# Pulsed DNP

1. DNP using CW  $\mu$ w irradiation has  $\mathcal{E} \sim \frac{1}{B_0^{n \ge 1}}$ 

#### 2. Pulsed DNP has constant *ɛ* (in theory)

can be as efficient as nuclear orientation via electron spin locking (NOVEL),<sup>8,9</sup> the gold standard DNP mechanism. Concurrently, the ISE requires much less microwave power than NOVEL,<sup>4</sup> making it a promising method for high field experiments.

## 9.4 T / 263 GHz Pulsed DNP @ ENS

- 1. Incorporate arbitrary waveform generator (AWG) into the CW source to make MW *pulses* : Change *widths*, *frequencies*, *phases*, and *amplitudes*  $\rightarrow$  Spin-locked e<sup>-</sup>
- 2. Similar design as NMR rf console (MHz  $\rightarrow$  GHz transition), high multiplication factor (x 24) introduces artefacts (harmonics & power)

## **Unwanted Spurs / Harmonics in MW Output**

filter for high-quality  $\mu w$ 

Spurious signals grow by  $20*\log(n)\sim 27$  dB (500x in power) after *n*=24 multiplication.

**Solutions**: Use IQ Modulation (quadrature), filters, amplification bandwidth, high LO/IF...

We <u>abandoned the IQ modulation</u> used by most groups (\$\$, 1-chn AWG; IQ imbalance / perfect 90° introduces artefact).

## **Customized MW Narrow Bandpass Filter**

Spurs /

Harmonics

 Specify the f<sub>center</sub> (~11 GHz) and bandwidth (~0.3 GHz) to company (*Sirius Microwave*, Estonia), costs ~400 €

2. Harmonics suppressed by > 40 dB, net: 40-27= 13 dB

Similar DNP field profile ensures proper AWG installation

Field- or frequency-modulation technique is not new DNP improves ~14 % with chirped pulses (unoptimized)

#### Application on Ultra Wideline Low-Gamma Nuclei (<sup>63</sup>Cu, <sup>91</sup>Zr, <sup>33</sup>S, etc)

- 1. Low-gamma nuclei usually have low sensitivity because of (i) large quadrupolar coupling (and/or CSA) (beyond MAS) (ii) low abundance and (iii) low gyromagnetic ratio
- 2. Examples: <sup>195</sup>Pt, <sup>35</sup>Cl, <sup>91</sup>Zr, <sup>63</sup>Cu, <sup>207</sup>Pb, <sup>33</sup>S, etc.., and they play important roles in functional materials (catalysts / gas adsorption / perovskites / batteries)
- 3. Enhance sensitivity with DNP or study dynamics with our unique setup

Most plastic components of the MAS assembly, including the gas inlet bushings (Fig. 1g), coil block (Fig. 1i), bottom plate (Fig. 1j), and fiber optic block (Fig. 1n) were 3D printed in-house using clear resin on a Formlabs (Somerville, MA) Form 3 printer at a resolution setting of 25 µm. The Form 3 printer was not capable of producing the drive caps (Fig. 1a) and drive plate (Fig. 1d)

However, quality varies with batches I want to make them in our own lab!

### **3D-Printed + Electroless Plating MW Waveguide**

1 m normal waveguide (steel) loses 75 % P<sub>mw</sub>

Corrugation minimizes ohmic losses till 1 %
