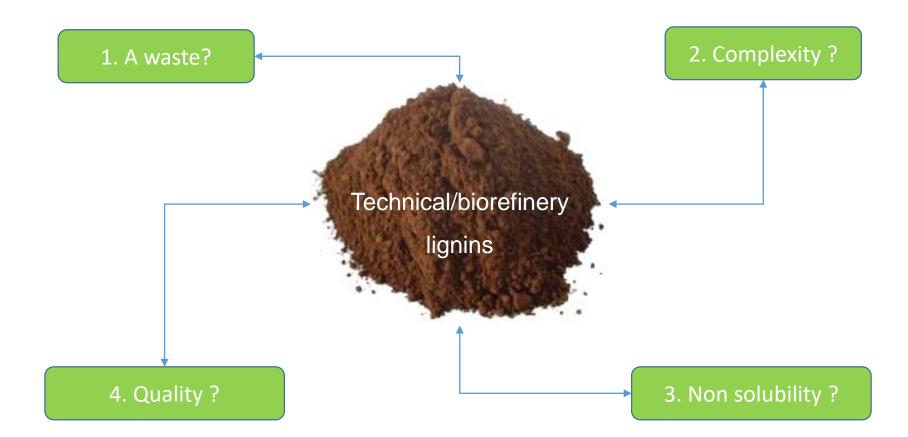

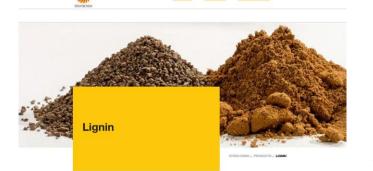

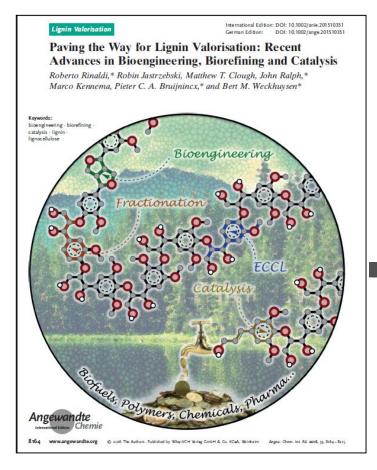

Techno-economic, environment, and socio-economic studies

- Review (Wengel et al. 2020)
 - Lignin a key to commercial success on pulp production: energy supply + value-added products from the surplus
 - Possibility to reduce the carbon footprint of 2G bioethanol production by using the lignin rich residues in materials: e.g. –82 g CO2e/MJ of ethanol (composite filler; *Pourhashem & Bajwa, 2018*)
 - Barriers to large-scale commercialization: availability (quantity and quality), infrastructure cost of innovation
 - Limited markets (heat and power, vanillin, lignosulphonates, niche markets)

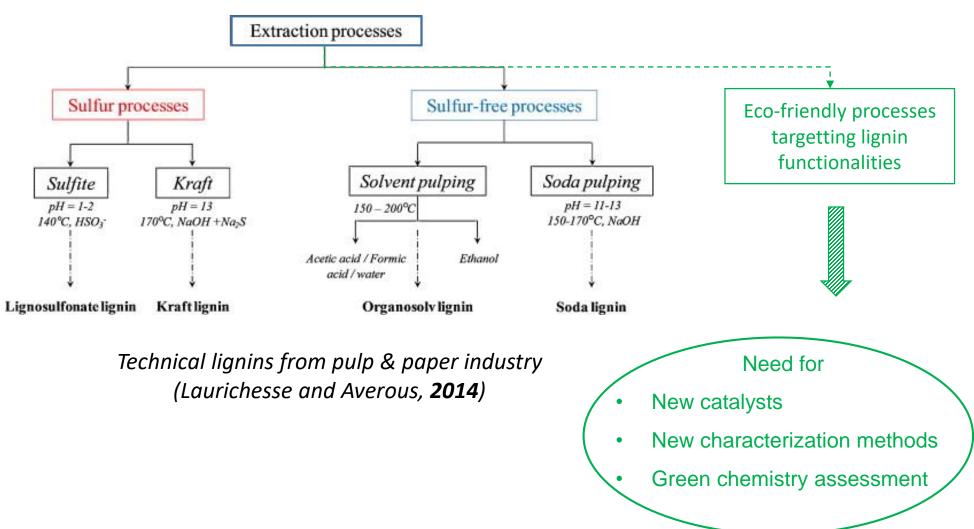

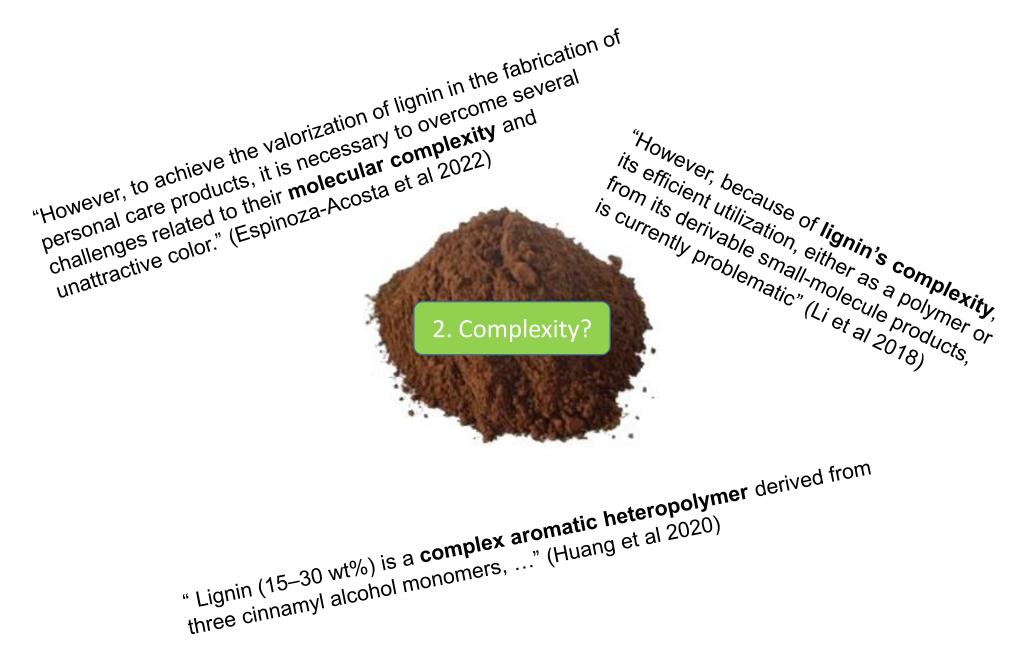

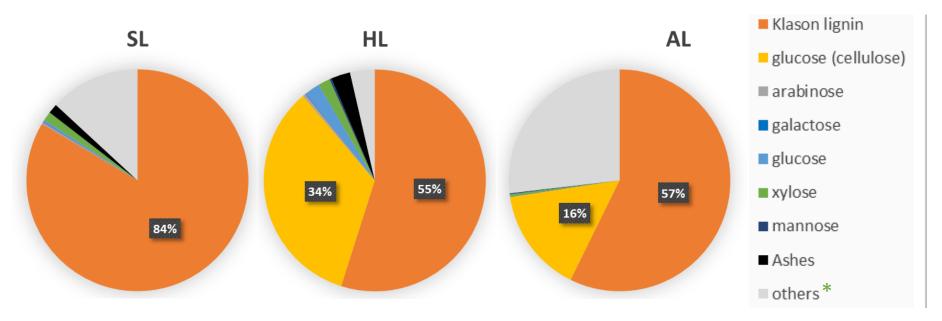
New generation of processes





Mixture of compounds of different chemical nature

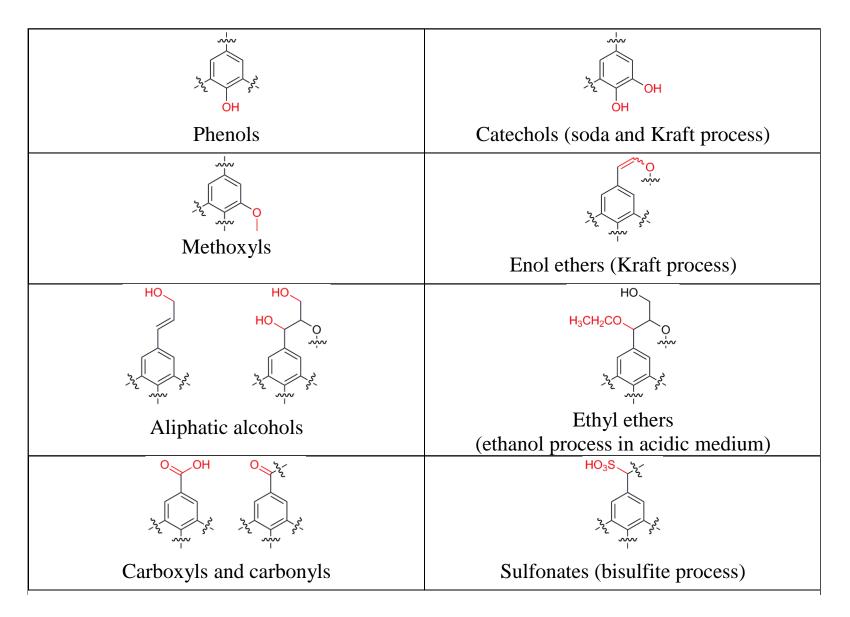
- Composition of 3 types of biorefinery lignins (Zelcor project)
 - SL=grass soda lignin (Protobind 1000, Green value LLC)
 - HL=wheat straw hydrolysis lignin from bioethanol production
 - AL= softwood acidic lignin (Dawn technology)



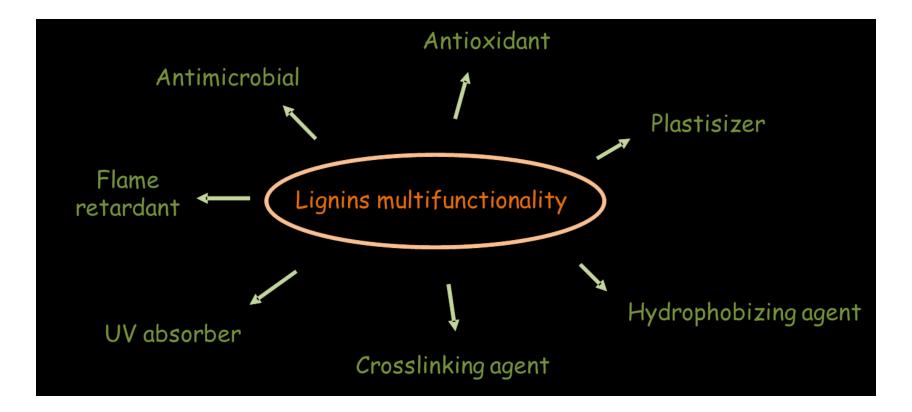
* acid soluble lignin, uronic acids, extractives, proteins

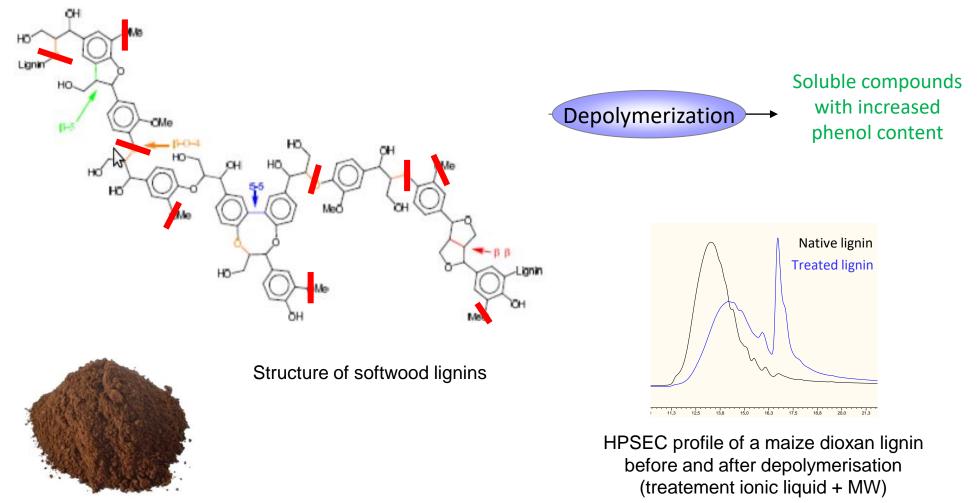


Advantage: multifunctionality and tunability

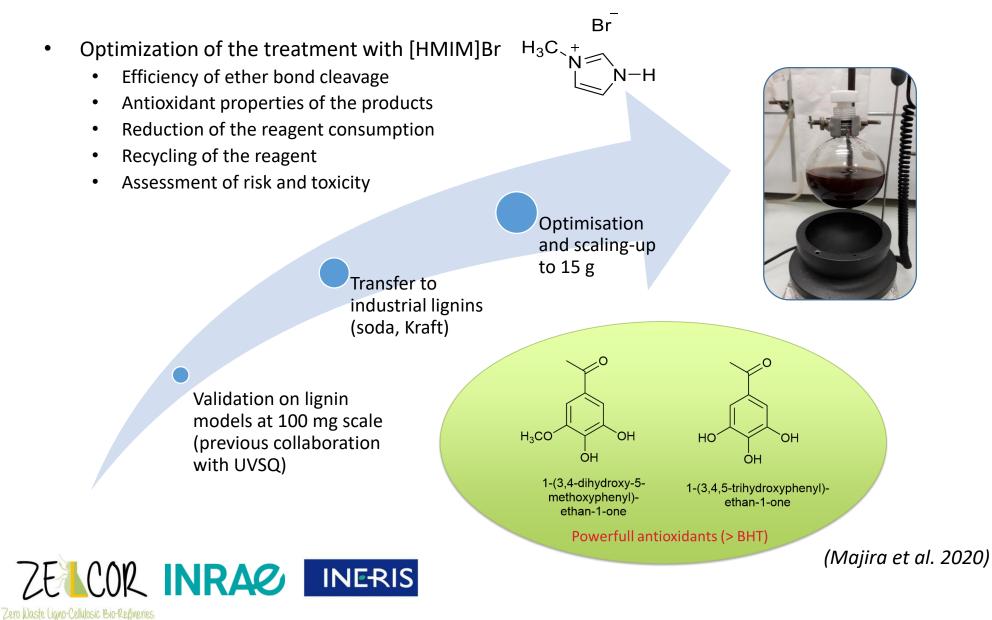


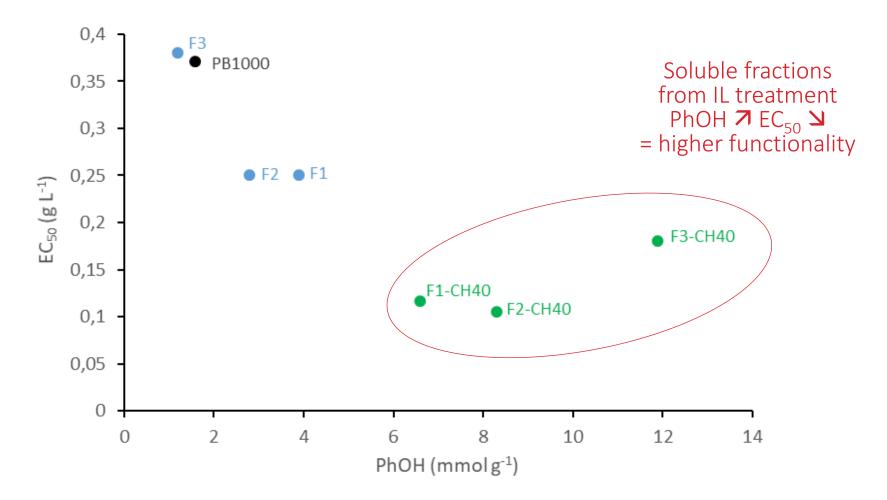
Distribution of C-C and β -O-4 linkages

Example of the development of a depolymerisation process

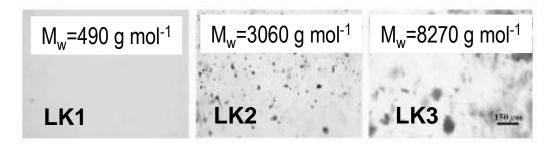




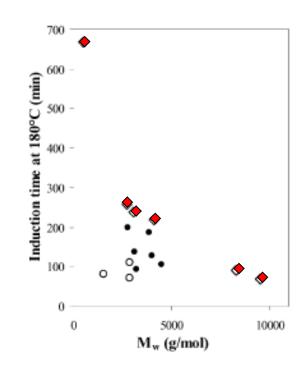

Molecular heterogeneity related to molar mass distribution

- ⇒ Advantage for uses as additives in thermoplastics:
 - ⇒ LMW compounds: miscible with the matrix, confer antioxidant, antimicrobial and insect repelent properties (ex. soda lignin extract; Vachon et al., 2020)
 - ⇒ HMW compouds: role of filler, mechanical reinforcement

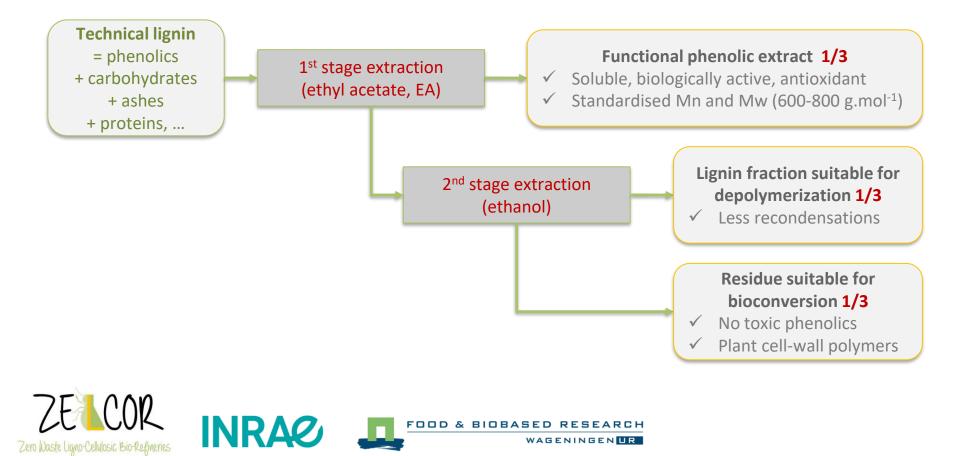


Micrographs of PP matrix containing distinct fractions of Kraft lignins (Pouteau et al., 2004)



Oxidation induction time of the material as a function of KL fractions Mw (Pouteau et al., 2003)

- ⇒ Possibility to settle a cascading process
- Combined solvent extraction depolymerization bioconversion





Some lignins are already soluble

- Lignosulfonates: 100% soluble in water
 - ⇒ Application in various colloidal systems (waste water treatments, drilling mud, binder in composites)
 - ⇒ Substrate for aqueous-medium chemistry
 - ex. substitution of a phenol-formaldehyde resins by lignosulfonatecarbonyle compound systems (Allais et al, 2019 – Patent Fr3032197)
- Organosolv, soda and Kraft lignins : 80-100% soluble in organic solvents (aqueous ethanol, acetone and dioxan, DMF, THF ...) and dispersible in water as colloidal particles

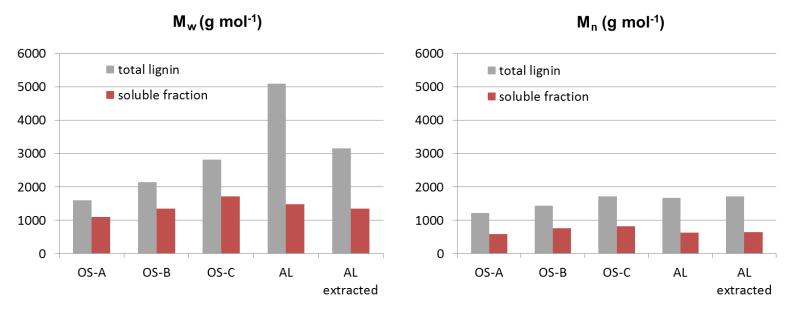


Potential application in waste water treatement (virus removal)

Advantage of partial solubility

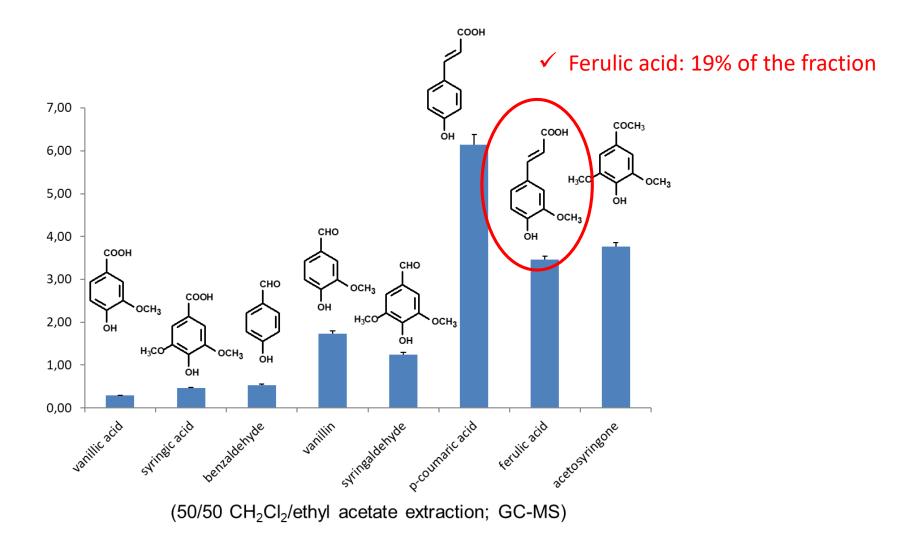
 Possibility to fractionate and obtained standardized fractions and/or to enrich in compounds of interest

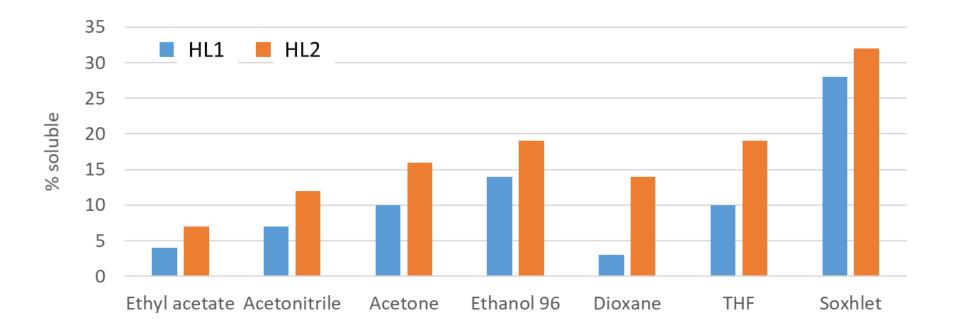
Composition of the phenolic monomer fraction of a soda lignin extract (mg.g⁻¹)





Low solubility of hydrolysis lignins

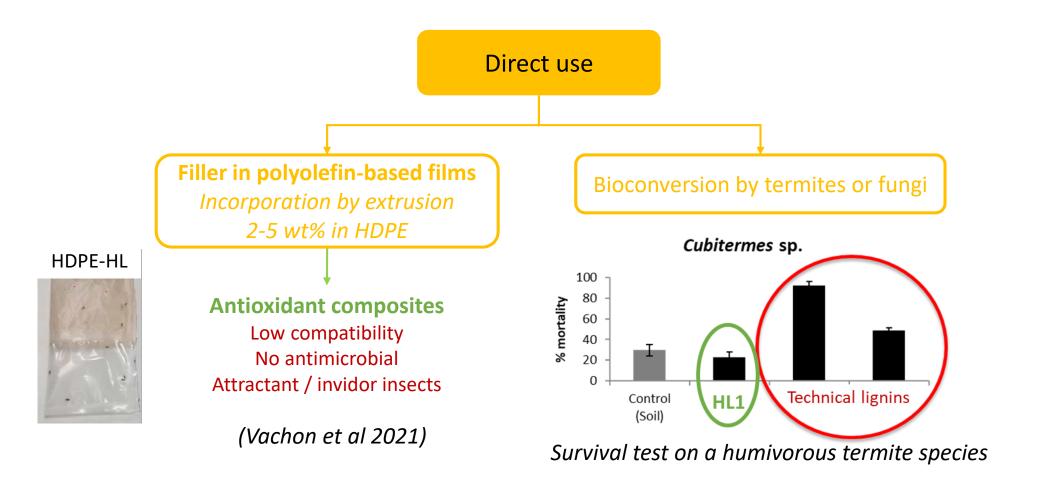

⇒Need for specific valorization strategies



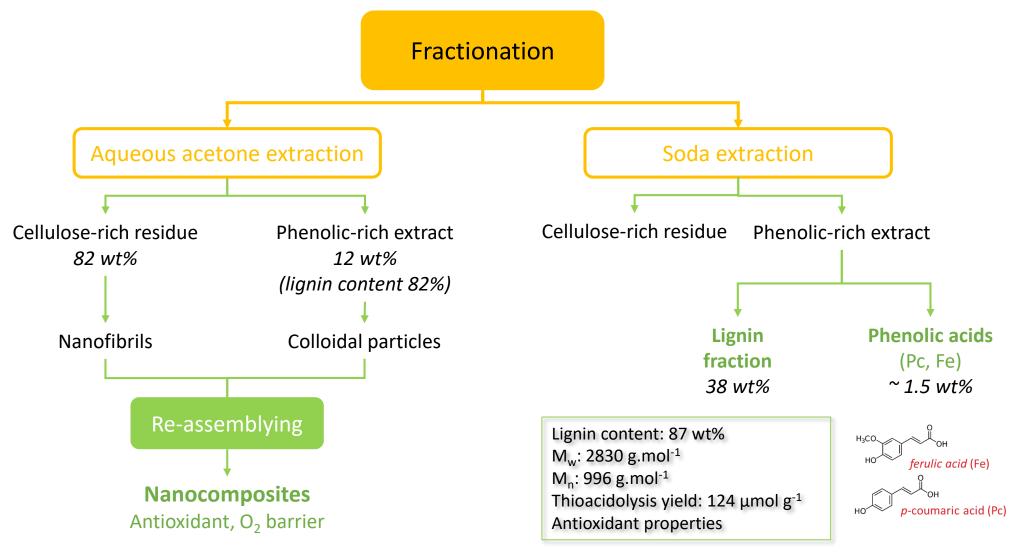
Bioethanol production residue – Valorization routes

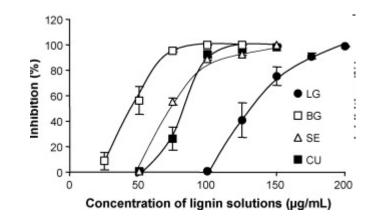
What is a lignin of « good quality » ?

- Lignin with expected functionnal properties ?
 - Ex. antioxidant properties

High proportion of hindered phenol groups \Leftrightarrow radical stabilisation by resonance

 \Rightarrow grass soda lignins

Antioxidant activity of lignins assessed through the inhibitory effect on human erythrocytes hemolysis (*Vinardell et al. 2008*)

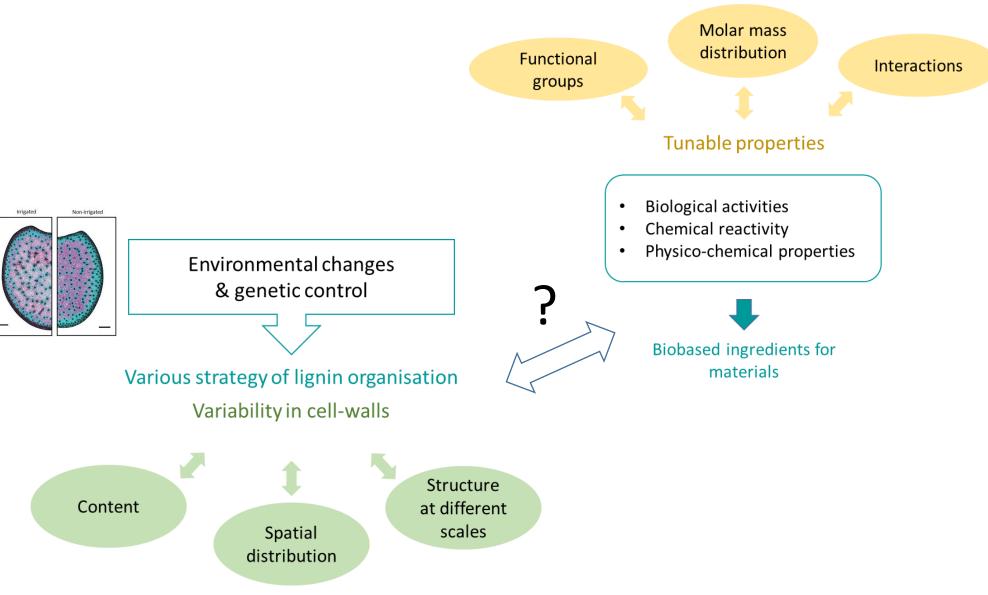
What is a lignin of « good quality » ?

- Lignin with high purity ?
 - Low carbohydrate content / Low sulfur content / No toxic compounds ?
 - organosolv lignins (e.g. ethanol/water): well suited for cosmetic applications
 Hair fixer based on 5-10% wt. organosolv lignin or derivatives (Lang et al 1992; Patent)
 Anti UV cream formulated with 0.5-5% wt. organosolv hazelnut lignin (Gordobil et al 2020)
 - ⇒ Organosolv and Kraft lignins adapted to carbon fiber synthesis (Dakla et al 2002)
 - Lignin with high depolymerisation potential?
 - High proportion of units only linked through β -O-4 bonds
 - Low recondensation propension

⇒ new isolation processes preserving or targeting lignin nativ polymer structure

= « lignin-first approach »

Future research: from plant to functional biomolecules



Challenges

- Development of methods to analyse lignin at different structuration levels and in different media (ex. analysis of oligomers; analysis in ionic liquids or deep eutectic solvents; analysis of non-soluble fractions ...)
- Need for high-throughput selective deconstruction methods allowing analysis of lignin functionalities
- Settlement of new value chains exploiting lignin structure ↔ limiting factor: up-scaling of fractionation/extraction processes
- Combination with the production of bioenergy production to ensure the sustainability of the biorefineries

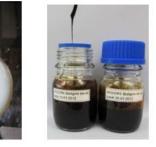
Lignins remains a valuable source of bioenergy

- Direct combustion of black liquors (> 98%) ⇒ heat and power
- Biogaz and bioethanol production by fermentation of spent sulfite liquors
- Other potential routes for bioenergy
 - Lignin catalytic depolymerization into specific aromatics ⇒ additives for fuels
 - Thermo-chemical conversion
 - ⇒ Syngaz
 - ⇒ Pyrolysis products + combined heat and power

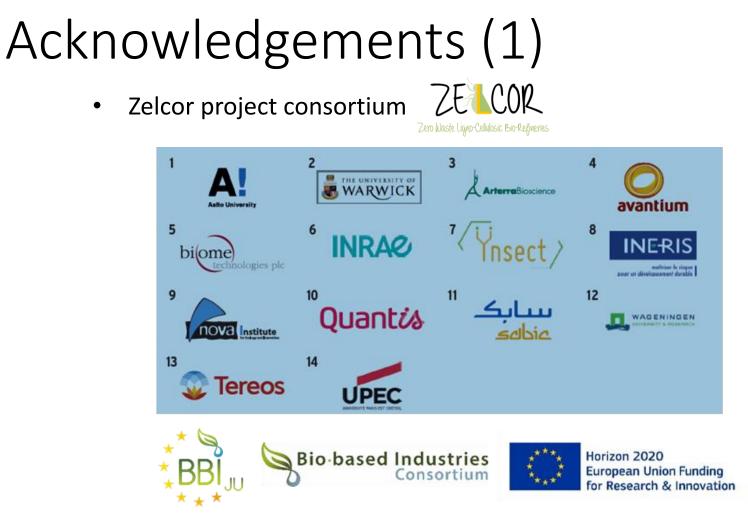
Lignin biochar
