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# Fine fraction of municipal solid waste incinerator: zinc and copper urban mine

metals based on the environmental, economic and geopolitical criteria. The zinc and the copper have been identified as the priority elements (Fig. 2). Their mean concentrations are close to actual mining grades (Fig 1); 3000-3500 mg/kg, corresponding to around 18 000 Mt of each metal landfilled each year in Europe. With the decrease of mining grades and increase of metal demand (Fig 1), MSWI could become a new secondary resource of copper and zinc (Fig.2).

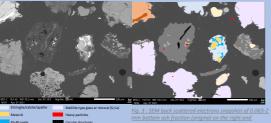

Pretreatments: quenching - wet screening Particle size fraction used: 0.063-2 mm

Homogenizing and sampling: by wet quartering on large plastic tarpaulin

# **Zn Recovery**

#### Objectives

Recover the maximum of Zn

Recirculate the leaching solution (no changes in pH and reactants concentrations)

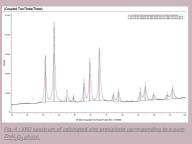
Precipitation has been chosen to satisfy theses objectives

#### Zn precipitation

Maximum precipitation achieved at :

- Temperature of approx. 40°C
- $\bullet$  Precisely 2 moles of  $\mathrm{AINO_3.9H_2O}$  /1 mole of Zn
- . Best at 1.5 M total ammonia

 $Zn^2++AINO_3.9H_2O+NH_3 \rightarrow Zn(OH)_3.2AI(OH)_3$ 

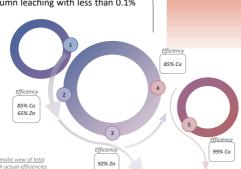


Precipitation aluminum nitrate allows to reach a zinc recovery of 92% and it's a selective operation because the copper concentration remains constant during precipitation step. No pH change is necessary or observed.

#### **Conclusions**

Up to 70% of copper and 60% of zinc are now recovered via the four steps process based on column leaching with less than 0.1% of iron co-solubilized.

The leaching step is a key step to improve efficiencies Βv identifying leaching limiting and improving factors it's possible to drastically improve total recovery for both metals.

Objective: Reduction of leachable sulfates content prior to the leaching

Experimental setup: down-flow percolating column filled with 50 g to 2 kg of MSWI.

Reactants: saline solutions to enhance sulfate solubilization (increasing ionic strength and cationic exchange capacity) - NaCl 1M

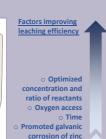
# Leaching

Objectives: Copper and zinc selective leaching Ammonia based complexing leaching applied

 $Cu^{2+} + 4NH_4^+ + 4H_2O \leftrightarrow Cu(NH_3)_4^{2+} + 4H_3O^+$ 

Experimental setup: down-flow percolating column filled with 50 g to 2 kg of previously washed MSWI.

Reactants: Ammonia chemical grade and ammonium chloride



#### Factors limiting leaching efficiency

 $\circ \ \ \textbf{Copper cementation}$ 

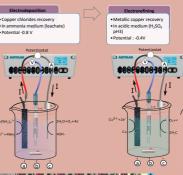
galvanic protection of copper

 Presence of others complexing agents forming less soluble complexes

 Limited accessibility and liberation of metallic particles in column

# **Cu Recovery**

Electrodeposition in two steps (Fig. 5).



After copper electrodeposition, leachate is recirculated to leach again the column. Also. the cathodic deposit is redissolved in acidic media to perform to the electrowinning step.
