Problem

Investigate the accuracy and robustness of Fully-coupled 3D parallel solver for incompressible two phase flows at large density and viscosity ratios.

NUMERICAL METHODS

Finite-Volumes on staggered grids.
Fully-coupled solver for Pressure / Velocity coupling.
Penalty methods.
Conservative VOF method.
MPI based parallelizations.

MATHEMATICAL MODEL

 $\frac{\partial \rho \mathbf{u}}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot (\rho \mathbf{u} \otimes \mathbf{u}) = -\nabla p + \nabla \cdot [\mu (\nabla \mathbf{u} + \nabla \mathbf{u}^T)] + \mathbf{f} \Rightarrow \text{Conservation of momentum}$ $\nabla \cdot \mathbf{u} = 0 \Rightarrow \text{Mass conservation}$ $\frac{\partial C}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot (\mathbf{u}C) = C \nabla \cdot \mathbf{u} \Rightarrow \text{Advection of volume fraction}$ $\mu = \mu_1 C + (1 - C)\mu_2 \Rightarrow \text{Mixture viscosity}$ Eulerian Implicit (WY) in 2D $\frac{\partial \phi}{\partial t} + \nabla \cdot (\phi \mathbf{u}) = 0 \Rightarrow \text{Algebraic Momentum Preserving (AMP) } (\phi = \rho, \phi = \rho \mathbf{u})[1]$



Fully coupled solver [2]

 $\begin{pmatrix} M_u^{(\rho)} + L_u^{(\mu)} & B_p^T \\ B_u & 0 \end{pmatrix} \begin{pmatrix} \mathbf{u}^{n+1} \\ p^{n+1} \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} \mathbf{g} \\ 0 \end{pmatrix} orA\mathbf{x} = \mathbf{b}$

Transforming the original system Ax = b into an equivalent one $P^{-1} Ax = P^{-1} b$.

 $\mathbf{P} \approx \begin{pmatrix} \mathbf{\hat{F}}_{\mathbf{u}} & B_p^T \\ 0 & \mathbf{\hat{S}}_{\mathbf{p}} \end{pmatrix}$



Matrix Structure

 $\hat{\mathbf{F}}_{\mathbf{u}}$ by Neumann series expansion and $\hat{\mathbf{S}}_{\mathbf{p}}$ by the PCD operator [3]

RESULTS



Phase inversion problem



Changing the air/water interface for different times. (Mesh: $322 \times 100 \times 100$, CFL=0.4.)



Oil/water interface over time. Mesh 256³. HPC DNS calculations \approx 12800 processors of the HPC Occigen cluster fo CINES.

Drop impact on viscous liquid film



Propergol/air inetrface for different times. Mesh 120^3 refined at the injector. The aspect ratios of H/D>3 π and Re<0.52.

Impact of water droplet on a liquid film. Crown formation and delayed splashing. (Mesh: $1024 \times 1024 \times 512$, CFL=0.4). HPC DNS calculations ≈ 8000 processors of the HPC Jean Zay cluster of IDRIS.
