 IoT (Internet of Things) revolution towards direct interaction between objects thanks to an internet network

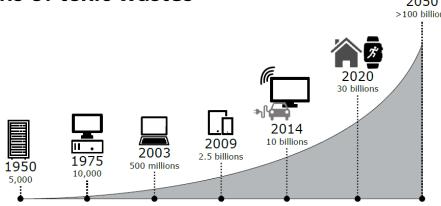
➤ 30 billions IoT worldwide in 2020¹

Why plastronic IoT antennas for energy storage and harvesting ?



<u>2019, France</u>: 1,5 billion batteries \approx **32 500 tons of toxic wastes**

Less than **50% collected 35% recycled 30% thrown** in domestic wastes → increasing environmental pollution



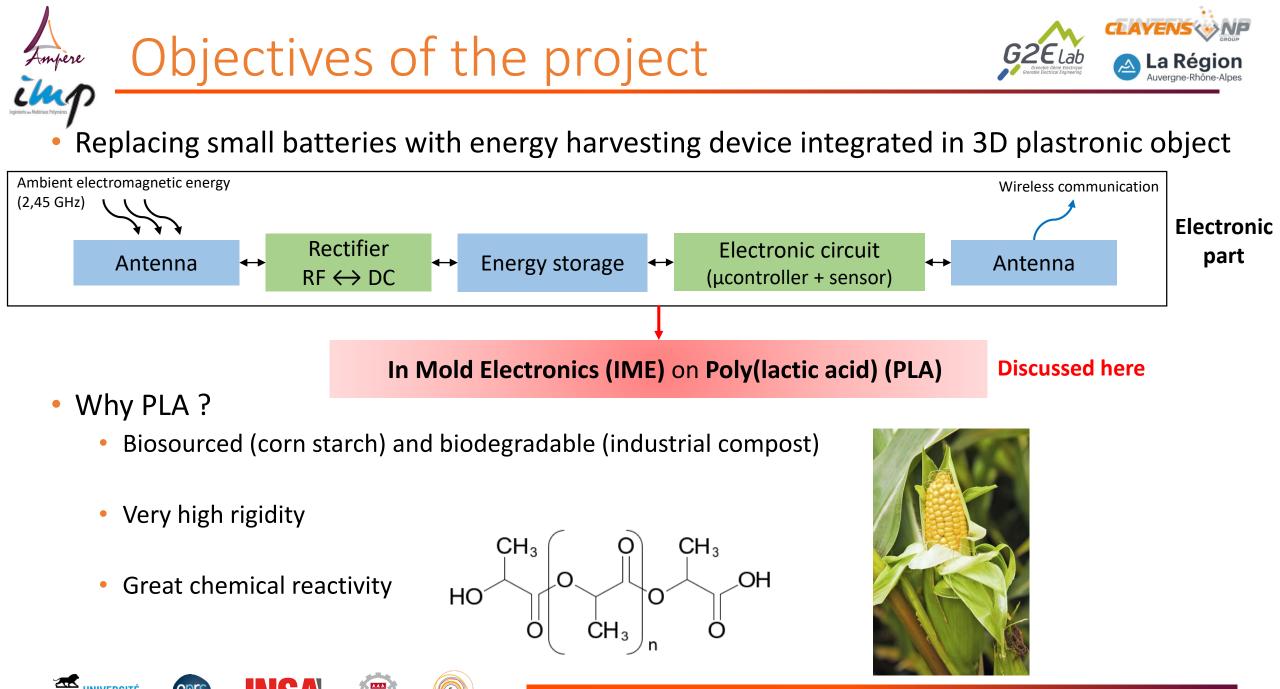

- Two thermoplastic polymers:
 - Poly(lactic acid) (PLA), sustainable alternative for the environment
 - PolyCarbonate (PC), reference material in IME
- PLA already used for:
 - Extrusion
 - 3D printing
 - Injection molding
- \rightarrow Interesting choice for IME



<u>Main objective</u>: determine the compatibility of PLA at each step of the IME process

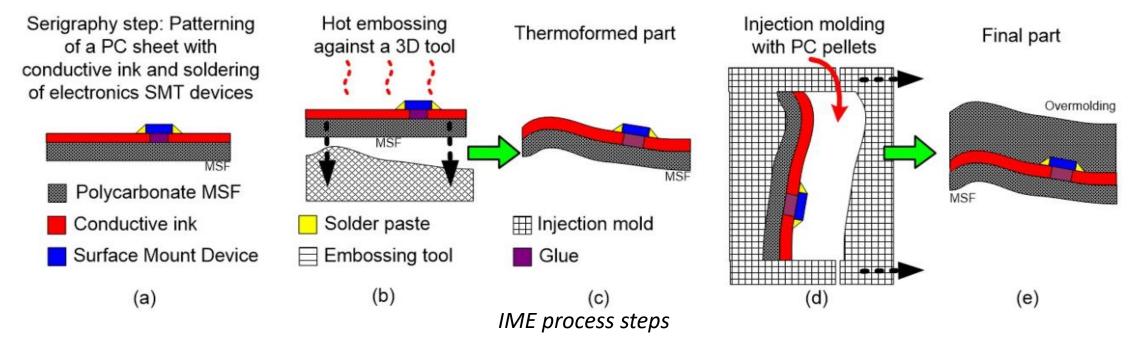

The IME technology



- Used to give a 3D shape to the device which enables better integration of the desired electronic functions to the object
- Technology advantages: innovation in design, features, reliability



- Process in development with amorphous PC
- Not studied with semi-crystalline PLA

• Compatibility of inks with PLA films

>Adhesion?

- \succ Low transition temperature Tg of PLA \rightarrow During curing after inking?
- Adhesion "polymer/ink+electronic components" during thermoforming?
- Adhesion "polymer/polymer" and "circuit/polymer" during injection molding?
- Thermoformability of PLA with screen printed inks and glued components (cracks, delamination of inks on PLA)?
- Injection molding: thermal shrinkage inducing warping, early deterioration, ink delamination or component shearing?

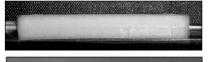

Example of warping after injection molding³



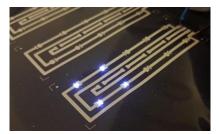

LED foil prepared on PLA film

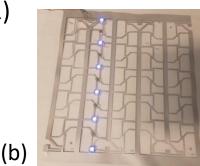


LED foil prepared on PLA substrate overmoulded with PLA

Screen printing and injection molding No thermoforming





Sheet-to-sheet screen printed silver on (a) unannealed stereocomplex PLA film dried at 100°C (left) and 80°C (right) and (b) annealed stereocomplex PLA film dried at 80°C.

PLLA Luminy LX175 and PDLA Luminy D120, Total Corbion (Film thickness: 80 μm to 125 $\mu m)$

Huge work on the preparation of the PLA films

Only screen printing No thermoforming or injection molding

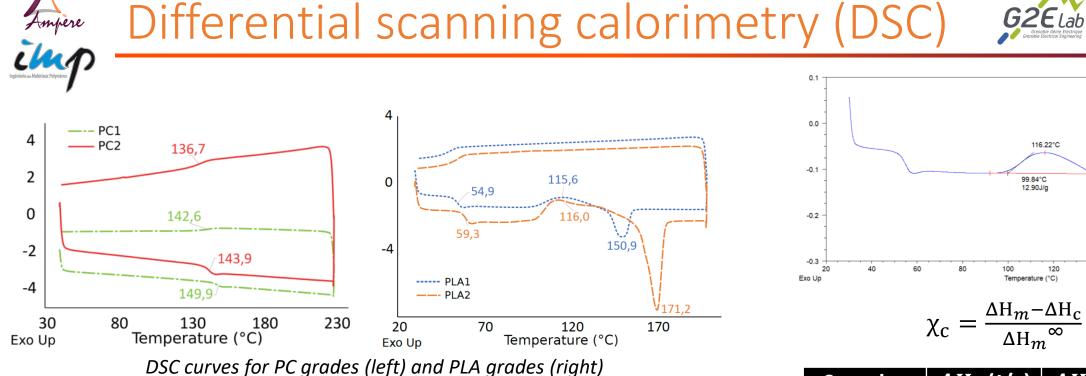


Materials initial characterization

Thermal properties and thermomechanical behavior

PC1: film DE 1-1 from Covestro (sheet) PC2: grade 2405 from Covestro (injection) PLA1: grade 2003D from NatureWorks (extrusion) PLA2: grade 3251D from NatureWorks (injection)

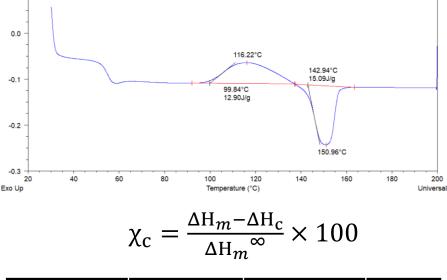




PC amorphous: Tg around 145°C

JNIVERSITÉ

- PLA semi-crystalline: low Tg (around 55-60°C) compared to PC
 - Cold crystallization (115°C)
 - Tm higher for PLA2 compared to PLA1 (170°C vs. 150°C)



Samples	ΔH_c (J/g)	ΔH_m (J/g)	χ _c (%)
PLA1	12,90	15,09	2,35
PLA2	30,43	35,00	4,91

- PLA1 less crystalline than PLA2
- Low enough crystallinity to consider these two PLA more amorphous than crystalline

 Can we see the variation of PLA crystallinity depending on the temperature of heat treatment?

Fourier Transform InfraRed (FTIR)

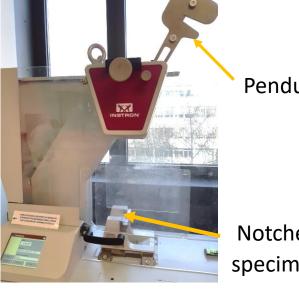

Confirmation PLA brittleness and PC great ductility But PLA objects in hands are still great!

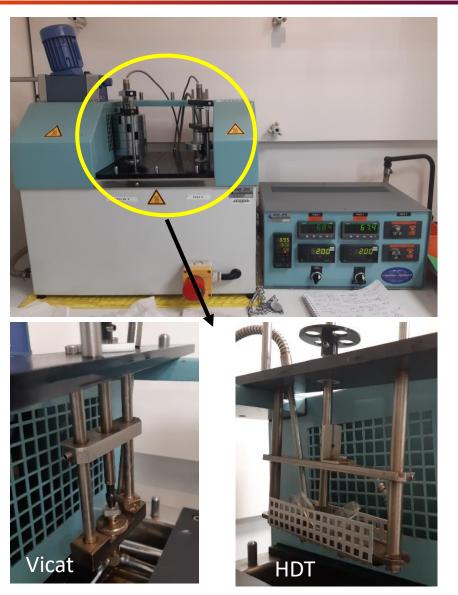

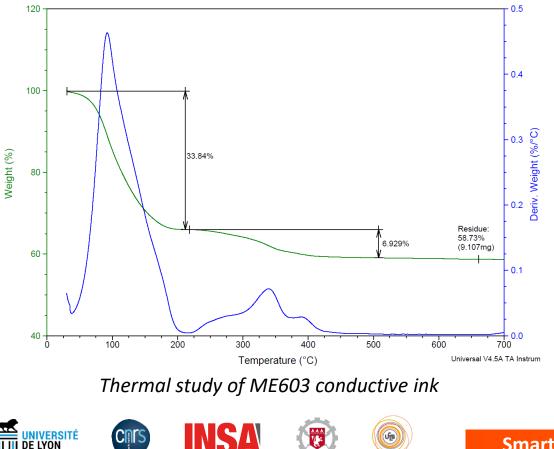
- Excellent thermomechanical properties of PC2
 - No plastic deformation before 140°C
- PLA: poor thermomechanical properties
- > Is PLA good enough for thermomechanical holding of electronic IME device?

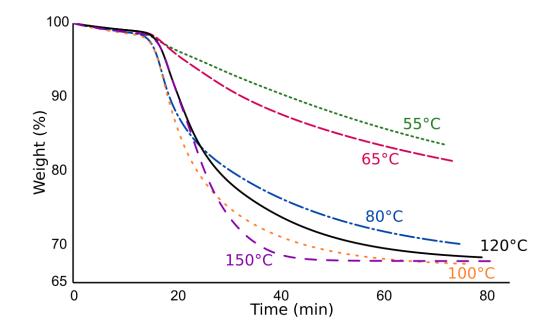




ThermoGravimetric Analyses (TGA)

- ME603 silver conductive ink from DuPont:
 - 3 or 4 chemical compounds (blue curve)
 - 58%wt residue = silver particles (green curve)





Isothermal study of ME603 drying to adapt on PLA substrate

- On PLA substrate: drying at lower temperature but for longer time
 - Choice: 55°C or 65°C during 2h30

Ink resistivity

- 4-point probe method
- S cross-sectional area with confocal measurements
- ME603 electrical properties

		ME603 supplier data on PC (120°C – 20 min)	
Resistivity (μΩ.cm)	1,59	89	150-200

Multimeter

V

L= 1.27mm

- Resistivity of ME603 dried at 55°C on PLA much higher than when dried at 120°C on PC
 - Ink drying temperature lower on PLA
- Photonic curing to reach similar results as PC with PLA?

- PLA films: initial relaxation of internal stress necessary
 - Heat chamber between metal plates: 75°C 15 min

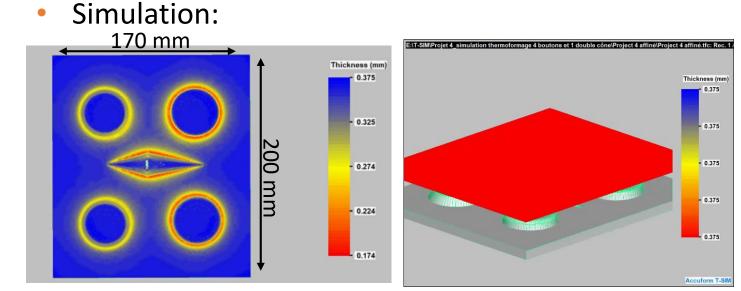

Standardized cross-cut **Before** After test (Scotch test) Adhesion ISO 2409:2007 PC $(120^{\circ}C - 20 \text{ min})$ Good adhesion: 100% success 1000 µm Quantitative measurements ongoing PLA $(65^{\circ}C - 30 \text{ min})$



Thermoforming of PLA

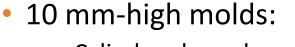




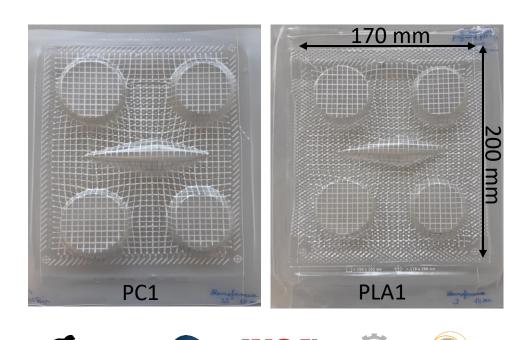
Thermoforming simulation with 375 µm thick PC film (T-SIM software)

Effect of geometrical parameters on film stretching

- Reduction in thickness to 174 μm
- Experimental:
 - PLA film well thermoformed: no cracks or holes
 - Ink slightly cracked in areas of greater deformations
 (→ smaller draft angle)



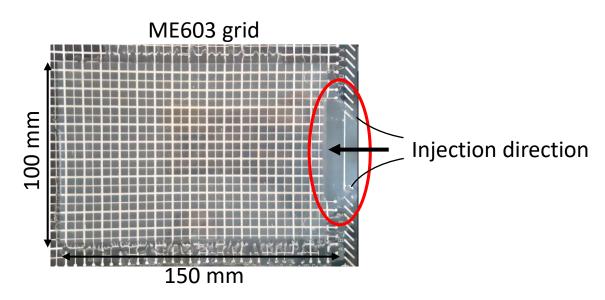
- Cylinder-shaped
 - Fillet radius: 0,5 mm or 1 mm
 - Draft angle: 10° or 30°
- 15 mm-high double cone-shaped mold



Injection molding of PLA on PLA



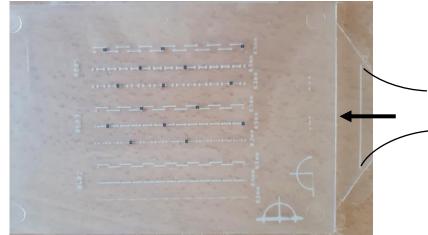
- Laboratory-scale injection molding of PLA
 - Injection mold: 2 mm-thick plate, side injection point
 - Polymer melt temperature: 210°C
- PLA1 screen printed films overmolded with PLA2



• Injection mold at room temperature

Screw speed: 60 mm/s

ME603 with SMDs



Conductive ink only washed out close to nozzle where melt is the hottest

DE LYON

➢No wash-out, SMDs perfectly in place in plate mold area



Comparison of PLA with PC



PLA		PC		
Advantages	Advantages Drawbacks		Drawbacks	
Biosourced and biodegradable	Low impact resistance	Great impact resistance		
Very high rigidity	Brittle	Excellent thermal stability	During injection molding, possible wash-out of conductive paths and SMDs on substrate	
Great chemical reactivity (–OH end groups)	Poor temperature performances of sheets (quick falling down)	up to 140°C		
Good enough thermomechanically	Wash-out being investigated*	Screen printing inks specifically designed for IME on PC		

*Possibly less problematic than PC because of lower injection temperature for PLA...

Future work

- SMDs glued on circuit
 - Conductive paste
 - Choice of dielectric structural paste
 - Quantitative adhesion strength tests

- 3D shaping: ongoing development of an injection mold
- Integration of the electronic functions
 - Improving the ink performances with photonic curing?
 - Replacing the conductive paste with solder paste by photonic soldering?
