## 1 - 2022 TAH airborne observations

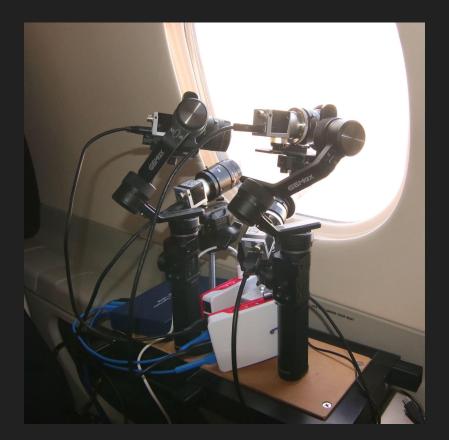
Airborne observation (see J. Toth's talk)

Mobile cameras from the MoMet device (see Da Fonseca's talk, IMC2021)

2 stabilized cameras + RBpi + RMS software

2 unstabilized cameras + continuous recording on Mac

Basler acA1920-155um + 6mm f/1.4 or 12mm f/1.6 lens ; 20 fps



### $\tau$ -Herculids meteors

4-hours data acquisition

165  $\tau$ -Herculids + 5 SPO

Stabilizer not stable enough for RMS to successfully detect meteors -> manual examination of the data (C. Loir)

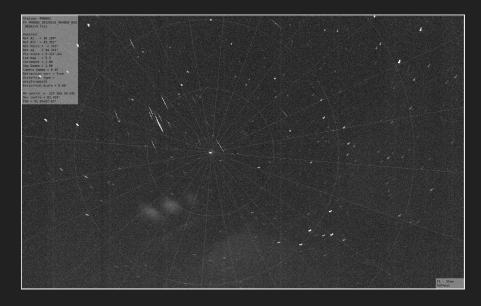


### $\tau$ -Herculids Cluster detection

06:48:56 UT - 06:49:03 UT

34 meteors within 7 sec

Initially spotted in RMS fits image (max).



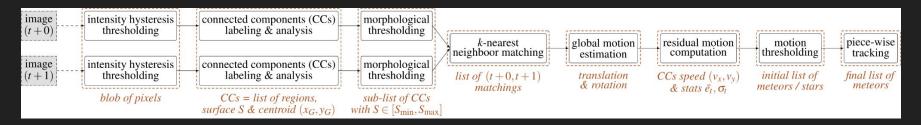

## **Computer-Vision Detection : Presentation**

- Real time software detection chain
  - Fast Meteor Detection Toolbox (FMDT), open source (<u>https://github.com/alsoc/fmdt</u>)
- Based on the **combination of well-known algorithms** in image processing



Key points :

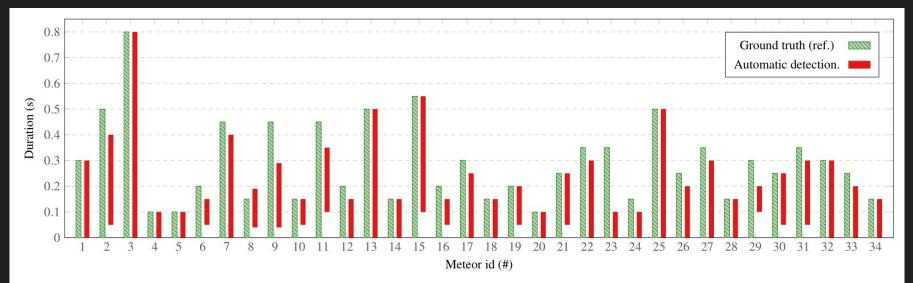
- ➡ Motion estimation and compensation based on "stationary" stars
- Energy efficient chain: designed for embedded systems

## **Computer-Vision Detection : Detection Results**

- **100 % of meteors detection** (34/34)
- 4 false positive detections
  - Because of the reflection of the light in the plane window
- Automated detection helped to detect more meteors !
  - Initial observation : 28 meteors
  - After automated detection : 34 meteors
  - 20% of the meteors were missed in the initial observation
- Encouraging results
  - Worked surprisingly well on the 2022 TAH video sequence
- Let's keep one's feet on the ground (even if we look at the stars  $\bigstar$ )
  - Mitigated results on some other video sequences (parameters overfitting?)
  - **Young detection system** (2022), need time (and work) to get more mature

### **Computer-Vision Detection : Tracking Rate**

The tracking rate is the duration while the detection system successfully tracks a meteor. **In the 2022 TAH video sequence, the obtained tracking rate is 80.4%.** 



## 3 - Cluster characterization

Assuming Poissonian distrib: Proba<1E-22

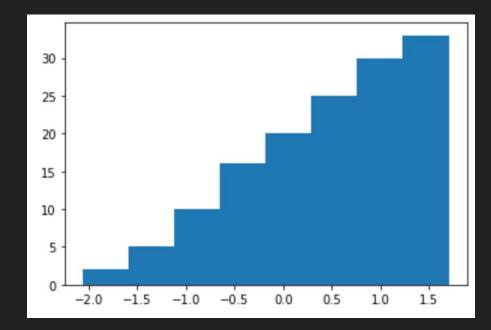
If alt=80 km, max distance between fragment: [185-200] km

Interplanetary self-disintegration within [4.9-5.2] days (see also Koten et al. 2016)

Mag: [-2 ; 2]

Population index: r=2.01 (low)

Differential size distribution index s=3.10



#### Comparison with other meteor clusters

SPE - LPC ; Koten et al. 2017: 8 meteors in <2 s LEO - HTC ; Kinoshita et al. 1999: 100-150 meteors in 2 s PER - HTC ; Hapgood & Rothwell 1981: 3 meteors in 1.3 s TAH - JFC ; this work: 34 meteors in 7 s

Koten el al. 2021: search or cluster in GEM: not conclusive (yet)

Origin: most likely thermal disruption: see Capek et al. 2022

Suggests s increases with gas environment

## Conclusion

7th detected meteor cluster ; 4th "big" one in 20 years => 1 meteor in  $10^6$ 

Automated detection successful

Shallow size distribution: influence of gas flow around the meteoroid
