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1 Complete genome sequences of two *Rhizobium* strains producing azol(in)e-2 modified antibiotics

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13 ABSTRACT

Rhizobia are known for their ability to establish symbiotic relationships with plants. Specialized metabolism of these bacteria remains understudied. Here, we report whole-genome sequences of two rhizobia producing narrow-spectrum antirhizobial azol(in)e-modified peptides: that of *Rhizobium* sp. Pop5, a phazolicin producer, and another of *Rhizobium anhuiense* T24, a trifolitoxin producer.

Symbiotic nitrogen-fixing rhizobia compete for the host plants nodulation using a variety 21 of mechanisms including the production of antimicrobial compounds (1). Phazolicin (2) and 22 23 trifolitoxin (3) are antirhizobial azol(in)e-containing antibiotics belonging to ribosomally synthesized and post-translationally modified peptides (RiPPs). The genome of the trifolitoxin 24 producer, isolated from the nodules of Trifolium dubium and originally classified as Rhizobium 25 trifolii T24 (4) was not sequenced to date except for two small, 7.1 and 7.3 kbp, regions (5, 6). 26 The genome of phazolicin-producing Rhizobium sp. Pop5, isolated from the nodules of 27 Phaseolus vulgaris, was available in contigs only (GCA 000295895.1). 28

29 Rhizobium sp. Pop5 was provided by Prof. Esperanza Martinez-Romero, and R. anhuiense T24 was obtained from USDA-ARS Culture Collection (USDA2124). Both strains 30 31 were maintained on YM medium. Genomic DNA was extracted from overnight cultures grown at 28°C using GeneJET Genomic DNA purification kit (ThermoFisher). Pop5 DNA was 32 sequenced using Oxford Nanopore Technologies (ONT) sequencing, while a combination of 33 34 ONT and Illumina sequencing was performed for T24 DNA. For Nanopore sequencing, libraries 35 were prepared with non-sheared DNA using the Ligation Sequencing Kit 1D (SQK-LSK109, ONT) and EXP-NBD104 native barcoding expansion according to standard protocols. Genomic 36 DNA was subjected to End Repair and A tailing by NEBNext FFPE DNA Repair mix and 37 NEBNext Ultra II End repair/dA-tailing module (NEB). Sequencing adaptors were ligated using 38

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NEBNext Ultra II DNA Ligation module (NEB) after AMPure XP (Beckman Coulter) purification. The final product was cleaned using LFB buffer. MinION sequencing was performed using R9.4 flow cell (FLO-MIN106D, ONT). Base calling was performed using Guppy 6.0.1 (7) with the "sup" mode. For Illumina sequencing, DNA was sheared using Covaris sonicator and 200-400 bp fragments were size-selected with AMPure XP beads. Library was prepared using NEBNext Ultra II DNA Library Prep kit (NEB). Sequencing was performed on MiSeq with the 250+250 bp paired-end protocol.

Illumina reads were filtered and trimmed with Trimmomatic v 0.39 (8). For T24, a draft genome was assembled with Unicycler (v 0.5.0) (9) using ONT reads. The assembly was subsequently polished with medaka (v 1.5.0), Polypolish (v 0.5.0) (10), and POLCA (v 4.0.8) (11) using ONT and Illumina reads. For Pop5, a draft genome was assembled with Unicycler (v 0.5.0), and the assembly was polished with medaka (v 1.5.0). Default parameters were used for all software unless otherwise specified. Replicons were circulated and rotated automatically using Unicycler and annotated using PGAP 6.1.

53 Both genomes contain multiple replicons including the chromosome and several plasmids 54 (Table 1). An antiSMASH (12) search revealed 12 biosynthetic gene clusters per genome (Fig. 1A). The trifolitoxin *tfxABCDEFG* cluster is located on the chromosome, while the 55 phazolicin cluster *phzEACBDR* is encoded on the smallest plasmid (Fig. 1A). According to 56 average nucleotide identity (ANI) analysis by JSpeciesWS (13), the genome of 57 R. leguminosarum T24 is 99.08% identical (89.78% aligned nucleotides) to that of R. anhuiense 58 CCBAU 23252^T (GCA 003985145.1) (14) (Fig. 1B). Accordingly, the strain is reclassified as 59 *R. anhuiense* bv. *trifolii* T24. 60
