Questioning of adult-child social relations

Context

- Developments in the field of Childhood Studies toward **children participation** (Hallett & Prout, 2005; Percy-Smith & Thomas, 2016)
- Emerging **youth social movements** : children's rights movement, climate action... (Wall, 2017; Sporre, 2021).

Some previous research with EVS data

- Inglehart's theory about **post-modernization** and the cultural shift (Inglehart, 1990, 2018)
- Many publications about **child-rearing values** (Kohn, 1977; Alwin 1988; Voicu, 2012; etc.)
- Study of the links between those values and aspirations for a democratic political system (Jeannot Piétroy, 2021).

Questions

How has the emphasis on child independence and child obedience changed over time?

What dynamics are at work in different European countries regarding the values associated with children's emancipation?



Methods



The European Values Study (EVS)

International statistical survey research program on basic human values.

→ provides insight into the ideas, attitudes, values, opinions of citizens all over Europe.

Data


Five waves

1981-1984
1990-1993
1999-2001
2008-2010
2017-2020



- Minimum sample of 1000 people per country (random selections and quotas)
- 36 countries in the last wave
- Age of the respondents : over 18 years old



At the European level








→ Grouping of countries by cultural areas (Inglehart-Welzel classification, 2020)


































Child-rearing values across Europe (EVS 2017)









Valuation of **obedience**

Valuation of **obedience** according to the household income


Income (EVS 2017)

Valuation of independence according to the household income


Valuation of obedience according to the respondent's age

Discussion

Historical perspective

Need for a broader historical perspective: significant changes during the 20th century (decline of fertility, women's employment, delays in childbearing, divorce)

 \rightarrow Adaptation of child-rearing values to meet the new demands of social life (Alwin, 1988).

Social perspective

Social stratification of child-rearing values:

- Cohort effect: generations may have distinctive social experiences (Sieben, 2017)
- Influence of socioeconomic variables on autonomy vs. conformity values (Kohn, 1977).

Cross-country comparison

Community-oriented values (collectivism) vs. individual-based values (Protestant work ethic).

 \rightarrow 2 different types, that are not mutually exclusive (Sieben, 2017; Park, 2016)



Conclusion



The use of EVS surveys:

- 🔠 allows us to work on broad quantitative data to examine perceptions of social relationships
- does not allow us to consider the children's perspective.

Importance of better understanding the individual and social factors that explain adults' attitudes toward child-rearing

→ Contribution to the understanding of the **social construction of power relations** between adults and children (see concepts of *adultism* (Flasher, 1978), *adult domination* (Bonnardel, 2015) and *childism* (Wall, 2010)).

Further research

- Looking forward to the next wave of EVS, where the impact of the heath and economic crisis can be analyzed
- Conducting qualitative research to investigate how individuals interpret child-rearing values
- Conducting a survey with children on their view on the "most desirable" qualities of parents (see Caplow, Bahr et al., 1982)
