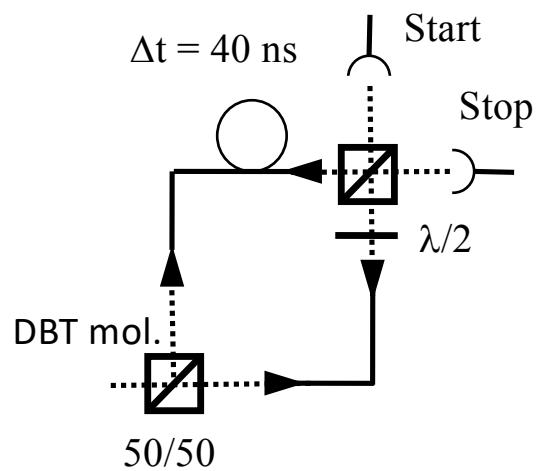
Why Molecules are interesting?

- ✓ Photostability
- ✓ Behaves like a two level system
- ✓ Resonances with high quality factors (up to $\sim 10^8$)
- ✓ Narrow Zero Phonon Line
- ✓ Single photon source

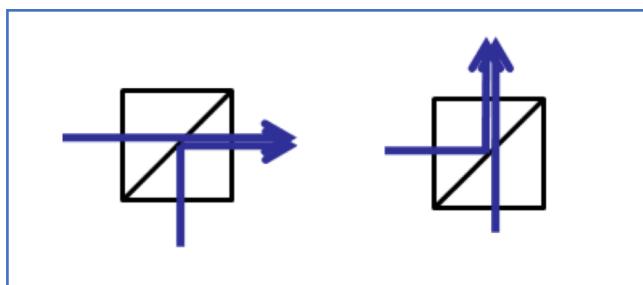

Sub nanosecond Rabi oscillations :

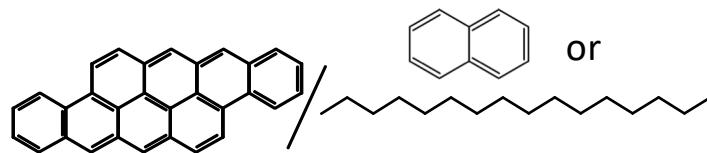
- Period : **850 ps**

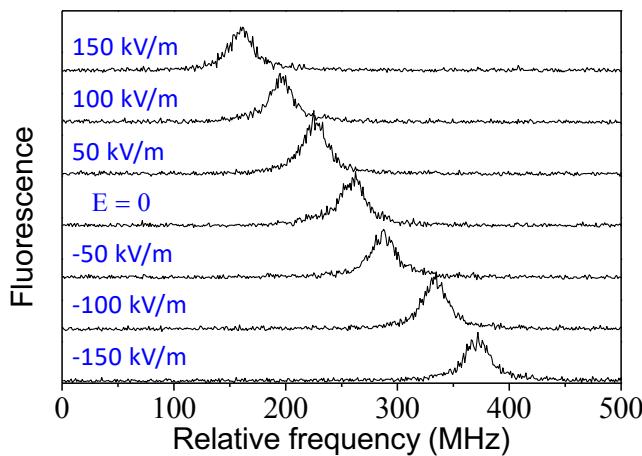
Stark Effect

with electric fields :



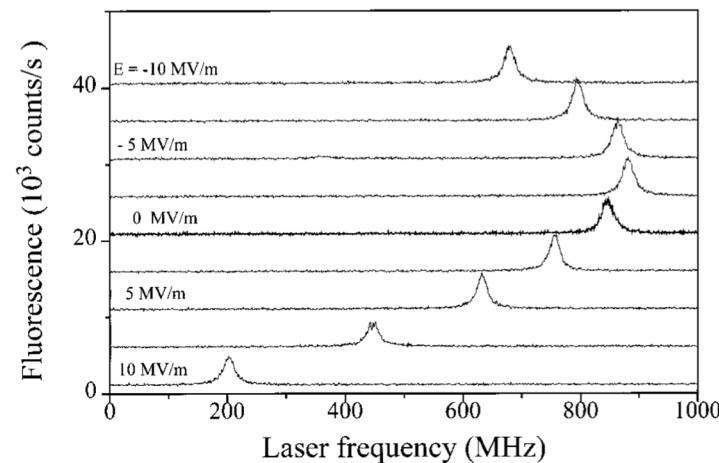
$$\hbar\omega(E) - \hbar\omega_0 = -\Delta\mu E - \frac{1}{2} \Delta\alpha E^2$$

Linear Stark Shift



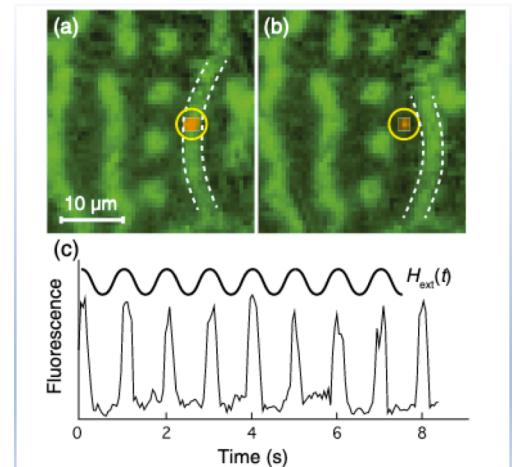
Permanent dipole moment:

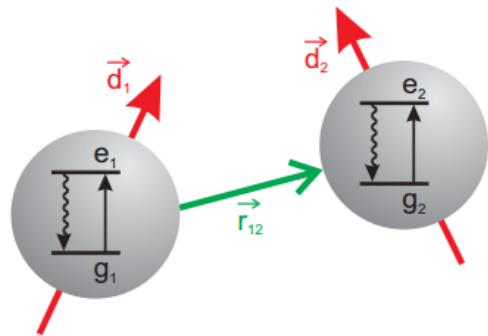

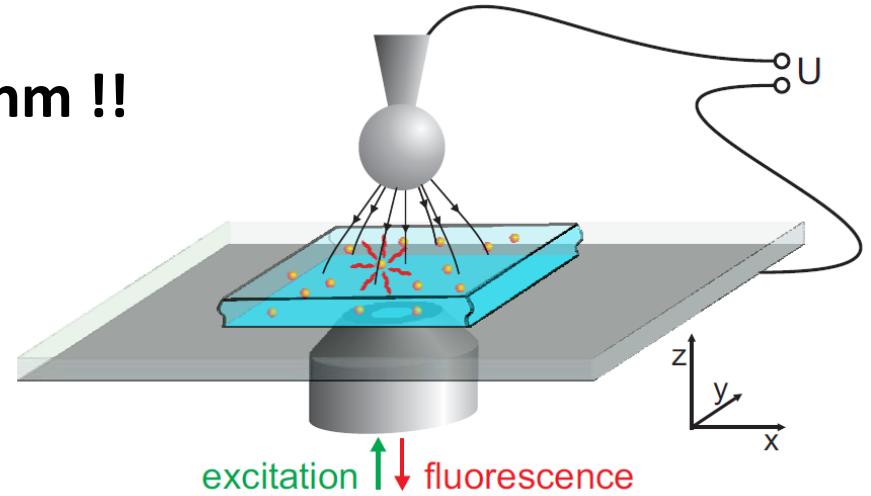

Need for an optical method to image the interacting emitters

Cryogenic super-resolution microscopy by Excited State Saturation (ESSat)

Super-resolution fluorescence microscopies

Imaging with resolutions below the diffraction limit

- revolutionized imaging capabilities offered by far-field optical microscopy
- development mainly driven by the need for better resolutions to study biological processes in live samples
- nm optical resolutions give access to nanoscale molecular organizations

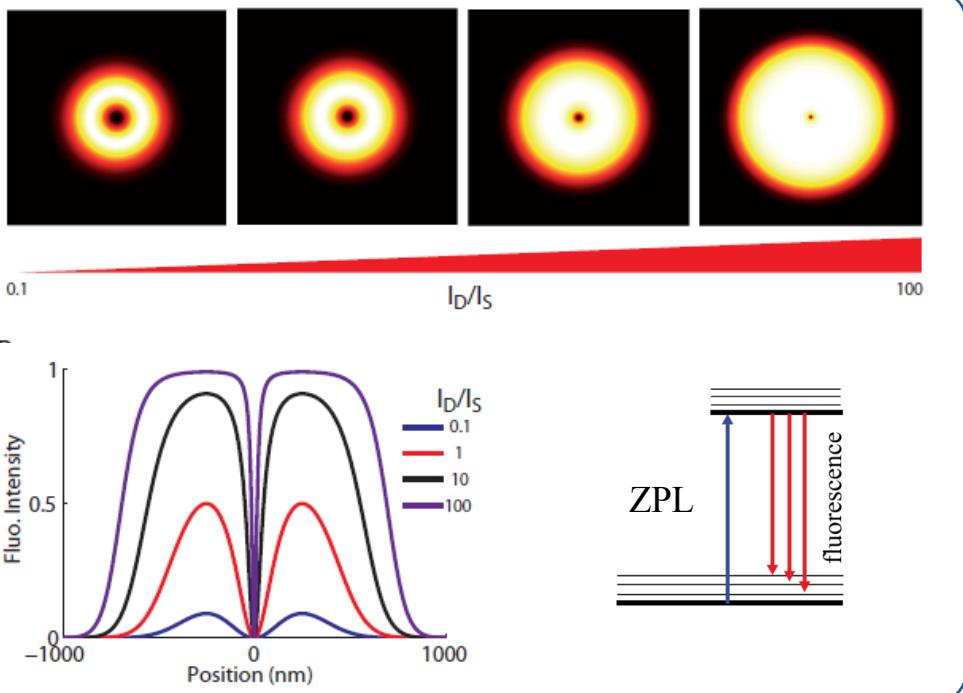

The Nobel Prize in Chemistry 2014 was awarded jointly to Eric Betzig, Stefan W. Hell and William E. Moerner "for the development of super-resolved fluorescence microscopy".

Demonstrated @ Room temperatures and are based on:
controlling fluorescence emission volumes to highly localized regions, using structured illumination schemes or stochastic detection of single emitters

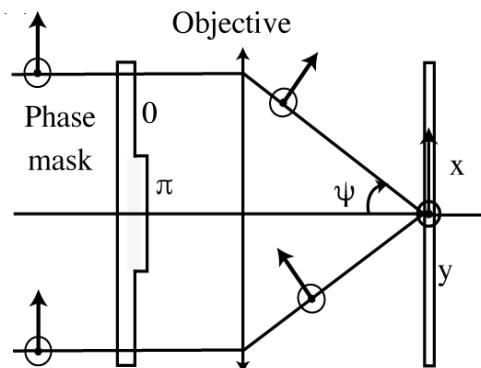

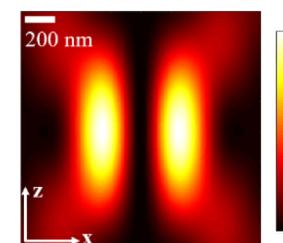
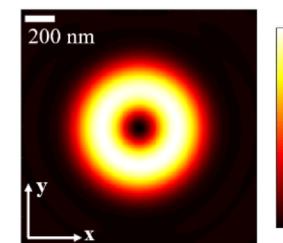
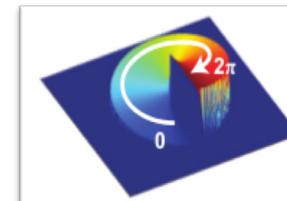
For a two-level system :

L.T. : $\sigma = 1.6 \times 10^{-9} \text{ cm}^2$
R.T. : $\sigma \sim 10^{-16} \text{ cm}^2$

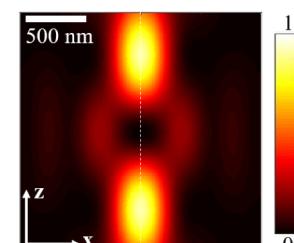
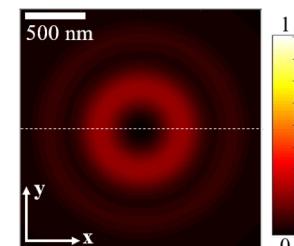
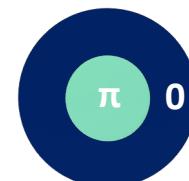


Helix phase plate :
Unaffected axial resolution



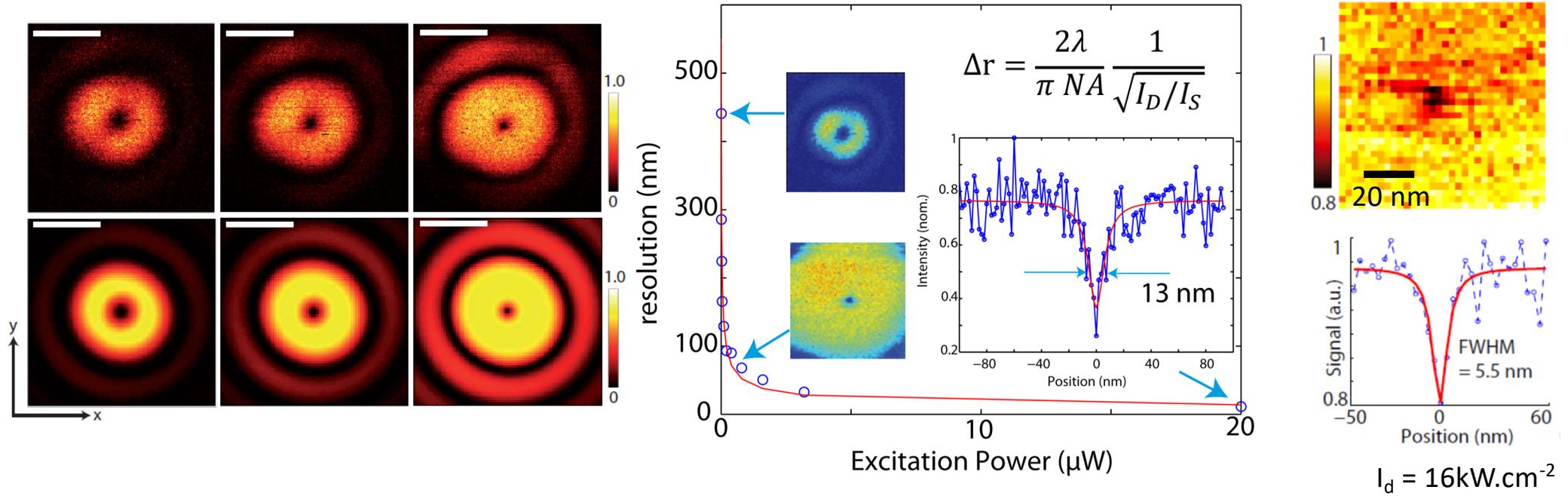

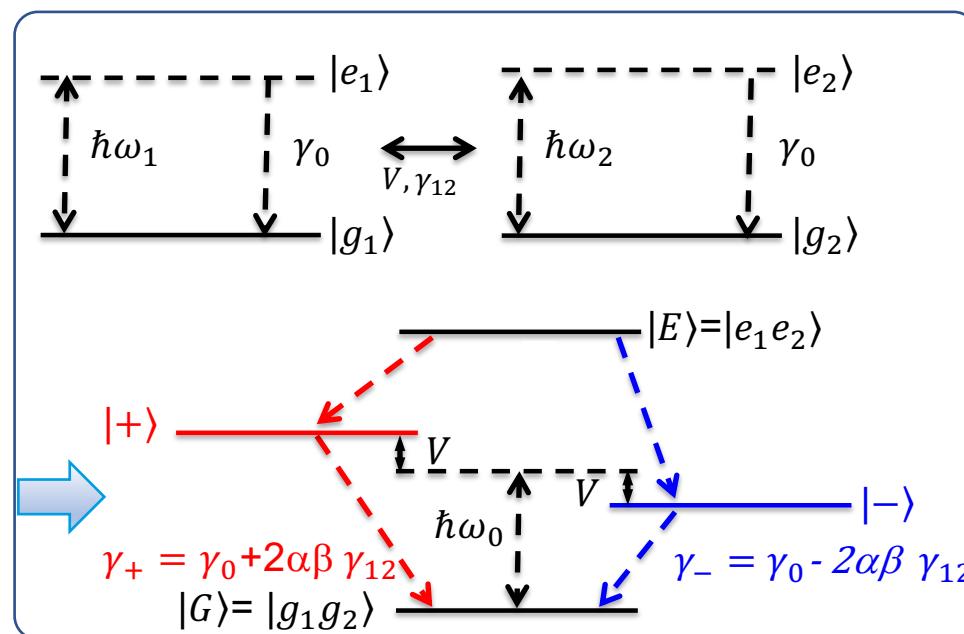
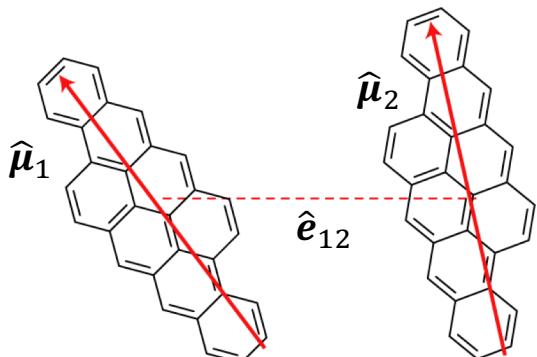
Coherent Optical Dipole Coupling of Two Individual Molecules

Coupling constant :

$$V = \frac{3\hbar\gamma_0}{4(kd)^3} [(\hat{\mu}_1 \cdot \hat{\mu}_2) - 3(\hat{\mu}_1 \cdot \hat{e}_{12})(\hat{\mu}_2 \cdot \hat{e}_{12})]$$

Cross-damping rate :

$$\gamma_{12} = \gamma_0 (\hat{\mu}_1 \cdot \hat{\mu}_2)$$



2 entangled « delocalized » states

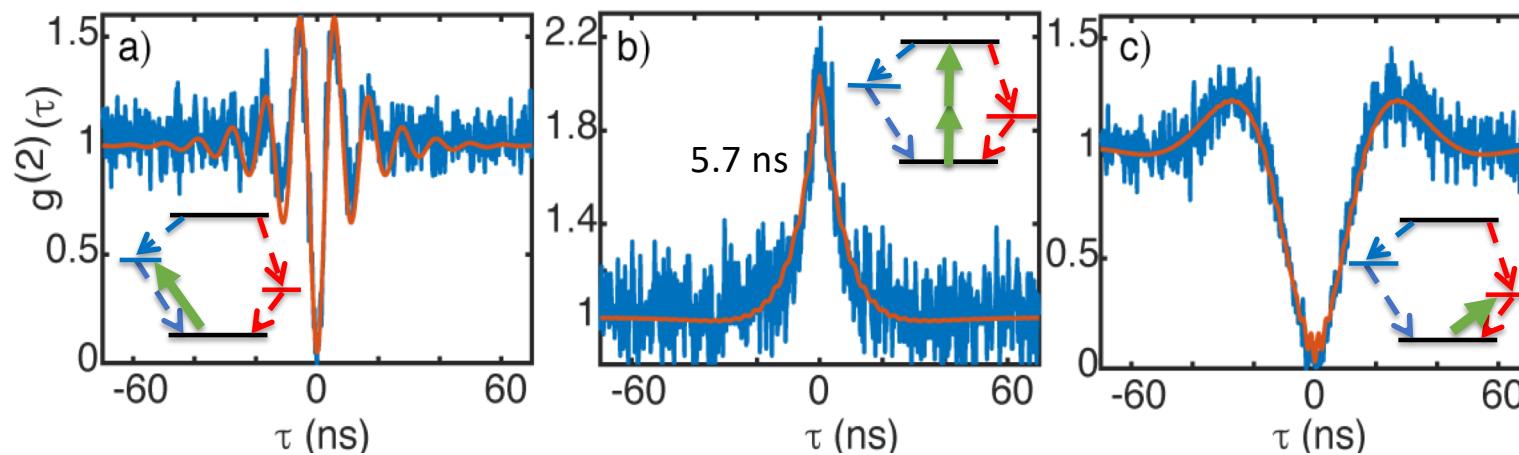
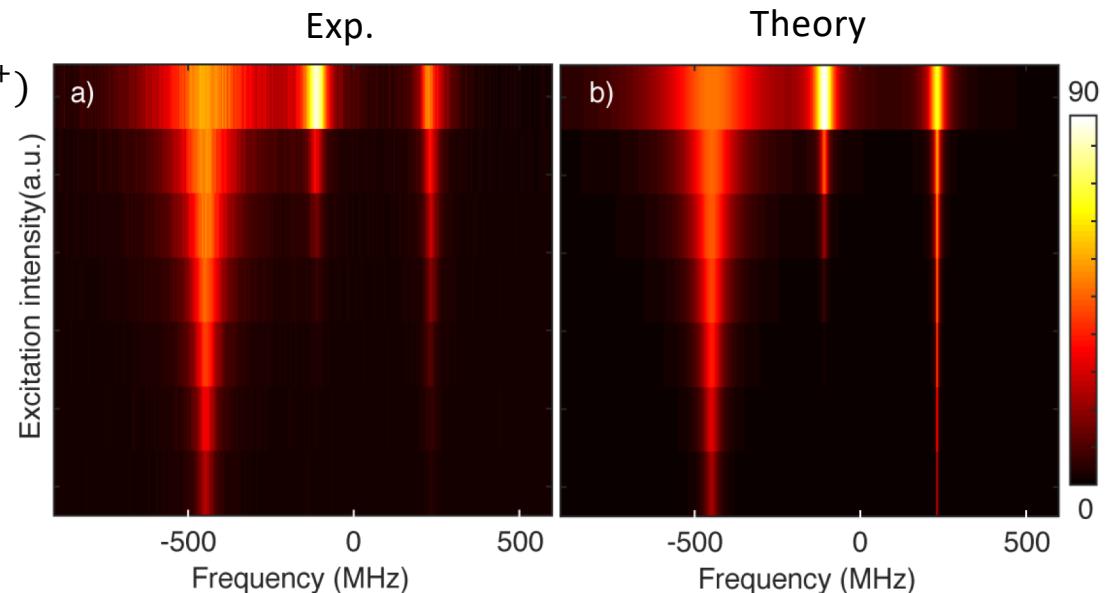
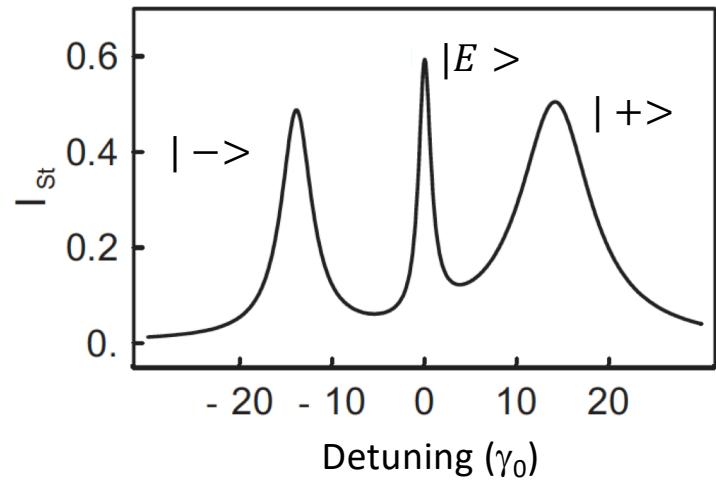
$$\begin{cases} |+\rangle = (\alpha|e_1, g_2\rangle + \beta|g_1, e_2\rangle) \\ |-\rangle = (\beta|e_1, g_2\rangle - \alpha|g_1, e_2\rangle) \end{cases}$$

Signatures of the coherent dipole dipole interaction

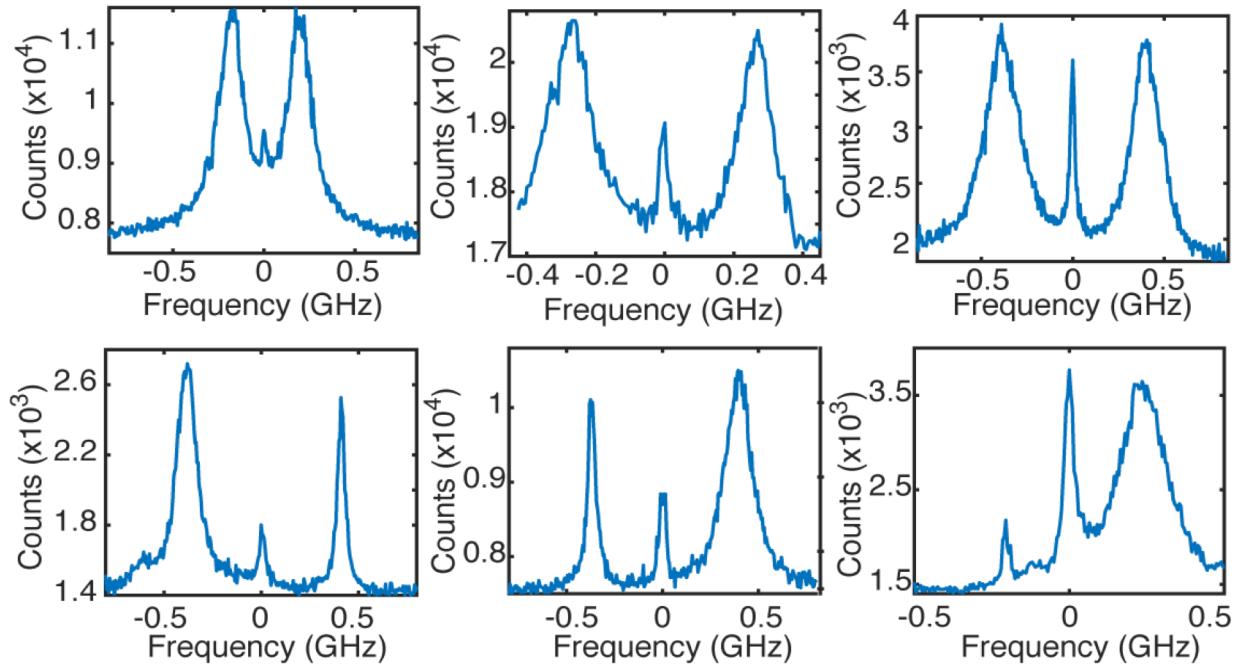
Excitation spectrum calculated using Master Equation :

$$\dot{\rho} = -\frac{i}{\hbar} [H, \rho] - \frac{1}{2} \sum_{i,j} \gamma_{ij} (S_i^+ S_j^- \rho + \rho S_i^+ S_j^- - 2 S_j^- \rho S_i^+)$$

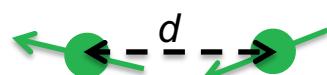

Optical nanoscopy allows finding coherently coupled molecules with different degree of entanglement

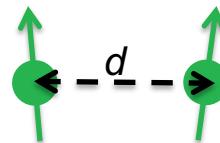

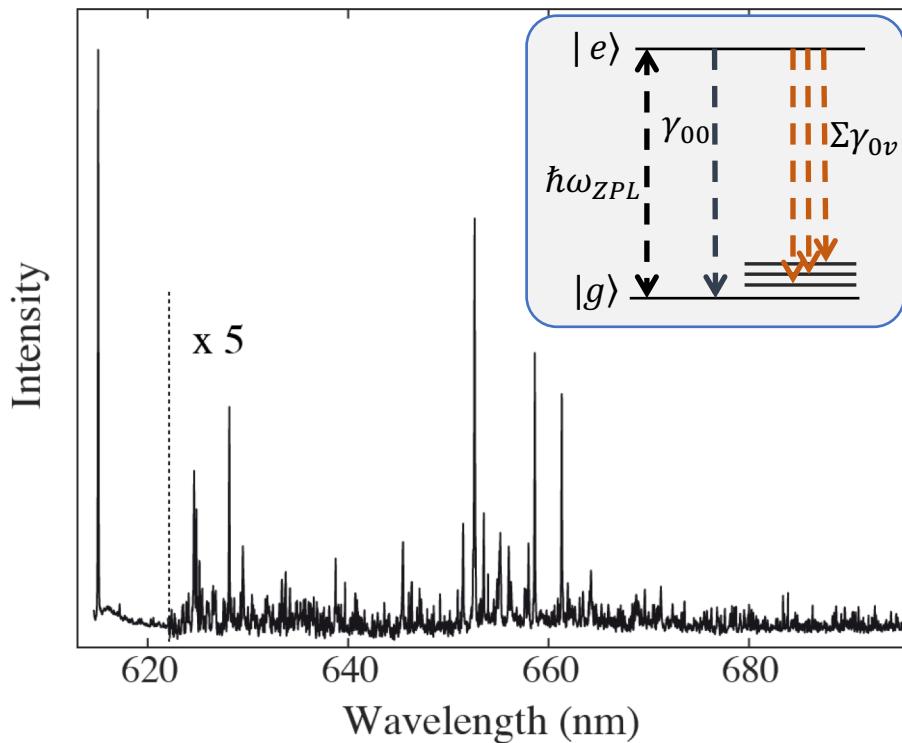
Maximum entanglement when $\Delta \rightarrow 0$:
 $\alpha, \beta \rightarrow \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}}$, and $\gamma_+ \rightarrow 2\gamma_0, \gamma_- \rightarrow 0$
From $V/h \sim 10\gamma_0$, estimated distance:
 $d \sim 25\text{nm}$

$|+>$ and $|->$ are close to Bell States :
 $|+> = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} (1.13|eg> - 0.84|ge>)$
 $|-> = \frac{1}{\sqrt{2}} (0.84|eg> - 1.13|ge>)$

Aromatic molecules in Molecular Crystals

Emission Spectrum

- Narrow Zero Phonon Lines: purely radiative transition
- Red-shifted vibrational lines and phonon sidebands

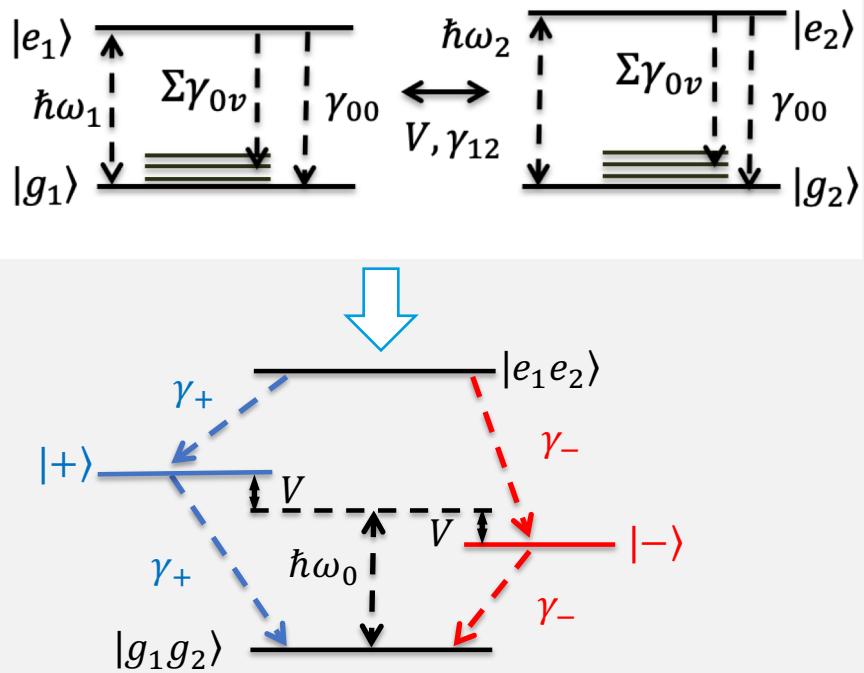


Excited state lifetime γ_0^{-1}
 $\gamma_0 = \gamma_{00} + \Sigma\gamma_{0v}$
with $\gamma_{00} = \eta_{ZPL}\gamma_0$

Combined Debye-Waller /
Franck-Condon factor
$$\eta_{ZPL} = \frac{\gamma_{00}}{\gamma_{00} + \Sigma\gamma_{0v}}$$

Low Temperature single molecule Emission Spectrum $\rightarrow \eta_{ZPL} \sim 0.35$

sub/super-radiance for two coherently coupled molecules :



Coherent dipole-dipole coupling

$$V = \frac{3\eta_{ZPL}\gamma_0}{4(kd)^3} [(\hat{\mu}_1 \cdot \hat{\mu}_2) - 3(\hat{\mu}_1 \cdot \hat{e}_{12})(\hat{\mu}_2 \cdot \hat{e}_{12})]$$

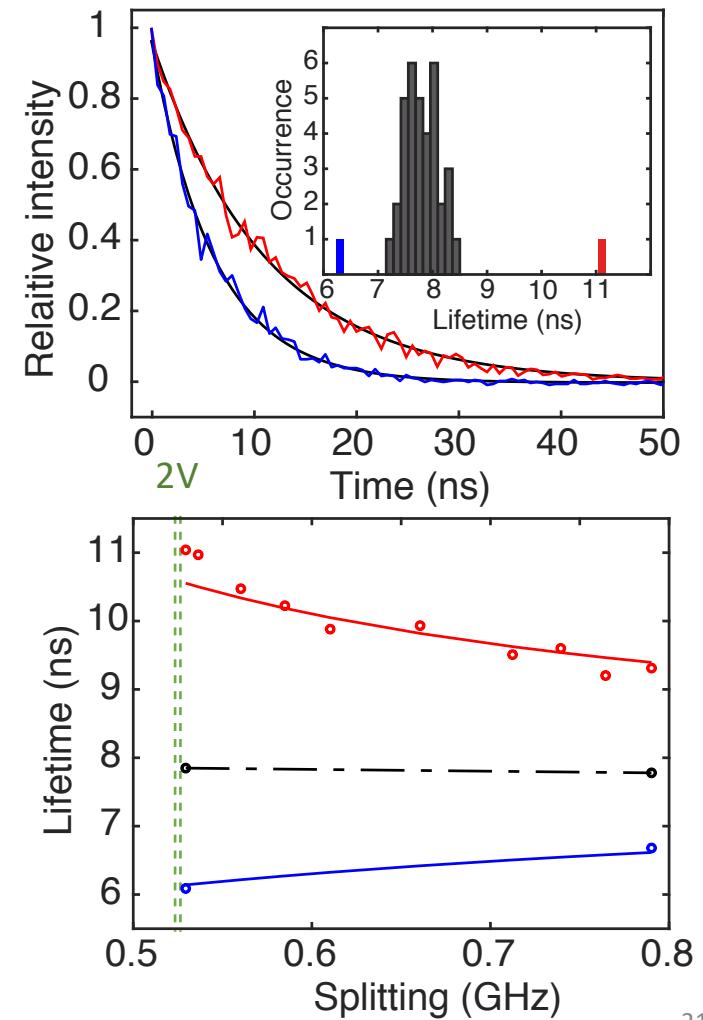
Incoherent cross-damping rate

$$\gamma_{12} = \eta_{ZPL}\gamma_0(\hat{\mu}_1 \cdot \hat{\mu}_2)$$

For $\omega_2 = \omega_1$ and $\mu_1 // \mu_2$:

$$\begin{aligned} \gamma_+ &\rightarrow \gamma_0(1 + \eta_{ZPL}) \\ \gamma_- &\rightarrow \gamma_0(1 - \eta_{ZPL}) \end{aligned}$$

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Delocalized states coupling to laser fields

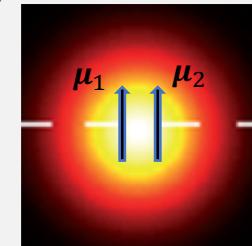
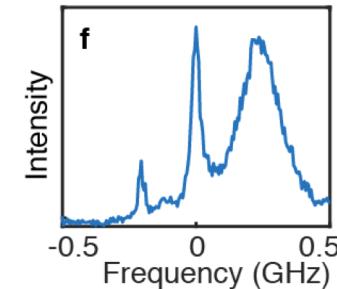
Hamiltonian governing the coupled with a driving laser of frequency ω_L

$$H = \hbar\omega_0(|E\rangle\langle E| - |G\rangle\langle G|) + \hbar\Lambda(|+\rangle\langle +| - |-\rangle\langle -|)$$
$$- \frac{\hbar}{2} \{ [(\alpha\Omega_1 + \beta\Omega_2)|E\rangle\langle +| + (\beta\Omega_1 + \alpha\Omega_2)|+\rangle\langle G|]e^{i\omega_L t} +$$
$$[(\alpha\Omega_2 - \beta\Omega_1)|E\rangle\langle -| - (\beta\Omega_2 - \alpha\Omega_1)|-\rangle\langle G|]e^{-i\omega_L t} + h.c.\}$$

Complex Rabi frequencies: $\Omega_i = -\vec{\mu}_i \cdot \vec{\mathcal{E}}(\vec{r}_i - \vec{r}_c)/\hbar$

Matrix elements that govern the laser coupling strengths:

$$\begin{aligned} \langle -|H|G \rangle &\propto \alpha\Omega_1 - \beta\Omega_2 \\ \langle +|H|G \rangle &\propto \beta\Omega_1 + \alpha\Omega_2 \end{aligned} \} \rightarrow \text{depend on } \alpha, \beta \text{ and } \Omega_i$$



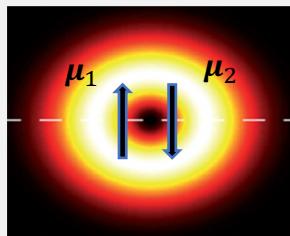
Gaussian laser spot centered between the molecules:

- Generation of in-phase dipole oscillations with $\Omega_1 = \Omega_2$.

When Δ approaches zero ($\alpha \approx \beta \approx 1/\sqrt{2}$):

- Excitation of the superradiant state is enhanced (by up to $\sqrt{2}$), while that of the subradiant state becomes forbidden.

Enhanced laser coupling to the subradiant state

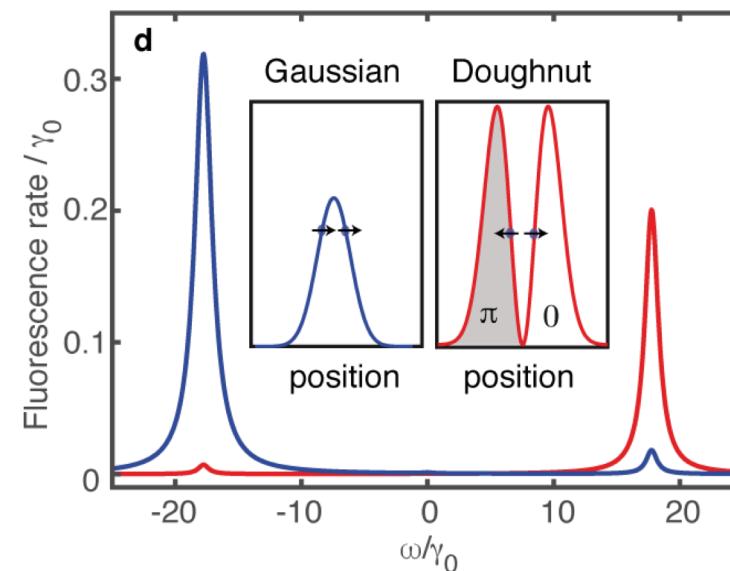
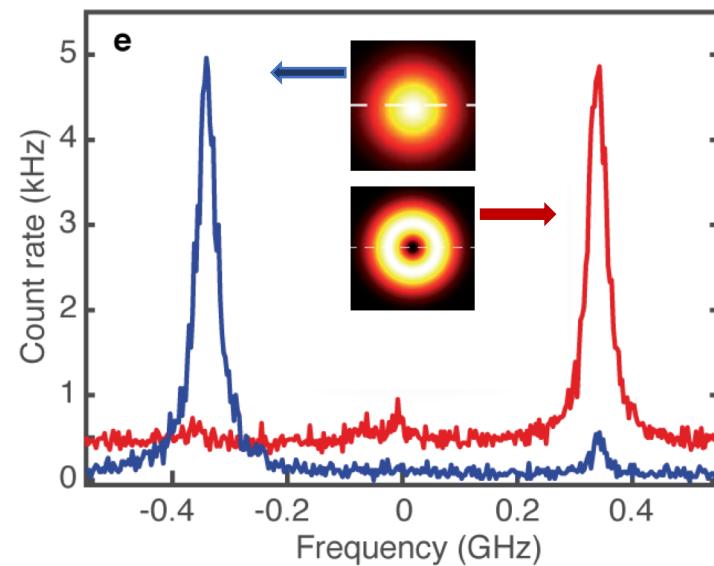
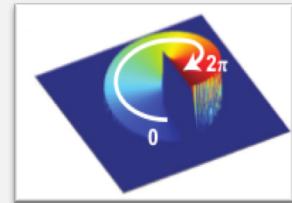


Doughnut-shaped laser spot centered between the molecules:

- Opposite-phase dipoles oscillations, $\Omega_1 = -\Omega_2$.

When Δ approaches zero ($\alpha \approx \beta \approx 1/\sqrt{2}$):

- Excitation of the subradiant state is enhanced, while that of the superradiant state is forbidden.



A method for selective preparation of long-lived subradiant states

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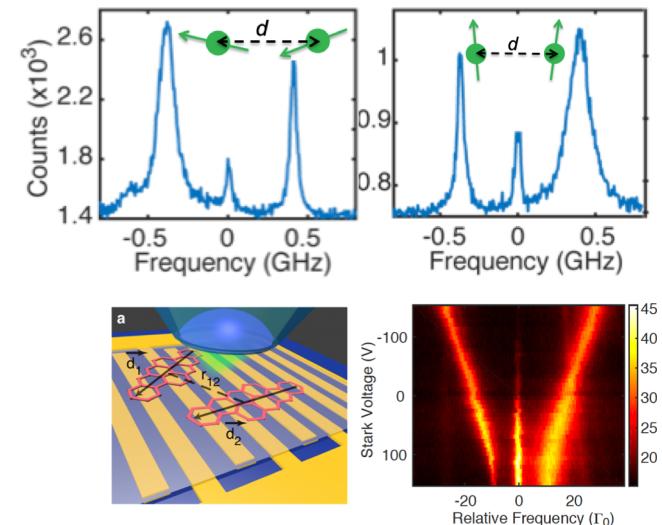
Conclusions and Perspectives

Conclusions:

Ultra stable quantum system : excitation during weeks without any photobleaching,

Optical nanoscopy to find and super-resolve coupled pairs in various configurations,

Possibility to entangle and disentangle two molecules with an electric field.

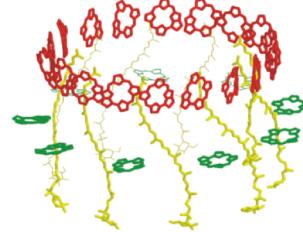

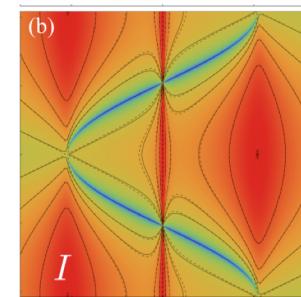

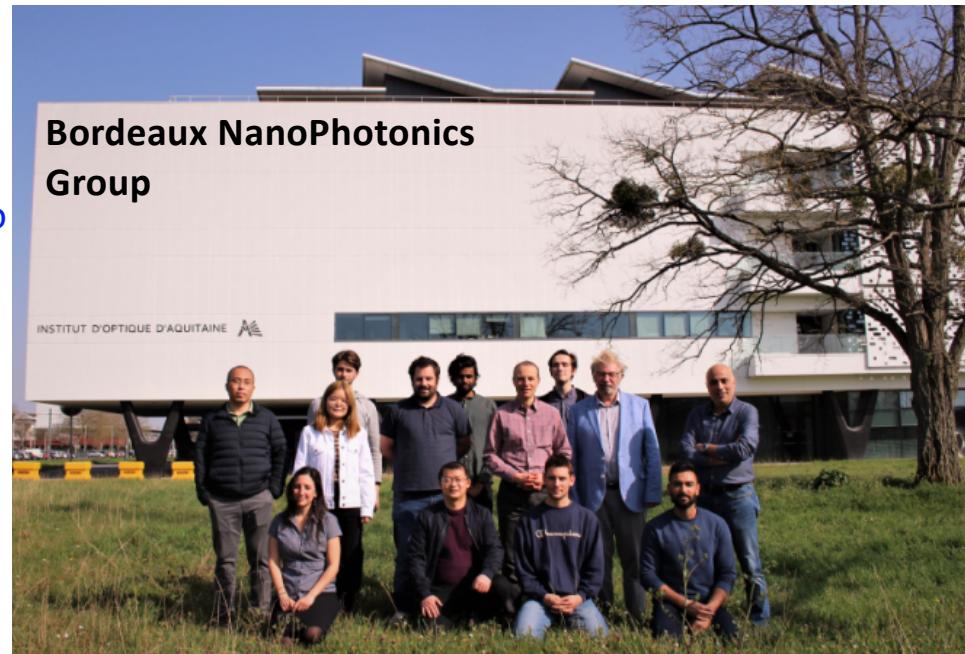
