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## Effect of aging on the temperature dependence of FeQuSiNbB nanocrystalline alloys

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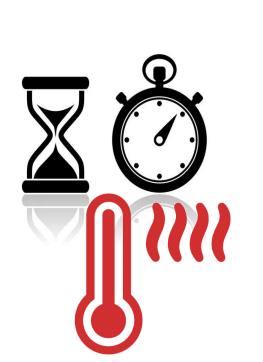
### Introduction

Not only their magnetic properties vaires at high temperatures, but also exposing these materials to high temperatures for long periods of time, changes their magnetic properties.

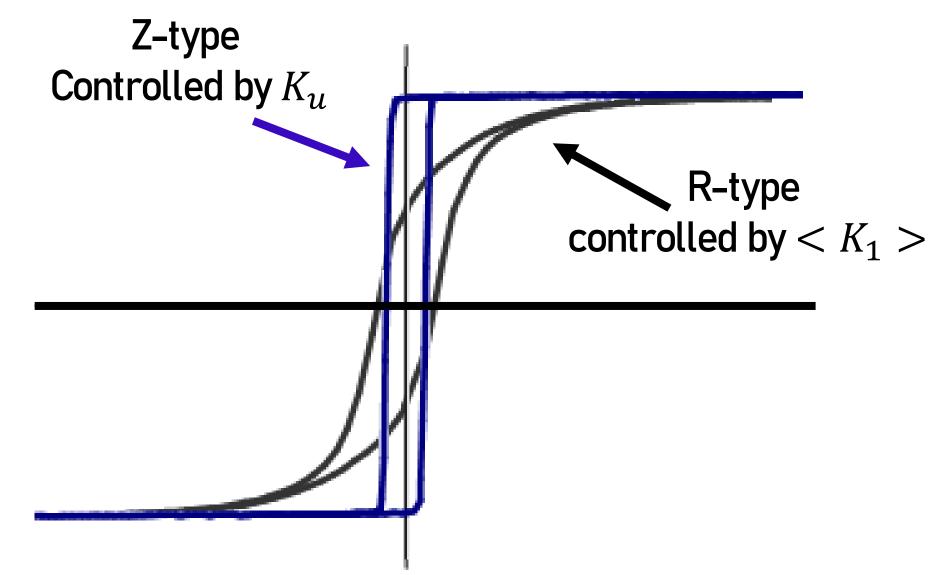


Magnetic behavior at different measuring temperatures of two nanocrystalline nuances

### Materials & conditions



Fe<sub>73.5</sub>Cu<sub>1</sub>Nb<sub>3</sub>Si<sub>15.5</sub>B<sub>7</sub> nanocrystalline alloys

Measuring temperatures: -55 to 125 °C Quasi-static characterizations

A Z-type sample is exposed to 200 °C in its <u>demagnetized state</u>.

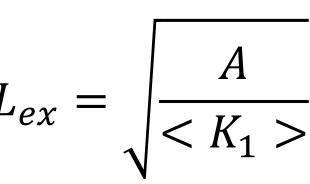
### Results & Discussion

### Origin of soft magnetic properties [1]

magnetocrystalline anisotropies randomly averaged out thanks to grain sizes Dsmaller than the ferromagnetic exchange length.

the random anisotropy model  $< K_1 > = K_1/(D/L_{ex})^{\frac{3}{2}}$ 

The exchange length



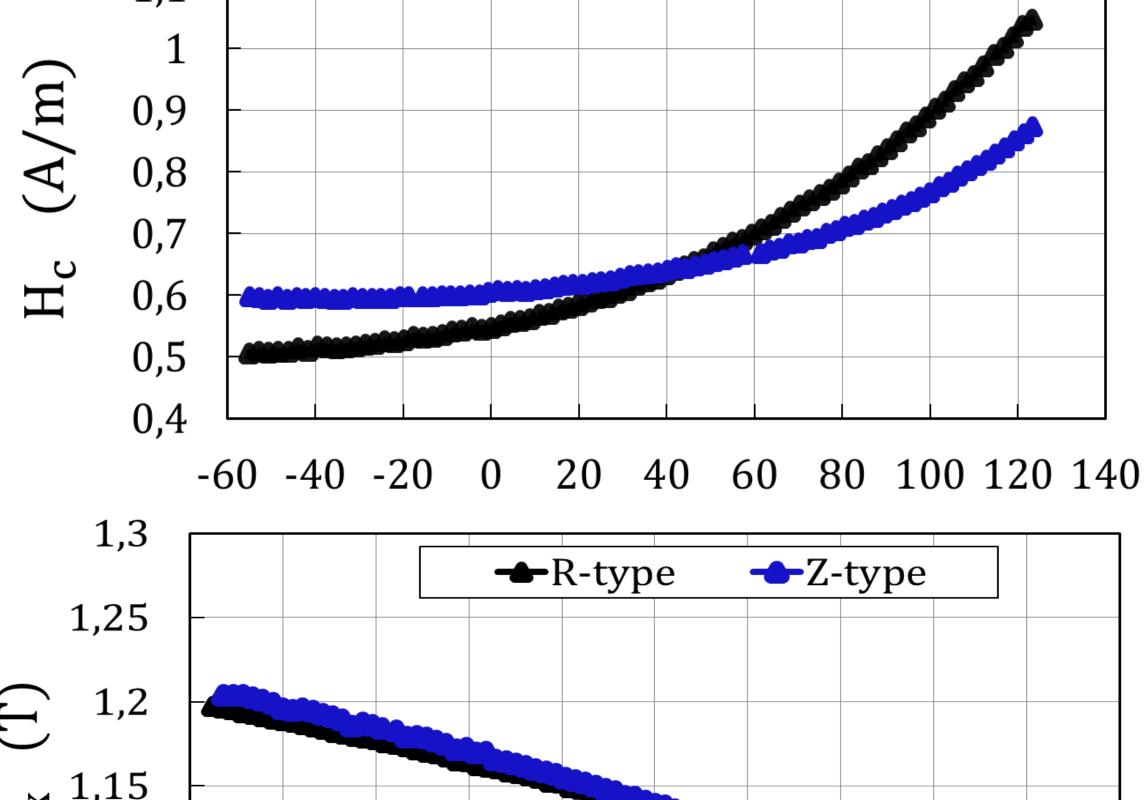
A exchange stiffness  $K_1$  magnetocrystalline anisotropy constant

### Behavior at high temperatures [2] By increasing measurement temperature and approaching $T_c^{am}$ and the exchange length is reduced.

- =>Random anisotropy increases
- =>Soft magnetic properties degraded : saturation coercive increases, force induction and permeability decreases...

### Comparison

- Kinetics of degradation are slower in Z-type since  $K_{ij}$  was dominating
- In R-type  $\langle K_1 \rangle$  was already dominating and increases faster.

## 2. Aging impact in Z-type nanocrystalline

Coercive force  $H_c$  has increased as function of aging time, whereas maximal permeability  $\mu_{max}$  has dropped.

Aging in Z-type nanocrystalline materials was related [3] to a formation of locally induced anisotropy along the spontaneous magnetization vectors within domains walls.

Grain size would not change as XRD measurements showed in [4] => Same kinetic before and after aging at 200 °C.

# Conclusions

Soft magnetic properties in nanocrystalline are instable as a function of measuring temperature, this is due to the reduction in the intergranular exchange coupling length.

Temperature stability depends on annealing conditions. The Z-type nanocrystalline materials are more stable as function of temperature where the degree of freedom of random anisotropy formation is reduced by inducing a uniform anisotropy during field annealing.

Aging in nanocrystalline materials is not due to microstructural changes. It is rather related to a disturbance of the uniform anisotropic energy.
