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# Targeting innate immunity during the neonatal period with NOD2-based ligands to fight Cryptosporidiosis

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## Context

INRAQ

During the **neonatal period**, the immune system is still immature, giving at newborns susceptibility to infections such as Cryptosporidiosis, caused by the parasite *Cryptosporidium parvum* (*C. parvum*). This zoonosis is due to an orally transmitted protozoan that develops in intestinal epithelial cells and causes acute diarrhea in very young ruminants. Cryptosporidiosis also causes a moderate-to-severe diarrhea in children under 5 years and immunecompromised hosts. Today, there is no vaccine to prevent infection nor efficient treatment, and there is therefore an urgent need for the development of new methods to control this zoonosis.






The innate immunity has been shown to play an important role in the control of C. parvum infection (Lacroix-Lamandé & Laurent, 2017). We hypothesize that modulation of the innate immune system during the neonatal period could enhance the immune defense at young ages and favor the control of cryptosporidiosis. We have previously shown that the immunostimulation with ligands of the innate immunity targeting the Toll Like Receptors (TLRs) can help the mice to control C. parvum infection. (Barrier et al., 2006 ; Lacroix-Lamandé et al. 2009 ; Lantier et al., 2014 ; Lacroix-Lamandé et al., 2014).

Nucleotides Oligomerization Domain (NODs) are other innate immune receptors expressed by diverse immune cells (monocytes, dendritic cells, eosinophils, and neutrophils) and by epithelial cells. They recognize peptidoglycan of bacteria. In the intestine, these receptors are present on the different types of intestinal epithelial cells (enterocytes, Paneth cells and Goblet cells) and are essential in the maintenance of intestinal homeostasis. In this work, we studied if, during the neonatal period, the stimulation of these NOD receptors could efficiently stimulate the innate immune responses and confer protection against an enteric infection by C. parvum.












The MDP (NOD2) treatment significantly reduced the parasitic burden in the intestines of neonatal mice when administered by IP route. iE-DAP (NOD1) has no effect.


## **B** – Transcriptomic response in the intestine of neonatal mice

To decipher the mechanism of protection induced by MDP treatment by IP route, transcriptomics studies were performed in intestinal tissue. Among the 96 genes studied, the genes that were significantly regulated are described below.









## **Antimicrobial peptides - AMPs**

Neonatal mice are infected at 3 day-old with 5.10<sup>5</sup> oocysts of *C. parvum* by oral route (OR). They

receive iE-DAP (di-aminopimelic acid containing peptides), a NOD1 agonist or MDP (muramyl-dipeptide),

a NOD2 agonist by intraperitoneal (IP) or oral (OR) route. 24 hours post treatment, mice were


Gene expression of Regenerating islet-derived protein III (Reg3) B and  $\gamma$ , and Angiogenin 4 (Ang4) are significantly increased in the ileum of mice after MDP treatment. These AMPs are mainly produced by the Paneth cells (intestinal epithelial cells located in the intestinal crypt).


**MMP7** gene expression is **significantly increased** in the ileum of MDP treated mice. MMP7 is a member of the matrix metalloproteinase family, this enzyme is produced by the Paneth cells and is responsible for the cleavage of  $\alpha$ -defensine (AMPs) and was shown to induce neutrophils influx into tissues.

Gene expression of tight junction proteins is significantly increased following MDP treatment in the ileum of neonatal mice.

Inflammatory cytokines No modulation of the gene expression for the inflammatory cytokines in the ileum of the mice 24h post MDP treatment was observed (IFNγ, TNFα, IL-6, IL-1β, IL-12).

The stimulation of the NOD2 receptor during the neonatal period induces an intestinal protective response against the parasite C. parvum. If the deciphering of the precise protective mechanism still needs complementary

AMPs and Paneth cells are known to play a role in the control of C. parvum (Guesdon et al., 2016 ; non published data). Our data suggest that stimulation of these cells with NOD2 ligand can favor AMP and MMP7 response by Paneth cells and therefore participate in the protection. Moreover, the increased response of MMP7 could be associated to the neutrophils recruitment and consequently to the increased permeability detected after MDP stimulation. All together these observations suggest a reepithelization process that could allow parasite elimination.





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
