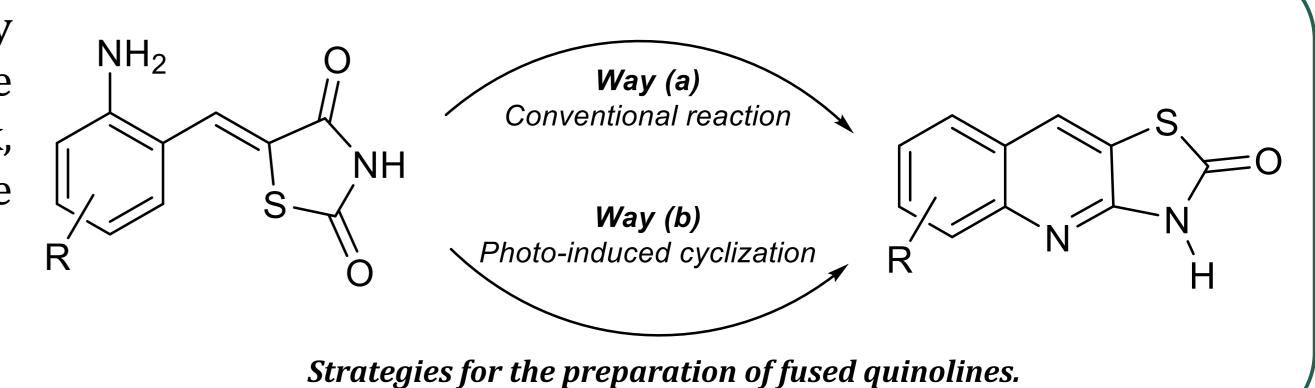

Introduction

Quinoline structure are interesting as they are present in a large variety of biologically active compounds,¹ thus their synthesis have received a large attention. Many methods are employed to prepare these moieties but they often need hard conditions.^{2,3,4} In this work, we focused our attention on a short and efficient synthesis of fused quinolines. We envisioned two strategies:

* one with classical conditions,

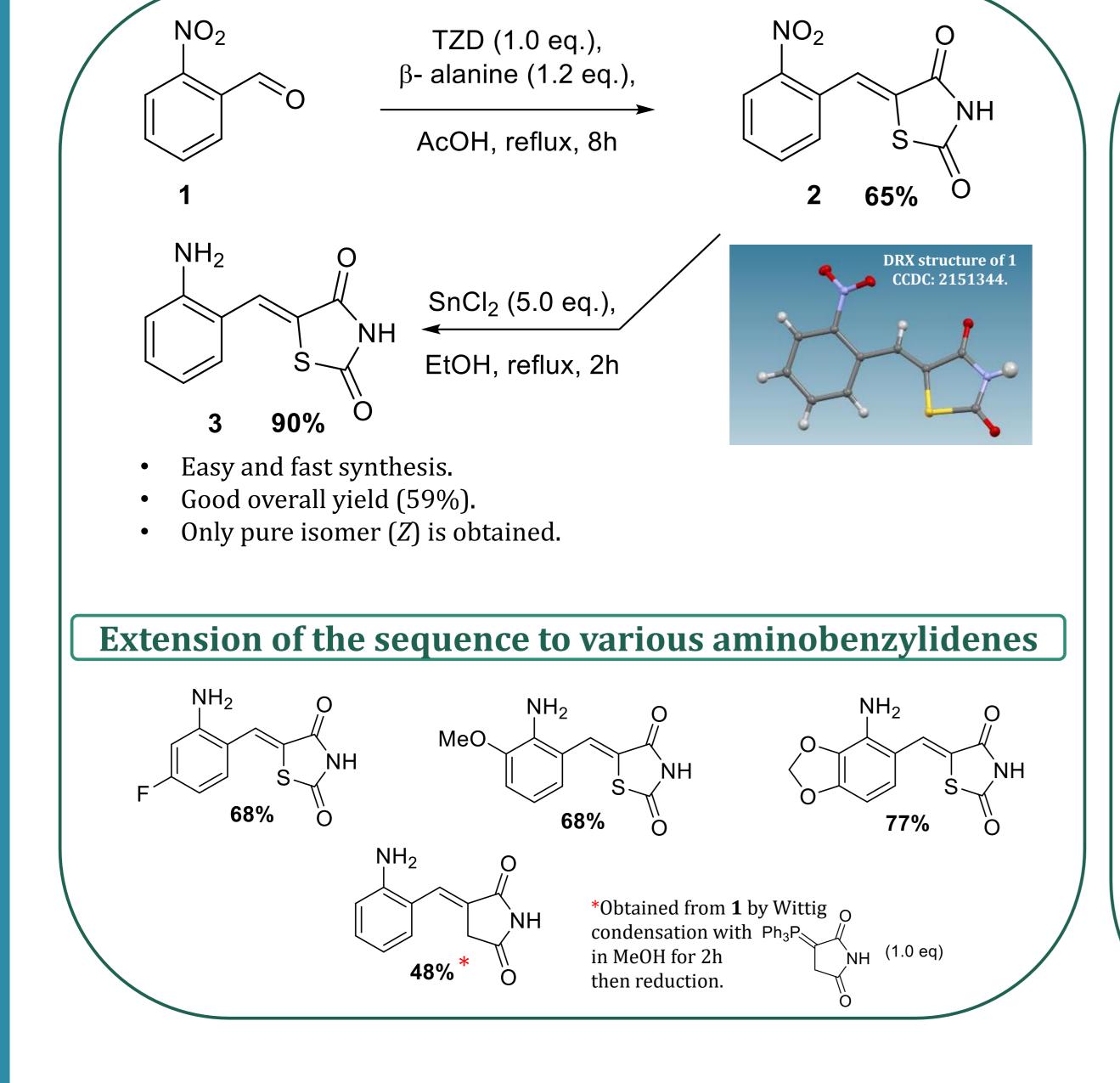
* a more original one, based on photo-induction.

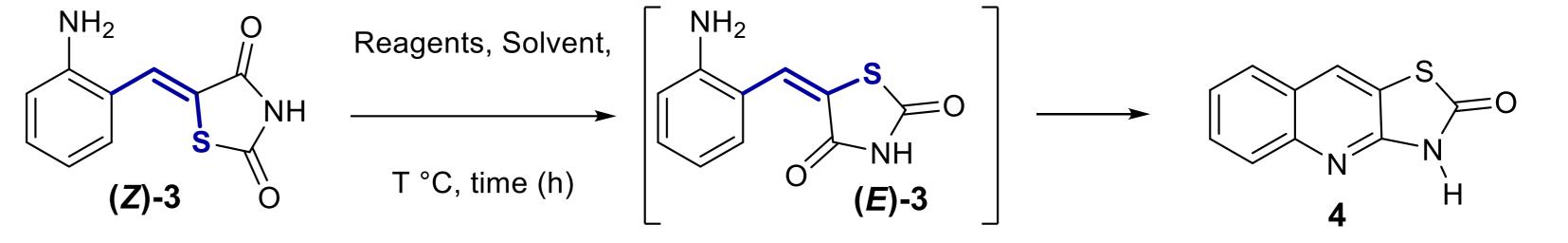




The preparation of quinoline **4** depends on the isomerization of the double bond.

Classical way

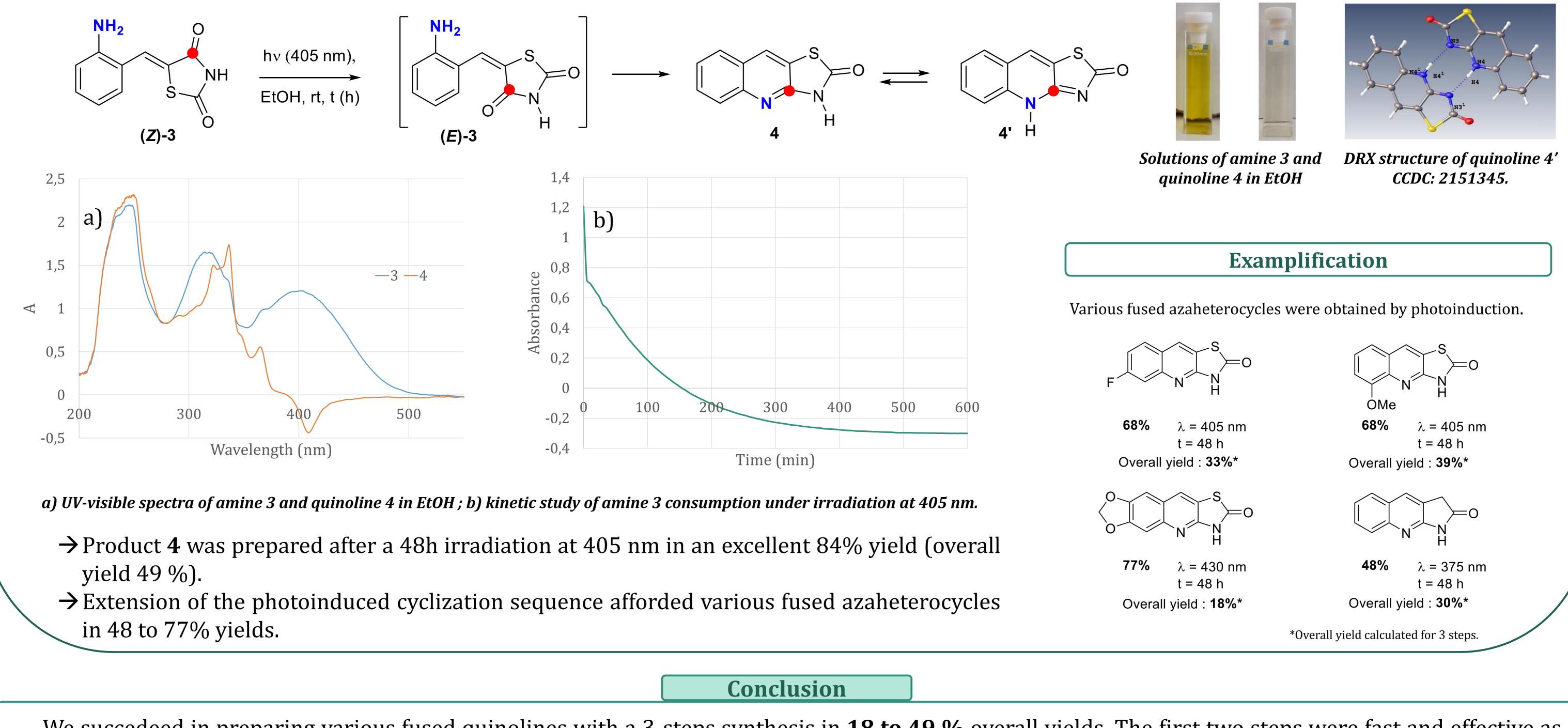

Photochemistry way

The nuclophilic attack of the amine moiety on a carbonyl group depends on the double bond configuration: an inversion is necessary to obtain the fused quinoline. As a consequence of the latter results (acetone, r.t., 2 months), we investigated the photo-induced isomerization of the double bond with light.^{5,6,7}



We succedeed in preparing various fused quinolines with a 3-steps synthesis in **18 to 49** % overall yields. The first two steps were fast and effective as we obtained amines **3** as pure products in very good yields (**23 to 62** %). The third step consisted in a photo-induced isomerization followed by a subsequent cyclization. This method is convenient, clean and really effective compared to classical ways.⁸
