$$K_m(\varphi) = \int_0^{\varphi} \sqrt{1 - m \sin^2 \theta} d\theta.$$

# Model coupling the electrostatic potential and the distribution of ions

In  $\Omega$ :  $\rho_k$  is the concentration of ions of species k, of valence  $z_k$ ,  $\psi$  is the electrostatic potential, e is the charge of the proton,  $\varepsilon_s$  is the dielectric constant of the cell,  $k_b$  is the Boltzmann constant and T is the temperature:

$$\begin{cases} -\nabla_x \cdot \left( D_k \left( \nabla_x \rho_k + \frac{ez_k}{k_b T} \rho_k \nabla_x \psi \right) \right) = 0 \\ -\nabla_x \cdot \left( \varepsilon_s \nabla_x \psi \right) = e \sum_k z_k \rho_k \end{cases}$$

Inhomogeneous Dirichlet boundary condition for the potential on  $\partial\Omega$  and no flux condition for each species of ions.

Reduction to a 1D model:  $\Omega = [-L, L]$ . Boundary conditions

- for the potential:  $\psi(\pm L) = \pm \psi_D$
- for the concentration of ions:  $(\rho'_k + \frac{ez_k}{k_h T} \rho_k \psi')(\pm L) = 0.$

#### Reduction of the model to a single ODE

For ion concentrations  $\rho_k(x) = \rho_k(-L)e^{-\frac{ez_k}{k_bT}\psi(x)}$ . Electrostatic equation:

$$-\psi'' = \frac{e}{\varepsilon_s} \sum_k z_k \rho_k(-L) e^{-\frac{ez_k}{k_b T}\psi(x)}.$$

Notation  $\varphi(X) = \frac{e}{k_b T} \psi(XL)$ ,  $X \in [-1, 1]$ . Equation

$$-\varphi'' = \frac{e^2 L^2}{k_b T \varepsilon_s} \sum_k z_k \rho_k(-L) e^{-z_k \varphi}.$$

Number of ions of each species given

$$n_k = \int_{-L}^{L} \rho_k(-L) e^{-\frac{ez_k}{k_b T}\psi(x)} dx \Leftrightarrow \rho_k(-L) = \frac{n_k}{\int_{-L}^{L} e^{-\frac{ez_k}{k_b T}\psi(x)} dx}.$$

#### Reduction to a elliptic equation

Equation: 
$$-\varphi'' = \frac{e^2 L}{k_b T \varepsilon_s} \sum_k n_k z_k \frac{e^{-z_k \varphi}}{\int_{-1}^1 e^{-z_k \varphi(X)} dX}$$
. Boundary conditions  $\varphi(\pm 1) = \pm \varphi_D$ .

#### Lemma

This problem has a unique solution in  $H^1([-1,1])$ .

Proof: one observes that it is the Euler equation for  $J(\varphi) = \int_{-1}^{1} \frac{1}{2} [(\varphi'(X))^2 + \frac{e^2 L}{k_b T \varepsilon_s} \sum_k n_k \ln(\int_{-1}^{1} e^{-z_k \varphi(X)} dX)] dX.$ 

$$\frac{1}{2}(\varphi')^2 - \frac{1}{2}(\varphi'(X_0))^2 = \frac{e^2L}{k_b T \varepsilon_s} \sum_k n_k \frac{e^{-z_k \varphi} - e^{-z_k \varphi(X_0)}}{\int_{-1}^1 e^{-z_k \varphi(X)} dX}.$$
 (1)

 $f(X) = e^{-\varphi(X)}$  yields  $(f')^2 = (\varphi')^2 f^2 \Rightarrow (f')^2 = R(f)$ , where R is a rational fraction  $\Rightarrow$  elliptic equation.

#### First application: the electroneutral case for two species of

ions  $z_k = \pm 1$ 

Notation  $n_{+} = n_{-} = n$  and introduce  $\alpha = \frac{e^{2}Ln}{k_{b}T\varepsilon_{s}}$ . Equation  $-\varphi'' = \alpha [\frac{e^{-\varphi}}{\int_{-1}^{1} e^{-\varphi(X)}dX} - \frac{e^{\varphi}}{\int_{-1}^{1} e^{\varphi(X)}dX}].$ 

One proves  $\varphi$  odd. Thanks to  $\int_{-1}^1 e^{-\varphi(X)} dX = \int_{-1}^1 e^{\varphi(X)} dX = 2 \int_0^1 e^{-\varphi(X)} dX$ , reduce the equation on (0,1) to

$$(f')^2 = 2f^2 \alpha \frac{f + f^{-1} - 2K}{\int_{-1}^1 e^{-\varphi(X)} dX} = \beta f(f^2 - 2Kf + 1),$$
  
$$\beta = \frac{2\alpha}{\int_{-1}^1 e^{-\varphi(X)} dX}, K = 1 - \frac{(\varphi'(0))^2}{2\beta} < 1, f(0) = 1, f(1) = e^{-\varphi_D}$$

$$\int_{1}^{e^{-\varphi(X)}} \frac{df}{\sqrt{f(f^2 - 2Kf + 1)}} = \sqrt{\beta}X.$$
 (2)

Equations for determining  $\beta$  and K:  $\int_{1}^{e^{-\varphi_D}} \frac{df}{\sqrt{f(f^2 - 2Kf + 1)}} = \sqrt{\beta}, \int_{1}^{e^{-\varphi_D}} \frac{fdf}{\sqrt{f(f^2 - 2Kf + 1)}} = \frac{\alpha}{\sqrt{\beta}}.$ 

#### Expression of the solution

Case K < -1. Polynomial  $f(f+q)(f+\frac{1}{q})$ , q > 1. New unknown  $\sin^2 \varphi = \frac{e^{-\varphi(X)}}{e^{-\varphi(X)}+\frac{1}{q}}$ , new variable  $\sin^2 \theta = \frac{f}{f+\frac{1}{q}} = 1 - \frac{1}{q} \frac{1}{f+\frac{1}{q}}$ ,  $2\sin \theta \cos \theta d\theta = \frac{1}{q} \frac{df}{(f+\frac{1}{q})^2}$ ,  $\cos^2 \theta = \frac{1}{q} \frac{1}{(f+\frac{1}{q})^2}$ ,

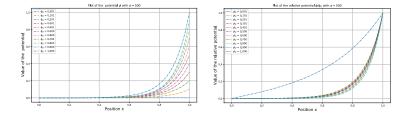
$$f(f+q)(f+\frac{1}{q}) = \frac{1}{q^2} \frac{\sin^2 \theta}{\cos^6 \theta} (q + (\frac{1}{q} - q) \sin^2 \theta).$$

With  $m = 1 - \frac{1}{q^2}$ 

$$\frac{df}{\sqrt{f(f+q)(f+\frac{1}{q})}} = \frac{2}{\sqrt{q}}\frac{d\theta}{\sqrt{1-m\sin^2\theta}},$$

$$F_m(\arcsin\sqrt{\frac{e^{-\varphi(X)}}{e^{-\varphi(X)} + \frac{1}{q}}}) - F_m(\arcsin\sqrt{\frac{1}{1 + \frac{1}{q}}}) = \sqrt{\beta}X \quad (3)$$

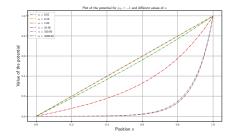

# Second application: the non electroneutral case for two species of ions $z_k = \pm 1$

With  $\varphi_D = 0$ ,  $n_+ \neq n_-$ , one proves that the function  $\varphi$  is even, has its maximum (or its minimum) at X = 0 according to the sign of  $n_+ - n_-$ . Equation  $(f_0 = e^{-\varphi(0)} := e^{-\varphi_0})$  $(f')^2 = 2\alpha f^2 [\beta_-(\frac{1}{f} - \frac{1}{f_0}) + \beta_+(f - f_0)],$ with  $\beta_- = \frac{n_-}{\int_{-1}^1 f(X) dX}, \beta_+ = \frac{n_+}{\int_{-1}^1 f^{-1}(X) dX}$ . Need three equations fo  $f_0, \beta_-, \beta_+$ . Introduce  $f_1 = \frac{\beta_+}{\beta_- f_0}$ . Equation  $(f')^2 = 2\alpha \beta_+ f_0^{-1} f(f - f_0)(f - f_1) = K^2 f(f - f_0)(f - f_1).$ Two cases:  $f_1 < f_0$  ( $f_0$  is the point of minimum of f) or  $f_1 > f_0$  ( $f_0$  is the point of maximum of f).

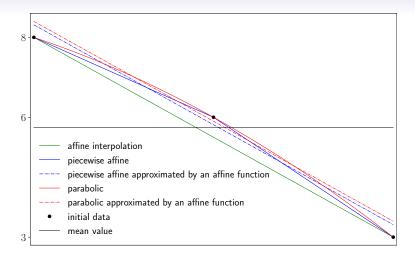
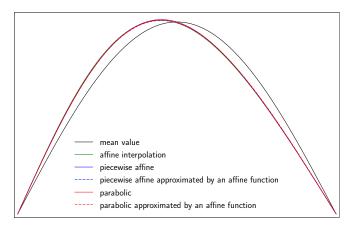


Figure: Function  $h \mapsto \Sigma(h)$ .

## Why does one need analytic formulae?

- Quick and accurate calculations and graphical representation thanks to the presence of the special functions in packages.
- In the study of the potential inside a cell: link with models of exchanges of ions: dependency in terms of L and of  $\varphi_D$  or of number of ions.
- Uncertainty and sensitivity analysis (one has a dependency on parameters, n and L in the case of the first problem,  $n_-, n_+, L$  in the case of the second problem, given values of  $D(h), \Sigma_a(h), \Sigma_f(h)$  in the third problem)
