

Auditory Periphery Model

The Verhulst, Altoe, & Vasilkov, (2018) model was priorly validated (1) to capture broadband and level dependent cochlear filter tuning derived from human OAEs, Single-unit AN adaptation and EFR properties, and (2) it can be used to study the impact of OHC and AN fiber/synapse loss have on ABR and EFR.
