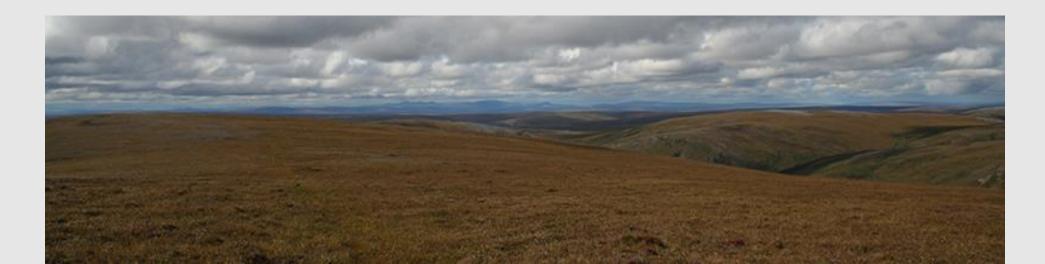

Key Questions

- Did Human populations culturally respond to millennialscale climatic variability? If so, how?
- What is the range of relationships between ecological niche and cultural adaption (technology, mobility, social networks, cultural transmission, etc.)?
- What mechanisms are at work behind cultureenvironmental relationships? Are these mechanisms consistent through time?

« Eco-Cultural » Niche Modeling

- Use of predictive modeling architectures to:
- Reconstruct the ecological niche exploited by a past human population or archaeological culture
- Identify and quantify the ecological parameters that shaped a past niche
- Use to better understand culture-environmental relationships and identify the mechanisms at work behind past cultural variability

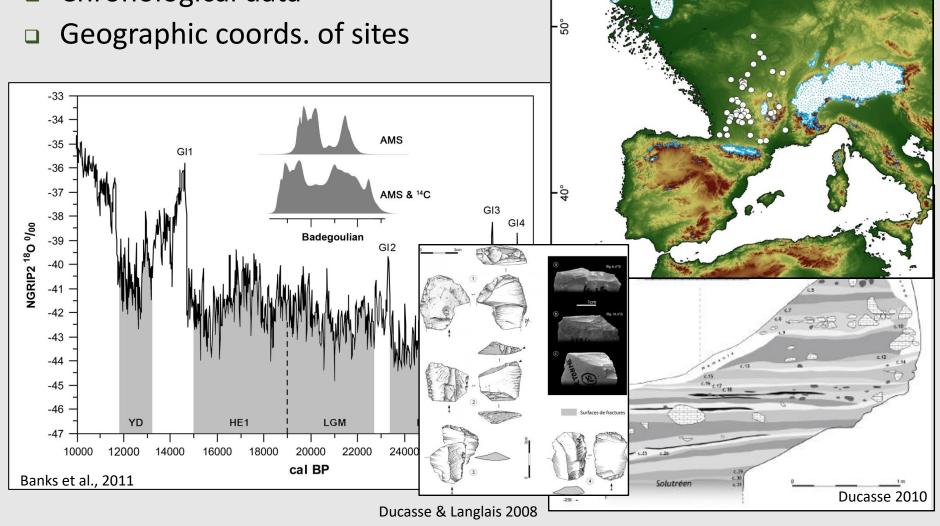

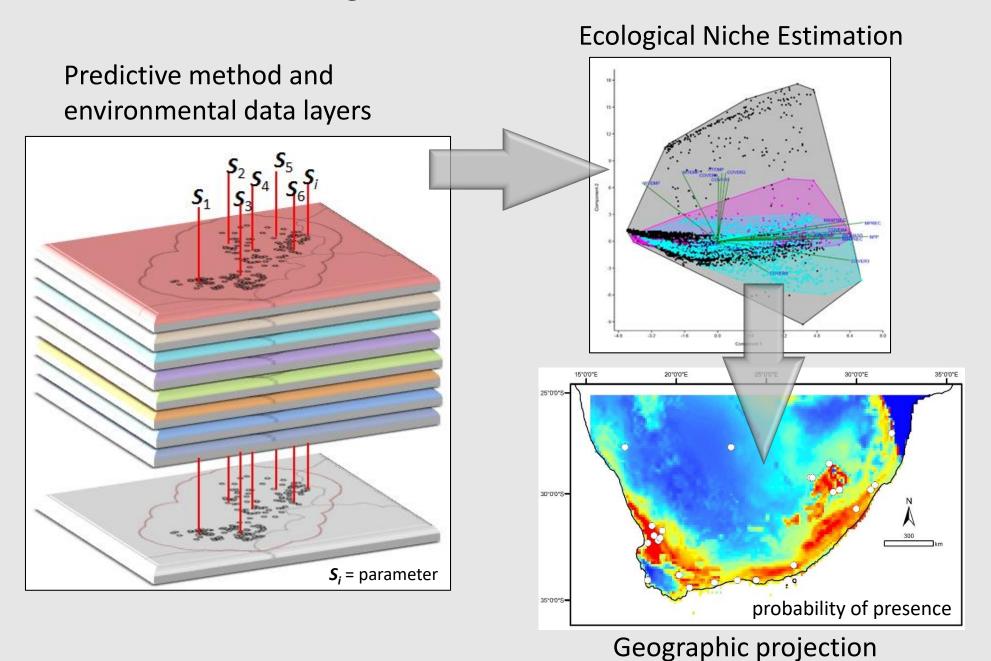

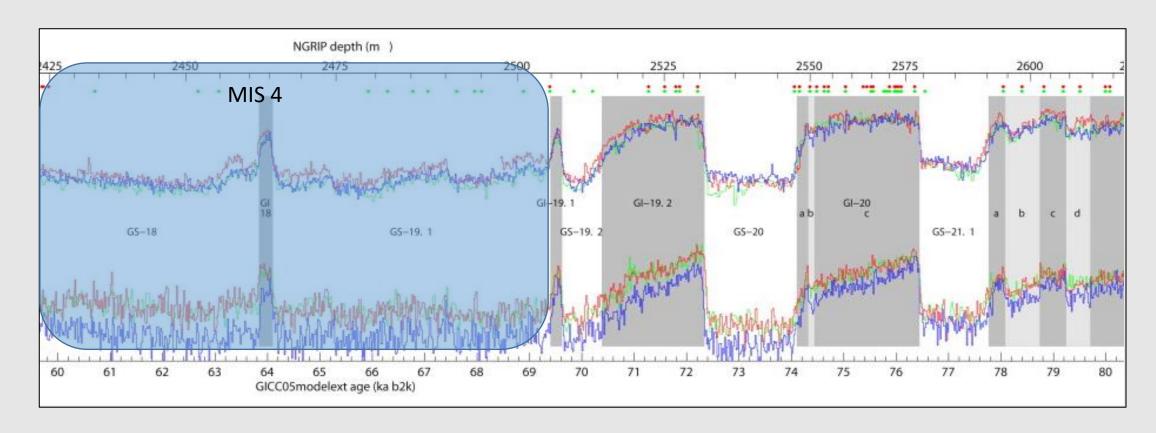

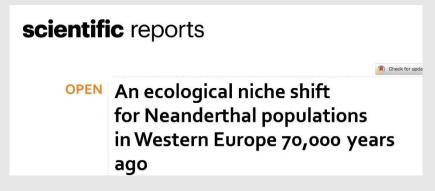


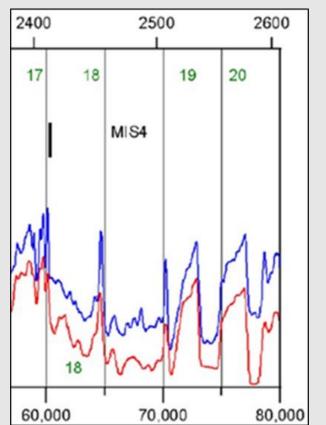

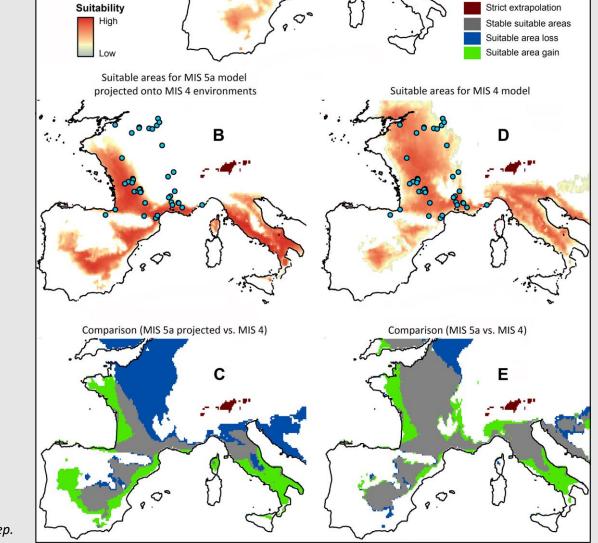




- Appearance of the Quina typo-techno complex during MIS 4
- Is this cultural innovation associated with an ecological niche change?



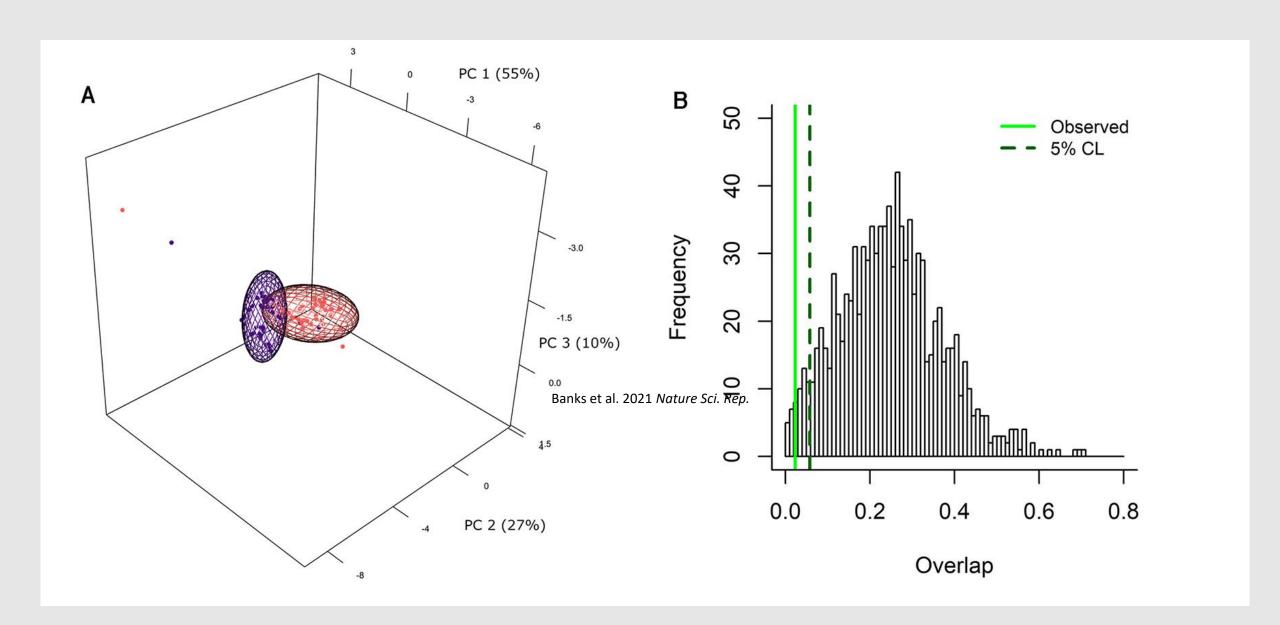


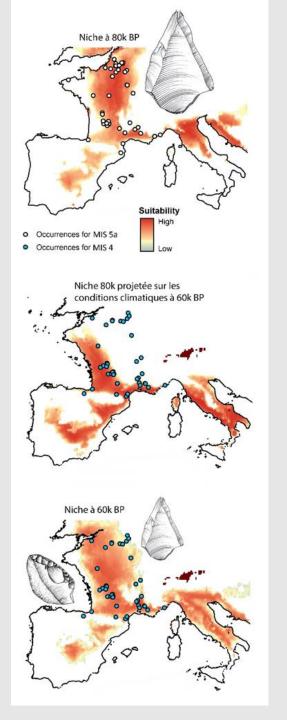


Suitable areas for MIS 5a model

Occurrences for MIS 5aOccurrences for MIS 4

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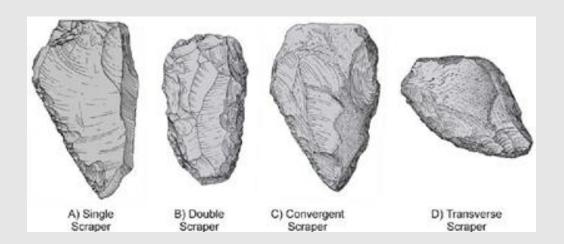
eco-cultural niche of Neanderthal populations in west-central France 80,000 years ago, associated with a Levallois technology

80,000 year old niche projected onto Isotopic Stage 4 environmental conditions to show where Neanderthal populations would have had to move if they had continued to exploit the same environments during this period of climatic cooling between 70,000 and 60,000 years before present (BP)

eco-cultural niche exploited by Neanderthal populations during Stage 4. During this period we observe the "Quina" technology emerging in the south of the study area.

- Ecological niche contraction and shift between MIS 5a and MIS 4
- Niche shift due to Neanderthals remaining fixed to territories
- They responded to changing ecological conditions by innovating culturally Quina in the south
 and southwest and different mobility strategies with same lithic technology in the north
- Culturally flexible but different culture-environment relationships than what has been observed in the two AMH regional trajectories that we have examined.



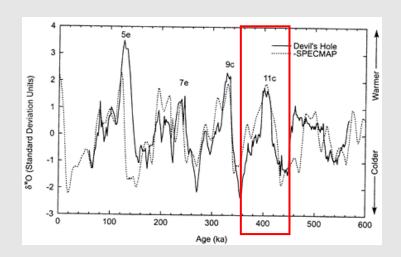
Understanding a threshold in Human evolution at 450-350 ka through the roots of Neanderthal behavior. NEANDROOTS

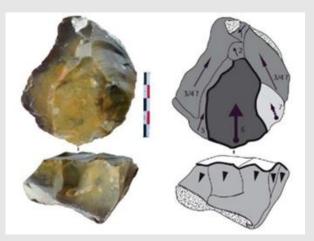

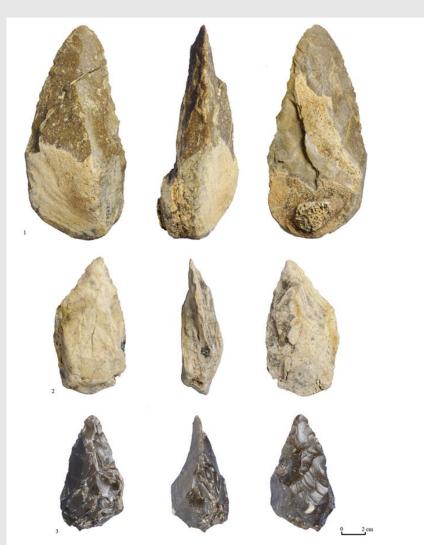

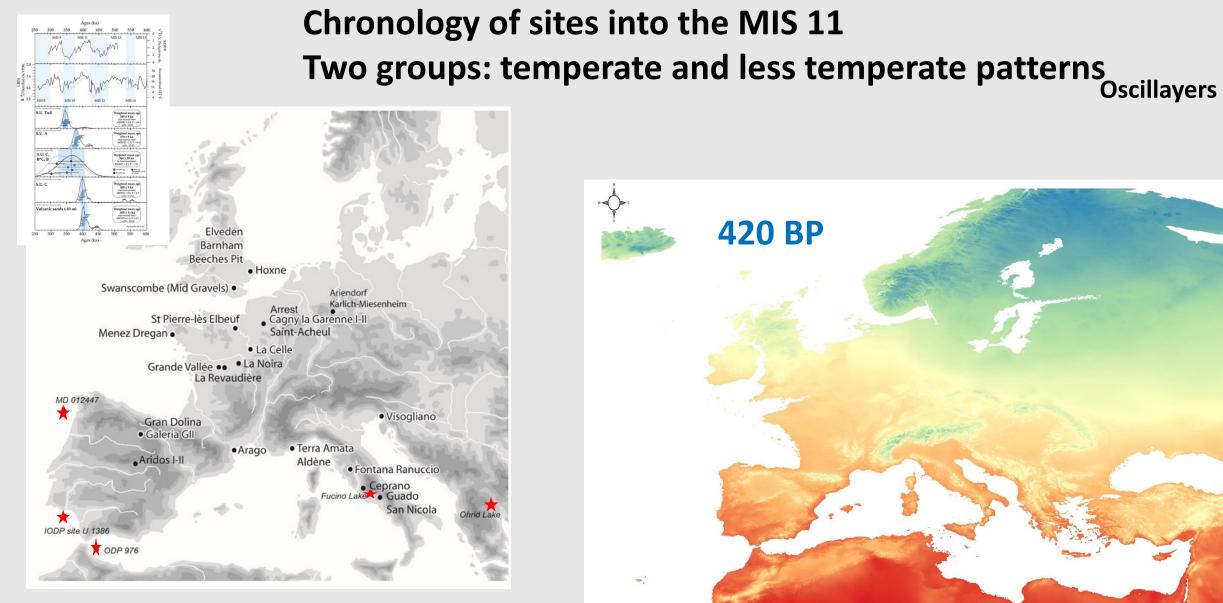

- (1)to build a large comprehensive database for the 450 to 350 ka period,
- (2) to bridge the gap in chronological and environmental data,
- (3) to develop methodological approaches to identify regional patterns and diffusion models of innovations,
- (4) to question the role of population size and structure by modeling,
- (5) to test the impact of climate evolution on hominin adaptation by iLOVECLIM model and Eco-cultural-niche modeling.
