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17 Summary

A Gram-negative, aerobic, yellow pigmented, straight rod, strain MOLA117^T, was 18 19 isolated from a coastal water sample from the north-western Mediterranean Sea, near 20 Banyuls-sur-mer, France. On the basis of phylogenetic analysis of the 16S rRNA gene sequence, strain MOLA117^T was placed within the family *Flavobacteriaceae*, but 21 22 showed less than 93% 16S rRNA gene sequence similarity to other recognized species 23 within the family. The most closely related genera included Arenibacter, Cellulophaga, 24 Maribacter and Zobellia. The only isoprenoid guinone was MK6 and the fatty acid iso-25 C17:0 3-OH was dominant, representing over 33% of the total fatty acids. The DNA G+C content was 36.9 mol%. MOLA117^T required NaCl for growth, did not exhibit 26 gliding motility or produce flexirubin. Based upon the phenotypic and phylogenetic data, 27 we propose that strain MOLA117^T should be considered to represent a novel genus and 28 29 species, for which the name Saonia flava gen. nov., sp. nov. is proposed. The type strain of *Saonia flava* is MOLA117^T (=CIP 110873^T = DSM 29762^T). The accession number of 30 the MOLA117^T 16S rRNA gene sequence is AM990891. 31

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33 The marine environment continues to be a major source of uncharacterized 34 microorganisms with potentially interesting activities. These activities can be of 35 academic interest but can also result in biotechnological applications. At the 36 Oceanological Observatory in Banyuls, we aim to isolate prokaryotes that are 37 environmentally ubiquitous in marine coastal ecosystems to study their biodiversity and 38 function as well as to explore their use in biotechnology. Each isolated strain is added to 39 the Banyuls Bacterial Culture Collection (WDCM911). During such an effort we isolated a Gram-negative, aerobic, vellow-pigmented bacterium, strain MOLA117^T, from a water 40 41 sample taken off the coast of Banyuls-sur-Mer, France. The closest cultured relatives, 42 based on their 16S rRNA gene sequence, were species within the genus Zobellia, and the 43 closest described species was Zobellia uliginosa strain ATCC 14397 with 92.7 % identity 44 (BLAST [1]). Some species within the genera Arenibacter, Cellulophaga and Maribacter also showed some similarity (close to 92%) to MOLA117^T. The highest identities to 45 46 environmental sequences were 94%-93% to three 16S sequences retrieved from the gut of a wood feeding gastropod [2]. Thus, we suggest that MOLA117^T represents a novel 47 48 genus within the family Flavobacteriaceae. Our aim was to investigate the exact phylogenetic position and to phenotypically describe strain MOLA117^T. 49

50 Strain MOLA117^T was isolated from a seawater sample collected in February 51 2004 from 3 m depth at station SOLA located in the bay of Banyuls-sur-Mer (42° 29' N 52 3° 08' E). The isolation and bacterial stock procedures were performed as described in 53 [3] using modified R2A agar (BD Co., Franklin Lakes, NJ) with 75% filtered 54 Mediterranean seawater. Subsequent growth experiments were realized using Marine 55 Agar (MA, BD Co.) or Marine Broth (MB, BD Co.) in the dark at 25°C. Cellular 56 morphology and size were determined using liquid culture incubated for 4 days, which 57 corresponds to end of log phase/beginning of stationary phase (data not shown), and a 58 Model H-7500 transmission electron microscope (Hitachi, Tokyo, Japan) as previously 59 described [4], see figure S1.

60 Motility was tested using the hanging drop technique combined with light 61 microscopy (model AX70 microscope, Olympus, Tokyo, Japan) with liquid cultures 62 incubated for 4 days. Most of the tests for phenotypic characterization were performed as 63 previously described [3]. Briefly, this included Gram staining using the Ryu KOH 64 reaction [5], determination of oxidase activity using the oxydase reagent kit (bioMérieux, 65 Marcy l'Etoile, France) and testing for catalase activity by determination of gas 66 production upon exposure to a 3 % hydrogen peroxide solution. Formation of H₂S was 67 tested with Hydrogen Sulfide Test strips (Sigma Aldrich, St Louis, MO) with cultures grown on MB for 3 days. The requirement and tolerance of MOLA117^T to NaCl was 68 69 determined at 25 °C for 6 days on MB with NaCl concentrations ranging from 0-15 %, or more precisely 0, 0.5, 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 10, 13 and 15 %. To verify the optimal and 70 tolerated pH levels for growth, MOLA117^T was incubated in MB at 25 °C for 6 days 71 72 amended with different buffers to stabilize the pH as follows: pH 4, 5 and 6 (MES), pH 7 73 and 8 (HEPES) and pH 9 and 10 (AMPSO). Growth temperatures was determined on MA after 4 days of growth at temperatures ranging from 4 to 44 °C, or more accurately 4, 74 75 10, 15, 20, 25, 30, 37 and 44°C. Antibiotic resistance was determined using antibioticimpregnated paper discs on MA with a lawn of MOLA117^T that was incubated at 25°C 76 77 for 4 days. Production of flexirubin was evaluated by flooding a 4 day old plate with 20% 78 (w/v) KOH (positive for flexirubin if color change from yellow to red, purple or brown).

79 Hydrolysis of starch, aesculin and Tween 80 was tested according to Lányi (1988) [6]. Growth on different single carbon sources was verified with media supplemented with 1 80 81 % of each carbon source [7]. The carbon sources tested included acetate, arabinose, 82 cellobiose, citrate, dextran, galactose, glucose, glutamic acid, glycerol, formate, fumarate, 83 lactate, lactose, maltose, pyruvate, succinate, sucrose, sorbitol, trehalose and xylose. To determine whether strain MOLA117^T was able to degrade cellulose we utilized both filter 84 85 paper dissolved in agar and filter paper in carbohydrate free broth [8], as well as CM-86 cellulose [9].

Additional carbohydrate metabolism was tested using the API 20NE and API 50CH test systems (bioMérieux). Enzymatic activities were investigated using the API ZYM system (bioMérieux). For these tests, the medium utilized had the following composition: 25 g/L NaCl, 8g/L MgCl2 and 0.5g/L KCl and the cultures were incubated at 30°C for a week in the dark [9].

Biomass for fatty acid analysis of MOLA117^T was harvested from MA plates 92 93 grown at 25°C for 4 days. Biomass for polar lipids and respiratory quinone analyses was 94 harvested from cells grown on MB at 25°C for 4 days and cell pellets from 3 L of culture 95 were lyophilized and sent for analysis. Analysis of fatty acid methyl esters, respiratory 96 quinones, polar lipids and GC content was performed by the DSMZ Identification 97 Germany) Service (DSMZ, Braunschweig, according to their protocols 98 (http://www.dsmz.de/services/services-microorganisms/identif ication.html).

99 The sequence of the 16S rRNA gene of MOLA117^T was determined from PCR 100 products amplified after genomic DNA extraction with the Wizard Genomic DNA 101 purification kit (Promega, Madison, WI) as previously described in Fagervold *et al.* [3]. Bacterial primers 27Fmod (AGRGTTTGATCMTGGCTCAG) [10][11] and 1492Rmod
(TACGGYTACCTTGTTAYGACTT) [12] were used for PCR amplification. PCR
products were purified using the Agencourt AMPureXP purification kit (Beckman
Coulter France, Villepinte, France) and sequenced with an AB3130x1 genetic analyzer
(Life Technologies).

Sequence similarities of strain MOLA117^T to sequences available in the NCBI 107 108 GenBank were analyzed using the Basic Local Alignment Search Tool (BLAST)[1]. 109 Phylogenetic analysis was performed as previously described [3], using the ARB 110 software package [13] and the RAxML Webserver (http://www.phylo.org) for bootstrap analysis (450 replicates) [14]. This analysis revealed that strain MOLA117^T was 111 112 phylogenetically related to species within the genera Arenibacter and Cellulophaga. However. MOLA117^T clearly does not group with any of these genera since the bootstrap 113 114 values clustering species within the genus Arenibacter together were high, as were the 115 bootstrap values clustering species within the genus Cellulophaga. Nevertheless, the exact phylogenetic position of MOLA117^T is uncertain since the bootstrap values for 116 117 clustering MOLA117 with either of the genera Arenibacter or Cellulophaga are low (see Figure 1). Also, it is clear from the phylogenetic analysis that $MOLA117^{T}$ does not 118 119 belong to any of the other described genera in the family *Flavobacteriaceae*.

Morphological, physiological and biochemical properties of strain MOLA117^T are listed in Table 1 and in the genus and species descriptions. The major respiratory lipoquinone is MK-6, which is also the major respiratory quinone in *Flavobacteriaceae* [15].

Pigmentation, salinity requirement for growth and gliding motility are some 124 125 important characteristics for the description of genera within the family *Flavobacteriaceae*. All the closest described genera and MOLA117^T are pigmented, but 126 only *Zobellia galactivorans* Dsij^T [9] is positive for flexirubin. This strain also exhibits 127 gliding motility, as do Cellulophaga lytica 23178^T [16] and Maribacter sedimenticola 128 KMM 3903^T [17], but not MOLA117^T and Arenibacter latericius KMM426^T [18][19]. 129 Indeed, Arenibacter latericius KMM426^T and MOLA117^T are similar in many 130 characteristics, but they differ in that MOLA117^T can hydrolyze starch while *Arenibacter* 131 *latericius* KMM426^T cannot and that MOLA117^T is susceptible to kanamycin. They also 132 exhibit different ranges of growth temperature and pH tolerance; MOLA117^T is the only 133 one that is negative for growth at both 4°C, 37°C and 42°C. Further, even though all 134 compared strains require NaCl for growth (Table 1), MOLA117^T is slightly less 135 halotolerant than related genera (Table 1), as indicated by the more narrow range of NaCl 136 concentrations required for growth. MOLA117^T is the only species, of those compared, 137 138 which do not reduce nitrate.

The polar lipids that were extracted from MOLA117^T could not be identified in 139 140 detail by thin layer chromatography and subsequent staining (Figure S2). Acid production 141 was observed with only a few substrates using single carbon sources with the API 50CH system and the API20NE test showed a relatively narrow range of carbon source 142 143 utilization. However we did see a somewhat wider range when the carbon sources were 144 tested with more specialized media and a 1% carbon source [7] meaning that the carbon 145 utilization patterns from only API 50CH and the API20NE systems probably underestimate the range of substrates MOLA117^T can utilize. 146

The most predominant fatty acid found in strain MOLA117^T was iso- $C_{17:0}$ 3-OH 147 at 33.21 % and this fatty acid is found in related genera, like Zobellia, Cellulophaga and 148 149 *Maribacter* in relatively high amounts (from 14.9-20.8%), but was not found in the genus Arenibacter. Other major fatty acids found in MOLA117 were: C₁₅₀ (1.17 %), C₁₇₁₁₅ 150 (1.41%), iso-C_{15:0} (11.44%), iso-C_{15:1} (7.12%), anteiso-C_{15:0} (1.26%), iso-C_{17:1 $\square 9c$} (2.62%)151 %), C_{16:0} 3-OH (2.08 %), iso-C_{15:0} 3-OH (7.41%), summed feature 3 (4.14 %), and an 152 153 unknown fatty acid at 14.90 %. Generally, all the genera we compared directly contained 154 $C_{15:0}$, iso- $C_{15:0}$, iso- $C_{15:1}$ and anteiso- $C_{15:0}$ in varying amounts. The main difference between MOLA117^T and the related genera with respect to fatty acids is that MOLA117^T 155 156 contains much more iso- $C_{17:0}$ 3-OH than strains in related genera.

In summary, strain MOLA117^T is different from related genera in numerous metabolic capabilities listed in Table 1 and discussed above. Thus, both the phenotypic and phylogenetic data suggest that strain MOLA117^T should be placed in a new genus *Saonia* gen. nov., with *Saonia flava* sp. nov. as the type species and MOLA117^T as the type strain.

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Description of *Saonia* **gen. nov.**

Saonia (Sa.o'ni.a L. fem. N. Sao, the nereid Sao; N.L. fem. n. *Saonia* named after
Sao, the Nereid of "safe" passage, or the rescue of sailors, referring to the marine origin.)
Gram-negative, non-motile, aerobic and chemo-organoheterotrophic. Catalase,
oxidase and alkaline phosphatase positive. Requires NaCl for growth. Produces yellow
pigment but no flexirubin. The most predominant fatty acid is iso-C_{17:0} 3-OH and the only
respiratory lipoquinone is MK-6. Based upon the 16S rRNA gene sequence, the genus

forms a separate branch within the family *Flavobacteriaceae* close to the genera *Arenibacter* and *Cellulophaga*. The type species is *Saonia flava*.

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173 **Description of** *Saonia flava* **sp. nov.**

174 *Saonia flava* (fla'va. L. fem. adj. *flava* yellow).

175 In addition to properties given in the genus description the species is characterized 176 as follows. Cells are 1.5-3.4 µm long and 0.5-0.6 µm wide, non-spore forming, straight 177 rods. The cells have an EPS like structure and they form aggregates in liquid culture. 178 Colonies are yellow, smooth and slightly convex on MA. Growth occurs at temperatures 179 between 15 and 30 °C. Optimal pH for growth is 7, and growth occurs at pH 7-8. Growth 180 occurs in the presence of 1-4% NaCl, but the optimal NaCl concentration is 3 %. H₂S is 181 not produced. Nitrate is not reduced under aerobic conditions. Using the API 20NE system, MOLA117^T is shown to be positive for urease activity, aesculin hydrolysis and 182 β -galactosidase utilization and negative for denitrification, gelatin hydrolysis, indole 183 184 production, D-glucose fermentation, arginine dihydrolase, β -glucosidase, and utilization of D-glucose, L-arabinose, D-mannose, D-mannitol, capric acid, N-acetvlglucosamine, 185 186 D-maltose, potassium gluconate, adipic acid, malic acid, trisodium citrate and 187 phenylacetic acid. Acid production was only observed with a few substrates using the 188 API 50CH system, namely fructose, aesculin, saccharose, trehalose, inulin, raffinose and starch. MOLA117^T could assimilate cellobiose, arabinose, maltose, trehalose, xylose, 189 dextran, lactate, glycerol, sucrose, galactose, glucose and sorbitol as single carbon 190 191 sources but not lactose, fumarate, succinate, formate, pyruvate, citrate, glutamic acid and 192 acetate. When assayed with the API ZYM system, alkaline phosphatase, esterase lipase

193 (C8), leucine arylamidase, valine arylamidase, acid phosphatase and N-acetyl- β -194 glucosaminidase are present, but esterase (C4), lipase (C14), cystine arylamidase, trypsin, 195 α -chymotrypsin, napthol-AS-BI-phosphohydrolase, α -galactosidase, β -galactosidase, β -196 glucuronidase, α -glucosidase, β -Glucosidase, α -mannosidase and α -fucosidase are absent. MOLA117^T is susceptible to cefotaxime (30 μ g), ciprofloxacin (5 μ g), kanamycin 197 198 (30 µg), vancomycin (30 µg), rifampicillin (30 µg), chloramphenicol (50 µg), ampicillin 199 (10 μ g), and resistant to erythromycin (15 μ g), penicillin (20 U), polymyxin (50 μ g), 200 streptomycin (10 µg), tetracycline (30 µg). The DNA G+C content is 36.9 mol %. The type strain MOLA117^T (=CIP $110873^{T} = DSM 29762^{T}$) was isolated from 201

seawater from the northwestern Mediterranean Sea off the coast of Banyuls-sur-Mer,France.

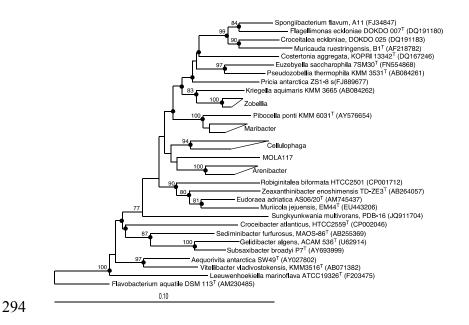

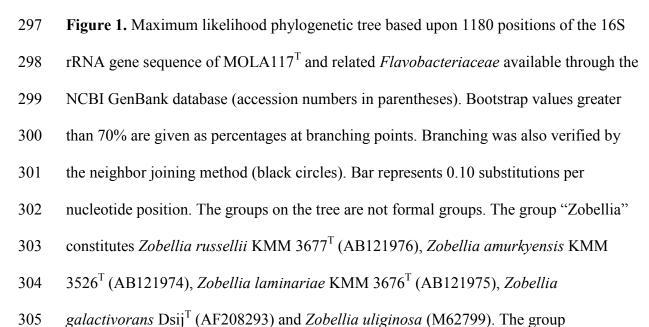
