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Existence of strong solutions for a compressible fluid-solid interaction system with Navier slip boundary conditions Imene Aicha Djebour *1 ¹Université de Lorraine, CNRS, Inria, IECL, F-54000 Nancy, France April 13, 2023 Abstract We consider a fluid-structure interaction system coupling a viscous fluid governed by the compressible

7 8 Navier-Stokes equations and a rigid body immersed in the fluid and modeled by the Newton's law. In this 9 work, we consider the Navier slip boundary conditions. Our aim is to show the local in time existence and uniqueness of the strong solution to the corresponding problem. The main step of this work is that we 10 use Lagrangian change of variables in order to handle the transport equation and to reduce the problem in 11 the initial domain. However, the specificity here is that the Lagrangian coordinates do not coincide with 12 the Eulerian coordinates at the boundaries since we consider slip boundary conditions. Therefore, it brings 13 some extra nonlinear terms in the boundary conditions. The strategy is based on the study of the linearized 14 system with nonhomogeneous boundary conditions and on the Banach fixed point theorem. 15

³ Let Ω be a bounded domain of \mathbb{R}^3 . At each time t, the fluid domain is denoted by $\mathcal{F}(t)$ and we consider a rigid

The function $\tilde{\rho}$ represents the density of the fluid while \tilde{v} denotes the fluid velocity and \tilde{p} is the fluid pressure. The Cauchy stress tensor is defined by

where $\mu > 0$ and $\lambda \ge 0$ are constants and represent respectively the dynamic and the bulk viscosities of the fluid. The pressure $\tilde{p} = \tilde{p}(\tilde{\rho})$ is given by the following constitutive law:

 $p(\widetilde{\rho}) = a_{\rho}\widetilde{\rho}^{\gamma}, \quad a_{\rho} > 0, \ \gamma \geqslant 1.$

The vector h(t) and the matrix Q(t) represent the translation of the center of mass and the rotation of the rigid body. Note that we assume without loss of generality that h(0) = 0 and $Q(0) = \mathbb{I}_3$. Then, at time t, the domain S(t) occupied by the structure is described as follows

and we denote the associated region occupied by the fluid $\mathcal{F}(t) = \Omega \setminus \overline{\mathcal{S}(t)}$. Then, the domain of the rigid body and the fluid are given as follows at initial time

• where ω is the angular velocity of the rigid body. Hence, the velocity of the structure is given by

The constant m and the matrix J represent the mass and the moment of inertia of the rigid body. The vector \tilde{n} is the outer unit normal vector on $\partial \mathcal{F}(t)$. For any vector $z \in \mathbb{R}^3$, we define the normal and the tangential components of z as follows

In order to state the main result, we consider X a C^1 -diffeomorphism that transforms $\overline{\mathcal{F}(0)} = \overline{\mathcal{F}}$ into $\overline{\mathcal{F}(t)}$ that is defined more precisely in Section 2 and we denote v and ρ the corresponding functions to this change of variables

ainresult Theorem 1.1. Let $\rho^0, v^0, \ell^0, \omega^0$ the initial data that satisfy (1.6), (1.7), (1.8) and (1.9). Then, there exists T > 0 such that the system (1.1), (1.2), (1.3) admits a unique strong solution with

The slip boundary conditions were introduced first by Navier in [58] and they are generally used to model the 6 motion of the fluid at the boundaries eventually for collision problems, see [43, 33, 72, 44]. In the mathematical 7 literature, the survey of this type of coupling problems is tackled. In the case of an incompressible fluid-rigid 8 body systems, there are many interesting works in the literature considering no slip boundary conditions, see 9 for example [17, 65, 22, 23, 24, 30, 31, 40, 69, 45, 70, 71]. In the case of slip boundary conditions, we have 10 [32, 61, 15, 15, 20]. The controllability of the fluid-rigid body problem is studied in [14, 63, 12, 47] considering no 11 slip boundary conditions whereas in the case of Navier boundary conditions, we mention [26]. The stabilization 12 problem is discussed in [3, 2]. In the case of a compressible fluid-solid interaction system with no slip conditions, 13 the global existence of weak solutions are investigated in [25, 29] and in [11] for strong solutions stated in 14 the Hilbert space framework. In the $L^p - L^q$ setting, the study of the interaction fluid-rigid body problem 15 is investigated in [42, 41] assuming no slip boundary conditions. Furthermore, the analysis of the motion of a 16 piston in a viscous gaz modeled by the 1D compressible Navier-Stokes system is studied in [54]. The stabilization 17 problem is investigated in [64]. Concerning compressible Navier-Stokes equations without structure involving slip 18 boundary conditions, existence of local strong solutions in the $L^p - L^q$ framework is tackled in [57], whereas the 19 existence of global strong solutions is obtained in [66]. In the case of the compressible Navier-Stokes equations 20 set in a moving domain, weak and strong solutions are studied in [48] under slip or no slip boundary conditions. 21 Moreover, in the $L^p - L^q$ setting, the compressible problem in a moving domain is studied in [49]. In [59], the 22 existence of a weak solution to fluid-solid interaction problem is proved considering slip boundary conditions. 23

Let us mention some works that are devoted to the case of an elastic structure. In the case of an incom-1 pressible fluid-beam interaction system with Dirichlet boundary conditions, the existence of weak solutions was 2 investigated in [19] considering a damping in the structure equation and [34] in the case where the structure 3 satisfies the plate equation without any damping. The existence of strong solutions for the fluid-damped beam 4 system was established in [8, 50]. For global in time solutions, we mention [35] where the authors proved no 5 contact between the beam and the domain cavity. In [36], the existence of strong solutions is proved when-6 ever the structure satisfies either a damped beam equation, a linear wave equation or a linear beam equation 7 with inertia of rotation. In [7], the authors considered the incompressible fluid-wave interaction system and 8 showed maximal regularity for the solutions, they proved in particular that the corresponding semigroup of the 9 linearized system is analytic. In [5, 6], the authors obtained Gevrey regularity for a system coupling incompress-10 ible Navier Stokes system with a beam equation. For the stabilization problem, we refer to [62, 4]. In the case of 11 boundary conditions involving pressure, regularity results are obtained in [18]. In the case of an incompressible 12 fluid-beam interaction system with Navier boundary conditions, the existence of weak solutions is investigated 13 in [39, 38, 56] whereas the existence of strong solutions is discussed in [27]. In the case of a compressible fluid 14 and an elastic structure, weak solutions are obtained in [10], local existence of strong solutions is obtained in 15 [55] for the coupled system considering a damped beam equation and assuming that the initial displacement of 16 the structure is 0. Maximal-regularity in $L^p - L^q$ framework is obtained in [53] where the structure is modeled 17 by the damped beam equation and in the case where the structure verifies the wave equation, the existence and 18 uniqueness of the strong solution are proved in [52] in the L^2 approach. 19

The objective of this paper is to provide local existence and uniqueness of the strong solution to the system (1.1), (1.2), (1.3) in the Hilbert space framework. In section 2, we write the system in a fixed configuration by using the Lagrangian change of variables. Since the system considered here is compressible, the change of variables that is commonly used is the Lagrangian flow to transform the domain $\mathcal{F}(t)$ into \mathcal{F} . In order to obtain a local solution, it is crucial to go back in the initial domain so that we can use the classical Banach fixed point theorem. However, in the Dirichlet case (see [64, 41]), we have the following correspondence on the boundary

²⁰ that is not true considering slip boundary conditions. Due to this change of variables, nonlinear terms appear

in the whole system even in the boundary conditions that cannot be avoided even in the case without structure (see [66, 57]). In Section 3, we study the linearized system. We first make a suitable lifting at the boundary

²² conditions to handle the nonlinearities coming from the change of variables and we establish a first regularity

result for the Linearized system with nonhomogeneous boundary conditions. An important step in this section

²⁵ is to elaborate elliptic estimates for the associated Lamé system. In section 4, we use a Banach fixed point ²⁶ argument and prove Theorem 1.1.

As in [57], we show that X is C^1 -diffeomorphism.

Proposition 2.1. Under the boundary conditions (2.5), if v is regular and T is small enough, the application C1diff 1 X defined in (2.1) is a C^1 -diffeomorphism and transforms $\overline{\mathcal{F}(0)} = \overline{\mathcal{F}}$ into $\overline{\mathcal{F}(t)}$. 2

Proof. From (2.1), we see that

$$\nabla X(t,\cdot) = \mathbb{I}_3 + \int_0^t \nabla v(s,\cdot) \, ds, \quad t \in (0,T).$$

If T is small enough and v regular enough, we see that ∇X is invertible with $\delta_X > 0$ in such a way the transformation X preserves the orientation. Hence X is a one to one mapping. Since ∂S is smooth, there exists $\eta_{\mathcal{S}}$ a smooth function such that $\eta_{\mathcal{S}} = 0$ in a part of $\partial \mathcal{S}$. Then, the corresponding part in $\partial \mathcal{S}(t)$ is locally expressed as $\xi(t,x) = \eta_{\mathcal{S}}(Q(t)^{\top}(x-h(t))) = 0$. Let prove that $X(t,\partial \mathcal{S}) \subset \partial \mathcal{S}(t)$. Let y be in the neighborhood of ∂S satisfying $\eta_{\mathcal{S}}(y) = 0$, we obtain
