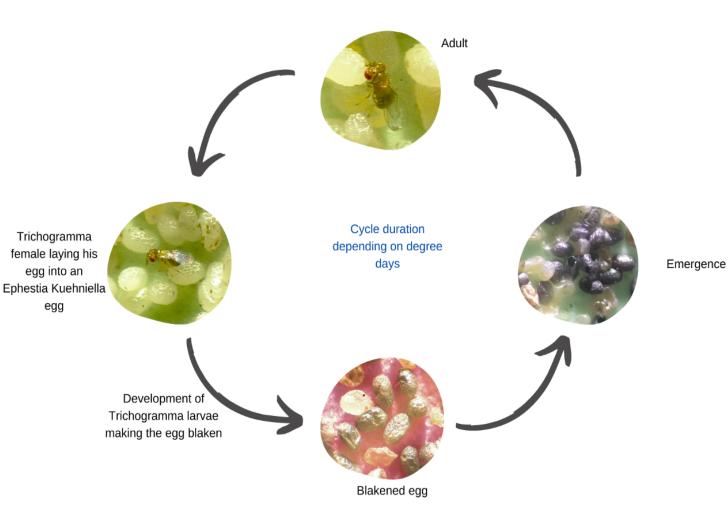
- You've probably all eaten popcorn before, right?
- Before being a sweet treat, it is a corn kernel that clings to its cob.

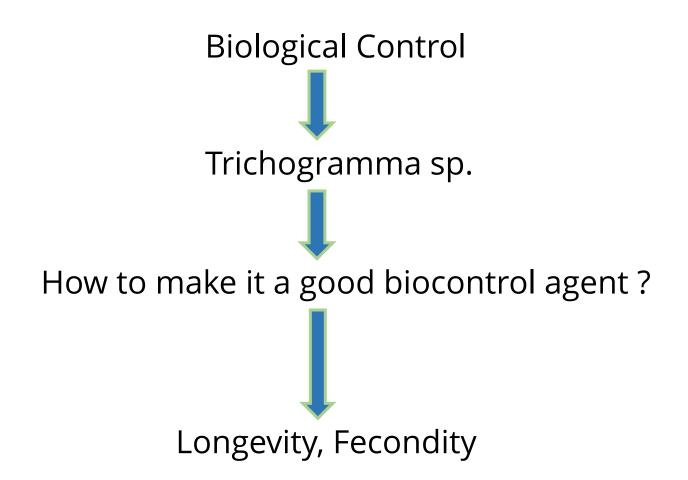


- A crop that can be threatened by pest attacks! Like the European Corn Borer *O. nubilalis*
- A clean, sustainable, environmentally and human friendly protection: biocontrol! → the use of natural enemies (whether introduced or otherwise manipulated) to control insect pests (Smith 1996)
- Famous natural enemy, one of the most used: Trichogramma sp.!

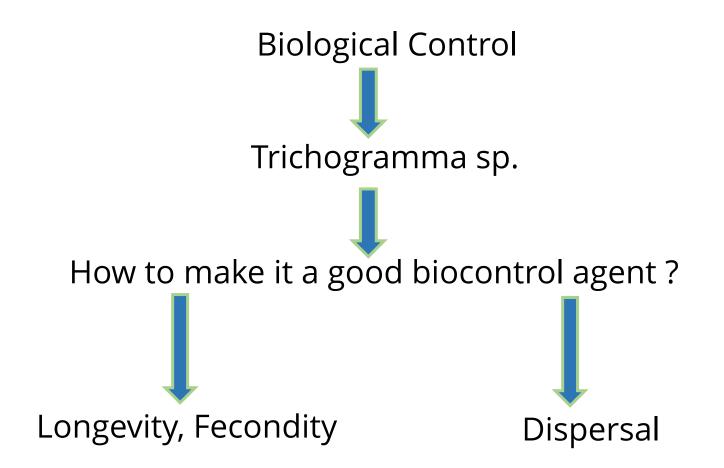
#### Presentation of Trichogramma sp.

- Oophagous parasitoids
- Hymenoptera less than 0.5mm.
- Ease of rearing on alternative hosts, wide geographical distribution interesting biocontrol agents.
- Walking insects
- Species studied: *Trichogramma* cacoeciae with 17 asexual strains from the CRB "Egg Parasitoids Collection" (CRB EP-Coll).

#### Dispersal, interest and definition

#### Why be interested in dispersal?

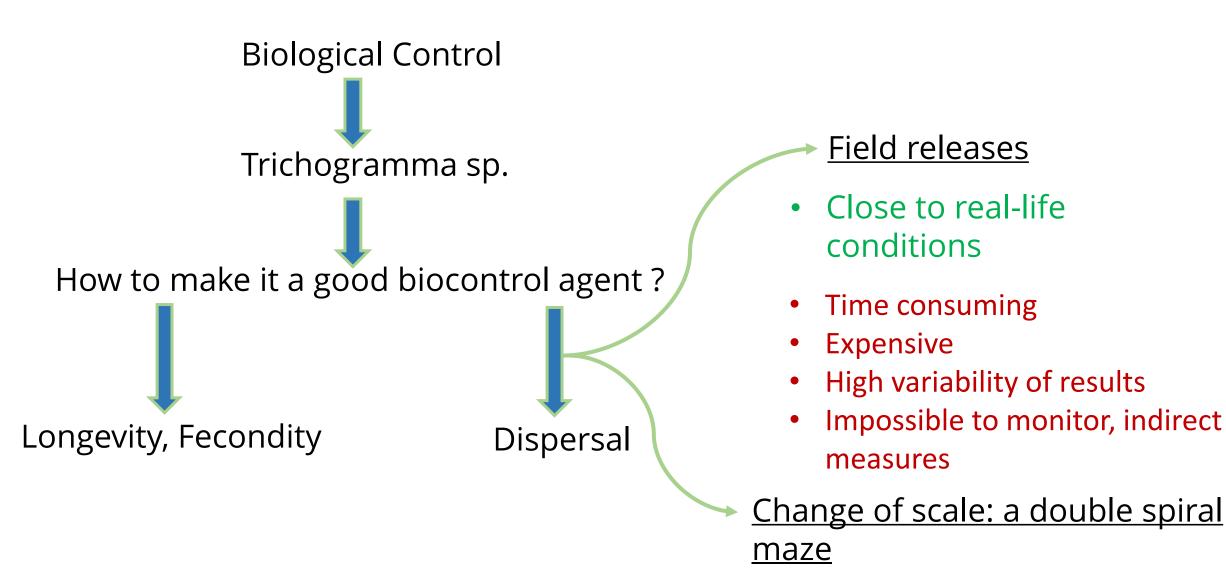
A key element of life history and fitness, affecting not only individual fitness, but also genetics and population dynamics, and ultimately species distribution.

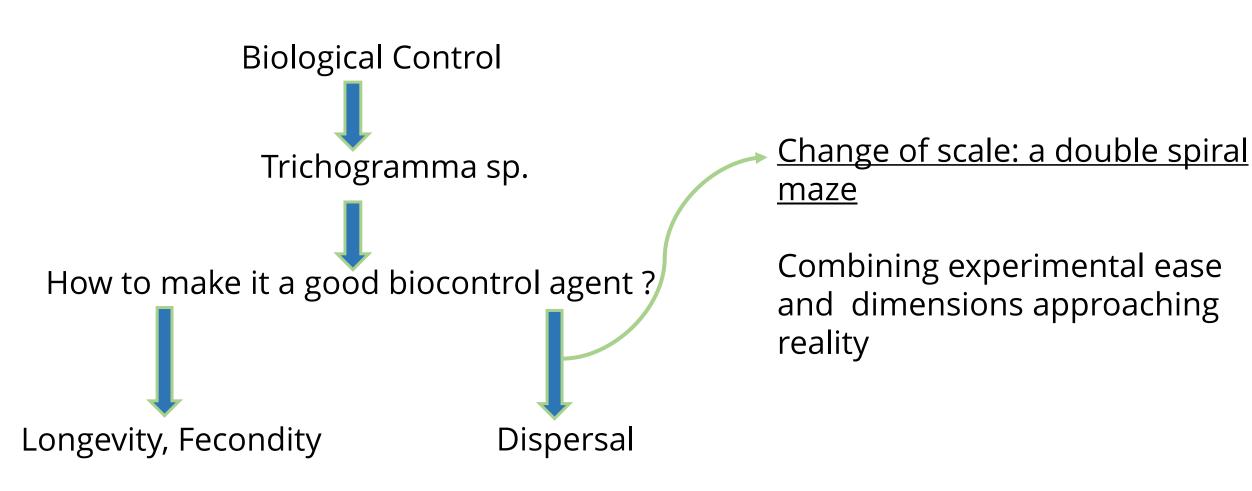
#### For biocontrol:

- Good distribution of the insects in the appropriate crops.
- Reducing the workload by reducing the number of release points per unit area.

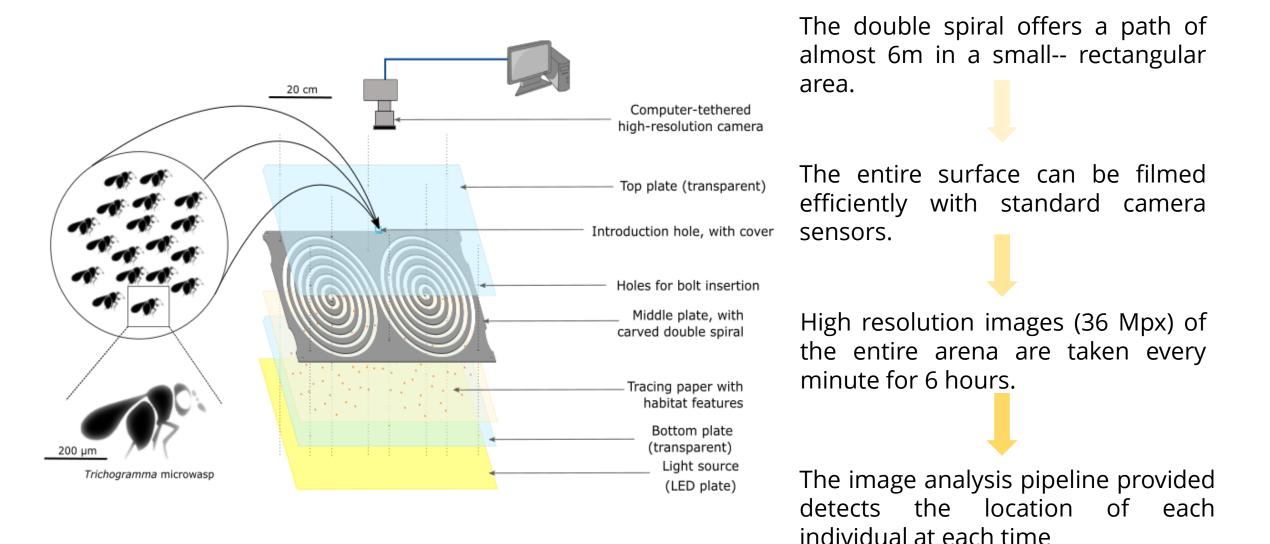
#### We address here the following **definition of dispersal**

The spatial spread of individuals (dispersal sensu lato), which can potentially have consequences on reproduction, and gene flow (dispersal sensu stricto).

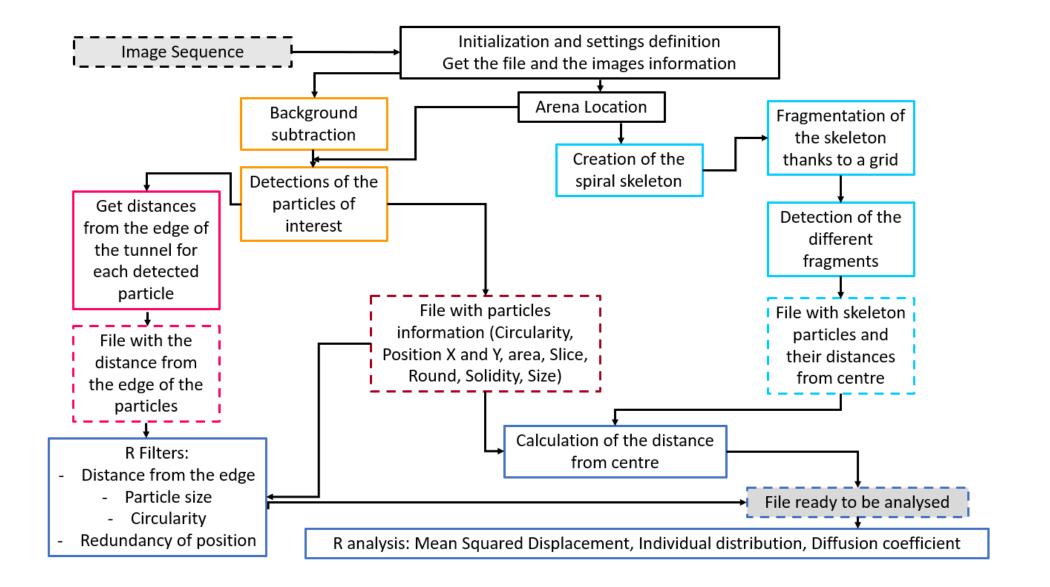




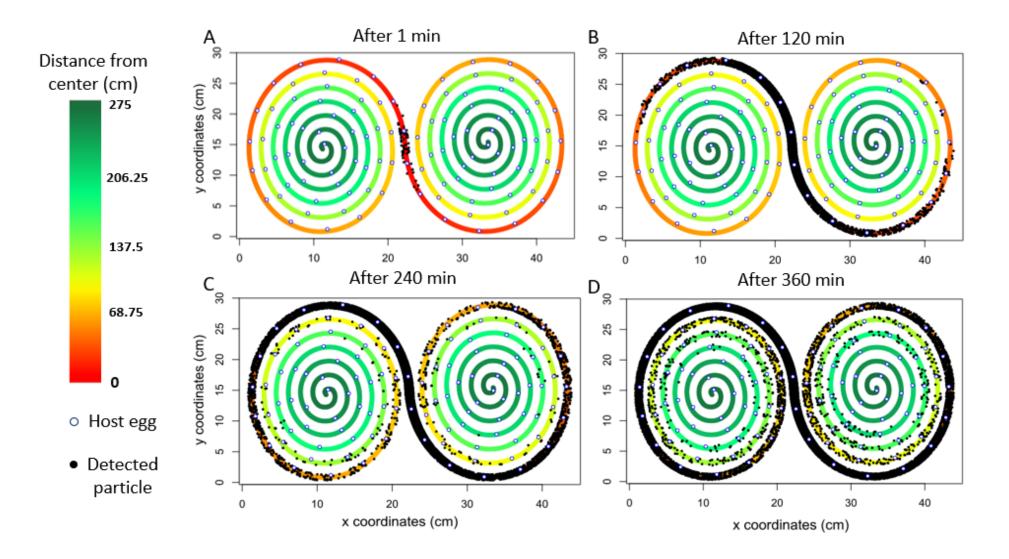
#### Presentation of the double spiral maze arena



Overview of how the automatic image analysis pipeline works



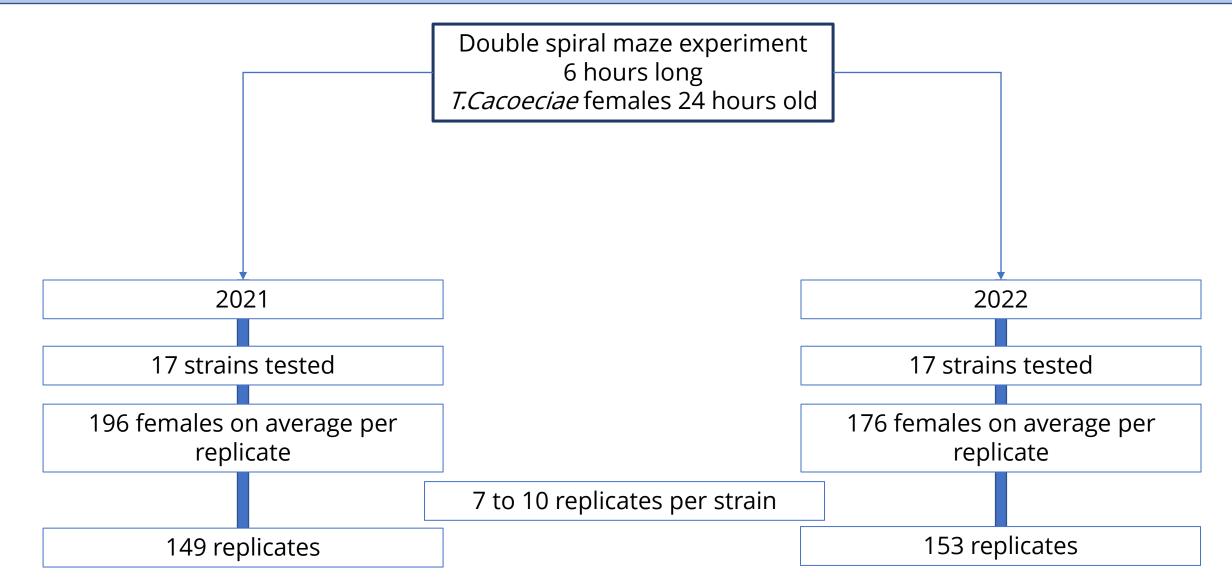
#### Detection of Trichogramma individuals at different times by the automatic pipeline

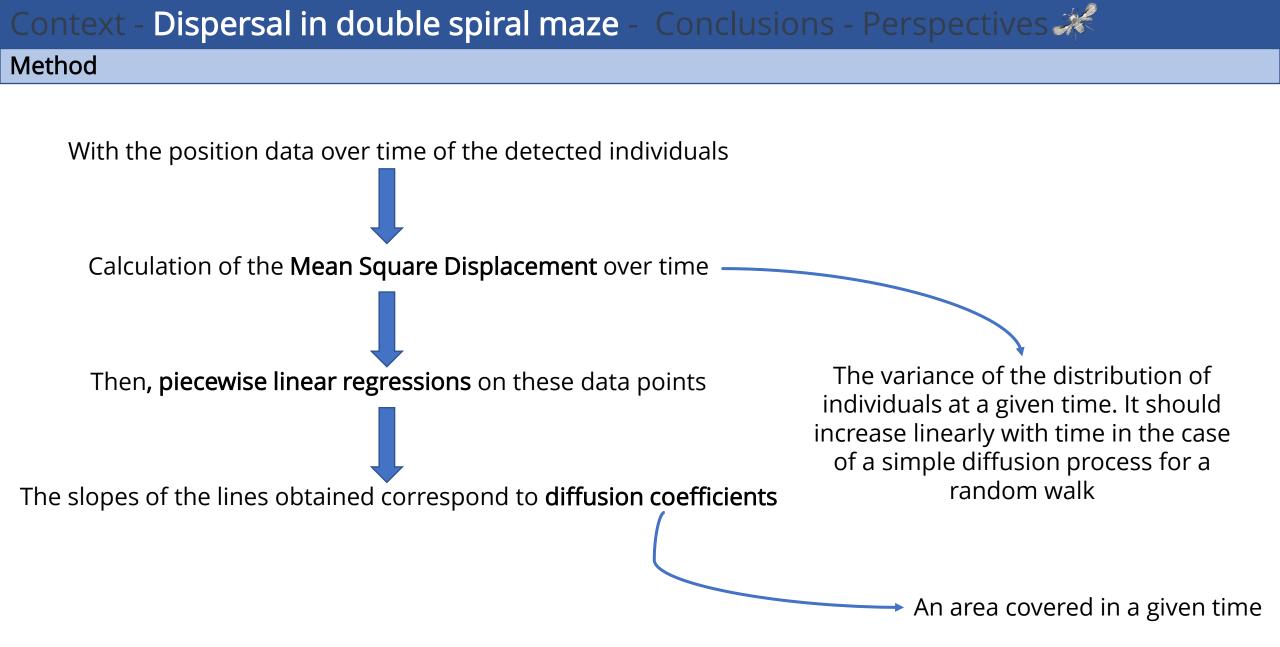


#### **Technical verification**

- Verification of the symmetry and the effect of the direction of rotation. The direction of rotation has no effect on the individual dispersion within the double spiral and the distributions are well symmetrical with respect to the release point.
- Quality of sealing. A variation of the labyrinth was designed with solid walls, or septa, along the double spiral tunnel, delimiting 39 zones. No leakage.
- Lighting. No systematic variation according to distance from the center, fluctuations around the average of more or less 14%.
- Overall detection rate of 72%. Somewhat variable between replicates, ranging from 68% to 78%, but stable over time and shows little variability along the double spiral path.

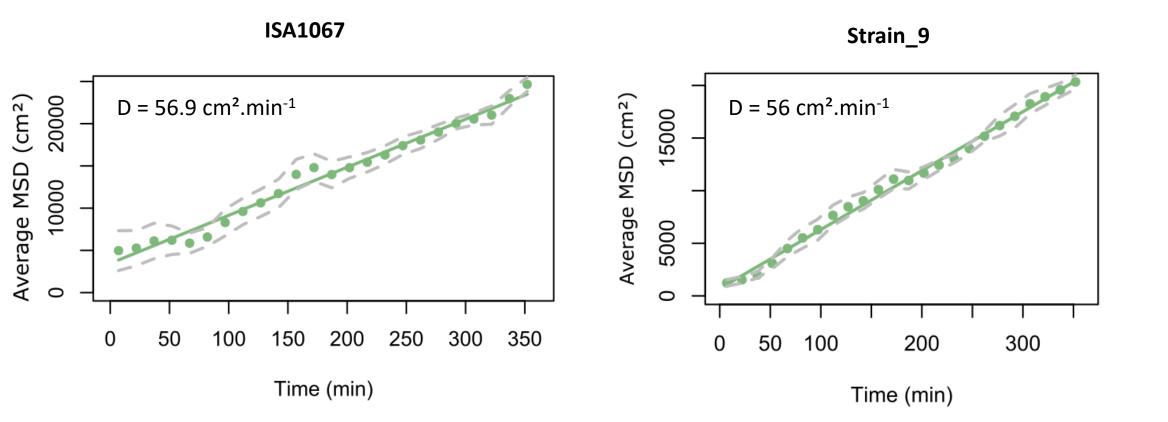

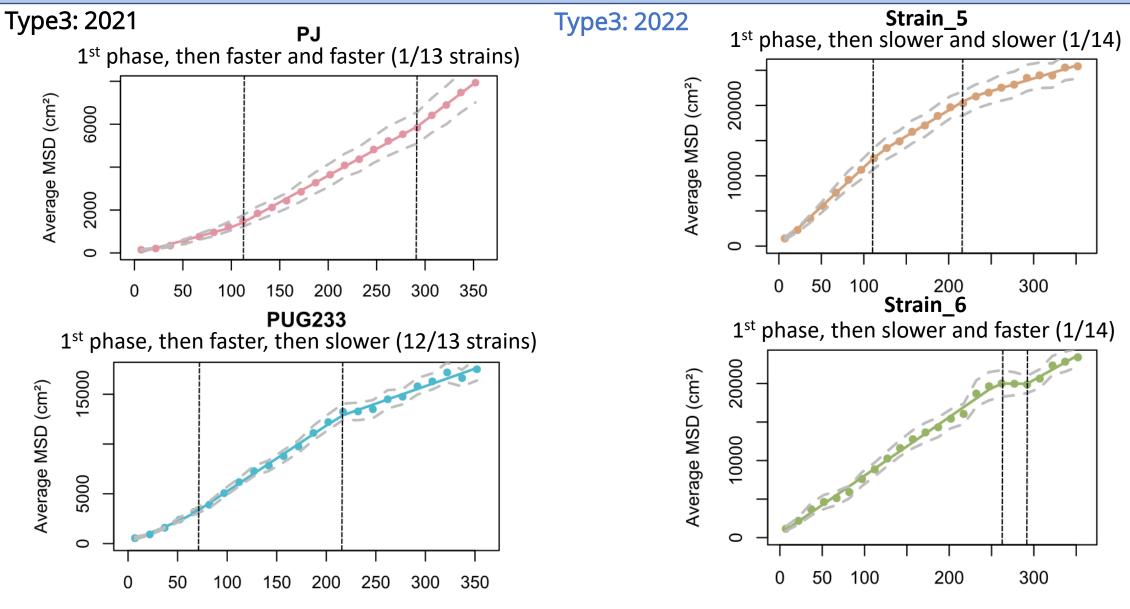

For both years, **3 types of dispersal** behaviour were identified, differentiated first by the number of phases that constitute them, then by the nature of these phases.

Type1 = Linear Type 2 = Two phases Type 3 = Three phases 2021 2021 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then faster, then slower (12/13 strains) Or 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then faster (2/3 strains) 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then faster and faster (1/13 strains) Or 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then slower (1/3 strains) 2022 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then faster, then slower (8/14 strains) Or 2022 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then faster and faster (1/14 strains) Or 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then slower (2/2 strains) 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then slower and slower (4/14) Or 1<sup>st</sup> phase, then slower and faster (1/14)

• It is for now difficult to relate these dispersal patterns to what is already known about the dispersal of Trichogramma sp., owing both to the novelty of our method, and the relative scarcity of quantitative data on Trichogramma dispersal.

 Ongoing work is seeking to correlate these dispersal patterns with (i) more traditional smaller-scale behavioral studies of dispersal, and (ii) larger scale field experiments.

 Ideal objective: highlight which dispersal profiles are most effective for biocontrol in realistic field conditions → the time-consuming and costly field evaluations of candidate biological control agents could benefit from a pre-screening using the double-spiral maze and/or small-scale studies.
