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# Homogenization of the moment magnitude estimates available in the French datasets and implications on ground motion model variability

## INTRODUCTION

Seismic hazard assessment (SHA) studies require earthquake events characterized in terms of the moment magnitude (M<sub>w</sub>) scale both in the earthquake catalogs and in the ground-motion databases. These magnitudes are either estimated directly after an inversion or deduced from other magnitude scales using a scale conversion formula. However, for the same event, M<sub>w</sub> estimates provided by different agencies may differ due to differences in computation methods, input data or seismic networks – especially among small-moderate sized events.

Various strategies have been adopted in the literature to define a unique, reference M<sub>w</sub> for each event in earthquake catalogues. Some strategies follow a priority scheme to prefer an M<sub>w</sub> source over another, e.g., the European-Mediterranean Earthquake Catalog [EMEC]. While others prefer to correct the  $M_w$  estimates of each source for their systematic deviation relative to an  $M_w$  reference source, and then average the available M<sub>w</sub> estimates for each event, e.g., the Italian Catalogue [CPTI15]. A recent study, Laurendeau et al. (2022) collected a large number of M<sub>w</sub> for the Euro-Mediterranean region with a focus on metropolitan France for the lowest M<sub>w</sub>. They chose to define a unique and unified  $M_w$  by combining these two strategies (ranking and unification) in order to have a consistency of  $M_w$  down to lower  $M_w [M_{w unified}]$ .

Since in low-moderate seismicity regions of Europe, small-moderate sized events significantly contribute to hazard estimates, it becomes critical that their  $M_w$  estimates are homogenized prior to development of regional seismic source models and GMMs. In this study, we developed Fourier Spectrum GMMs using the pan-European Engineering Strong Motion [ESM] database using two possible choices for defining  $M_{W}$ : (1) the revised EMEC  $M_{W}$  data set already used in the regression of Kotha et al. (2022) [M<sub>W EMEC revised</sub>] and (2) the M<sub>W unified</sub> data set when an M<sub>w</sub> value is available and  $M_{W \ EMEC \ revised}$  otherwise. We then analyzed the impact of these two data sets on the GMMs, and especially on the inter-event variability.

## THE FOURIER SPECTRUM GMM – KOTHA ET AL. (2022)

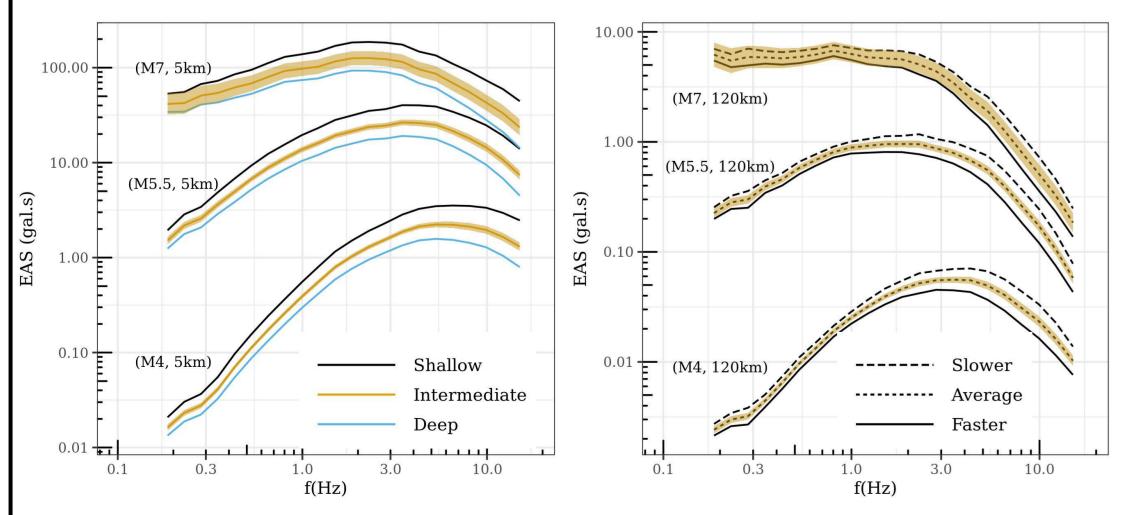

- *EAS*: Effective Amplitude Spectrum with *f* = 0.186Hz – 15.051Hz

- $f_{R,a}(R_{IB})$ :  $M_w$  independent anelastic attenuation
- $f_M(M_W)$ :  $M_W$  scaling

- $N(0, \phi_{S2S})$ : Between-site variability
- $N(0, \tau_0)$ : Region corrected between-event variability
- $N(0, \tau_{L2L})$ : Regional variability of event characteristics
- $N(0, \tau_{c3})$ : Regional variability of anelastic attenuation
- $N(0, \phi)$ : Residual variability

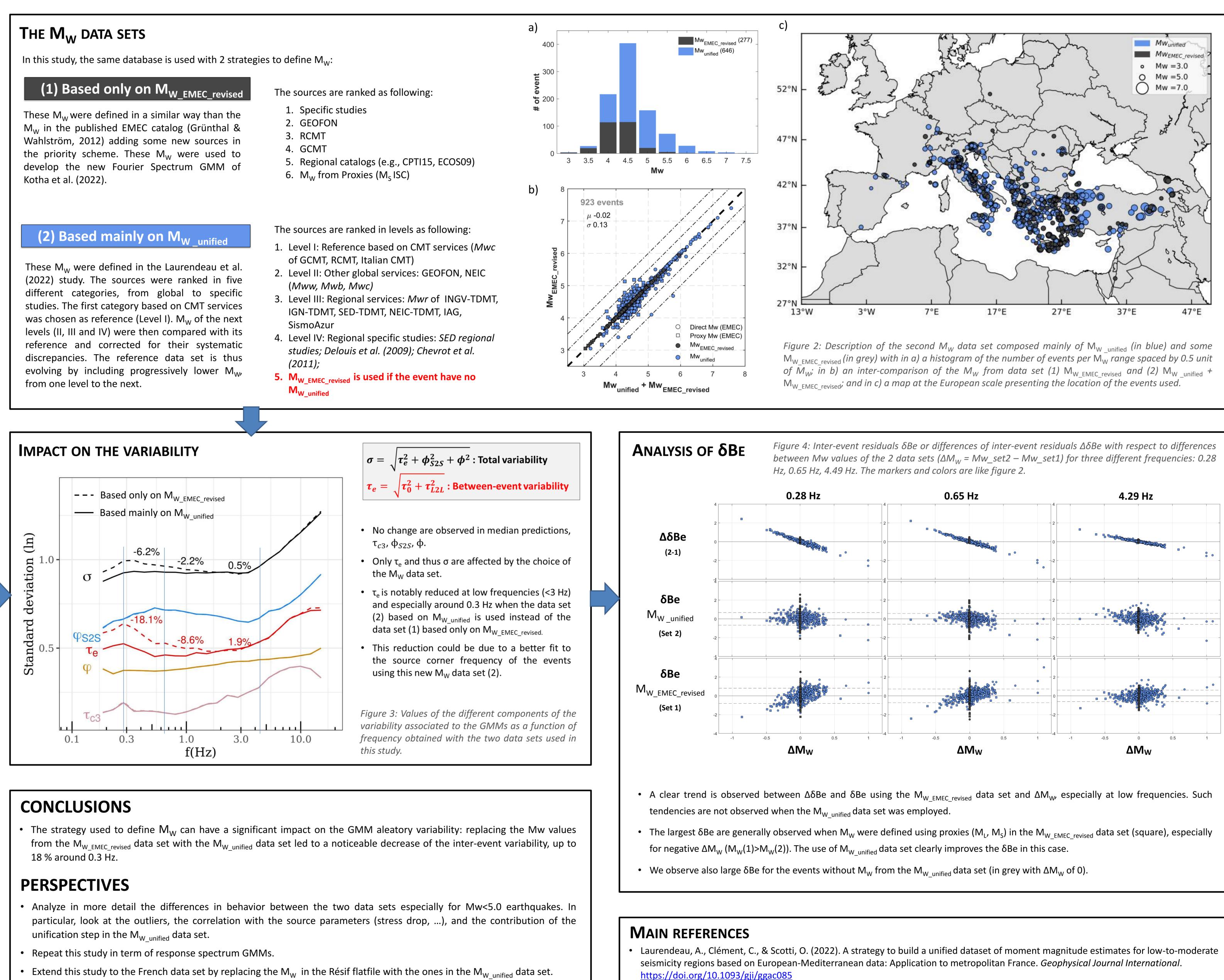
*Figure 1: Predicted Effective Fourier Acceleration Spectra [EAS] in gal.s with respect to the frequency* (Hz) for different scenarios: left) Shallow, Intermediate, Deep correspond to hypocentral depths. *Right) Slower, Average, Faster correspond to regions with different anelastic attenuation rates.*

The 923 events used in to develop the new GMMs represented in the Figure 1 are from the Fourier Spectrum ESM database. Each event is defined in an M<sub>W\_EMEC\_revised</sub> and has at least 3 recordings.

- Extend this study to the French data set by replacing the M<sub>W</sub> in the Résif flatfile with the ones in the M<sub>W unified</sub> data set.
- Extend the unification of the  $M_w$  data set at the European scale, especially adding the regional Mw estimates (Greece, Turkey).
