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Analysis of Seismic, Hydroacoustic and Acoustic Waves Recorded on the Shoreline in the AGU

Vicinity of Shallow Underwater Explosions

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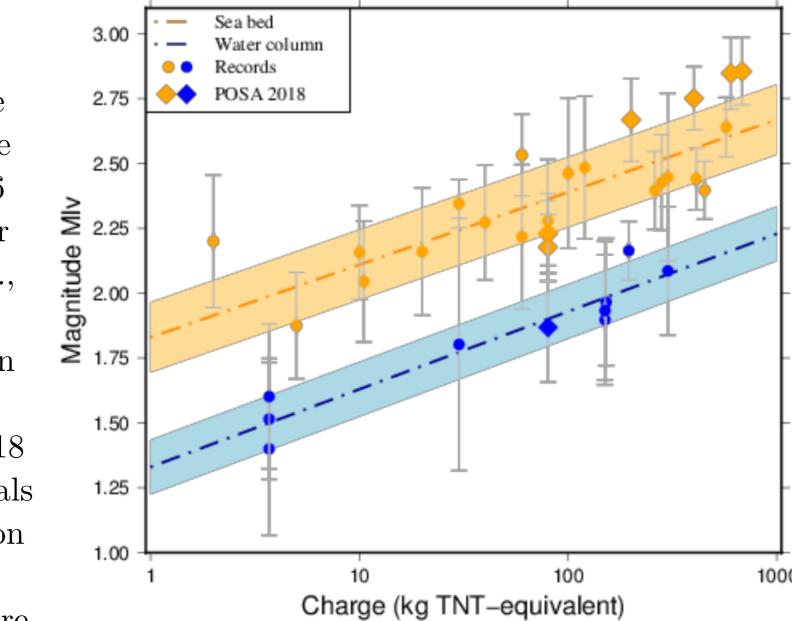


The French Navy Mine Warfare Office conducted a series of 8 calibrated underwater explosions in December 2018 in the Bay of Hyères, SE France. The charges were ranging from 80 to 680 kg TNT-equivalent weights and the generated mechanical waves have been recorded at 17 seismic stations (composed of velocimeters, accelerometers and/or Microelectomechanical system accelerometers) temporarily deployed within 10 km of the sources. The large sampling rate recordings (> 250 Hz) allow to clearly identify both seismic, hydroacoustic and acoustic waves on the shoreline. The hydroacoustic phases, mostly observed at the rocky sites, rapidly attenuate when propagating on land and seem to be conditioned by the bathymetry and the seabed sedimentary cover. The hydroacoustic onset times can be used very efficiently to infer explosion locations and origin times. The spectrum analyses and site response along the shore and inside a building (church) provide insights on the mitigation of the possible nuisance caused by the disposal of unexploded historical ordnance.

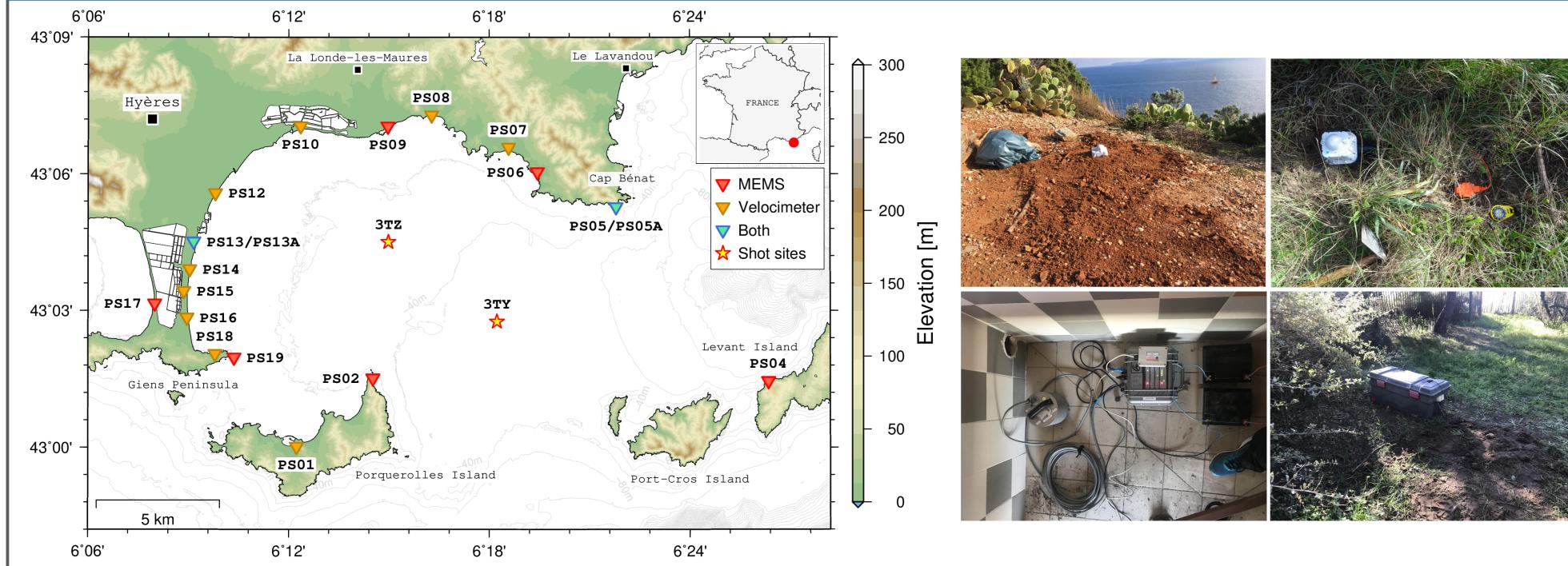
1. Introduction

The POSA project (étude de la Propagation des Ondes Sismiques d'origine Anthropique, 2015-2019) aimed to study the impact, inland, of the WWII unexploded ordnance (UXO) disposal operations of the French Navy along the French coasts. Several tens of UXO are detonated offshore every year to ensure the security of ships and divers. We performed two sets of experiments in 2016 and 2018 to derivate magnitude to charge weight (kg TNT-equivalent) laws for the underwater explosions. We have obtained two laws (Favretto-Cristini et al., 2022, see figure on the right): a law for UXO detonated on the sea bottom (orange in the figure) and an other for UXO detonated in the water column (in $\stackrel{\geq}{}$ 1.75 $\stackrel{\downarrow}{}$ floating barrels, blue in the figure).

This study presents the analysis of the experiment conducted in December 2018 in the bay of Hyères, SE France, and, in particular on the high frequency signals recorded by 8 MEMS accelerometers. The 500 s.p.s. sampling rate configuration allowed us to observe hydroacoustic phases that bring interesting pieces of information for the mitigation of the UXO disposal nuisance inland and offshore.



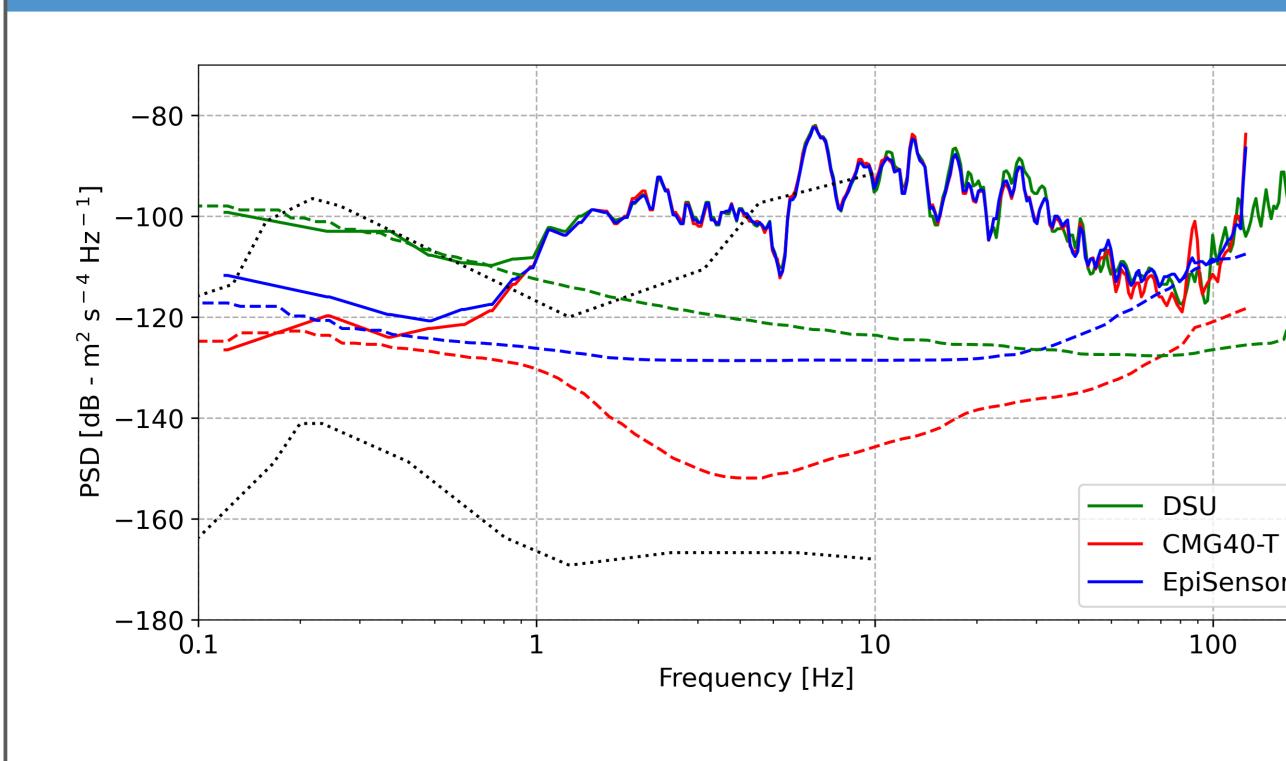
2. 2018 POSA experiment



20 seismic sensors installed at 17 sites between December 11 and December 12 2018.

8 explosions trigerred by the French Navy: 2 at the shot site 3TZ (S1 and S2) and 6 at the shot site 3TY. Charges loads were between 80 (S1, S2, S3 et S8) and 680 kg TNT-equiv. (S4). 7 shots occurred at the sea bottom (S1-S7) and the last one within the water column (S8). The experiment used 10 CMG40-T (250 s.p.s.), 1 ES-T (250 s.p.s.) and 8 Sercel DSU-428 MEMS accelerometers (500 s.p.s.).

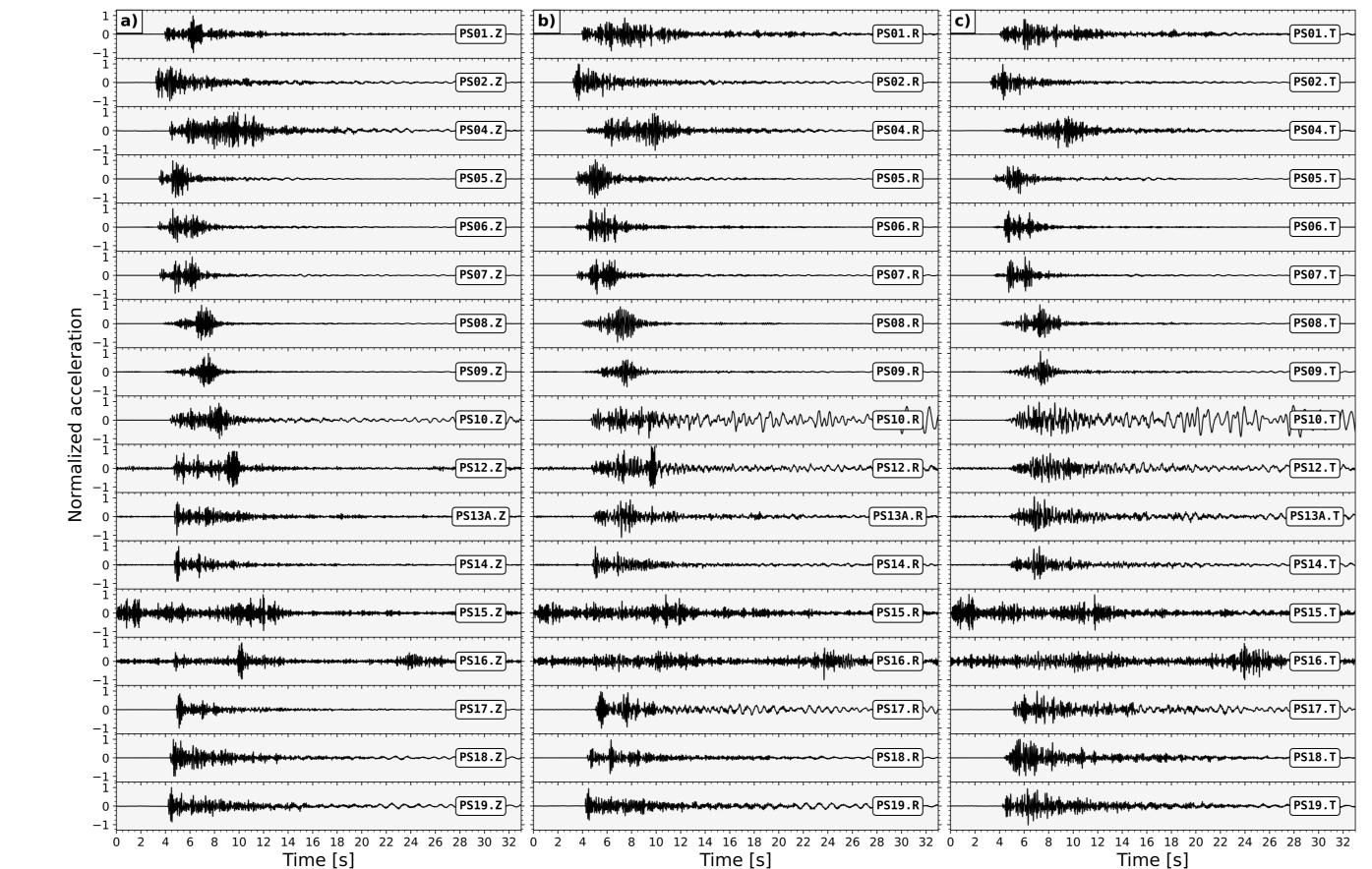
3. Characterisation of the MEMS sensors



The POSA 2018 experiment was our first use of the SerCel DSU sensors. To estimate the performance of this sensor, we installed at the site PS05 a CMG40-T. an ES-T and a DSU. The figure on the left shows PSD computed on the continuous signal during the night of December 12 (dotted curves) and for shot S3 (80 kg TNTequiv., solid curves). Though the selfnoise of the DSU is high, the figure demonstrates that the DSU outperforms the ES-T above 20Hz for the signal of the explosion. In general the three sensors return

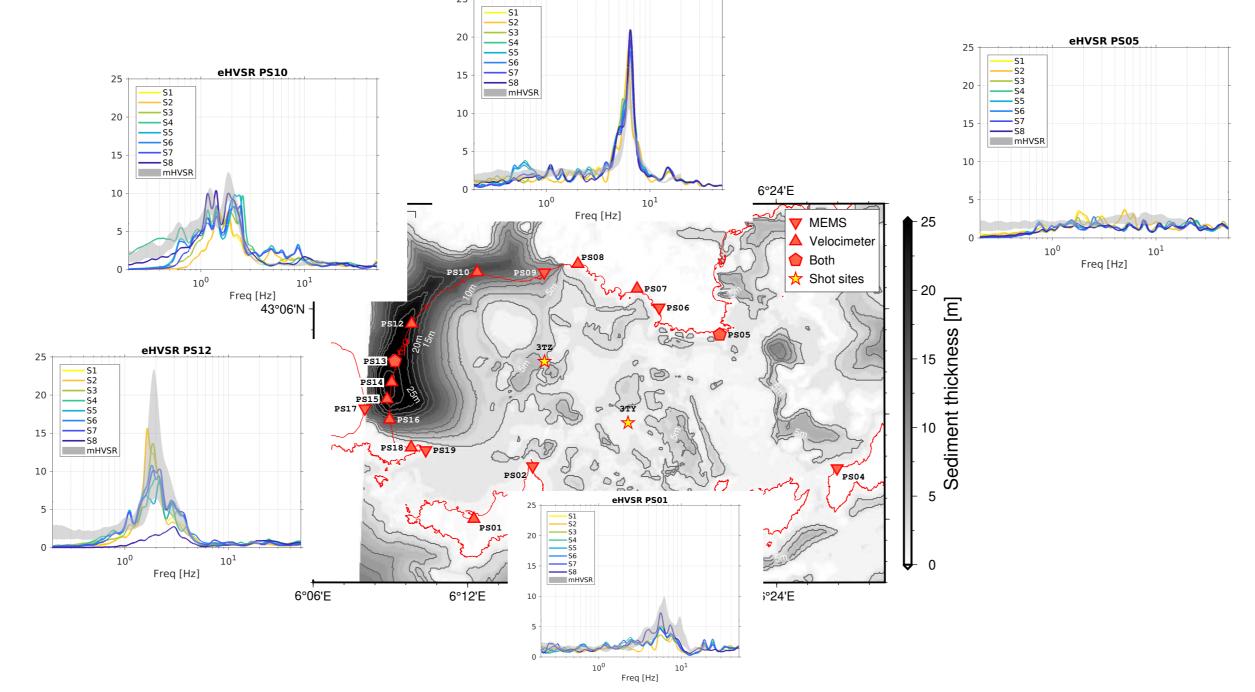
coherent PSD between 1 and 20Hz

4. Seismic amplitude variability

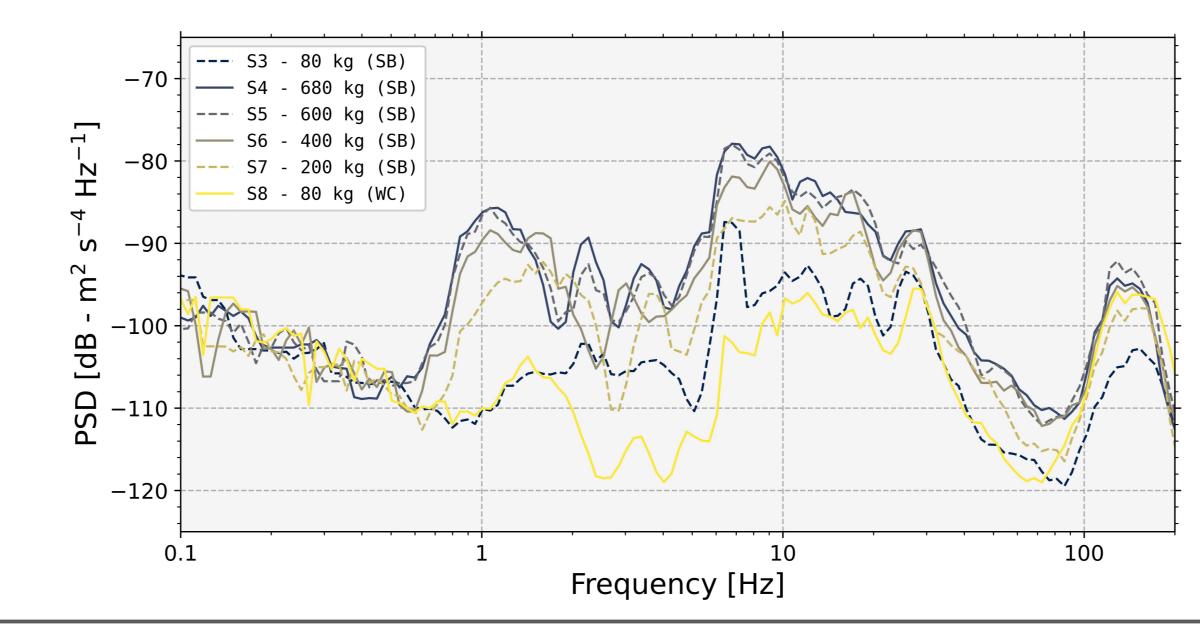


Waveforms and signal duration are very dependant of the nature of the rocks (solid rocks or unconsolidated sediments) at a given site. The figure above shows three-component signals at all the sites for shot S4 (680 kg TNT-equiv.).

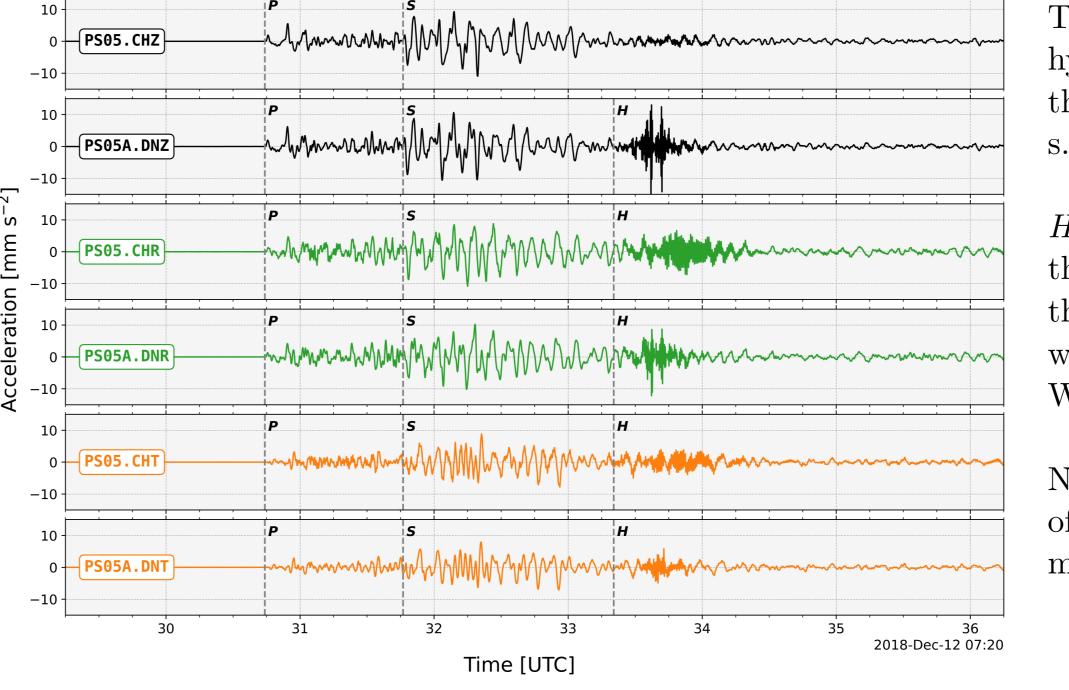
The figure below shows mHVSR and eHVSR at some sites. We can see that the sites on the western part of the area are associated with amplifications.



The spectrum of the explosion induced signals is dominated by a peak around 1Hz for the largest shots (surface waves), by a plateau between 5 and 20Hz (P waves) and by an other peak near 100Hz (H phase). Figure below presents spectra of shots S3-S8 at PS05A (MEMS).

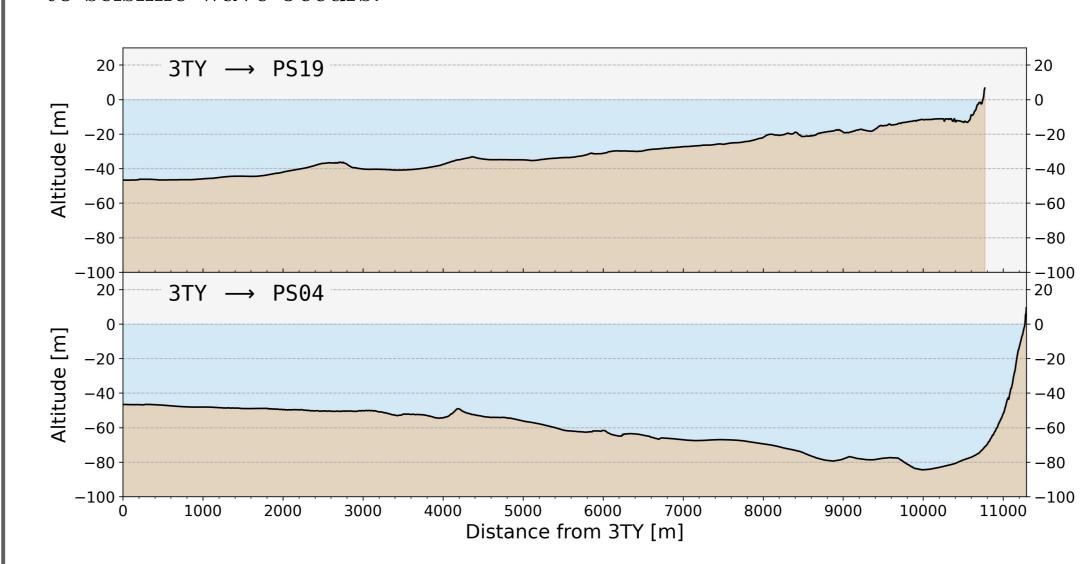


5. Observation of hydroacoustic signals



We can note on the spectrograms that the H waves are not recorded at all the sites with a MEMS sensor. We suspect that this is caused by the bathymetry of the bay of Hyères: to the West water depth is low near the shore (see profile for PS19 below) while water depth increases towards the East (see profile for PS02).

This changes the distance at which the conversion from hydroacoustic to seismic wave occurs.

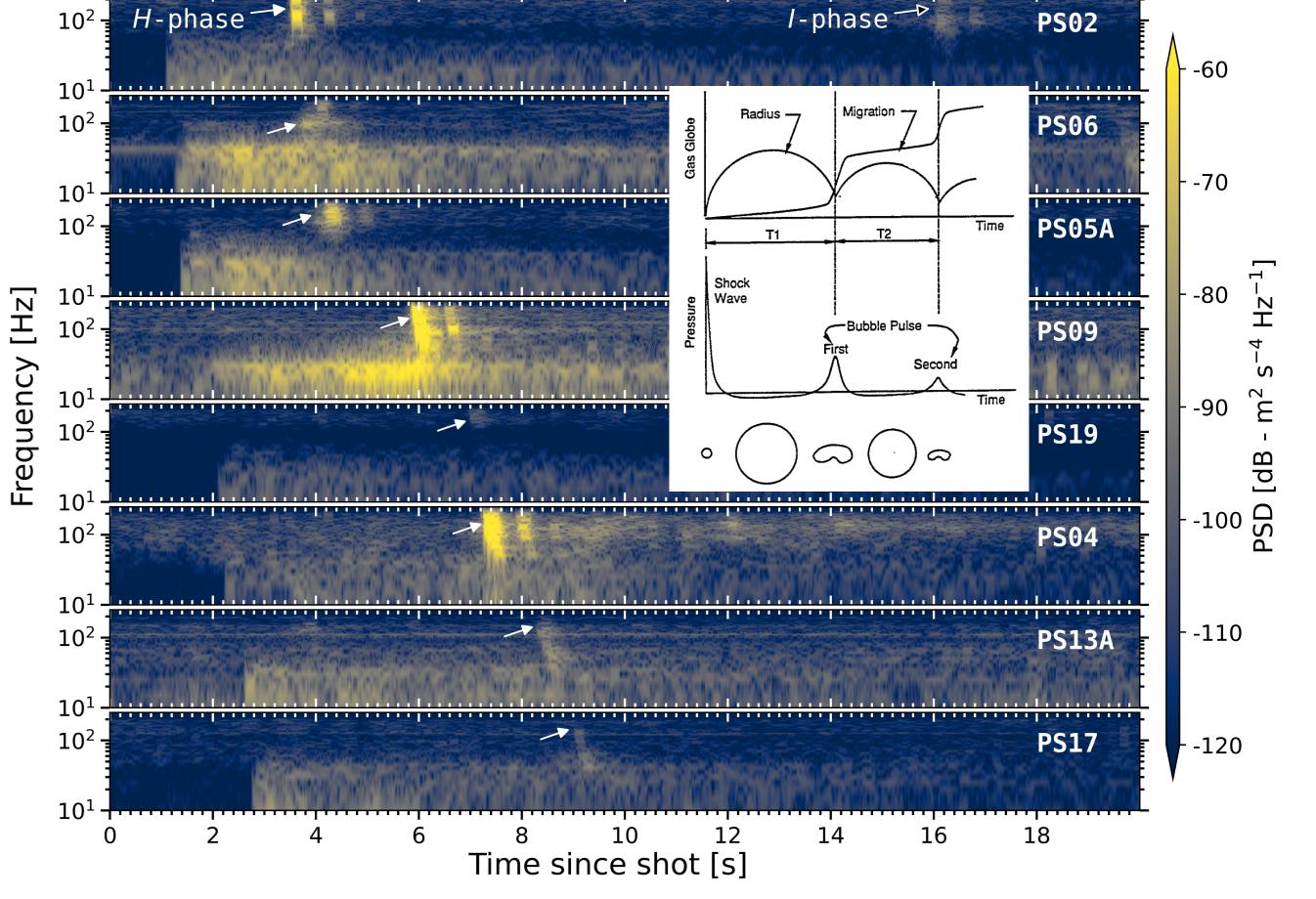


The use of sampling frequecy > 250Hz (500 s.p.s. for MEMS) allows us to observe hydroacoustic (*H* phase of the figure on the left) and acoustic waves at PS02. Compare, in the figure on the left, the amplitude of the H phase for CHZ (250 s.p.s.) and DNZ (500

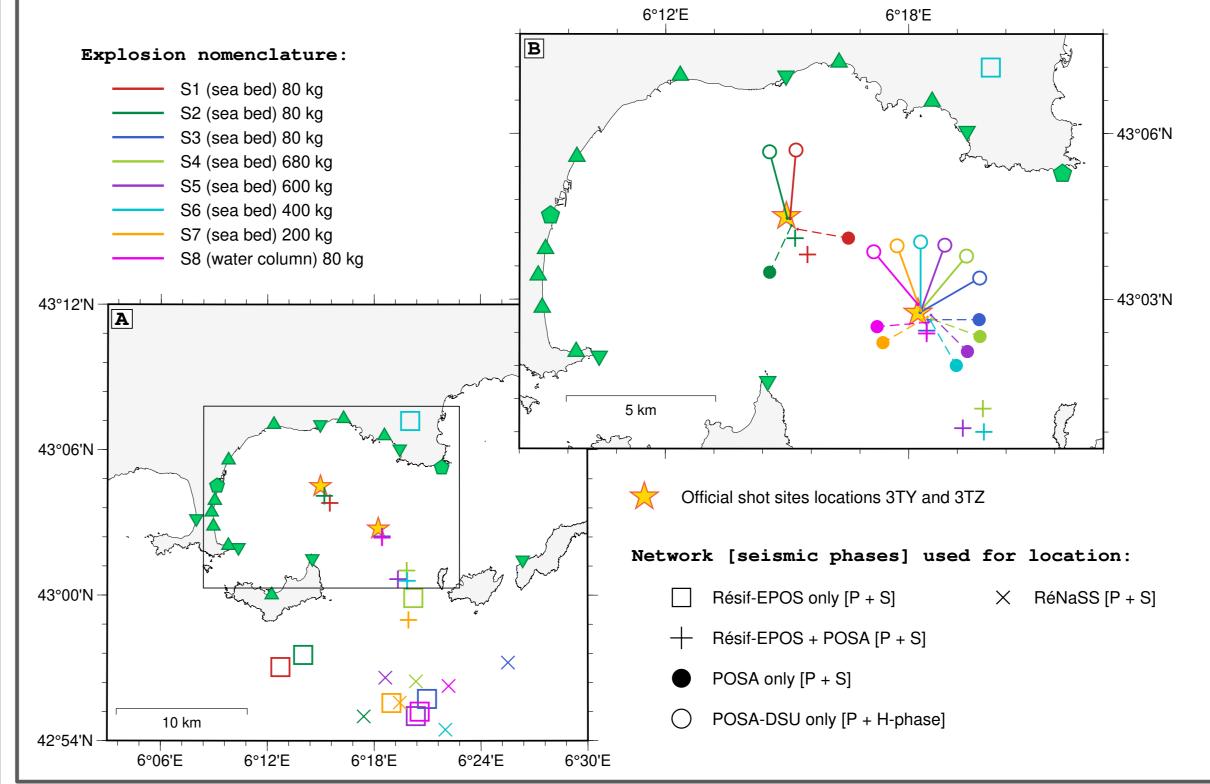
H phases are the most energetic wave packets (see spectrograms below) and the ones with the highest frequency content (> 100Hz). Their attenuation is low. At PS04 for instance, though body waves amplitudes are low, the amplitude of the H phase is as large as at PS02 which is twice closer from the source.

We have also detected acoustic phases (I on the spectrograms) at station PS02.

Note that we can observe 3 H phase arrivals that correspond the expansion and contraction of the gas globe generate by the explosion in the water column (inset in the spectrogram, modified from Reid, 1996).



6. Localisation of the sources



Localisation of the sources using the French permanent network (network -43°06'N FR) located at more than 40km from the bay of Hyères results in mislocations of approximately 15km. The epicenters are systemetically

shifted towards the South. This is caused by the absence of permanent stations to the South of the bay.

We have tested several inversion schemes and sets of data. We find that the best results are obtained using a MCMC bayesian inversion scheme using time arrivals of P and H waves. We obtain location errors of approximately 100m (open circles on the left).
