The problem (c.f. figure 1)

Noninvasive prenatal diagnosis (NIPD) [2] used to detect **pathogenic** genetic variation potentially **transmitted to the fetus** by a parent at risk without a hazardous invasive prenatal diagnosis (PND), i.e. risk of miscarriage

NIPD successfully applied for single-gene disorders [3] but still **challenging** for triplet-repeat expansion diseases, a.k.a. trinucleotide repeat disorder (e.g., myotonic dystrophy type 1, Huntington's disease, fragile X syndrome)

Fetal genotyping using circulating cell-free fetal DNA (cff-DNA) from maternal blood may **not** be able to **detect complex genetic patterns** in the **fetal DNA** that could have been inherited from a parent at risk

The proposed method (c.f. figure 1)

Directly infer which **haplotypes** among the pair of parental homologous chromosomes have been **inherited** by the fetus

→ to determine if the **haplotype region** carrying the pathogenic variation was **transmitted to the fetus or not**

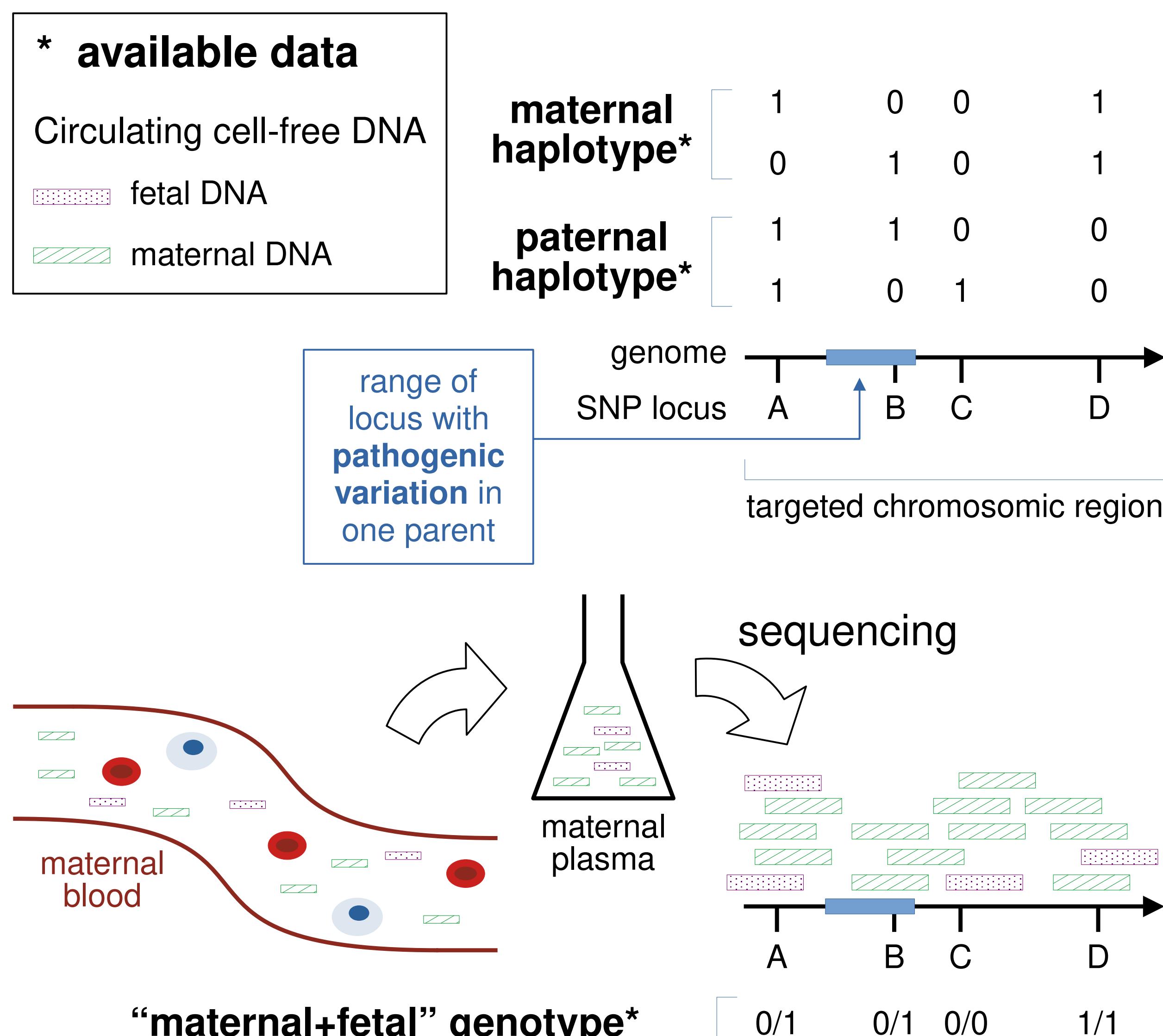


Figure 2. Available data to infer the parental allele origin in the fetus

The data (c.f. figure 2)

- parental **phased haplotypes** for the targeted chromosomal region
- maternal plasma cell-free DNA (cf-DNA) **genotype** for the targeted chromosomal region

The perspectives

- Integrate the **fetal fraction** (=proportion of fetal DNA in sampled maternal plasma DNA) **estimation** [4] in the Bayesian model
- Run a **larger-scale study** with a different phasing protocol

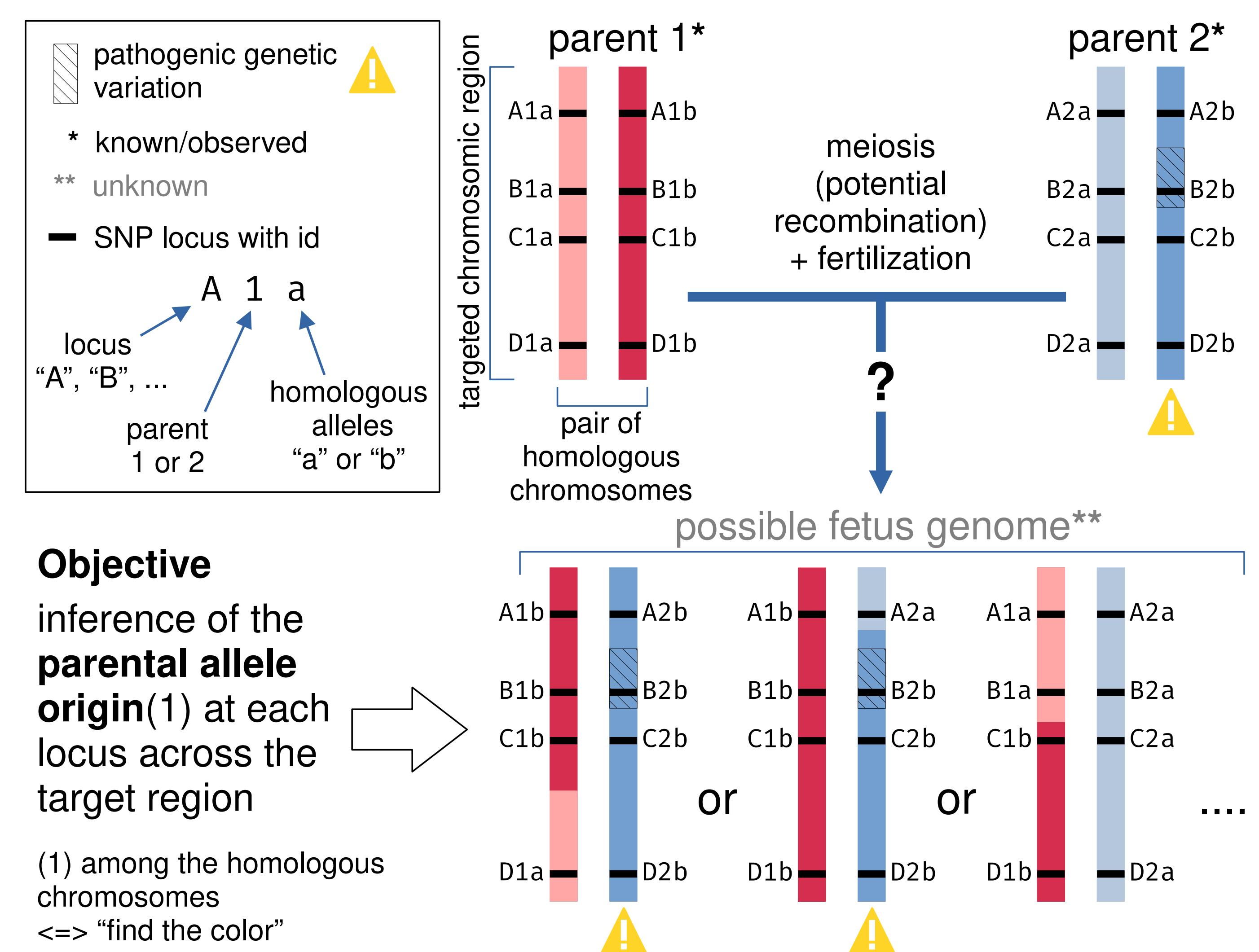


Figure 1. Inheritance pattern of the pathogenic genetic variation

The Bayesian model

Output: $O_\ell = (\text{mat}X, \text{pat}Y)$ fetal allele origin among the pair of homologous haplotypes from each parent (mat = maternal, pat = paternal and $X, Y \in \{1, 2\}$) at locus ℓ

Objective: infer $(O_1, \dots, O_\ell, \dots, O_L)$ over all locus inside the targeted region

Tool: estimate the **full posterior** jointly over all locus

$$P(O_1, \dots, O_\ell, \dots, O_L | \text{data})$$

Issue: impossible because of **combinatorial cost** (no independence between locus)

Workaround: use a **Markov chain Monte Carlo** (MCMC) algorithm to estimate the full posterior, specifically a **Gibbs sampler** based on iterative sampling from the **conditional marginal posterior**

$$P(O_\ell | \text{data}, O_{\ell-1}) \sim P(\text{data at locus } \ell | O_\ell) \times P(O_\ell | O_{\ell-1})$$

- $P(O_\ell | O_{\ell-1})$ = **transition probability** (depending on recombination probability and potential phasing error in both parents between locus ℓ and $\ell - 1$)
- $P(\text{data at locus } \ell | O_\ell)$ = **conditional likelihood** that can be explicitly derived from fetal genotype model using read counts and fetal fraction estimation (as in the locus-independent fetal genotyping Hoobari model [3])

The results

Analysis: a cohort of 14 families, each including one parent with a pathogenic genetic variation

Comparison between Bayesian NIPD and invasive PND results (=ground truth)

(2) because of either poor polymorphism or phasing quality
