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Retention of nine micropollutants covering a wide range of physical-chemical properties by negatively charged hollow fiber nanofiltration membranes

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CONTEXT

Increase of population and living standard lead to increasing amount of micropollutants released into wastewater but actual wastewater treatment plants (WWTP) are not efficient for the removal of such molecules

Great urgency to redifine the technologies employed in WWTP regarding elimination of micropollutants



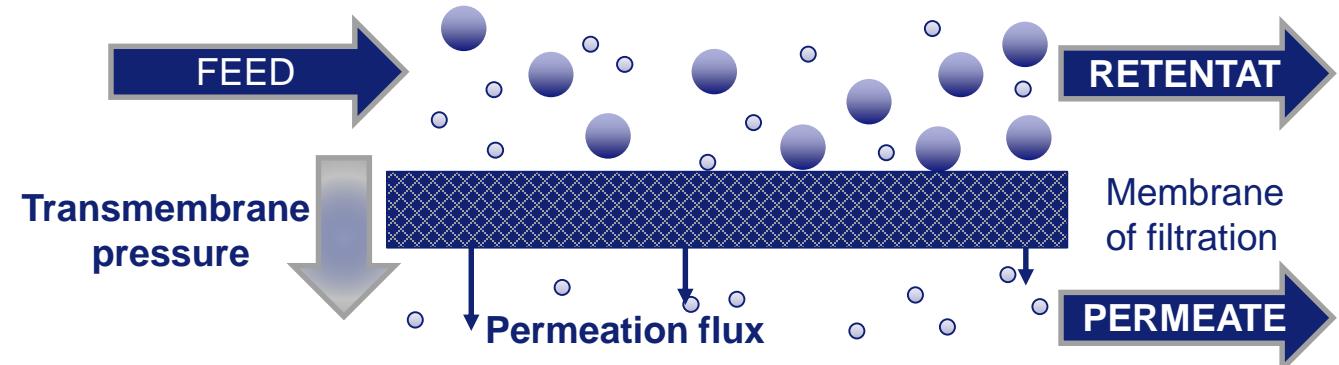
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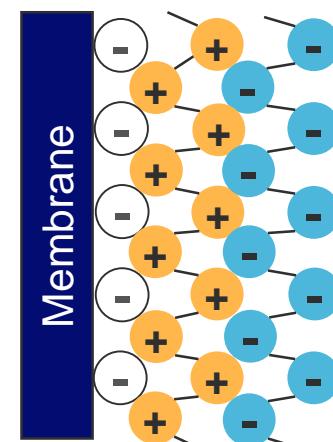

STRATEGY

Impact of physical-chemical properties of micropollutants

Experimental design to determine the micropollutants of the study according to their **molecular weight, hydrophobicity and charge** at neutral pH

Impact of the membrane properties

Molecular weight cut-off of the membrane (size of the smallest molecule being retained by the membrane) :
400 or 800 Da

Impact of the operation parameters

Volume reduction ratio (volume of feed divide by volume of retentat) :
1, 3 or 6

Impact of the matrix

Content in organic matter of the matrix :
0, 15 or 50 mg.L⁻¹

Performance indicators on 24 h filtration at TMP 3 bar

Permeation flow rate = quantity of liquid going through the membrane per time unit

Retention of micropollutants

Retention of salts



STRATEGY : selection of micropollutants

Experimental design :

to determine the impact of each physical-chemical property of MPs on their retention by NF membranes

3 factors ; 3 levels → 27 micropollutants

Square Latin method :

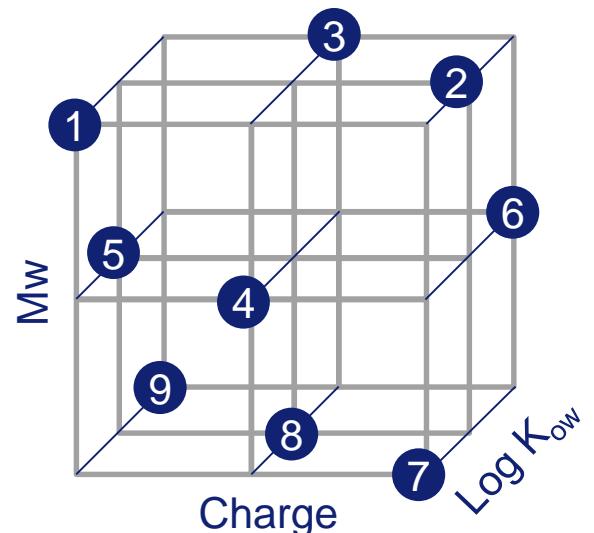
to reduce the number of contaminant from 27 to 9

Technical constraint :

Molecules have to be quantifiable by chromatography with UV detector

→ Content of micropollutants : 10 mg.L^{-1} each

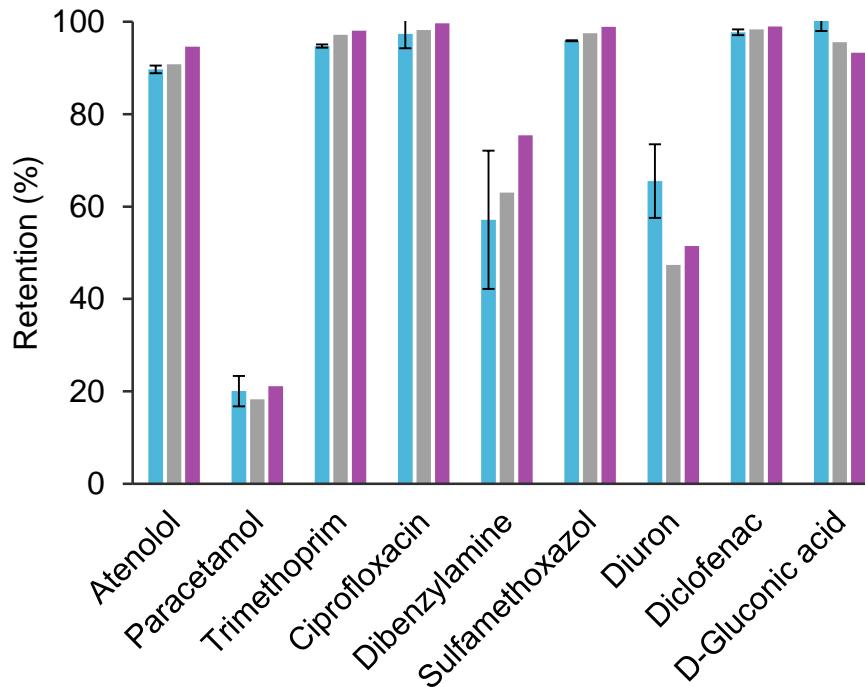
#	Charge	Hydrophily	Size
-	Negative	$\text{Log } K_{\text{ow}} > 2$	$\text{Mw} < 210 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$
0	Neutral	$0.5 < \text{Log } K_{\text{ow}} < 2$	$230 < \text{Mw} < 280 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$
+	Positive	$\text{Log } K_{\text{ow}} < 0.5$	$\text{Mw} > 300 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$



Compounds selected :
atenolol,
paracetamol,
trimethoprim,
ciprofloxacin,
dibenzylamine,
sulfamethoxazole,
diuron,
diclofenac
D-gluconic acid

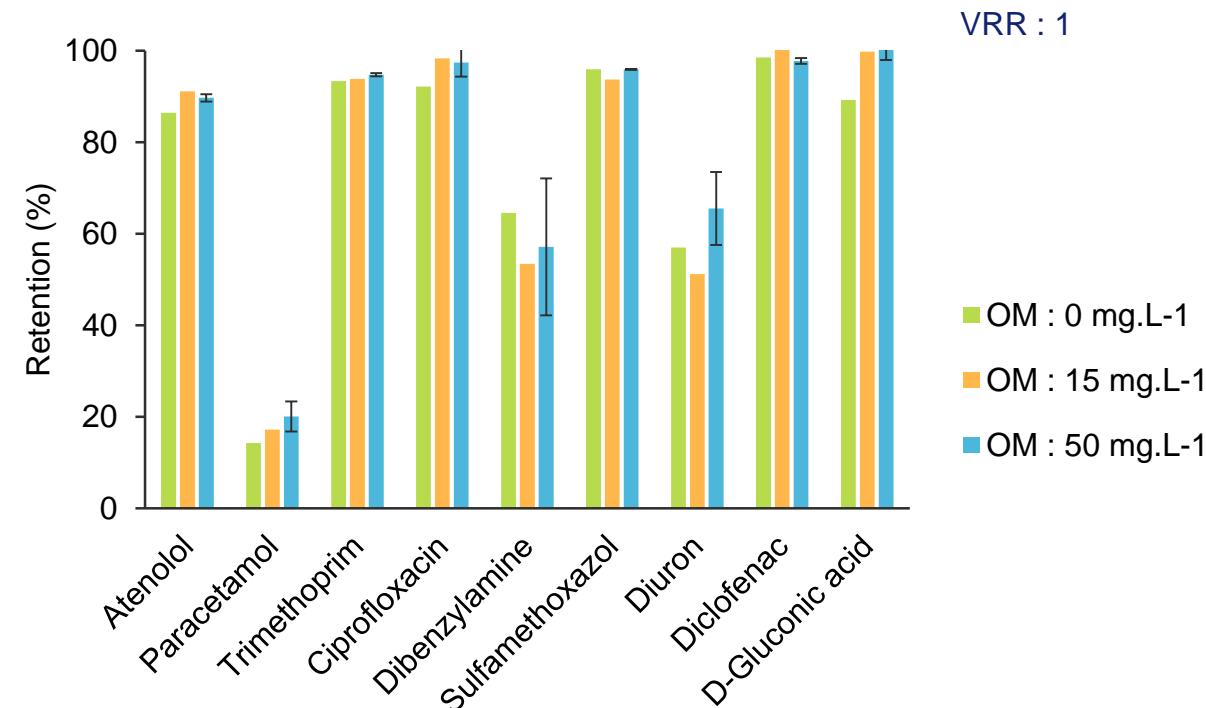
Impact of the volume reduction ratio



Organic matter's content into the matrix : 50 mg.L⁻¹

- VRR 1
- VRR 3
- VRR 6

Impact of the matrix



VRR : 1

- OM : 0 mg.L⁻¹
- OM : 15 mg.L⁻¹
- OM : 50 mg.L⁻¹

With 400 Da membrane :

- High retention ($\geq 90\%$) for six micropollutants
- Moderate retention (between 57 and 65 %) for two micropollutants
- Only one micropollutant with low retention ($\leq 20\%$)
- No effect of VRR applied on micropollutants retention

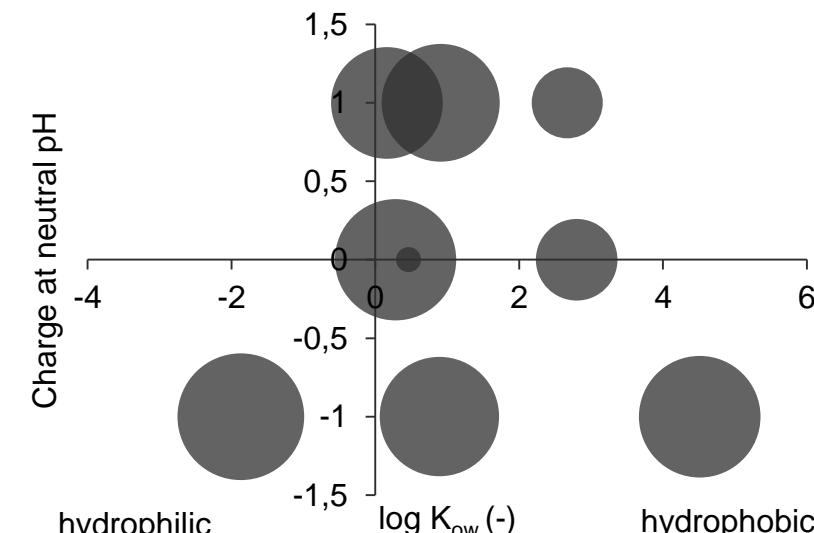
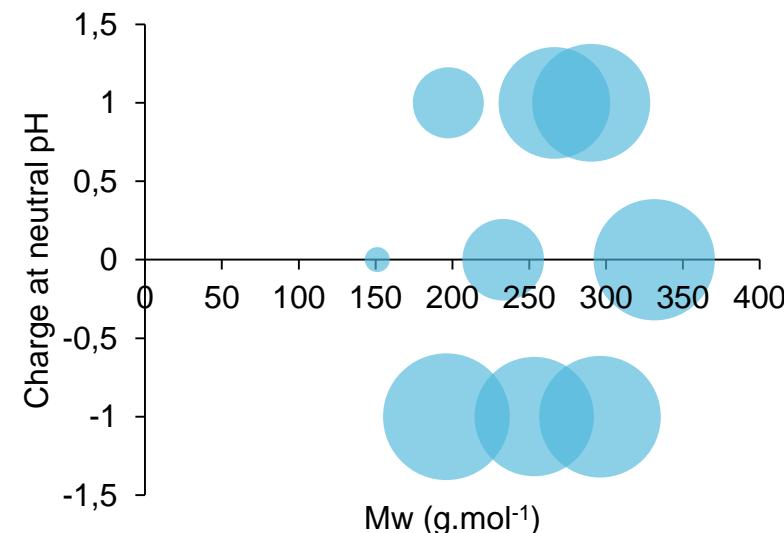
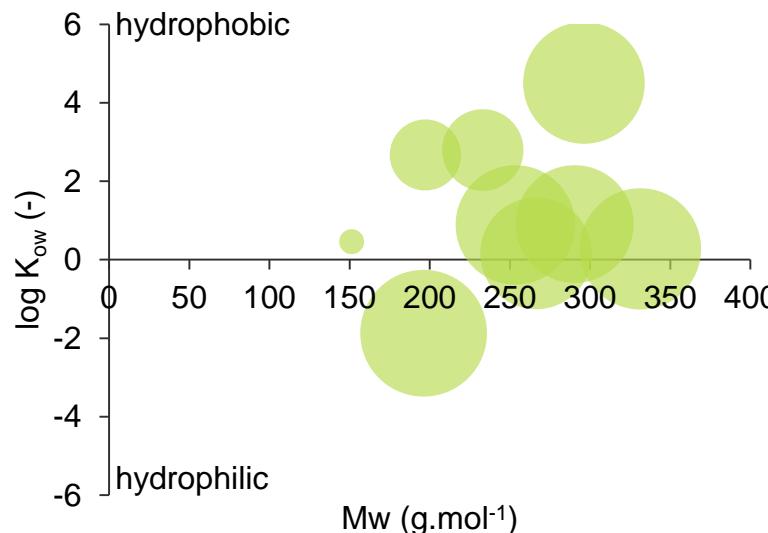
- No effect of organic matter content on micropollutants retention

PEM are efficient to remove most of micropollutants whatever the VRR applied and the content of organic matter into the matrix

RESULTS : retention of micropollutants on 400 Da MWCO membrane

VRR : 1

Organic matter's content into the matrix : 50 mg.L⁻¹



- For small contaminants ($Mw < 250 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$), the highest retentions were observed for hydrophilic molecules
- For large contaminants ($Mw > 250 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$), retention was similar
- Retention of contaminants increased when Mw increased
- For small contaminants ($Mw < 250 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$), the highest retention were measured for negatively charged micropollutants
- For large contaminants ($Mw > 250 \text{ g.mol}^{-1}$), retention was similar
- For negatively charged contaminants, no differences were measured between hydrophilic and hydrophobic molecules
- For neutral or positively charged molecules, no correlation was observed between retention and hydrophobicity

Size exclusion and electrostatic repulsion seem to be the main mechanisms occurring with the functionalized membranes studied

TAKE HOME MESSAGES

- 
- **Polyelectrolyte LbL membranes were efficient for the removal of most of the micropollutants with low retention of chloride**
 - **Hollow fiber membranes were efficient to avoid fouling during 24 h to 96 h of filtration in the conditions studied**
 - The influence of size and charge of micropollutants would be studied statistically

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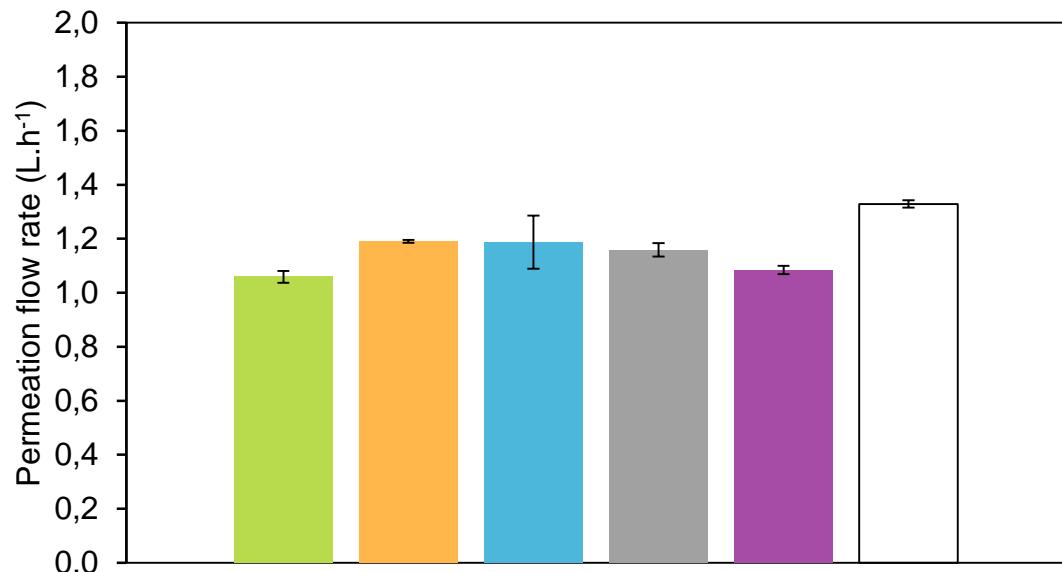
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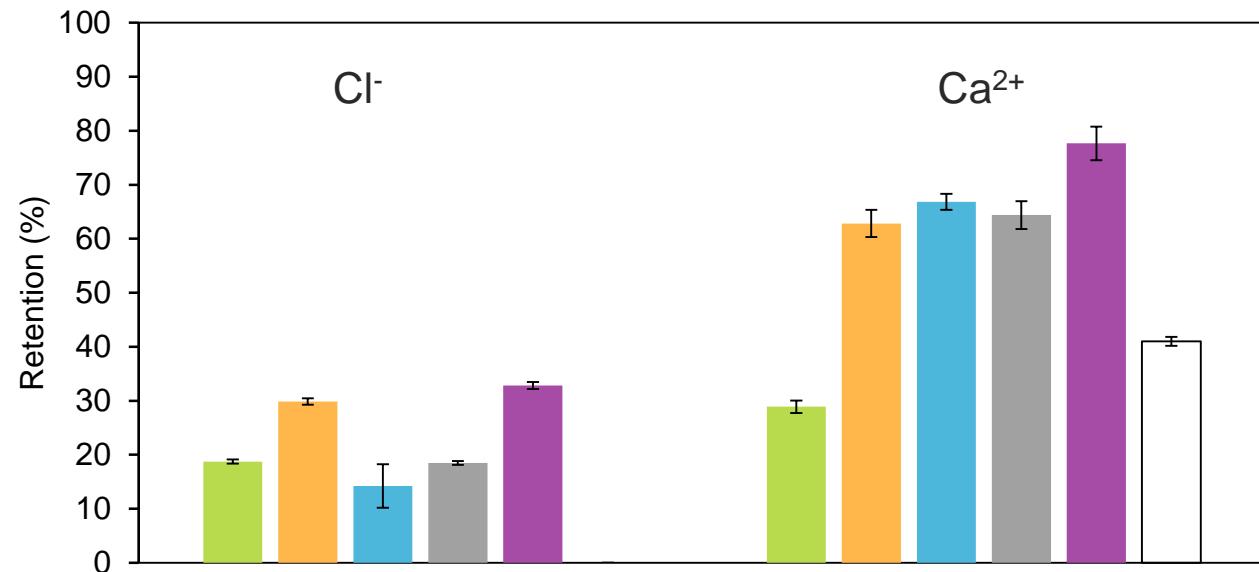
RESULTS : permeation flux & salts retention

Permeation flow rate



- Small increase of permeation with the MWCO of the membrane
- No effect of VRR applied on permeation
- No effect of organic matter content on permeation

Salts retention



- Decrease of the salts retention when MWCO of the membrane increase
- Low retention of chloride (< 30 %)
- Increase of chloride retention when VRR increase
- Increase of calcium retention when the organic matter content increase

No fouling on 24 h filtration in the study conditions

MWCO (Da)	400	400	400	400	400	800
VRR	1	1	1	3	6	1
OM (mg.L⁻¹)	0	15	50	50	50	50

Low VRR appears to be preferred
