

Figure 1 (a-e) SEM micrographs and normalized mass percents (wt.%) of C, O, Fe, Al and Si, as measured by EDX on points 1-5, performed on aggregates (< 2 mm) with no goethite (a) and goethite content of 10 (b), 20 (c), 40 (d) and 80 (e) g kg⁻¹. Red arrows point to phytolith particles, yellow ones to other constituents). (f-j) TEM micrographs performed on aggregates (< 250 µm) with no goethite (f) and goethite content of 10 (g), 20 (h), 40 (i) and 80 (j) g kg⁻¹. Yellow arrows point to OM and mineral components, red arrows to phytoliths.

(k) Dissolved organic carbon (DOC) extracted using CaCl₂0.01M after 16h from both unaggregated mixtures and aggregates for each goethite content (see values in Table S1): different lowercase letter (a, b) resulting from the independent samples *t*-separation test, indicates a significant difference between mixtures and aggregates at a given goethite content (p < 0.05); different uppercase letter (A, B, C) resulting from *LSD's* multiple comparison test, indicates a significant difference among all mixtures or aggregates with various goethite proportion (p < 0.05).

(a-b) Time evolution of pH in 0.01 M CaCl₂ extracts (pH_{CaCl2}) in unaggregated mixtures (a) and aggregates (b) for each goethite content: the different mixtures and aggregates are designated by their goethite content expressed in g kg⁻¹: mixture-X and aggregate-X where X = 0, 10, 20, 40, 60 or 80 g kg⁻¹.

(c) Values of pH_{CaCl2} at 64th day: different the lowercase letter (a, b) resulting from the independent samples t – separation test (p < 0.05) is given for comparison between unaggregated mixtures and aggregates at each goethite content.

Time evolution of Si in 0.01 M CaCl₂ extracts (CaCl₂-Si) in unaggregated mixtures (a) and aggregates (b) for each goethite content: the different mixtures and aggregates are designated by their goethite content expressed in g kg⁻¹: mixture-X and aggregate-X where X = 0, 10, 20, 40, 60 or 80 g kg⁻¹.

(c) Values of CaCl₂-Si at 64th day: different the lowercase letter (a, b) resulting from the independent samples t – separation test (p < 0.05) is given for comparison between unaggregated mixtures and aggregates at each goethite content.

Time evolution of the Ge concentration in 0.01 M CaCl₂ extracts (CaCl₂-Ge) in unaggregated mixtures (a) and aggregates (b) for each goethite content: the different mixtures and aggregates are designated by their goethite content expressed in g kg⁻¹: mixture-X and aggregate-X where X = 0, 10, 20, 40, 60 or 80 g kg⁻¹.

Values of CaCl₂-Ge at 16th hour (c) and 64th day (d): different lowercase letter (a, b) resulting from the independent samples t–separation test, indicates a significant difference between the mixture and the aggregate at a given goethite content (p < 0.05); different uppercase letter (A-E) resulting from LSD's multiple comparison test, indicates a significant difference between mixtures and, separately, between aggregates with various goethite content (p < 0.05).

Concentration of Si in CaCl₂ extracts (CaCl₂–Si) as plotted against pH of respective CaCl₂ extracts (pH_{CaCl2}) in unaggregated mixtures (gradient blue) and aggregates (gradient orange) for each goethite content: the different mixtures and aggregates are designated by their goethite content expressed in g kg⁻¹: mixture-X and aggregate-X where X = 0, 10, 20, 40, 60 or 80 g kg⁻¹. Using the independent samples t–separation test, the values of the slopes of the two regression lines significantly differ at p <0,0001.
