Practice of clowning in a therapeutic context was developed in the 1980s. in paediatrics.

- For some twenty years, this practice has been deployed in the accompaniment of elderly people, in hospital or in nursing home.
- Various qualities of the clown seem to be at work: humour, interaction

 \succ The interventions studied were those of clowns, exclusively or for the most part.

After reading the abstracts, 24 of the 49 articles met these two conditions and were selected.

 \succ In context of home care, new proposals are emerging in terms of prevention of loss of autonomy and
