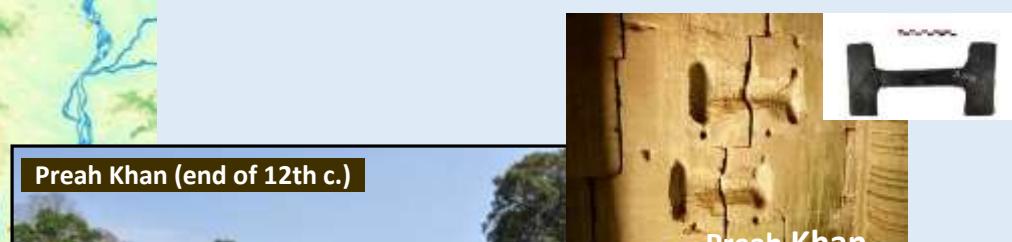
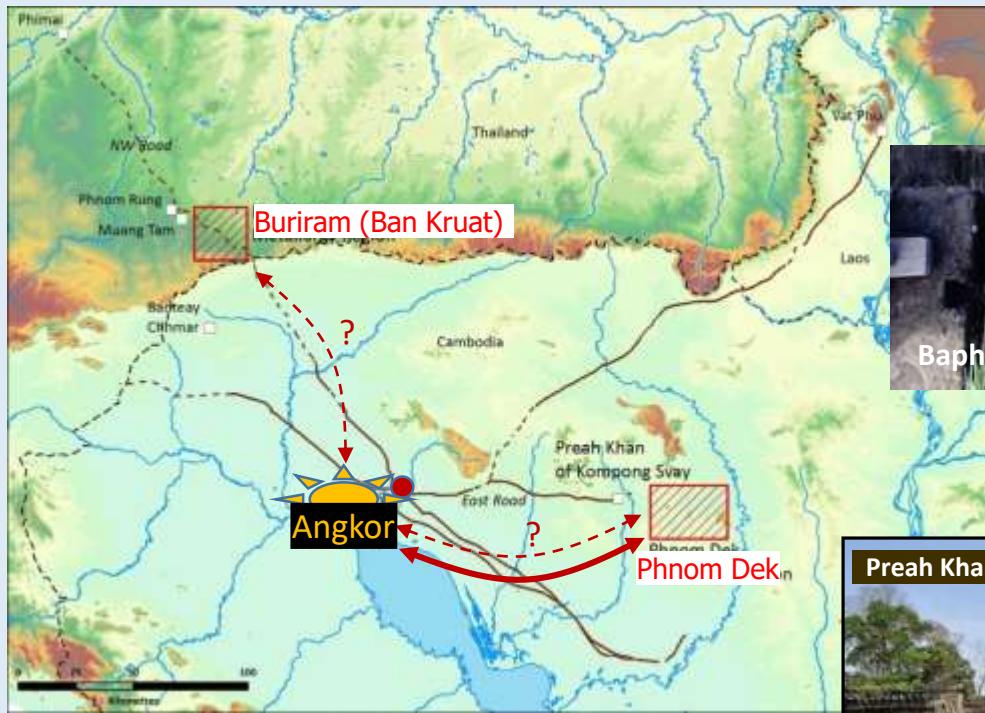
The Khmer Empire (IXth - XVth c. CE)

Sampling

- Drilling with TiN or CoB coated drills in the **most carburized areas**
- 50 to 1000 mg of iron

Combustion, Graphitization

- Iron particles + CuO (CuO/Fe=5) + Ag wire, 850°C, 5 h



- $\text{CO}_2 + 2\text{H}_2 \rightarrow \text{C} + 2\text{H}_2\text{O}$, with Fe at 600°C

Iconographic and stylistic criteria : more complex than in the stone statues

Engraved stones, stories of chinese pilgrims, rare royal chronicles

- ^{14}C on organic remains trapped in the clay

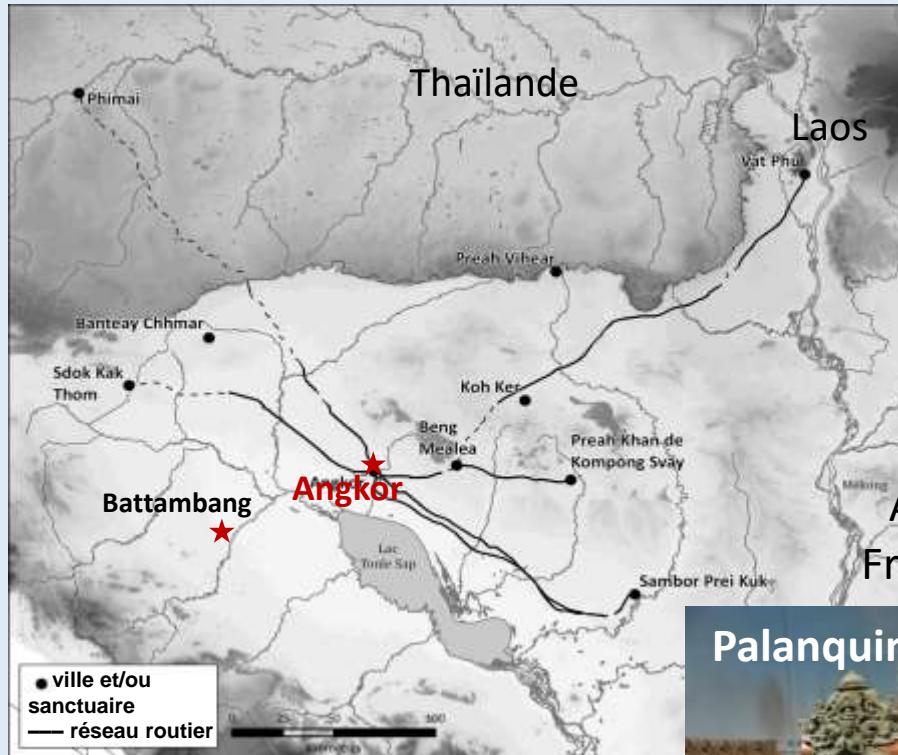

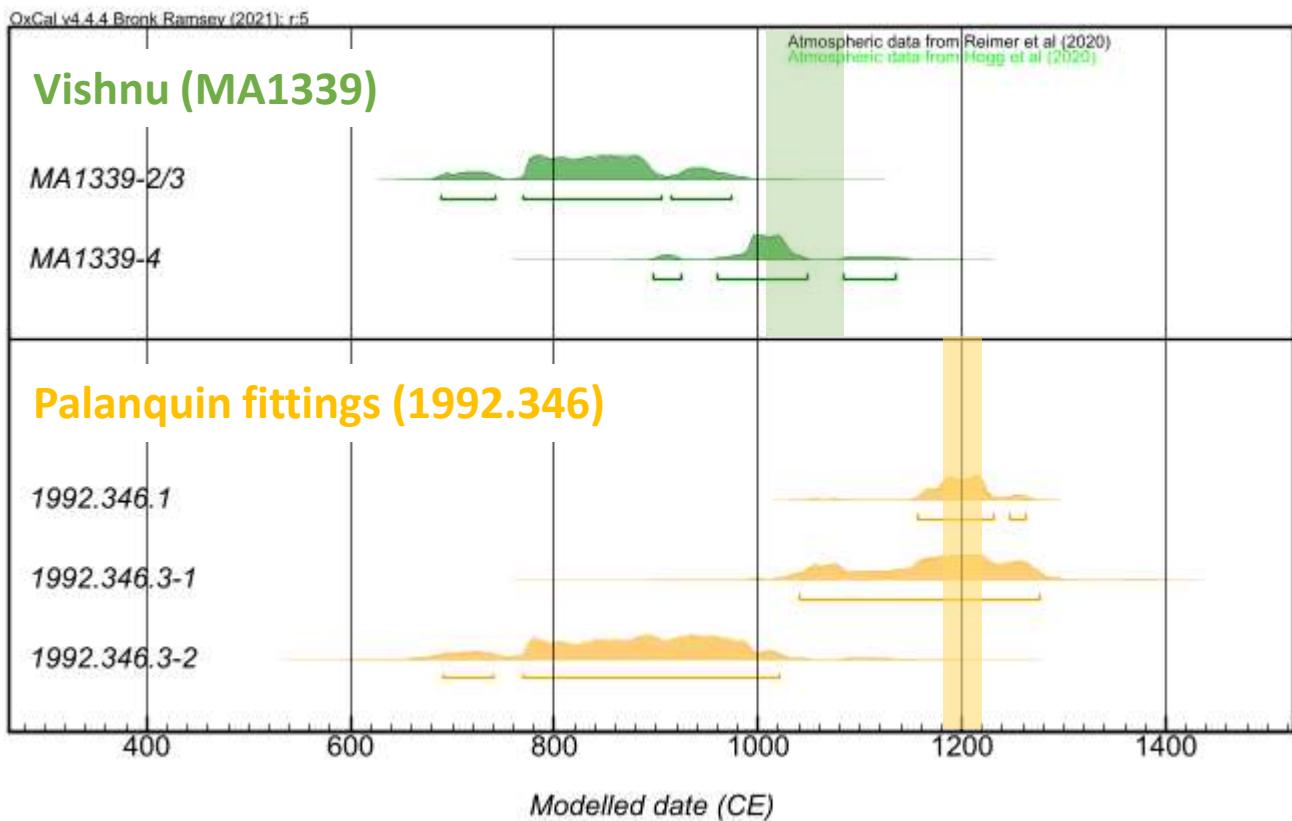

- ✓ Close collaboration with the conservators
- ✓ Thorough review of the objects before sampling (corrosion of the metal, object safety, preservatives, restaurations ?)
- ✓ Small samples → adaptation of the conditions of preparations and measurements
