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# REFLECTION ZONE PLATE SPECTROMETER FOR LI K EMISSION DETECTION IN LITHIUM COMPOUNDS

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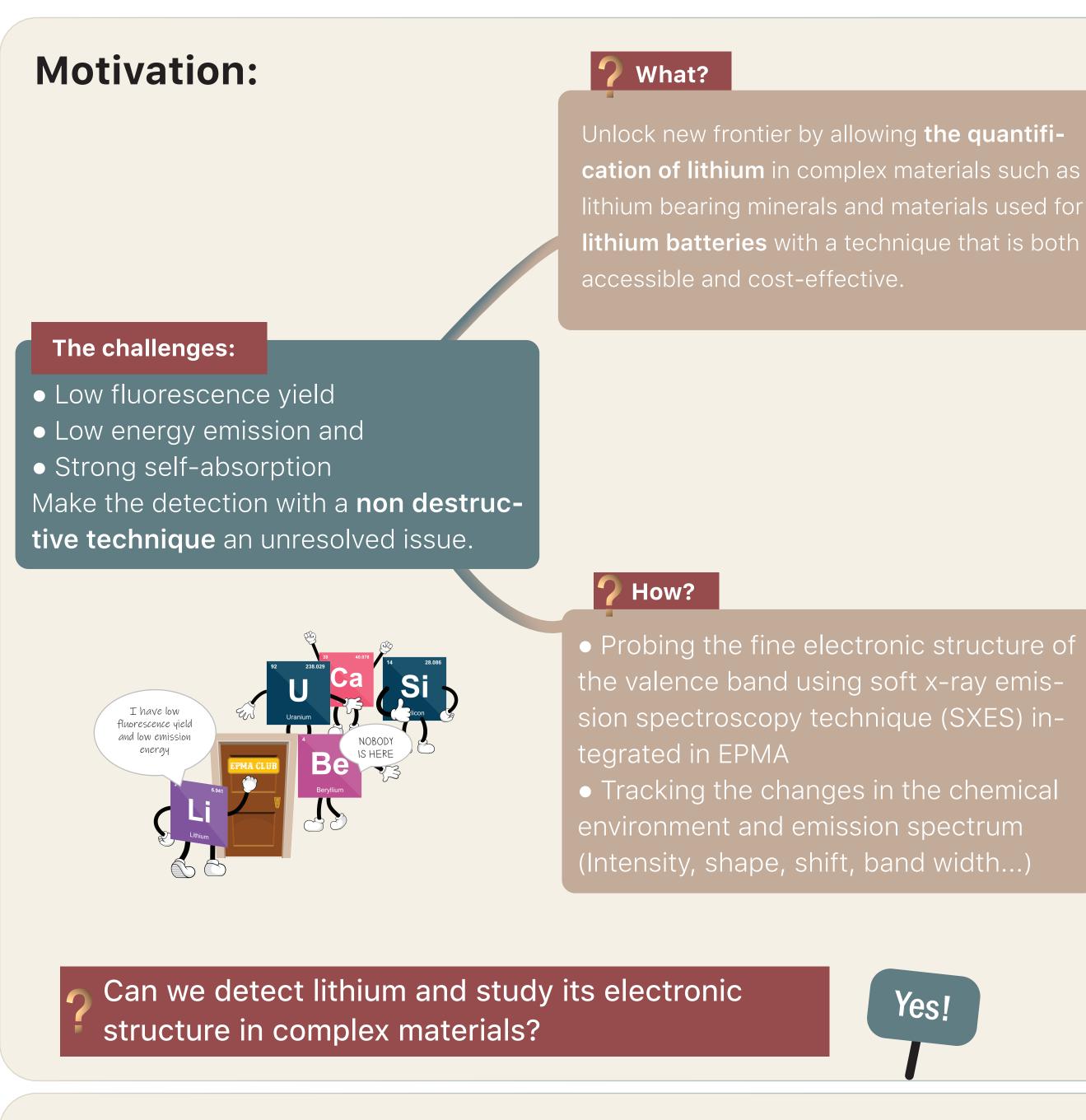




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# Methods:

#### The x-ray emission process:

- 1. Excitation: The sample is being bombarded with and acccelerated beam of charged particles (electrons).
- 2. **Ionization:** The interaction of the beam of electrons with matter leads to the ionization of the core states.
- 3. **Emission:** the vacancy is filled with an electron from an outer shell, resulting in the emission of an x-ray photon that correspond to the energy difference between the two states.

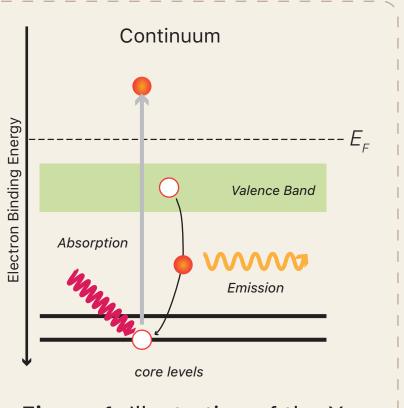
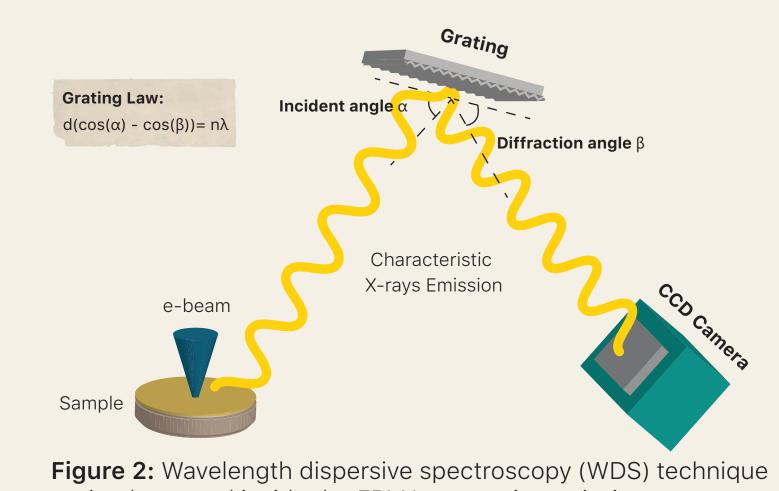


Figure 1: Illustration of the X-ray emission process

Detection:

Reflection zone plates (RZP) are used in XES as a wavelength-dispersive element [1]. They consist of a special laminar groove profile, each with a slightly different thickness. When x-rays interact with the zone plate, the different zones act as diffraction gratings, resulting in the x-rays diffracting and interfering with each other while focusing them at the same time.

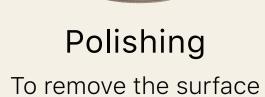
Figure 3: Image of reflection zone plate spectrometer mounted on a eletron probe microanalyser (Cameca SX100).

## Why RZP instead of Multilayers?

- No scanning mechanism
- Higher resolution (~0.5 at Al L2,3 edge and ~0.25 eV at Mg L2,3 edge)
- Cover wider energy range

#### Results:

The Li K emission occurs when a **2p** valence states transition to **1s** core states in lithium atoms and therefore the spectrum reflects the distribution of the p states within the valence band **[2]**. The Li K emission of lithium in LiF, Lepidolite K(Li,Al)<sub>3</sub> (Si, Al)<sub>4</sub>O<sub>10</sub>(OH)<sub>2</sub>, Bikitaite LiAlSi<sub>2</sub>O<sub>6</sub>(OH)<sub>2</sub>, and Amblygonite (Li,Na)Al PO<sub>4</sub>(F,OH) is presented below.







#### Conclusion:

We demonstrate the possibility to spectroscopically analyze Li K emissions in different compounds using a non destructive and accessible technique. We also report for the first time the Li K emission bands in minerals. Our results unlocked potential for various applications to study in details the fine structure of valence band of lithium.
