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# LOGARITHMIC STABILIZATION OF AN ACOUSTIC SYSTEM WITH A DAMPING TERM OF BRINKMAN TYPE

#### Abstract

We study the problem of stabilization for the acoustic system with a spatially distributed damping. Without imposing any hypotheses on the structural properties of the damping term, we identify logarithmic decay of solutions with growing time. Logarithmic decay rate is shown by using a frequency domain method and combines a contradiction argument with the multiplier technique and a new Carleman estimate to carry out a special analysis for the resolvent.


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## 1. Introduction

We consider the following system of equations:

u(0, x)=u^{0}(x), r(0, x)=r^{0}(x), x \in \Omega,
\end{array}\right.
$$

where $\Omega$ is a bounded domain in $\mathbb{R}^{d}, d \geq 2$, with a smooth boundary $\Gamma$, div $=\nabla$. is the divergence operator and $b \in L^{\infty}(\Omega)$, with $b \geq 0$ on $\Omega$ and such that
$\exists b_{-}>0$ such that $b \geq b_{-}$on $\omega$.
Here $\omega \neq \emptyset$ stands for the open subset of $\Omega$ on which the feedback is active. As usual $n$ denotes the unit outward normal vector along $\Gamma$.

The system of equations (1.1) is a linearization of the acoustic equation governing the propagation of acoustic waves in a compressible medium, see Lighthill [21, 22, 23], where $b u$ represents

[^0]a damping term of Brinkman type. This kind of damping arises also in the process of homogenization (see Allaire [1]), and is frequently used as a suitable penalization in fluid mechanics models, see Angot, Bruneau, and Fabrie [4]. Our main goal is to prove the logarithmic decay of solutions of (1.1) with growing time.

Let $L^{2}(\Omega)$ denote the standard Hilbert space of square integrable functions in $\Omega$ and its closed subspace $L_{m}^{2}(\Omega)=\left\{f \in L^{2}(\Omega): \int_{\Omega} f(x) d x=0\right\}$. To avoid abuse of notation, we shall write $\|\cdot\|$ for the $L^{2}(\Omega)$-norm or the $L^{2}(\Omega)^{d}$-norm.

Denoting $H=\left(L^{2}(\Omega)\right)^{d} \times L_{m}^{2}(\Omega)$, we introduce the operator

We recall that for $u \in\left(L^{2}(\Omega)\right)^{d}$ with $\operatorname{div} u \in L^{2}(\Omega), u \cdot n_{\mid \Gamma}$ make sens in $H^{-1 / 2}(\Gamma)$ (see GiraultRaviart [13, Chp 1, Theorem 2.5]).

Accordingly, the problem (1.1) can be recasted in an abstract form:

where $Z=(u, r)$, or, equivalently,

with $\mathcal{A}_{d}=-\mathcal{A}-\mathcal{B B}^{*}$ with $\mathcal{D}\left(\mathcal{A}_{d}\right)=\mathcal{D}(\mathcal{A})$.
It can be shown (see [2]) that for any initial data $\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right) \in \mathcal{D}(\mathcal{A})$ the problem (1.1) admits a unique solution

$$

Moreover, the solution $(u, r)$ satisfies, the energy identity

where we have denoted

Using (1.5) and a standard density argument, we can extend the solution operator for data $\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right) \in H$. Consequently, we associate with the problem (1.1) (or to the abstract Cauchy problems (1.3) or (1.4)) a semi-group that is globally bounded in $H$.

As the energy $E$ is nonincreasing along trajectories, we want to determine the set of initial data $\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right)$ for which

Such a question is of course intimately related to the structural properties of the function $b$, notably to the geometry of the set $\omega$ on which the damping is effective. In fact, when the damping term is globally distributed Ammari, Feireisl and Nicaise [2] showed an exponential decay rate of
the energy by the means of an observability inequality associated with the conservative problem of (1.1). Besides, it is also shown that if the damping coefficient is not uniformly positive definite (i.e $\inf _{x \in \Omega} b(x)=0$ ) then the system (1.1) is not exponentially stable. In this paper we consider a damping which is locally distributed over the domain $\Omega$ without any geometrical control condition in particular this including the case when the damping coefficient is not uniformly positive defined. So we expect to prove a weaker decay rate then given in [2]. More precisely, we prove a logarithm decay rate of the energy. Our approach is based in the frequency domain method which consist to prove an exponential loss on the resolvent estimate $[7,6,10]$ where the main tool for establishing a such decay is the Carleman estimate.

The theory of Carleman estimates for scalar equations is rather well developed by now. We refer to Hörmander [14] and Lebeau and Robbiano [17, 18, 19] for the second-order elliptic and hyperbolic PDE's and to Isakov [15] second-order parabolic and Schrödinger operators. However, it turned out that Carleman estimates for systems in more than two variables are difficult to obtain and still somehow very limited: The first results to systems go back to then Carleman's original work [9] which is written for a system in two independent variables, and we refer to Calderón [8] and Kreiss [16] for more relevant systems. Recently, Eller and Toundykov [11] have established a Carleman estimate for some first-order elliptic systems. This estimate is extended to elliptic boundary value problems provided the boundary condition satisfies a Lopatinskii-type requirement. In this paper we provide a Carleman estimate for a system of first-order which does not fit into the same framework as that of Eller and Toundykov [11]. Unlike their approach, our method is based into the Hörmander approach which is essentially based on the sub-ellipticity condition and the Gårding inequality in order to control the non-elliptical regions.

The paper is organized as follows. Section 2 summarizes some well known facts concerning the acoustic system (1.1). In section 3, we establish a new Carleman estimate needed for the stabilization problem of the system (1.1). In Section 4, we prove the logarithmic stability for the system (1.1).

## 2. Preliminaries

We start with a simple observation that the problem (1.1) can be viewed as a bounded (in $H$ ) perturbation of the conservative system

which can be recast as the standard wave equation

r_{t t}-\Delta r=0
$$

Consequently, the basic existence theory for (1.1) derives from that of (2.8). Hence $\mathcal{A}_{d}$ generates a $C_{0}$-semigroup $(S(t))_{t \geq 0}$ in $H$ that is even of contraction because $\mathcal{A}_{d}$ is dissipative (see (1.5)).

The first main difficulty is that the operator $\mathcal{A}_{d}$ possesses a non-trivial (and large) kernel that is left invariant by the evolution. Indeed if $(u, r)$ belongs to ker $\mathcal{A}_{d}$, then it is solution of the "stationary" problem

Thus multiplying the first identity of (2.9) by $\bar{u}$ and integrating over $\Omega$ yields

By an integration by parts, using the fact that $u$ is solenoidal and the boundary condition $u \cdot n=0$ on $\Gamma$, we get

and therefore we obtain

In other words, we have

Accordingly, we have shown that

For shortness set $E=\operatorname{ker} \mathcal{A}_{d}$ and introduce also its orthogonal complement $H_{0}$ in $H$.
It is easy to check that

in particular, the semi-group associated with (1.1) leaves both $E$ and $H_{0}$ invariant. Consequently, the decay property (1.7) may only hold for initial data emenating from the set $H_{0}$.

The following observation can be shown by a simple density argument:
Lemma 2.1. The solution $(u, r)$ of (1.1) with initial datum in $\mathcal{D}\left(\mathcal{A}_{d}\right)$ satisfies

Therefore the energy is non-increasing and (1.5) holds for all initial datum in $H$.
As already shown in the above, the strong stability result (1.7) may hold only if we take the initial data

\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right) \in H_{0}=\operatorname{ker}\left[\mathcal{A}_{d}\right]^{\perp}
$$

There are several ways how to show (1.7), here we make use of the following result due to Arendt and Batty [5]:

Theorem 2.1. Let $(T(t))_{t \geq 0}$ be a bounded $C_{0}$-semigroup on a reflexive Banach space $X$. Denote by $A$ the generator of $(T(t))$ and by $\sigma(A)$ the spectrum of $A$. If $\sigma(A) \cap i \mathbb{R}$ is countable and no eigenvalue of $A$ lies on the imaginary axis, then $\lim _{t \rightarrow+\infty} T(t) x=0$ for all $x \in X$.

In view of this theorem we need to identify the spectrum of $\mathcal{A}_{d}$ lying on the imaginary axis, and we have according to [2]:

- Suppose that $|\omega|>0$. If $\lambda$ is a non-zero real number, then $i \lambda$ is not an eigenvalue of $\mathcal{A}_{d}$.
- Suppose that $|\omega|>0$. If $\lambda$ is a non-zero real number, then $i \lambda$ belongs to the resolvent set $\rho\left(\mathcal{A}_{d}\right)$ of $\mathcal{A}_{d}$.

Now, Theorem 2.1 leads to
Corollary 2.1 ([2]). Let $(u, r)$ be the unique semi-group solution of the problem (1.1) emanating from the initial data $\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right) \in H$. Let $P_{E}$ be the orthogonal projection onto the space $E=\operatorname{ker}\left[\mathcal{A}_{d}\right]$ in $H$, and let

Then

We now state the main result of this article. We begin by a proposition on an estimate of the resolvent.

Proposition 2.1. There exist $C>0$ such that for every $|\mu| \geq 1$, and $(f, g) \in H=\left(L^{2}(\Omega)\right)^{d} \times$ $L_{m}^{2}(\Omega)$, the solution $(u, r) \in \mathcal{D}(\mathcal{A})$ of $\left(\mathcal{A}_{d}+i \mu\right)(u, r)=(f, g)$ satisfied

or equivalently

We recall the following result.
Theorem 2.2. Let $B$ a generator of a $C_{0}$-semigroup $(T(t))_{t \geq 0}$ on $\mathcal{H}$, a Hilbert space. We assume

Then there exist $C_{1}>0$ such that for all $u \in \mathcal{D}(B)$ we have

One has also, for every $k \geq 1$ there exists $C_{2}>0$ such that if $u \in \mathcal{D}\left(B^{k}\right)$, we have

A weak version of this theorem was first proven by Lebeau [17], next Burq [6] gives the precise statement. We also refer to Batty and Duyckaerts [7] for some generalizations.

On $H_{0}=\operatorname{ker}\left[\mathcal{A}_{d}\right]^{\perp}$, as seen above $\mathcal{A}_{d}+i \mu$ is invertible on $H_{0}$, in fact $\mathcal{A}_{d}$ is invertible on $H_{0}$ and $\mathcal{A}_{d}+i \mu$ is invertible on $H$ for $\mu \neq 0$. The semigroup is bounded as the norm on $H$ is non-increasing by (1.5). With Proposition 2.1, we can apply Theorem 2.2. We then obtain.

Theorem 2.3. Let $(u, r)$ be the unique semi-group solution of the problem (1.1) emanating from the initial data $\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right) \in \mathcal{D}(\mathcal{A})$. Let $P_{E}$ be the orthogonal projection onto the space $E=\operatorname{ker}\left[\mathcal{A}_{d}\right]$ in $H$, and let

(w, s)=P_{E}\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right)
$$

Then

\|(u, r)(t, \cdot)-(w, s)\|_{H} \leq C \frac{\left\|\mathcal{A}_{d}\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right)\right\|_{H}}{\ln (3+t)}, \forall t \geq 0
$$

for some $C>0$ independent of $\left(u^{0}, r^{0}\right)$.
Proposition 2.1 is obtained from Carleman estimates. We need two kinds of such estimates, first an estimate far away the boundary, second an estimate up to the boundary. Both estimates are proven in the next section.

## 3. Carleman estimates

Let $\Omega$ be an open bounded subset of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$. Let $(u, r)$ be a solution of the resolvent problem $\left(\mathcal{A}_{0}+i \mu\right)(u, r)=(f, g) \in\left(L^{2}(\Omega)\right)^{d} \times L_{m}^{2}(\Omega)$, that is

-\operatorname{div} u+i \mu r=g \text { in } \Omega
\end{array}\right.
$$

Here we moreover assume that $(u, r)$ are supported in $K \subset \Omega$ where $K$ is a compact set. Taking the divergence of the first line and using that $\operatorname{div} u=i \mu r-g$, we obtain

We have to give a Carleman estimate for the solution of this type of equation. This is done in Section 3.2. to do that we need some tools on pseudo-differential operators we recall below.
3.1. Pseudo-differential operators. We start this section with some useful notations. If $\alpha=\left(\alpha_{1}, \ldots, \alpha_{n}\right) \in \mathbb{N}^{n}$ is a multi-index, we introduce the following notation:

where $D_{k}=-i \frac{\partial}{\partial x_{k}}=-i \partial_{x_{k}}$. We denote by $\mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}(V)$ the set of functions of class $\mathscr{C}^{\infty}$ compactly supported in $V$. For a compact subset $K$ of $\mathbb{R}^{n}$, we note by $\mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}(K)$ the set of functions in $\mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ supported in $K$. The space $L^{2}(V)$ is equipped with the usual norm denoted by $\|u\|_{0}$. For $s \in \mathbb{N}$ we set $H^{s}(V)=\left\{u \in \mathscr{D}^{\prime}(V) ; \partial^{\alpha} u \in L^{2}(V) \forall|\alpha| \leq s\right\}$. The Schwartz space $\mathscr{S}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ is the set of functions of $\mathscr{C}{ }^{\infty}$ class with rapid decay rate. Its dual, $\mathscr{S}^{\prime}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ is the set of temperate distributions. If $u \in \mathscr{S}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ its Fourier transform denoted by $\hat{u}$ is defined by $\hat{u}(\xi)=\int_{\mathbb{R}^{n}} e^{-i y \cdot \xi} u(y) \mathrm{d} y$ where $y \cdot \xi=\sum_{i=1}^{n} y_{i} \xi_{i}$ stands for the euclidean inner production in $\mathbb{R}^{n}$. Let $f$ and $g$ be two smooth functions defined in $V \times \mathbb{R}^{n}$, we define the Poisson bracket by $\{f, g\}=\sum_{j=1}^{n}\left(\partial_{\xi_{j}} f . \partial_{x_{j}} g-\partial_{x_{j}} f . \partial_{\xi_{j}} g\right)$. And if $A$ and $B$ are two operators we define there commutator by $[A, B]=A \circ B-B \circ A$.

Definition 3.1. Let $a(., ., \tau) \in \mathscr{C}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n} \times \mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ where $\tau \geq 1$ is a large parameter, such that for every muti-index $\alpha, \beta \in \mathbb{N}^{n}$ we have

where we denoted by $\langle\xi, \tau\rangle=\left(|\xi|^{2}+\tau^{2}\right)^{\frac{1}{2}}$. In this case we say that $a$ is a symbol of order $m$ and we write $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$. We call principal symbol of $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$ the equivalence class of a in $S_{\tau}^{m} / S_{\tau}^{m-1}$. We also define $S_{\tau}^{-\infty}=\bigcap_{r \in \mathbb{R}} S_{\tau}^{r}$ and $S_{\tau}^{+\infty}=\bigcup_{r \in \mathbb{R}} S_{\tau}^{r}$.
Definition 3.2. We define the pseudo-differential operator of order $m$ by

where $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$. The set of the pseudo-differential operator of order $m$ is denoted by $\Psi_{\tau}^{m}$. If $A \in \Psi_{\tau}^{m}$, we denote by $\sigma_{p}(A)$ his principal symbol.

Remarks 3.1. Let $s \in \mathbb{R}$ for $u \in \mathscr{S}^{\prime}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)$ we set the following norm

Hence we can define the corresponding space

Theorem 3.1. Let $s \in \mathbb{R}$ and $a(x, \xi, \tau) \in S_{\tau}^{m}$, then the operator $O p(a): H_{\tau}^{s} \longrightarrow H_{\tau}^{s-m}$ maps continuously and uniformly for $\tau>1$.
Lemma 3.1. Let $m \in \mathbb{R}$ and $a_{j} \in S_{\tau}^{m-j}$ with $j \in \mathbb{N}$. Then there exist $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$ such that

We then write $a \sim \sum_{j} a_{j}$. The symbol a is unique up to $S_{\tau}^{-\infty}$ in the sens that the difference of two symbols is in $S_{\tau}^{-M}$ for all $M \in \mathbb{N}$. Hence, we identify $a_{0}$ with the principal symbol of $a$.

Theorem 3.2. Let $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$ and $b \in S_{\tau}^{m^{\prime}}$, then $O p(a) \circ O p(b)=O p(c)$ with $c \in S_{\tau}^{m+m^{\prime}}$ which admits the following asymptotic expansion

c(x, \xi, \tau) \sim \sum_{\alpha} \frac{1}{i^{|\alpha|} \alpha!} \partial_{\xi}^{\alpha} a(x, \xi, \tau) \partial_{x}^{\alpha} b(x, \xi, \tau)
$$

Theorem 3.3. Let $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$ and $b \in S_{\tau}^{m^{\prime}}$, then $[O p(a), O p(b)]=O p(c)$ with $c \in S_{\tau}^{m+m^{\prime}-1}$ and principal symbol

\sigma(c)(x, \xi, \tau)=\frac{1}{i}\{a, b\}(x, \xi, \tau)
$$

which admits the following asymptotic expansion

c(x, \xi, \tau) \sim \sum_{\alpha} \frac{1}{i^{|\alpha|} \alpha!}\left(\partial_{\xi}^{\alpha} a(x, \xi, \tau) \partial_{x}^{\alpha} b(x, \xi, \tau)-\partial_{\xi}^{\alpha} b(x, \xi, \tau) \partial_{x}^{\alpha} a(x, \xi, \tau)\right)
$$

Theorem 3.4. Let $a \in S_{\tau}^{m}$, then $O p(a)^{*}=O p(b)$ with $b \in S_{\tau}^{m}$ which admits the following asymptotic expansion

b(x, \xi, \tau) \sim \sum_{\alpha} \frac{1}{i^{|\alpha|} \alpha!} \partial_{\xi}^{\alpha} \partial_{x}^{\alpha} \bar{a}(x, \xi, \tau)
$$

In particular we have $\sigma_{p}\left(O p(a)^{*}\right)=\bar{a}$.
Theorem 3.5 (Gårding inequality). Let $K$ be a compact subset of $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $a(x, \xi, \tau) \in S_{\tau}^{m}$, of principal symbol $a_{m}$. We suppose that there exist $C>0$ and $R>0$ such that

\operatorname{Re} a_{m}(x, \xi, \tau) \geq C\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{m}, \quad \forall x \in K, \xi \in \mathbb{R}^{n}, \tau \geq 1,\langle\xi, \tau\rangle \geq R

Then for any $0<C^{\prime}<C$ there exists $\tau_{*}>0$ we have

\operatorname{Re}(O p(a) u, u)_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}\right)} \geq C^{\prime}\|u\|_{\tau, \frac{m}{2}}^{2}, \quad \forall u \in \mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}(K), \tau \geq \tau_{*}
$$

3.2. Local Carleman estimate away from the boundary. We set the operator

a real values function $\varphi$ and then we define the conjugate operator by

where $\mu$ is a parameter that depends on $\tau$, precisely we suppose that

\end{equation*}
$$

for some constants $c_{0}^{\prime}>c_{0}>0$. Then we have

P_{\varphi}(x, D) w=-\mu^{2} w-\Delta w+2 \tau \nabla \varphi \cdot \nabla w-\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2} w+\tau \Delta \varphi w
$$

whose symbol is given by

\sigma\left(P_{\varphi}\right)=|\xi|^{2}+2 i \tau \nabla \varphi \cdot \xi-\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2}+\tau \Delta \varphi-\mu^{2}
$$

and with principal symbol $p_{\varphi}$ given by

p_{\varphi}(x, \xi, \tau)=|\xi+i \tau \nabla \varphi|^{2}-\mu^{2}=|\xi|^{2}+2 i \tau \nabla \varphi \cdot \xi-\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2}-\mu^{2}
$$

We define the following self-adjoint operators

Q_{2}=\frac{P_{\varphi}+P_{\varphi}^{*}}{2} \quad \text { and } \quad Q_{1}=\frac{P_{\varphi}-P_{\varphi}^{*}}{2 i}
$$

with principal symbols respectively

$$
q_{2}(x, \xi, \tau)=|\xi|^{2}-\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2}-\mu^{2} \quad \text { and } \quad q_{1}(x, \xi, \tau)=2 \tau \nabla \varphi \cdot \xi
$$

Noting that $P_{\varphi}=Q_{2}+i Q_{1}$ and $p_{\varphi}=q_{2}+i q_{1}$.

We assume that the weight function $\varphi \in \mathscr{C}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}, \mathbb{R}\right)$ satisfies the following sub-ellipticity condition in $K$ a compact set of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$, if

& |\nabla \varphi|>0 \text { in } K  \tag{3.4}\\
& \forall(x, \xi, \tau) \in K \times \mathbb{R}^{n} \times[1,+\infty) ; p_{\varphi}(x, \xi, \tau)=0 \Longrightarrow\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}(x, \xi, \tau) \geq C\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{3}>0
\end{align*}
$$

Note that the constant $C$ does not depend on $\mu$ assuming (3.3).
Remark 3.1. Noting that

p_{\varphi}(x, \xi, \tau)=0 \Longleftrightarrow|\xi|^{2}=\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2}+\mu^{2} \text { and } \nabla \varphi \cdot \xi=0 .
$$

Lemma 3.2. Let $\psi \in \mathscr{C}^{\infty}\left(\mathbb{R}^{n}, \mathbb{R}\right)$ such that $|\nabla \psi|>0$ in $K$. Then for $\lambda$ large enough $\varphi=e^{\lambda \psi}$ satisfies the sub-ellipticity assumption in $K$.

Proof. We can assume that $\psi \geq 0$, as we can add a constant to $\psi$ and $\varphi$ is multiplied by a constant $\beta$. Changing $\tau$ in $\tau / \beta$ we can see that sub-ellipticity condition is also satisfied for a different constant $C$. A straightforward calculation shows that

\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}(x, \xi, \tau)=4 \tau\left({ }^{t} \xi \varphi^{\prime \prime} \xi+\tau^{2}{ }^{t}(\nabla \varphi) \varphi^{\prime \prime} \nabla \varphi\right)

Using the fact that $\varphi=e^{\lambda \psi}$ then we have

\nabla \varphi=\lambda \nabla \psi \varphi, \quad \varphi_{j}^{\prime}=\lambda \varphi \psi_{j}^{\prime} \quad \text { and } \quad \varphi_{j k}^{\prime \prime}=\lambda \varphi \psi_{j k}^{\prime \prime}+\lambda^{2} \varphi \psi_{j}^{\prime} \psi_{k}^{\prime}, 1 \leq j, k \leq n
$$

therefore we obtain

\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}=4 \tau \lambda^{3} \varphi^{3}\left(\lambda \tau^{2}|\nabla \psi|^{4}+\tau^{2}{ }^{t}(\nabla \psi) \psi^{\prime \prime} \nabla \psi+|\lambda \varphi|^{-2}{ }^{t} \xi \psi^{\prime \prime} \xi+\lambda^{-1}|\varphi|^{-2}|\nabla \psi \cdot \xi|^{2}\right) .
$$

Now if $p_{\varphi}=0$ then $|\xi|^{2}=\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2}+\mu^{2}=\tau^{2} \lambda^{2} \varphi^{2}|\nabla \psi|^{2}+\mu^{2}$, which gives that

|\lambda \varphi|^{-2}{ }^{t} \xi \psi^{\prime \prime} \xi \geq-\left|\psi^{\prime \prime}\right|\left(\tau^{2}|\nabla \psi|^{2}+|\lambda \varphi|^{-2} \mu^{2}\right) \geq-C \tau^{2}\left(|\nabla \psi|^{2}+\lambda^{-2}\right)
$$

Besides, we have

Then it follows from these estimates that

\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\} & \geq 4 \tau \lambda^{3} \varphi^{3}\left(\lambda \tau^{2}|\nabla \psi|^{4}+\tau^{2}{ }^{t}(\nabla \psi) \psi^{\prime \prime} \nabla \psi+|\lambda \varphi|^{-2}{ }^{t} \xi \psi^{\prime \prime} \xi\right) \\
& \geq 4 \tau \lambda^{3} \varphi^{3}\left(\lambda \tau^{2}|\nabla \psi|^{4}-C \tau^{2}|\nabla \psi|^{2}-C \tau^{2} \lambda^{-2}\right)
\end{aligned}
$$

Since $|\nabla \psi|>0$ in the compact set $K$ then for $\lambda$ large enough we have $\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\} \geq C_{\lambda} \tau^{3}>0$. As $|\xi|$ is comparable to $\tau$ on $p_{\varphi}=0$, we obtain the result.

Lemma 3.3. Let $f$ and $g$ be two real continuous functions defined in $K$ such that $f$ is positive on a compact subset $K$ of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ and verifies that

\forall y \in K, \quad f(y)=0 \Longrightarrow g(y) \geq L>0
$$

We set $h_{\kappa}=\kappa f+g$, then for $\kappa$ sufficiently large then $h_{\kappa} \geq C$ for some constant $C>0$.
Proof. Let $y_{0} \in K$ to prove the result we distinguish two cases.
Case 1: We assume $f\left(y_{0}\right)=0$. Then according to the assumption made in this lemma we have $h_{\kappa}\left(y_{0}\right)=g\left(y_{0}\right) \geq L$. Then there exists a neighborhood of $y_{0}, V_{y_{0}}$ such that for $y \in V_{y_{0}}$ and every $\kappa>0, h_{\kappa}(y) \geq g(y) \geq L / 2$. Let $\kappa_{y_{0}}=1$.
Case 2: We assume $f\left(y_{0}\right)>0$. Since $f$ and $g$ are continuous, there exist $V_{y_{0}}$ a neighborhood of $y_{0}$ and $C_{1}, C_{2}>0$ such that $f(y) \geq C_{1}$ and $|g(y)| \leq C_{2}$ for all $y \in V_{y_{0}}$. Then for all $\kappa \geq\left(L+C_{2}\right) / C_{1}, h_{\kappa}(y) \geq L$. Let $\kappa_{y_{0}}=\left(L+C_{2}\right) / C_{1}$.

We cover $K$, by compactness argument, by a finite number of such neighborhoods $V_{y_{1}}, \ldots, V_{y_{p}}$ with associated $\kappa_{j}=\kappa_{y_{j}}$. Taking $\kappa=\max _{1 \leq j \leq p}\left\{\kappa_{j}\right\}$, we have $h_{\kappa}(y) \geq L / 2$ on each $V_{y_{j}}$, then on $K$. This completes the proof.

Lemma 3.4. Let $V$ an open bounded subset of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ and $\kappa>0$. We suppose that $\varphi$ verifies the sub-ellipticity assumption on $K$ and we set $\rho_{\kappa}=\kappa\left(q_{2}^{2}+q_{1}^{2}\right)+\tau\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}$. Then for $\kappa$ large enough there exists $C>0$ such that for all $(x, \xi) \in K \times \mathbb{R}^{d}$ and $\tau \geq 1$ we have $\rho_{\kappa}(x, \xi) \geq C\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{4}$.

Proof. First we assume $|\xi|$ large with respect $\tau$, that is $|\xi| \geq \beta \tau$ for $\beta$ sufficiently large, to be fixed below. We have
$\rho_{\kappa}(x, \xi)=\kappa\left(q_{2}^{2}+q_{1}^{2}\right)+\tau\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}$

=\kappa\left(|\xi|^{2}-\left(\tau^{2}|\nabla \varphi|^{2}+\mu^{2}\right)\right)^{2}+4 \kappa \tau^{2}(\nabla \varphi \cdot \xi)^{2}+4 \tau^{2}{ }^{t} \xi \varphi^{\prime \prime} \xi+\tau^{4}{ }^{t}(\nabla \varphi) \varphi^{\prime \prime} \nabla \varphi
$$

$$
\begin{align*}
& =\kappa\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{4}\left(1-\frac{\left(\tau^{2}\left(1+|\nabla \varphi|^{2}\right)+\mu^{2}\right)}{\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{2}}\right)^{2}+4 \kappa \tau^{2}(\nabla \varphi \cdot \xi)^{2}+4 \tau^{2}{ }^{t} \xi \varphi^{\prime \prime} \xi+\tau^{4}{ }^{t}(\nabla \varphi) \varphi^{\prime \prime} \nabla \varphi  \tag{3.5}\\
& \geq C^{\prime}\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{4}-C \tau^{2}|\xi|^{2}-C \tau^{4}
\end{align*}
$$

if $\beta$ is sufficiently large such that $\frac{\left(\tau^{2}\left(1+|\nabla \varphi|^{2}\right)+\mu^{2}\right)}{\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{2}} \leq 1 / 2$ and for some constants $C^{\prime}, C>0$. If $\beta$ is sufficiently large we obtain $C \tau^{2}|\xi|^{2}+C \tau^{4} \leq C^{\prime}\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{4} / 2$, from (3.5) we obtain $\rho_{\kappa}(x, \xi) \geq$ $C^{\prime \prime}\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{4}$, for $C^{\prime \prime}>0$. This fixes $\beta$.

Second we assume $|\xi| \leq \beta \tau$. As $\rho_{\kappa}$ is homogeneous of degree 4 in $(\xi, \tau, \mu)$, we can prove the estimate on $K^{\prime}=\left\{(x, \xi, \tau, \mu) \in K \times \mathbb{R}^{d} \times[0,+\infty) \times \mathbb{R},|\xi|^{2}+\tau^{2}+\mu^{2}=1,|\xi| \leq \beta \tau, c_{0} \tau \leq|\mu| \leq\right.$ $\left.c_{0}^{\prime} \tau\right\}$ taking into account of (3.3). As $K^{\prime}$ is a compact set, we can apply Lemma 3.3 by taking $f=q_{2}^{2}+q_{1}^{2}$ and $g=\tau\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}$. This completes the proof.
Theorem 3.6. Let $\Omega$ be an open bounded set of $\mathbb{R}^{n}$ and $\varphi$ be a function that satisfies the sub-ellipticity assumption in $K$. Then there exist $\tau_{*}>0$ and $C>0$ such that

\begin{equation*}
\tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}^{2}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} \nabla r\right\|_{0}^{2}+\tau^{-1} \sum_{\alpha=2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} D^{\alpha} r\right\|_{0}^{2} \leq C\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} \operatorname{Pr}\right\|_{0}^{2} \tag{3.6}
\end{equation*}
$$

for all $r \in \mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}(K), \tau \geq \tau_{*}$ and $\mu$ satisfying (3.3).
This theorem is classical, and we can find in Hörmander [14]. Here we give a proof to be complete.

Proof. Let's take $w=e^{\tau \varphi} r$ then $\operatorname{Pr}=f$ can be written as follow $P_{\varphi} w=g=f e^{\tau \varphi}$. Since $g=Q_{2} w+i Q_{1} w$ and $Q_{1}$ and $Q_{2}$ are symmetric then we have

\|g\|_{0}^{2} & =\left\|Q_{2} w\right\|_{0}^{2}+\left\|Q_{1} w\right\|_{0}^{2}+i\left(Q_{1} w, Q_{2} w\right)-i\left(Q_{2} w, Q_{1} w\right) \\
& =\left(Q_{2} Q_{2} w, w\right)+\left(Q_{1} Q_{1} w, w\right)+i\left(Q_{2} Q_{1} w, w\right)-i\left(Q_{1} Q_{2} w, w\right) \\
& =\left(\left(Q_{1}^{2}+Q_{2}^{2}+i\left[Q_{2}, Q_{1}\right]\right) w, w\right) \tag{3.7}
\end{align*}
$$

We fix $\kappa$ large enough such that the statement of Lemma 3.4 is fulfilled, then for $\tau$ sufficiently large satisfying $\kappa \tau^{-1} \leq 1$ then from (3.7) we obtain

\tau^{-1}\left(\left(\kappa\left(Q_{1}^{2}+Q_{2}^{2}\right)+i \tau\left[Q_{2}, Q_{1}\right]\right) w, w\right) \leq\|g\|_{0}^{2} \tag{3.8}

Since the principal symbol of $\kappa\left(Q_{1}^{2}+Q_{2}^{2}\right)+i \tau\left[Q_{2}, Q_{1}\right]$ is given by $\rho_{\kappa}(x, \xi, \tau)=\kappa\left(q_{2}^{2}+q_{1}^{2}\right)+\tau\left\{q_{2}, q_{1}\right\}$ then from Lemma 3.4 we have $\rho_{\kappa}(x, \xi, \tau) \geq C\langle\xi, \tau\rangle^{4}$ therefore by Gårding inequality (Theorem 3.5) it follows that

$$

then we have

\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} \nabla r\right\|_{0}^{2} \leq C\left(\tau^{3}\|w\|_{0}^{2}+\tau\|\nabla w\|_{0}^{2}\right) \tag{3.11}
\end{equation*}
$$

and

\begin{equation*}
\tau^{-1} \sum_{|\alpha|=2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} D^{\alpha} r\right\|_{0}^{2} \leq C\left(\tau^{3}\|w\|_{0}^{2}+\tau\|\nabla w\|_{0}^{2}+\tau^{-1} \sum_{|\alpha|=2}\left\|D^{\alpha} w\right\|_{0}^{2}\right) \tag{3.12}
\end{equation*}
$$

Thus, estimate (3.6) follows by replacing (3.11) and (3.12) into (3.10). This concludes the proof.

Theorem 3.7. Let $\Omega$ be an open bounded set of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$, let $K \Subset \Omega$ and $\varphi$ be a function that satisfies the sub-ellipticity assumption in $K$. Then there exist $\tau_{*}>0$ and $C>0$ such that

\tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}^{2}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} \nabla r\right\|_{0}^{2} \leq C \tau^{2}\left(\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} g\right\|_{0}^{2}+\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} f\right\|_{0}^{2}\right)
$$

for all $r \in \mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}(K)$ which satisfies (3.2), $\tau \geq \tau_{*}$ and $\mu$ satisfying (3.3).
From this theorem we can deduce this corollary.
Corollary 3.1. Let $\Omega$ be an open bounded set of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$, let $K \Subset \Omega$ and $\varphi$ be a function that satisfies the sub-ellipticity assumption in $K$. Then there exist $\tau_{*}>0$ and $C>0$ such that

\tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0}^{2}+\tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}^{2}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} \nabla r\right\|_{0}^{2} \leq C \tau^{2}\left(\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} g\right\|_{0}^{2}+\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} f\right\|_{0}^{2}\right)
$$

for all $r, u \in \mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}(K)$ which satisfies (3.1), $\tau \geq \tau_{*}$ and $\mu$ satisfying (3.3).
Proof. As $r$ satisfies (3.2), with Theorem 3.7, we only have to estimate $\tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0}^{2}$. From the first equation of (3.1) we have $\tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0}^{2} \lesssim \tau^{3}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} \mu^{-1}(f+\nabla r)\right\|_{0}^{2}$, which gives the result using (3.3).

Proof of Theorem 3.7. We set $P_{\varphi}=e^{\tau \varphi} P e^{-\tau \varphi}, w=e^{\tau \varphi} r, F=-e^{\tau \varphi} f$ and $G=i \mu e^{\tau \varphi} g+$ $\tau e^{\tau \varphi} \nabla \varphi . f$. Then from (3.2) we have

Let $K_{1}$ be such that $K \Subset K_{1} \Subset \Omega$ and let $\chi \in \mathscr{C}_{c}^{\infty}\left(K_{1}\right)$ be such that $\chi=1$ on $K$. Setting $v=\chi \Lambda_{\tau}^{-1} w$ with $\Lambda_{\tau}=\left(\tau^{2}-\Delta\right)^{1 / 2}$ and we write

P_{\varphi} v=\chi \Lambda_{\tau}^{-1} P_{\varphi} w+\left[P_{\varphi}, \chi \Lambda_{\tau}^{-1}\right] w=\chi \Lambda_{\tau}^{-1}(G+\operatorname{div}(F))+\left[P_{\varphi}, \chi \Lambda_{\tau}^{-1}\right] w
$$

then we find

Applying Estimate (3.9) in the proof of Theorem 3.6 to $v$ then we obtain

We have $v=\Lambda_{\tau}^{-1} w+\left[\chi, \Lambda_{\tau}^{-1}\right] w$ then $\|w\|_{\tau, 1} \lesssim\|v\|_{\tau, 2}+\|w\|_{0}$. That together with (3.13)

3.3. Local Carleman estimate at the boundary. In this section because the boundary, we use a tangential pseudo-differential calculus. This calculus is completely analogous to the one presented in Section 3.1 except that a function $a\left(x^{\prime}, x_{d}, \xi^{\prime}\right)$ is a symbol in $\left(x^{\prime}, \xi^{\prime}\right)$ in the sense of Definition 3.1 where $x_{d}$ is a parameter and the estimates given in Definition 3.1 are uniform with respect $x_{d}$. To avoid confusion we denote by $S_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{m}$ the class of tangential symbol of order $m, \mathrm{Op}_{\mathrm{T}}(a)$ the operator associated with the symbol $a \in S_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{m}$. The class of operators associated with symbols in $S_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{m}$ is denoted by $\Psi_{T, \tau}^{m}$. We refer to [20] for details on these symbols and operators. We consider functions in a half space $\mathbb{R}^{d-1} \times(0,+\infty)=\mathbb{R}_{+}^{d}$, and we denote by $\|\cdot\|_{+}=\|\cdot\|_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}_{+}^{d}\right)}$ the $L^{2}$-norm and $(., .)_{+}=(., .)_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}_{+}^{d}\right)}$ the associated inner product. At the boundary $x_{d}=0$ we denote the $L^{2}$-norm by $|g|^{2}=\int_{\mathbb{R}^{d-1}}\left|g\left(x^{\prime}\right)\right|^{2} \mathrm{~d} x^{\prime}$ and the inner product associated by $(., .)_{\partial}=(., .)_{L^{2}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d-1}\right)}$. A set $W=\omega \times \Gamma$ in $\mathbb{R}^{d} \times \mathbb{R}^{d-1} \times \mathbb{R}^{+}$is called a conic open set, if there exist $\omega$ an open set in $\mathbb{R}^{d}$, and $\Gamma$ an open set in $\mathbb{R}^{d-1} \times \mathbb{R}^{+}$such that for all $\left(\xi^{\prime}, \tau\right) \in \Gamma$ and $\lambda>0$ then $\left(\lambda \xi^{\prime}, \lambda \tau\right) \in \Gamma$. For $s \in \mathbb{R}$ we denote by $\Lambda_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{s}$ the tangential operator defined by $\Lambda_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{s}=\mathrm{Op}_{\mathrm{T}}\left(\left\langle\xi^{\prime}, \tau\right\rangle^{s}\right)$.

We recall the following microlocal Gårding inequality obtained, for instance, by applying sharp Gårding inequality.

Let $K$ be a compact set of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ and let $W$ be a conic open set of $\mathbb{R}^{d} \times \mathbb{R}^{d-1} \times \mathbb{R}^{+}$contained in $K \times \mathbb{R}^{d-1} \times \mathbb{R}^{+}$. Let also $\chi \in S_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{0}$ be homogeneous of order $0\left(\right.$ for $\left.\left\langle\xi^{\prime}, \tau\right\rangle \geq 1\right)$ and be such that $\operatorname{supp}(\chi) \subset W$.

Let $a\left(x, \xi^{\prime}, \tau\right) \in S_{\mathrm{T}, \tau}^{m}$, with principal part $a_{m}$ homogeneous of order $m$. If there exist $C_{0}>0$ and $R>0$ such that

As we want to change the variables in order to have a flat boundary which is convenient to do the computations, we use the language and usual tools of Riemannian geometry. In this framework the gradient and divergence operators keep forms we can follow after a change of variables. Our purpose is to use these tools locally and we do not use manifold tools as charts, atlas and etc. To fix the notation, let $V$ be an open set in $\mathbb{R}^{d}$. Let $g(x)=\left(g_{i j}(x)\right)_{1 \leq i, j \leq d}$ be a positive symmetric matrix called the metric, we denote by $g^{-1}(x)=\left(g^{i j}(x)\right)_{1 \leq i, j \leq d}$ the inverse of $g(x)$. For a smooth function $r$, we denote by $\left(\nabla_{g} r(x)\right)^{i}=\sum_{1 \leq j \leq d} g^{i j}(x) \partial_{x_{j}} \bar{r}(x)$ the gradient of $r$. We have $\nabla_{g} r(x) \in T_{x} V$, this means that $\nabla_{g} r$ is a tangent vector field.

For $u(x)=\left(u^{1}(x), \ldots, u^{d}(x)\right)$ a smooth tangent vector field, we define the divergence operator by

We can define on each manifold $x_{d}=$ const the gradient and divergence operators associated with $\tilde{g}$ and for $r$ a smooth function and $\tilde{u}=\left(u^{1}, \ldots, u^{d-1}\right)$ a smooth vector field on $x_{d}=$ const, we have

The definition of $\alpha$ is ambiguous when $q-\mu^{2} \leq 0$ but in this case if $q-\mu^{2}<0$ the root are simple and the analysis below is independent of the choice of root. In particular the roots are smooth, or if $q-\mu^{2}=0$ the root is double and below, we give a specific analysis in this case. The root of $P(\lambda)$ are $i \tau \partial_{x_{d}} \varphi \pm i \alpha$ and the analysis in what follows depends on the location of roots in complex plane. We have the following result, denoting $s=t^{2}$ where $t, s \in \mathbb{C}$ we have for $r_{0}>0$,

for $v, w \in \mathscr{S}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)$ satisfying (3.19), for every $\tau \geq \tau_{*}$ and $\mu$ satisfying (3.3).
This lemma implies Proposition 3.1 as we can cover $\left\langle\xi^{\prime}, \tau\right\rangle=1$ by a finite number of open sets given by the statement of Lemma 3.5.

For the proof of Lemma 3.5, we distinguish two cases, $\alpha \neq 0$ and $\alpha=0$.
Assume that $\alpha\left(x_{0}, \xi_{0}^{\prime}, \tau_{0}\right) \neq 0$. ## 4. Logarithmic stability

The exponential estimate of Proposition 2.1 is the consequence of the two following results. First a global Carleman estimate with an observability term and second an estimate of the observability term coming from the dissipation.

Let $\omega_{0}$ and $\omega_{1}$ be open sets such that $\omega_{1} \Subset \omega_{0} \Subset \omega$, and, from (1.2), we have $b(x) \geq b_{-}>0$ for $x \in \omega$. In what follows we denote by $\|\cdot\|_{0}:=\|\cdot\|_{L^{2}(\Omega)}$.

Theorem 4.1. Let $\Omega$ be an open bounded set of $\mathbb{R}^{d}$ with smooth boundary. Let $\varphi \in \mathscr{C}\left(\mathbb{R}^{d}\right)$ be a function that satisfies the sub-ellipticity assumption in $\bar{\Omega} \backslash \omega_{1}$. Then there exist $\tau_{*}>0$ and $C>0$ such that

Remarks 4.1. It is classical that there exist $\psi$ such that $\partial_{n} \psi(x)<0$ for $x \in \partial \Omega$ and $\nabla \psi \neq 0$ for $x \in \bar{\Omega} \backslash \omega_{1}$ (see Fursikov-Imanuvilov [12]). From Lemma 3.2, $\varphi=e^{\lambda \psi}$ satisfies sub-ellipticity condition in $\bar{\Omega} \backslash \omega_{1}$ for $\lambda$ sufficiently large. In what follows we fix such a function $\varphi$.

Proposition 4.1. Let $(u, r) \in \mathcal{D}(\mathcal{A})$ solution of $\left(\mathcal{A}_{d}+i \mu\right)(u, r)=(f, g) \in H$. Then we have

Integrating by parts, we have $-(\nabla r, u)=$ $(r, \operatorname{div} u)$ as $u \cdot n=0$ on $\partial \Omega$. Using the second equation $-\operatorname{div} u+i \mu r=g$, we have $-(\nabla r, u)=$ $(r, i \mu r-g)$. We thus obtain

Taking the inner product between $-\operatorname{div} u+i \mu r=g$ and $\chi^{2} r$, we obtain $\left(-\operatorname{div} u, \chi^{2} r\right)+i \mu\|\chi r\|^{2}=\left(g, \chi^{2} r\right)$. Integrating by parts we have $\left(-\operatorname{div} u, \chi^{2} r\right)=\left(u, \chi^{2} \nabla r\right)+(u, 2 \chi r \nabla \chi)$ and by equation $-\nabla r+$ $i \mu u-b u=f$ we have

Let $\left(\chi_{j}\right)_{j \in J}$ be a partition of unity subordinated to $\left(V_{j}\right)_{j \in J}$ such that $\sum_{j \in J} \chi_{j}(x)=1$ for $x \in \bar{\Omega} \backslash \omega_{1}$. Let $u_{j}=\chi_{j} u$ and $r_{j}=\chi_{j} r$ where $(u, r)$ solution to (3.1), $\left.u \cdot n\right|_{\Gamma}=0$. We have

& -\nabla r_{j}+i \mu u_{j}=\chi_{j} f-r \nabla \chi_{j} \\
& -\operatorname{div} u_{j}+i \mu r_{j}=\chi_{j} g-u \cdot \nabla \chi_{j}
\end{aligned}

We can apply the Carleman estimate (4.4) in each $V_{j}$ and we obtain

\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r_{j}\right\|_{0}+\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u_{j}\right\|_{0} & \lesssim \tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi}\left(\chi_{j} g-u \cdot \nabla \chi_{j}\right)\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi}\left(\chi_{j} f-r \nabla \chi_{j}\right)\right\|_{0} \\
& \lesssim \tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} g\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} f\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}
\end{aligned}
$$

We have

\begin{aligned}
\tau^{3 / 2} & \left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}+\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0} \\
& \lesssim \tau^{3 / 2} \sum_{j \in J}\left(\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r_{j}\right\|_{0}+\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u_{j}\right\|_{0}\right)+\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\omega_{0}\right)}+\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\omega_{0}\right)} \\
& \lesssim \tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} g\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} f\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}+\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\omega_{0}\right)}+\tau^{3 / 2}\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{L^{2}\left(\omega_{0}\right)}
\end{aligned}
$$

This gives the sought result as we can absorb the term $\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} u\right\|_{0}+\tau\left\|e^{\tau \varphi} r\right\|_{0}$ with the left hand side.

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
