

CaVb1: The missing link from voltage sensing to muscle mass homeostasis

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CaVβ1: The missing link from voltage sensing to muscle mass homeostasis

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Deciphering the mechanisms governing skeletal muscle plasticity is essential for understanding pathophysiological processes, including age-related sarcopenia. Muscle activity reverses atrophy, but the connection between these processes is unknown. The voltage sensor CaV1.1 has a central role in excitationcontraction coupling, raising the possibility that it may also initiate the adaptive response to changes in muscle activity. Here, we reveal the existence of a transcription switch for the beta subunit of CaV1.1 (CaVβ1) that depends on the innervation state of the muscle. We show that denervation triggers the reexpression of a novel embryonic isoform, CaVB1E. CaVB1E boosts downstream GDF5 signaling to counteract muscle expresses significantly reduced levels of CaVB1E and that CaVB1E overexpression in aging muscle reduces sarcopenia by rescuing GDF5 expression. Crucially, we also identify human hCaVB1E and show a tight negative correlation between hCaVB1E expression and age-related sarcopenia in people, suggesting that the mechanisms underlying muscle mass homeostasis are conserved across species
