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Assessing the usefulness of Land Surface Temperature spatial disaggregation for water stress mapping in the frame of the preparation of the Trishna mission



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The french-indian Trishna Thermal Infra-Red remote sensing mission Main characteristics

- French (CNES) and Indian (ISRO) satellite to be launched in 2025
- 4 Thermal Infra Red bands along 6 VISNIR bands, at 57 meter nadir
- Field of view \pm 34°, 3 days revisit time (8 days with the same viewing angle)
- Design drivers:
- Ecosystem stress and water use
- Coastal and inland waters

Spatial Disaggregation of future Trishna data

- Important for the monitoring of small crops (design driver)
- Spatial disaggregation of LST relies on higher resolution VISNIR bands: for Trishna, we could use Sentinel-2

This work

- Assess performances of spatial disaggregation of LST applied to Trishna / Sentinel-2 pairs
- Assess the benefits for spatial disaggregation of LST for evapo-transpiration and water stress



We use Water Deficiency Index as a proxy to measure impact of spatial disaggregation on evapo-transpiration and water stress estimation

Benchmarked methods: Bicubic Zoom (reference method), TsHARP [1], ATPRK [2], AATPRK [3], HUTS [4], Bilinear [5], Data Mining Sharpener [6] (*Source code kindly* provided by the authors of [7] : https://github.com/cgranerob/ThUnmpy except for DMS: https://github.com/radosuav/pyDMS)

Pixels stratification by gradient class for performance evaluation



Divided into 31 tiles for processing
Resolution ≈ 2 meters, Swath width ≈ 300 meters

Performances on Water Deficiency Index

Scatter FVC - LST scatter plots without and with residual correction

- Without residual corrections, scatter plots are damaged by all methods (except from DMS)
- Residual correction restores the scatter plots shape for most methods

- 25% pixels with lowest gradient magnitude: low textures areas, no contours \rightarrow low spatial frequencies (should not be damaged by disaggregation)
- 25% with highest gradient magnitude: high texture, edges → high spatial frequencies (= target for disaggregation)



Residual compensation, RMSE on 31 tiles (step c)

Conclusions and future work

Importance of residual compensation for all methods but DMS

- Performances on LST spatial disaggregation are essentially tied to residual compensation
- Without residual compensation, LST FVC relation is not sufficiently preserved for WDI estimation

Interest of spatial disaggregation for water stress estimation in the Trishna case

- When compared to the 20m ground truth, when including residual compensations, all spatial disaggregation methods give a better estimate of WDI than a standard bicubic zoom
- Stratification on high gradient suggests that the performance gap with bicubic zoom is higher on high frequencies, and thus that faithful high resolution details are effectively generated
- $\bullet\,$ DMS outperforms the other methods by 10% on WDI RMSE

Future work

- Process the October tracks of the AHSPECT campaign
- Input more features to DMS (especially MNT derived)
- Study the impact of temporal gap which will occur in operational case between Sentinel-2 and Trishna

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
