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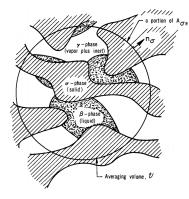

The porous medium system Introduction



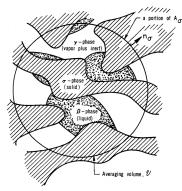
(not a) definition from [Bear, 1972]

- Multiple phases:
 - Solid phase = Matrix
 - One or more fluid phases fill the pore space
- Pore space is "relatively narrow" and matrix specific surface (S/V) is high

a lot of interfaces

 Interconnected pore space: fluids flow within pores

The porous medium system Description



- \triangleright Components: $i \in C$
- System parts: $k \in \mathcal{P} = \mathcal{P}^3 \cup \mathcal{P}^2 \cup \mathcal{P}^1$
 - $\circ \mathcal{P}^3$: matrix. fluids
 - $\circ \mathcal{P}^2$: interfaces
 - $\circ \mathcal{P}^1$: contact lines

- Extensive variables for each part
 - \blacktriangleright Spatial extension X_k
 - volume $X_k = V_k$. $k \in \mathcal{P}^3$ • interface area $X_k = A_k, k \in \mathcal{P}^2$ • line length $X_k = L_k, k \in \mathcal{P}^1$ Number of mole $N_{h}^{i} = X_{k} n_{h}^{i}$ lnternal energy $U_k = X_k u_k$ $S_k = X_k s_k$ Entropy
- Volume of porous system $V = \sum X_k$ $k \in \mathcal{P}^3$
- Averaged spatial extensions $x_k = \frac{X_k}{V}$
 - volume fraction $x_k = \phi_k, k \in \mathcal{P}^3$

 - length density
 - area density $x_k = a_k, k \in \mathcal{P}^2$ $x_k = l_k, k \in \mathcal{P}^1$

The porous medium system

Equilibrium thermodynamics of homogeneous parts

▶ The equilibrium of each homogeneous part $k \in \mathcal{P}$ satisfies

 $S_k(U_k, (N_k^i)_i, X_k)$

The classical relations write as follows

$$\begin{aligned} \mathrm{d}(x_k s_k) &= -\tau_k \mathrm{d}(x_k u_k) - \sum_i \nu_k^i \mathrm{d}(x_k n_k^i) + \tau_k \omega_k \mathrm{d}x_k \quad \text{(Gibbs/sys.)} \\ \mathrm{d}s_k &= -\tau_k \mathrm{d}u_k - \sum_i \nu_k^i \mathrm{d}n_k^i \quad \text{(Gibbs/part)} \\ \mathrm{d}(\tau_k \omega_k) &= u_k \mathrm{d}\tau_k + \sum_i n_k^i \mathrm{d}\nu_k^i \quad \text{(Gibbs-Duhem)} \end{aligned}$$

Intensive variables

 $\begin{array}{ll} \circ \mbox{ temperature } & T_k = -1/\tau_k \\ \circ \mbox{ chemical potential } & \mu_k^i = -\nu_k^i/\tau_k \\ \circ \mbox{ grand potential } & \omega_k = \begin{vmatrix} -p_k & \mbox{if } k \in \mathcal{P}^3 \ (\mbox{pressure}) \\ \gamma_k & \mbox{if } k \in \mathcal{P}^2 \ (\mbox{surface tension}) \\ \end{vmatrix}$

Balance equations Mole and energy

• Mole balance for $k \in \mathcal{P}$ and $i \in \mathcal{I}$

$$rac{\partial x_k n_k^i}{\partial t} +
abla \cdot oldsymbol{arphi}_k^{n,i} = \Lambda_k^{n,i}$$

• Energy balance for $k \in \mathcal{P}$

$$\frac{\partial x_k u_k}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot \boldsymbol{\varphi}_k^u = \Lambda_k^u + W_k^{\mathsf{ext}}$$

► heat diffusion: $J_k^u = \varphi_k^u - h_k q_v$ with $h_k = u_k - \omega_k$ ► work of external forces: $W_k^{\text{ext}} = F_k^{\text{ext}} \cdot q_k$ ► no reaction $\Rightarrow \sum_k \Lambda_k^u = 0$

Balance equations Entropy

The total entropy balance is computed as

$$\begin{split} \frac{\partial}{\partial t} \left(\sum_{k} x_{k} s_{k} \right) + \nabla \cdot \left(-\sum_{k} \tau_{k} \varphi_{k}^{u} - \sum_{k,i} \nu_{k}^{i} \varphi_{k}^{n,i} \right) &= \Psi_{\text{scalar}} + \Psi_{\text{vector}} + \Psi_{\text{time}} \\ \Psi_{\text{scalar}} &= -\sum_{k} \tau_{k} \Lambda_{k}^{u} - \sum_{k,i} \nu_{k}^{i} \Lambda_{k}^{n,i} \\ \Psi_{\text{vector}} &= -\sum_{k} J_{k}^{u} \cdot \nabla \tau_{k} - \sum_{k,i} J_{k}^{n,i} \cdot \nabla \nu_{k}^{i} \\ &- \sum_{k} \tau_{k} q_{k} \cdot (\mathbf{F}_{k}^{\text{ext}} + \nabla \omega_{k}) \\ \Psi_{\text{time}} &= \sum_{k} \tau_{k} \omega_{k} \frac{\partial x_{k}}{\partial t} \end{split}$$

• Second law: $\Psi_{...} \ge 0$ ($\Psi = 0 \rightarrow$ reversible process)

- $\circ \ \Psi_{\rm scalar} = 0 \rightarrow \text{local equilibrium: } \tau_k = \tau \ , \ \nu_k^i = \nu^i \quad \forall k \in \mathcal{P}$
- $\circ~\Psi_{\text{vector}} \geq 0 \rightarrow \text{dissipative transfert}$ (Darcy, Fourier, ...)
- $\Psi_{\mathsf{time}} = 0 \rightarrow \mathsf{interface equilibrium}$: $\sum_k \omega_k \mathrm{d}x_k = 0$

Equations of State for the porous system

► For each part k: $d(\omega_k) = \frac{h_k}{\tau} d\tau + \sum_i \frac{n_k^i}{\tau} d\nu^i$ (Gibbs-Duhem) ► $\omega_k(\tau, (\nu^i)_i)$ is an equation of state for part k

Using local and interface equilibrium, and introducing
s = Σ_k x_ks_k, u = Σ_k x_ku_k, nⁱ = Σ_k x_knⁱ_k, ω = Σ_k x_kω_k
dω = Σ_k x_kdω_k
ds = -τdu - Σ_i νⁱdnⁱ
d(τω) = udτ + Σ_i nⁱdνⁱ
(like homogeneous system)
(conjugate of entropy)

Assuming components are only in fluids $(k \in \mathcal{P}_{\mathsf{fluid}} \Rightarrow x_k \omega_k = -\phi_k p_k)$ $\mathrm{d}\omega = \frac{1}{\tau} h^{\mathsf{non fluid}} \mathrm{d}\tau - \sum_{k \in \mathcal{P}_{\mathsf{fluid}}} \phi_k \mathrm{d}p_k$

▶ $\omega(\tau,(p_k)_{k\in\mathcal{P}_{\mathrm{fluid}}})$ is an equation of state for the porous system

Capillary effects

- ▶ Relation between volume fractions and pressures: $\phi_k = -\frac{\partial \omega}{\partial p_k}$
- Structure of the EoS ω(τ, (p_k)_k)
 Entropy dissipation (Ψ_{time} ≥ 0) implies function is concave
 Rigid matrix implies φ = (constant porosity) = ∑_k ∂w/∂p_k
 ⇒ φ_k(τ, (p_k + p⁰)_k) = φ_k(τ, (p_k)_k)
 Volume fractions only depend on relative pressures
- Capillary pressure curve
 - ► Two phases: capillary curve $P_c(Sat)$ and EoS ω are equivalent $\omega(p_1, p_2) = -\phi \int^{p_1-p_2} P_c^{-1}(x) dx$
 - Three phases and more: capillary curves not always consistent with entropy dissipation

 $\Rightarrow~{\rm EoS}~\omega(\tau,(p_k)_k)$ generalizes the notion of capillary curve

Beyond interface equilibrium: irreversible processes
 multiple curves: relaxation, hysteresis, ...

Conclusions

- Thermodynamic framework for flows in porous media
 - multiphase, compositional, miscible or not
 - Tractable entropy dissipation
 - Contains the usual models (Darcy, Fourier, ...), and more
 - Well posed formulation based on $(\tau, (\nu^i)_i)$
 - Open for coupling with reactivity
- Fully thermodynamic explanation of capillary effects
 - No curvature, no contact angle, …
 - Interface equilibrium
 - Generalization of capillary pressure curve
