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Simultaneous Wavefront and 3D Tomographic Reconstructions for Phase Imaging Using Hartmann Sensor



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INTRODUCTION

Phase-contrast imaging (PCI) is a promising technique that
became practical using high-power micro-focus X-ray sources.
The Hartmann method captures the deflections of individual
X-ray beamlets to obtain contrast, relying on variations of the
imaginary part of the sample complex refractive index δ. This

METHODS

In order to improve the homogeneity between the projections during IR-WF, we developed a 3D-driven algorithm that converges on the reconstructed volume rather than the individual projections. To do so, the IR-WF algorithm is built into the iterative tomographic reconstruction (IR-CT).

RESULTS

We measured the SNR, PSNR and CNR on the three different dataset using both methods to assert the quality of the 3D reconstruction. The values of these metrics are reported in Fig. 7, as well as the evolution of the SNR vs iteration # on dataset (A) in Fig. 8.

is interesting for clinical imagery since δ becomes larger than the absorption index β at high energy for soft tissues [1].



With accurate measurements of the projected phase shifts, a phase tomogram can be reconstructed to obtain localized information on the sample material [2].

By doing both reconstructions at the same time all wavefronts are constrained to converge to the same result. This attenuates the artifacts caused by the IR-WF.

To validate our algorithm we used datasets obtained with three samples : (A) a set of quartz, alumina and crystalline silicon rods, (B) a juvenile oyster shell (from Institut Fresnel, Marseille), and (C) a polycarbonate tube filled with silica

Fig. 7 : SNR, PSNR and CNR extracted from layers illustrated in Fig. 6. The simultaneous method shows a better result than the sequential method in almost all cases.

We can see that unlike the sequential method, our simultaneous method is able to converge further and can support more iterations without introducing a quality loss.

Algorithms dedicated to reconstruct wavefronts (WF) acquired using Hartmann sensors have been largely described in the literature. A common one is described in [3] as an iterative reconstruction algorithm (IR-WF).

Existing algorithms lead to low-frequency artifacts when confronted with noisy images, resulting in incoherent information of each projection.

CONCLUSIONS

Our simultaneous IR-WF and IR-CT algorithm provides superior results compared to the existing algorithm when provided with a Hartmann PCI tomographic dataset by using the information of all projections in the iterative process. Although the computational complexity are equal, our method tends to converge more slowly due to the 3D homogeneity constraint.

This method allows to obtain a more homogeneous result with better SNR and CNR than the consecutive application of IR-WF and IR-CT.
