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CDK8 and CDK19 act redundantly to control the CFTR pathway in the intestinal epithelium

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Abstract CDK8 and CDK19 form a highly conserved cyclin-dependent kinase subfamily that binds to and inhibits the essential transcription complex, Mediator, and is thought to also activate gene expression by phosphorylating the C-terminal domain (CTD) of RNA polymerse II. Cells lacking either CDK8 or COK19 are viable and howe somewhat limited transcriptional alterations, but how they regulate expression of different to the expressed to allow cell differentiation is unhown. Here, we find that CDK8 and CDK19 are largely functionally redundant for tissue-specific gene expression. 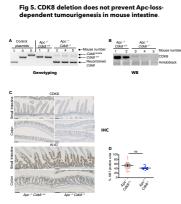


Fig 5. (A) denotyping confirms the loss of CdH group 2 in intensities explaining from American explosition in the control of CdH group 2. In intensities explaining the control of CdH group 2. In the control of CdH gr

Fig 7. Double CDK8/CDK19 knockout intestinal organoids show decreased cell proliferation.

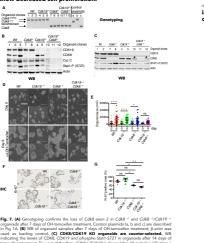


Fig 1and 2. CDK8 kn intestine homeostasi

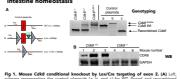


Fig 1. Mouse Gdk2 conditional knockout by Lox/Cre targeting of excn 2. (A) Left, scheme representing the corror plasmids (a, b, and c) for WT, flored and recombined (a) and (b) and VillinCr CDK8

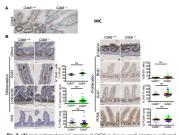
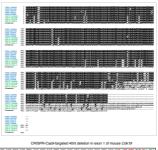


Fig. 2. (A) immunicitational series of CADB in mouse small intentions collected for months after transition treatment. (B) Analysis of cell differentiation (Bril and CaB) and CaB and CaB and CaB and CaB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) collection (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) collection of cases of the most state of the caB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) collection of cases of the most state of the caB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) collection of cases of the most state of the caB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB) represent the percentage of the mass state of the caB. (CaB) and CaB. (CaB)

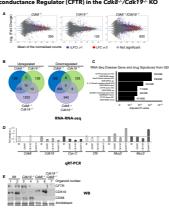


Fig. 1. (A) Dot plot analysis of differentially expressed genes (DEGs). Red dots: DEGs with probate s 0.05, pumple dots togs (bid durings (LFC) to r<1, probate s 0.05, graph dots togs (bid durings (LFC) to r<1, probate s 0.05, graph dots). The second second

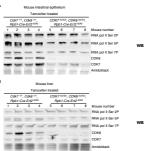


Fig 3. Effects of CDK8 and CDK7 knockout on RNA pol II CTD phosphorylation. WB analysis of the indicated proteins in mouse intestinal epithelium (A) or liver (B) samples from WT and Cdk7 ^{lock6}, Cdk8 ^{lock6}, Bpb-Cre-Er2 ^{lock7} mice after tamoxifen treatment. Amido-black taming was used as loading control.

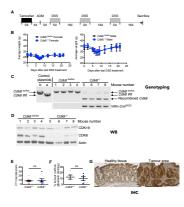


Fig 4. (A) Scheme showing the steps of the ACM/DDSC accinogenesis experiment. (B) cophs showing female (left; n=6 in both groups) and male (right; n=6 in both groups) weight exolution over 21 dops following the last DSS testment: (C) Generating and the last of the according to the last of the
