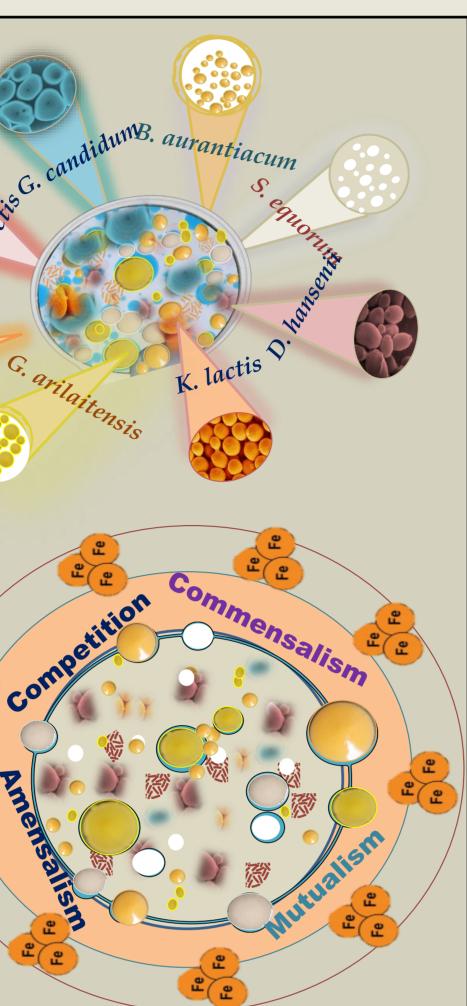
Microbial interactions are decisive factors in cheese quality and safety. Microorganisms require certain crucial nutrients for functioning, and iron is on top of the nutrients list. Iron is involved in various metabolic, physiological, and biochemical processes such as respiration, gene regulation, enzyme cofactor, DNA, fatty acids, and amino acids syntheses. However, cheese is a highly ironrestricted habitat (1.24mg/Kg) due to its very low iron quantity, presence of ironchelating proteins (lactoferrin), and low iron diffusion index. Consequently, iron competition is one of the mediators of microbe-microbe interactions in cheese rinds. It has been demonstrated that iron is a limiting factor for the growth of many surface ripening bacteria. Cheese ripening microorganisms have adapted One-way ANOVA depicts Glutamicibacter arilaitensis (p-value<0.05***) and strategies to combat the iron-restricted environment like the iron acquisition system. They produce **siderophores** (iron chelators with high Fe⁺³ affinity) under iron-starved conditions. Understanding iron's role in cheese ripening microbes is of utmost importance due to its crucial role in various mechanisms.

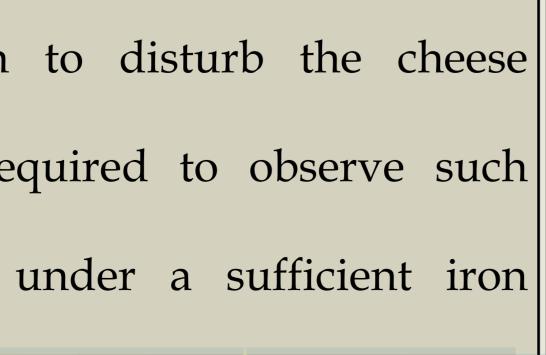

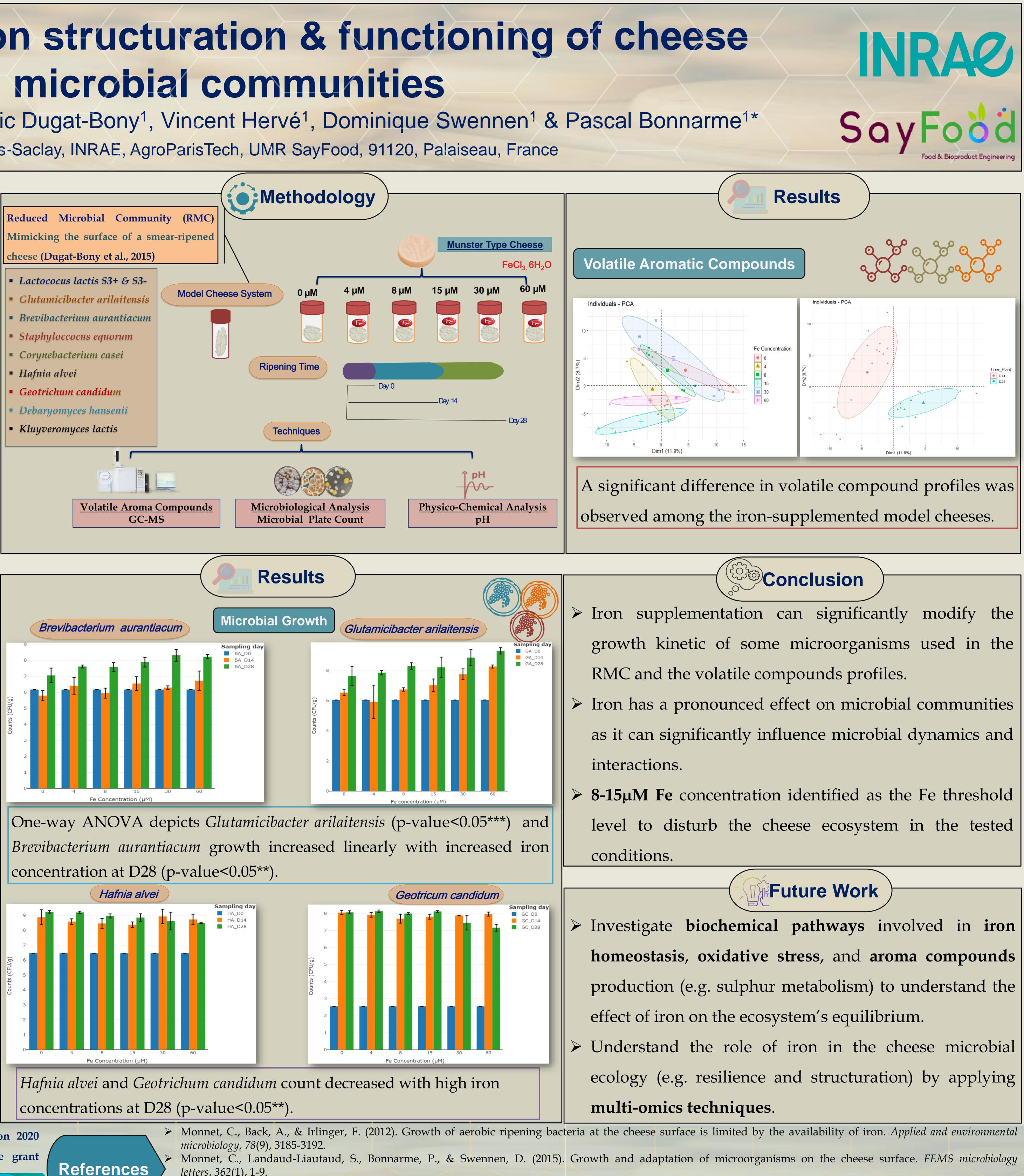
