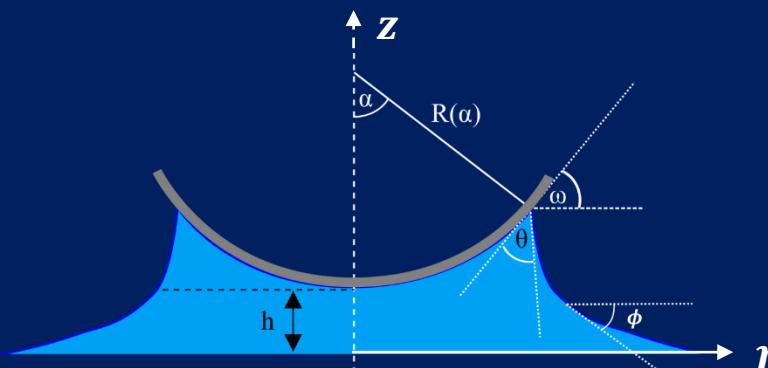

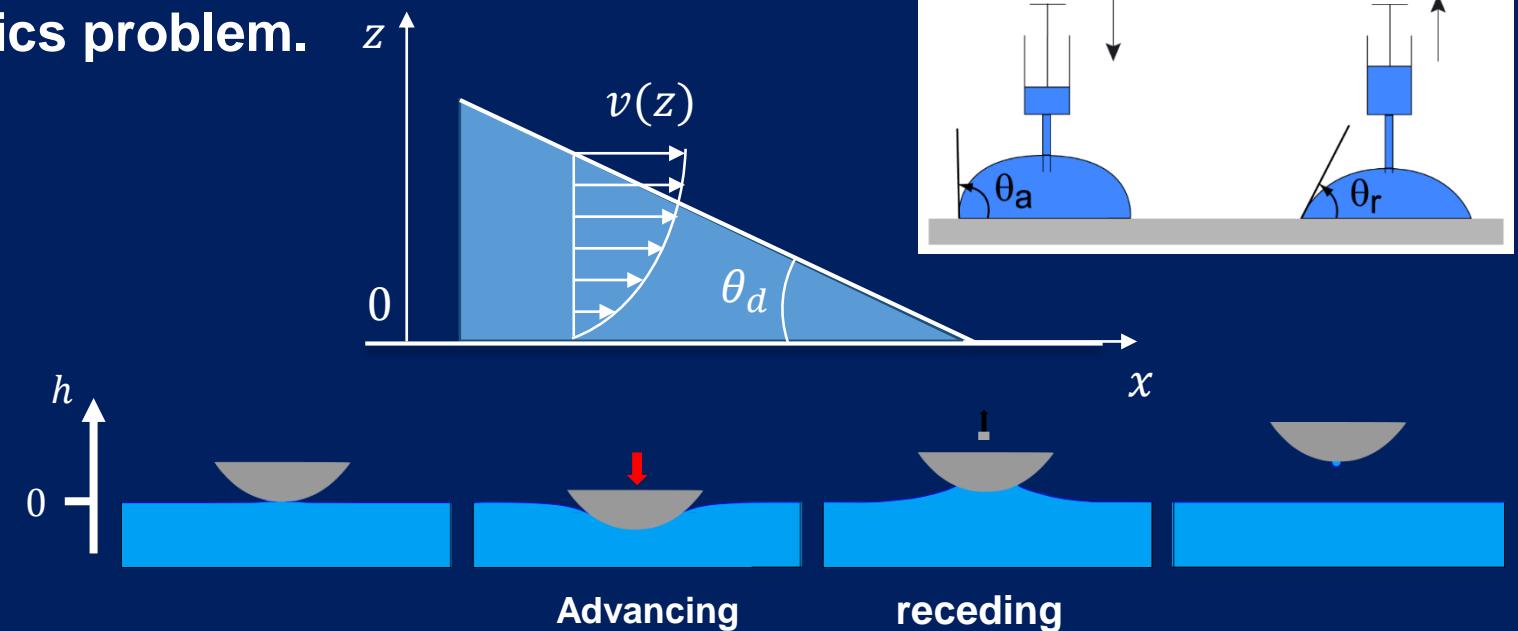


Superhydrophobic surfaces: multiscale roughness. Metastable state.

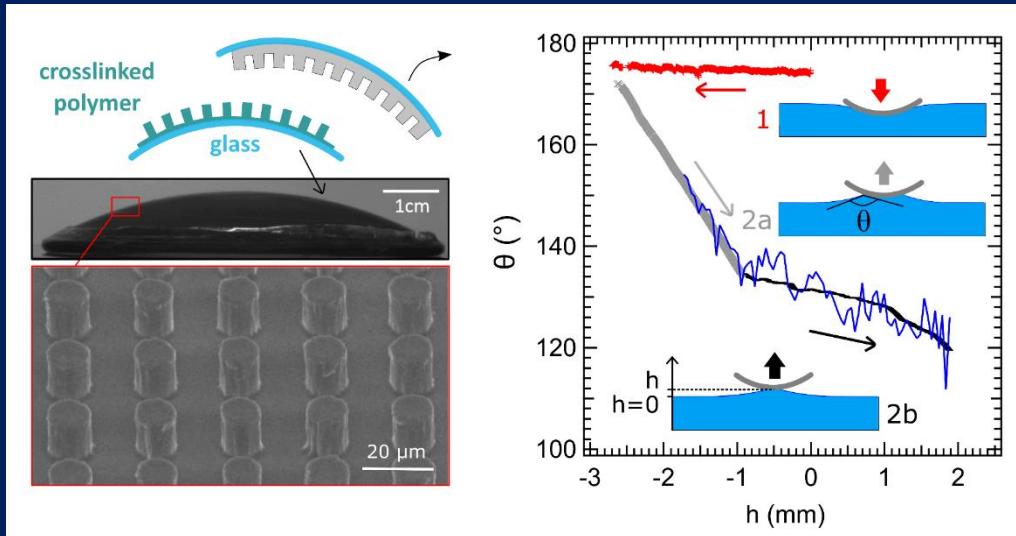
Contact line dynamics problem.



Capillary bridge setup.

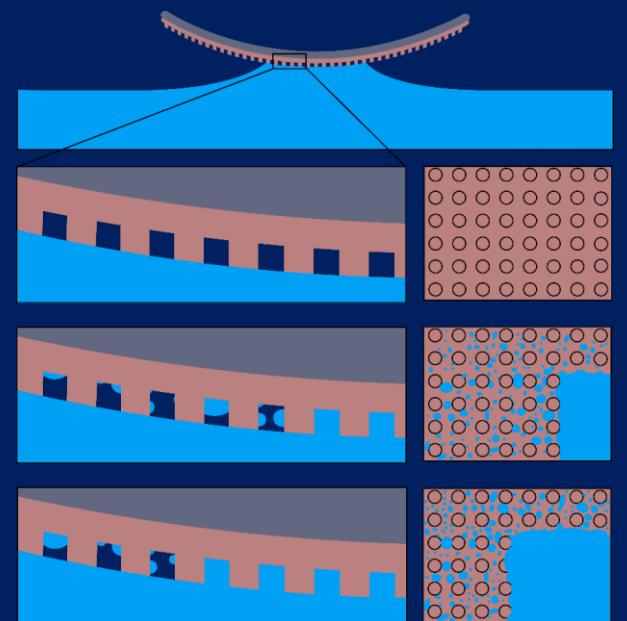
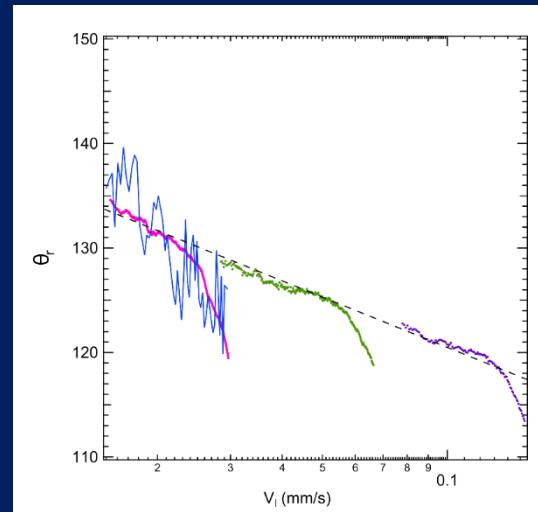


Fabrication of curved superhydrophobic surfaces

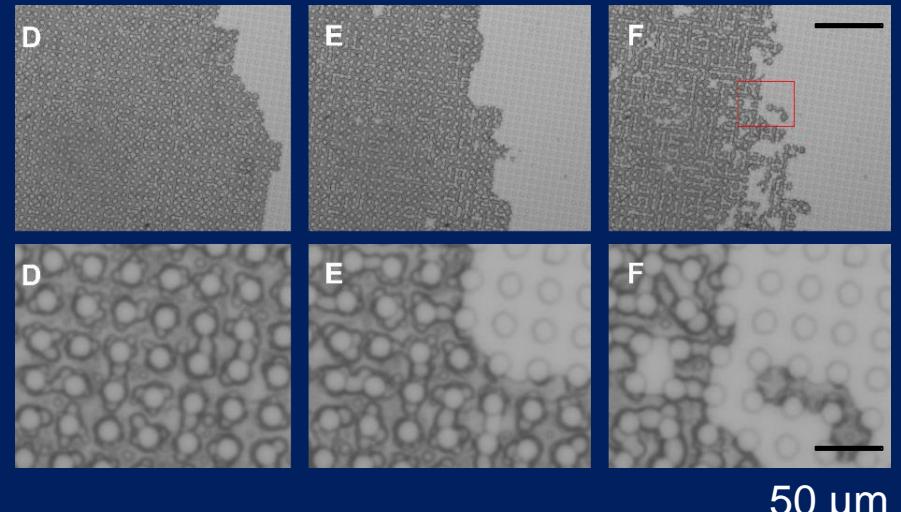


Large contact area :
